## Radar Trouble Postpones Space Shot; Set Wednesday, 6a.m.

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (UPI)- L. Gordon Cooper's attempt to fly 22 times around the world was postponed for 24 hours today by a faulty tracking radar on which his safety and the success of his mission depended.

Walter C. Williams, operations thief of the Mercury space program, announced that a second attempt would be made at 6 a.m. CST Wednesday.

Today's postponement was announced at 8:57 a.m., CSI, 12 minutes before the 36-year-old Air Force major was to have vaulted into the sky atop an Atlas rocket for a 34-hour trip through space. He had been in his cramped Faith 7 cabin 4 hours and 19 minutes when the reluctant decision was made to

Cooper's mission is to spend 34 hours in space to check the effects of weightlessness on human beings and to perform tests vital

to the forthcoming two-man Gem-

ini Apollo moon flights.

The faulty radar is at Bermuda, one of the key stations in the worldwide Mercury tracking network. This is the radar that tracks a spacecraft as it goes into orbit at a point 100 miles in space and 500 miles from the Cape.

The "scrub" came nearly 50 minutes after another difficulty, a balky diesel engine, had been cleared up. The engine is used to move the 450-ton service tower to and away from Cooper's mighty Atlas booster. It rejused to work when called on to move the tower at 7:05 a.m. It took a little more than two hours to get it going. Meanwhile, the Bermuda ra lar

was working only intermittently. These difficulties spoiled an otherwise perfect pre-flight countdown. The weather was fine here and at key recovery areas around the world. Cooper was in "tip-top" shape. The Atlas was ready to go.

Wednesday is the earliest another attempt can be made. The big Atlas had been loaded with 160,000 pounds of liquid oxygen to burn the 73,000 pounds of high grade kerosene fuel previously put aboard.

Technicians began at once to drain the liquid oxygen, roll the service tower back in place, and liberate Cooper from his cabin.

Asked just when the launch would be attempted again, an official said "It's too early to tell." It was not immediately determined what had gone wrong with the Bermuda radar. The trouble showed up around 6 a.m. CST. The countdown had been continued, however, in the hope the radar would start functioning

The postponement was a disappointment not only to Cooper but to the whole Mercury space team. President Kennedy and Democratic congressional leaders were at breakfast when the delay caused by the diesel engine was disclosed. Senate Democratic leader Mike Mansfield said the President indicated "great interest in the flight."

But delays and scrubs are old stuff in the space business. The first American in orbit, Lt. Col. John H. Glenn Jr. sweated it out twice in his spacecraft before he got off on his three-orbit flight Feb. 20, 1962.

Virgil I. Grissom, who made a suborbital flight July 21, 1961, atso was removed from his cabin because of delays. Grissom holds the record for time spent in a capsule before flight-6 hours and 19 minutes.

It was Glenn who voiced the thought always uppermost in the minds of astronauts. When he was pulled out of his cabin he said, "There'll be another day."

Officials had hoped to the last to get Cooper off today on his 575,000-mile flight. A postponealways raises the possibility that it may turn sour before the next attempt can be made.



These are the farmers who grow 15 acres of wheat or less, or those who grow 30 acres or less and use it all on their own farm. Such farmers are not now under acreage controls. This expanded control program will create a management and compliance problem of gigantic proportions.

Then too, certificates wi'l be is sued to farmers for millions of bushels of wheat, up to approximately 80 per cent of the "nor. mal" crop under controls. This huge certificate system has even some Agriculture Department officials worried. Gingerly remembering Billie Sol Estes, they are concerned about the possibility of a black market in grain certificates, worth 70 cents a bushel to some farmers.

In broad outline, if two . thirds of the growers vote for the new wheat plan:

- Each will have his acreage cut. He will be paid for retiring this land for the first two years and can use it only for soil conservation. Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman says the 1964 cut -the land to go for soil conservation-will be 10 per cent of the farmer's former allowable acre-

- A certain amount of the crop he grows on the remaining 90 per cent of his acreage will be certiscate wheat. This amount will vary from year to year. But the Secretary of Agriculture has said that 80 per cent of the normal yield (from past years) that the farmer grows on that 90 per cent of his land wll be certificate wheat in the 1964 crop year.

Up to now, a farmer who planted more acres than he was ailoted paid a penalty equivalent to his normal yield times his excess acres. Under the new plan a farmer who grows more than his acreage pays a penalty of double his normal yield times the over-planted acreage times 65 per cent of

If more than one third of the voting farmers vote "no" in the Wheat Referendum, price supports will drop to 50 per cent of parity (about \$1.25 per bushel on national average) for farmers who stay within their acreage allotments. They would not receive diversion payments or the certificates worth 70 cents a bushel.

This referendum is for the 1964 year only, but the program is set up as a continuing plan. The thinking in the Department of Agriculture is that once voted in, the program would be continued.

Those opposing the wheat program note that the prices and acreage allotments being granted farmers are being set high this first year compared to what they could be. These opponents claim that this is "sweetening" to get the farmers into the program They claim that once the farmer is in the program, the Government, in future years, will cut down the "sweeteners."

The proponents of the program say that farmers will vote each year and can then vote themselves out again. The program opponents reply by saying that once farmers vote themselves in, they've gotten themselves in a position where it becomes more difficult psychologically and economically to vote



### l elevision Review

By RICK DU BROW United Press International

HOLLYWOOD (UPI) - Round two of Congress' investigation of television ratings begins today in Washington, with things looking up. Here's how matters stand:

Rep. Oren Harris and his sub committee, who spotlighted glan ing ratings weaknesses in hear ings that ended last month, apparently have no intention of easing off after a few good punches. As the hearings resume today, broadcasters, sponsors, agencies and ratings firms have been made acutely aware that if remedies are not provided quickly, the federal government is very likely to step in. This would be to guarantee audience measure-

ment standards and samplings. Whenever there is a chance of federal interference in commercial matters, the threatened party is bound to holler, and rightly so. One must restrain a smile, however, when various parties involved in the present case issue the usual cry: "We can take care of this ourselves." They of course, if they only would; but if they had in the past, and didn't just tut-tut action until they got caught with their pants down, the ratings mess and probe never would have arisen.

Plan Industry Ravings The ratings, of course, decide the life and death of shows. And Bureau of Circulations, which paper and magazine figures, and, by these figures, provides a base for advertising rates. Since television costs are sky-high, and some video advertisers are demanding a granteed audience, such an accurate auditor would also be to the advantage.

Leroy Collins, president of the National Association of Broadcasters, has described the present ratings conditions as a "sor ry state of affairs," and has asked to appear before the Harris subcommittee in its new hearings with "corrective measures." One of these measures is reported to involve establishment of a Broadcast Audit Service (BAS). Others are said to concern development of minimum measiting standards.

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

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



### Equality-Most Dangerous Fallout

Editor's Note: This article, "Equality," is playing on the word "fallout." There are dif. ferent kinds of fallout, and since fallout is such a popular subject as regards fallout from nuclear bombardment, it seems to us that it would be well to discuss the most neglected, real and most dangerous falloutthe fallout that results from not realising the most important part of spiritual, intellectual and material progress, the respect-

ing of private property. The magazine from which this article was printed is published by The Society of Individualists in London, England. The Society was founded by Sir the few employers of labor who really understood the blessings that come from private property and laisses faire economy. He scrote many books.

We make no apology for reprinting below an article which appeared in "Freedom First" in the Summer Issue of 1956. BY REALIST

(Freedom First) The "Fall Out" from a ruclear explosion is more widespread, more lasting and may be more dangerous than the explosion itself. The radio-active dust of the French Revolution, as seems to have been seen by Edmund Burke almost alone amongst his thoughtful contemporaries, was the idea of equality. This has been floating around the world for a century and a half but it has only been precipitated in its full force in the first half of this century. It was postponed by the Napoleonic dictatorship and the Industrial Revolution until it was revived with terrible results by the Bolshevik Revolution of 1917.

On the face of it the idea of equality amongst men is benign and simple. Unfortunately it is constantly misinterpreted even by people of high intelligence and experience. The whole matter was summed up 23 centuries ago by Aristotle:- "for if the persons are not equal they must not have equal shares; in fact this is the very source of all the quarrelling and wrangling in the world, either they who are equal have and get awarded to them things not equal or being not equal those things which are equal".

Justice has been well defined as "the absence of arbitrary inequality", but, as Aristotle indicates, it also implies the absence of arbitrary equality.

If an intellectual misunderstanding of the simple doctrine were all, comparatively s m all harm might have been done. Unfortunately the idea of equality is one which appeals to most men, at least in the sense that they wish to be equal to their superiors, but have no correspording desire to be equal with those who are their inferiors. And the more ignorant, selfish and oppressed men are, the stronger is the appeal. It is the basis not merely of a desire for a more even distribution of economic goods but perhaps even worse, of an inferiority complex. This psychological disease not only affects individuals but organizations such as Trade Unions and Nations. It would be an interesting study to see how far the wars of this century, both great and small, have resulted from it. Argument seems hopeless

against emotion. As the Persian said before the battle of

"No human affliction is worse than this; to know, and to be helpless".

All the same it is almost the only weapon which is left to combat or mitigate the disasters which have fallen and are falling so rapidly on almost all the na-

tions of the world. It happened through a series of racial, geographical and historical accidents that these islands became in effect the masters of a large part of the uncivilized world in the 19th century. The incalculable benefits this brought to its peoples seem seldom to be appreciated. It so happened also that we had been velded into a coherent whole by 1,000 years of struggling history and the idea of nationhood and democracy had. received amongst us its most enduring and strongest expression. Such an idea was wholly foreign to the greater part of Asia and Africa. But amongst the rapids which swirl beneath the catastrophic falls of the Russian Revolution and two great wars, the idea of nationality, which curiously enough was condemned by the Left Wing parties at home, was supported by them amongst the ignorant and warring tribes of these two continents. "We have and desire self - government. Therefore all other races, being equal, should have it too". This idea is a godsend to the murderous adventurers who, playing and preying on the feelings of the oppressed masses, have established themselves as independent patriots with the spreading of murder, corruption, fraud

The truth is that men even of the same race and particularly men of different races, are unequal by reason of history, their education and, most important, of their genetic qualities. They are of course equal in the sense that their character, their feelings, their pains and pleasures cannot be arbitrarily distinguished or disregarded, but in other respects their inequality is pro-

For consider equality at home, This is not unnaturally associated with democracy and universal suffrage. We can give, and have given, equal voting rights to the halfwit, the criminal and the greatest men amongst us, but we cannot give them true equality. Inequality is ineluctable. We can deny it, shut our eyes to it, degrade and even execute superior men, but we cannot abolish it. "E pur si muove".

It might be thought that the great danger of attempted equality would be the reduction of all men to the same level. This would be a desperate disaster, for a battalion can only march at the pace of its slowest soldier. But it may be doubted whether it can happen certainly it cannot endure. The result of an attempt at equality of this kind has been throughout history and is today tyranny and a slave state. Are we sure, even in this coun-

try, that we are safe from that? The effects of equalitarianism at home, though they have not resulted in a dictatorship, are already becoming serious. Many people think that the real prosperity of the manual workers of this nation, considerable, though not so great as inflation makes it appear. is the result of pressure on their behalf by Trade Unions. Whether this is true to any extent is, to say the least, doubtful. What is certain is that the enormous increase in producand the adaptation by industry, particularly large scale industry, of scientific discoveries and inventions. Was it not Foch who said - "It was not the Carthagirian Army that crossed the Alps, it was Hannibal". It is now becoming obvious that we are short of people of the necessary intellectual and moral powers even to maintain, still less to improve, the nation's economic standards. This is largely due to equalitarinn doctrines which result in the less useful members of society receiving greater honour and being paid more than is proper relatively to the more useful monplace that neither young men, nor their parents, are prepared in large enough numbers to make the sacrifices necessary for a prolonged training, since they can so easily earn com-

Few people, however, seem to examine its true implications. In the first place it is completely and absolutely different from the idea of equality since, as is obvious in any athletic meeting, or in any phase of life, men are not equal, and if they are given equal opportunity, the rewards will be unrace; he will get a prize which none of the others shares. One must consider when equality of

opportunity is to start: to main-

tain the athletic metaphor, ought the whole of the competitors to be stopped in the middle of a race and to be started again afresh on equal terms? Is equality of opportunity to start at birth? If so, does this mean that parents who have shown exceptional qualities of skill, thrift and care for their children, are to obtain no advantage over those who are responsible for nothing but irresponsible reproduction? Again, are children to be taken from their parents' eare immediately they are born? If not, it is obvious that those children whose parents are of a higher order than others will be bound to give their children great advantages in early infancy. Are all children to be given equality of opportunity when, say, they attain school age? If so, that again means depriving parents of the incentive to work and save for their children, which is one of the greatest things economically and morally in the life of any State and in particular of a modern State. The same arguments apply to an attempt to give equality of opportunity after education is over. In short, are parents who have saved and worked and are therefore likely to be of superior stock not to be able to help their children to attain higher opportunities of serv-


