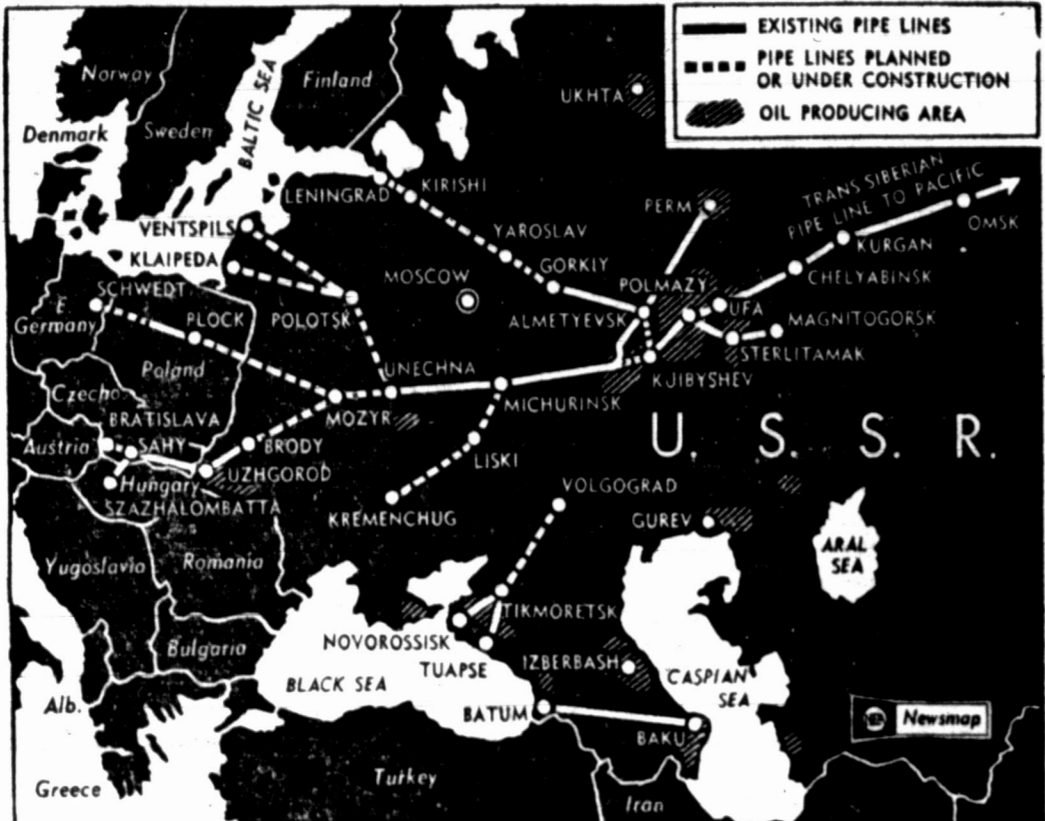

BLACK GOLD FROM THE REDS—A vast underground network is being built in the Soviet Union—a network of pipelines carrying oil from Russia's rich fields to the rest of the world. Soviet production increased more than 28 per cent between 1959 and 1961. The Soviets have now edged Venezuela out of second place next to the United States. Soviet oil expansion is cause for alarm in the West, because Soviet price-fixing allows them to undersell Western oil in many instances, thus weakening Western economic ties.

Underground Chief Intends Promoting Cuban Civil War

ATLANTA (UPI)—The chief of an underground organization said Sunday he hopes to step up raids on Communist Cuba so sharply that a civil war will erupt against dictator Fidel Castro.

Antonio Veciana, founder of Alpha 66 which has merged with "the Second Front of Escambray" as a force against Castro.

Veciana said that there are perhaps 30 groups in Cuba that have as their purpose the overthrow of Castro but they are not "operational" and hence, are ineffective.

Drive for Money

Veciana made his observations at a news conference preceding a fundraising speech made before a group of mostly Latin Americans.

He said that no arms are being furnished by the United States but that donations of money from private citizens are helping Alpha 66 continue its raids.

Veciana said Alpha 66 chapters have been formed all over the United States of persons wanting to help in the overthrow of Castro. Such chapters are now organized at Los Angeles, Philadelphia, San Antonio, Dallas, New York, Stamford and Bridgeport, Conn., and Atlanta and other chapters are in the process of being formed at Detroit and Chicago.

He said no Americans are being accepted to work for Alpha 66 at its bases in the Caribbean or on raids. But he added that recruitment is being made from Cuban refugee groups in the United States.

Photoengravers Delay Settlement Of News Strike

NEW YORK (UPI)—A deadlock between publishers and 320 striking photoengravers today pushed the New York newspaper blackout into its 10th day, despite a 3-2 vote by printers to end their walkout.

The printers, who had rejected a \$12.63 weekly package increase proposed a week earlier, reversed themselves Sunday and voted 2,562 to 1,763 to accept the contract terms.

While the printers cast their ballots on 50 city voting machines at Madison Square Garden, their striking sister union, the mailers, used black and white marbles as ballots to approve their contract by 466 to 256.

"It's wonderful," exclaimed Walter N. Thayer, spokesman for the Publishers Association of New York City, on learning that the printers had changed their stand.

Mayor Robert F. Wagner called for a new round of negotiations between the photoengravers and publishers to start at 10 a.m. EST today.

A 13-hour bargaining session ended late Sunday night with the two sides described by Wagner as "stalemated."

The photoengravers are demanding a cut in the work week from 36 1/2 hours to 35, which they claim would be in line with their craft's work week in commercial firms. Publishers contend that resulting increases in overtime pay would be too costly.

The printers maintained their picket lines today outside plants of the eight dailies involved in the shutdown. The union said they would keep picketing until a settlement is reached with the photoengravers, who went on strike last Monday.

"We won't be back to work until the photoengravers and we sign a contract, but that can be done very fast," said Bertram A. Powers, president of the International Typographical Union (ITU) Local 6.

The city's long-absent dailies will be able to return to the stands about two days after a settlement is reached with the photoengravers. A membership ratification meeting must be held before picket lines can be withdrawn and the presses roll again.

Sleigh Bells Don't Help Typhoid-Stricken Zermatt

GENEVA (UPI)—The tinkling of sleigh bells does nothing to still the fear in the ski resort of Zermatt, now haunted by the threat of spreading typhoid fever.

Even the bells themselves are heard less often.

Fewer and fewer people appear on the streets each day. This is giving the village, with its smart hotels, decorated shops and festive eating houses, something of the air of a deserted Hollywood movie set.

Very few guests range the echoing corridors of large hotels which are operating with absolute minimum staffs. The dining rooms are almost empty and guests beds go unmade until late evening.

Alive At Night

Only at night does the village come alive, when the few undaunted skiers dance and drink. This appears to be a forced gaiety, as the faces reading the skimpy medical bulletins become more serious each morning.

Several shops have closed "for reasons beyond our control."

At first many tourists—particularly the young—did not understand the seriousness of the situation because of the lack of restrictions on people coming into the village, which is cut off from the world by towering mountains except for one small railroad.

Local authorities appeared not to understand either, apparently confusing early typhoid fever cases with victims of an influenza epidemic also raging at the time.

Many foreign visitors told this correspondent they believed the authorities tried to obscure the situation to lure tourists into a sense of false security—thus cutting the already severe financial

Commission To Hear Resolution Request

City Manager Harold Schmitzer said today he will recommend Tuesday night that the City Commission adopt a resolution urging Congress to take the necessary steps to include Pampa's city firemen for Social Security participation.

The firemen, during the week end, received notification that the Federal Agency had made final determination that the City of Pampa had been in error in reporting the firemen for participation in Social Security.

The city has been deducting social security payments from the firemen's checks since 1956 and sending them to the Social Security Administration with matching checks as an employer.

City Secretary Edwin Vicars received a letter from James R. Atee, director of the Social Security Division of the State Department of Public Welfare, advising the City of Pampa of the action of the Social Security Administration in rejecting further social security participation by Pampa's 33 city firemen. Enclosed were checks totaling \$26,514.49 in refunds of payments already made for some 41 persons who have been employed in the Pampa fire department since 1956.

Apparently Social Security has ruled finally that the firemen are not eligible to participate because of the Texas Firemen's Relief and Pension Fund which is available to them. Twenty-four of Pampa's city firemen elected not to join the state pension fund and have never participated in it. At one time nine firemen did join the state fund but dropped it in 1957.

These nine never were permitted to return to Social Security participation. There are currently 24 of Pampa's 33 firemen who never joined the state pension and relief plan.

Clues Sought In Death Of Texas Socialite

PHOENIX, Ariz. (UPI)—An autopsy report today may shed some light on the slaying of a 21-year-old Texas socialite found at the mouth of a prospector's tunnel in the desert.

June Langdon, daughter of a Texas state judge, disappeared last Thursday. Her body was found Saturday by two men and a boy on a target practice outing.

Sheriff's Capt. Ralph Edmondson said evidence showed the Texas Christian coed had been forced to walk to the tunnel where she was shot once in the forehead and twice in the stomach. The autopsy was expected to be completed today.

She was last seen by a taxicab driver who let her off at the luxury apartment her family maintained in north central Phoenix, Edmondson said. The brown-haired Fort Worth, Tex., socialite had just arrived aboard an airplane to visit her ailing mother.

The cab driver told officers he let her off at the entrance to the apartments after he carried her baggage to the door.

The sheriff's captain speculated Miss Langdon, a former Arizona State University student, may have been confused about which apartment to enter since members of her family had previously stayed in a different unit.

She was not seen again until the target shooters saw the tunnel and decided to explore it.

Her father, Jack Langdon of the Texas Second Court of Civil Appeals and a Federal Bureau of Investigation agent arrived here Sunday.

Edmondson said there was no sign of a struggle at the excavation. However, he said the victim's hands had been bound with adhesive tape before she was killed. The tape was gone, leaving only traces of adhesive on her wrists, he said.

The tunnel is located about five miles north of Phoenix. Edmondson said there was no information to indicate a motive, the number of persons involved in the killing or leads to their identity.

Miss Langdon's purse was nearby, containing identification papers but no money. Edmondson said she apparently died sometime Thursday.

The Langdon family spent much of its time in Arizona.

Jane made her debut in 1961 at the Assembly ball in Fort Worth's Ridgela Country Club.

Before enrolling at TCU, she had attended Mount Vernon College in Washington and the University of Arizona.

Her father, a member of the Texas 2nd Court of Civil Appeals, was a football star for TCU during his college days.

Press Charged With Obscuring Real Issue

WASHINGTON (UPI)—A top administration officer charged today that "some of the press" has raised a "great fog bank of cliches" which obscure the real issue in the dispute over alleged government "news management."

Assistant Secretary of State for Public Affairs Robert Manning said the basic problem was the "built-in conflict" between the government's necessity to conduct some business in private and the public's "right and need" to know what is behind policy decisions.

In testimony prepared for the House Government Information subcommittee, Manning flatly rejected the idea that a government official might be justified in moments of crisis in lying to the press. He said that if the official couldn't tell the truth, he should "button his lip."

Defend News Policy

Manning and Assistant Defense Secretary for Public Affairs Arthur Sylvester were called before the subcommittee, headed by Rep. John E. Moss, D-Calif., to defend the administration's news policy.

Both have been under fire for alleged restrictions on the flow of news from their departments during and after the Cuban missile crisis, but Sylvester has drawn most of the criticism.

Manning said that "the obligation of a government official is to tell the truth or, if security dictates, to button his lip." He said he knew of no one "inside or outside our government who disputes this."

"I suppose many might accept the slogan 'Better misled than dead'—a slogan which does not represent State Department policy," (See CONFLICT, Page 3).

Missing Model Turns Up With Madrid Police

MADRID (UPI)—A red-haired London model, whose disappearance stirred a political storm in Britain, spent the night in a Madrid police station "to escape from reporters" and turned up today in an apartment filled with British newsmen.

The downtown apartment was 21-year-old Christine Keeler's latest way-station in her hide-and-seek chase with the press.

Miss Keeler left Britain two weeks ago shortly before she was to testify in the trial of her former boyfriend, a West Indian.

Last week, War Minister John P. Fumo, faced with mounting rumors, told the House of Commons he knew Miss Keeler, but had nothing to do with her disappearance.

She was discovered in Madrid Sunday night in the apartment of an American real estate man, Dick Zeidman. Then she vanished again.

John Eisenhower Quits Army After 19 Years Service

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Lt. Col. John S. D. Eisenhower, son of the former president, has submitted his resignation from the U. S. Army after 19 years of military service.

An Army spokesman said today the resignation was submitted last week at Carlisle Barracks, Pa., where young Eisenhower had been expected to begin studies next August at the Army War College.

The younger Eisenhower, now 40 years old, has been on extended leave from the Army since April 1961 to assist his father in the compilation of his official papers.

The spokesman said in response to inquiries that Eisenhower will receive no separation pay on pension rights. The minimum period of service to qualify for a military pension is 20 years.

Nationwide Strike Threatens France

PARIS (UPI)—President Charles de Gaulle, his hopes of European economic leadership plagued by growing labor unrest, faced the threat today of a possible nationwide strike by France's 2-million-man nationalized labor force.

The stage was set Sunday when union leaders of 200,000 striking coal miners rebuffed a government offer that would boost salaries 8 per cent over a 6-month period.

No new negotiations were scheduled.

Hundreds of strikers turned out in sub-freezing weather today to reinforce picket lines in the mining towns of northern France. They defied government efforts to get the mines running again.

Railway, utility, postal and airline workers also are pressing wage demands and threatening to extend nuisance walkouts.

Some observers say a general strike may be in the offing unless the government switches tactics.

The nationalized workers are angry about De Gaulle's efforts to keep production costs down by keeping wages in nationalized industries below the average of private industry.

The government claims its action is necessary to forestall inflation and keep prices level.

Workers claim they have suffered severely because of a sharp cost of living increase.

De Gaulle's hopes of leading a European economic surge are tied to keeping the franc strong.

Two Killed In Car Crash

MULESHOE, Tex. (UPI)—A speeding car being chased by police crashed into the rear of another vehicle Saturday night, killing two persons, one a child, in the shattering collision that hurled wreckage onto a third car 133 feet away.

Earl Stigallde, 47, of Muleshoe, was identified by police as the driver of the speeding car. He was killed.

Lowell Bell, 8, of Muleshoe was killed in the second car. His father, L. M. Bell, 41, and Charles Bell, 15, both were injured, but not seriously.

By LYLE C. WILSON WASHINGTON (UPI) — Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller must come up with something more persuasive than the record if he is to pry substantial numbers of Negro voters away from the Kennedy New Frontier. Rockefeller is talking and acting like a candidate for next year's Republican presidential nomination. He insists that he has not made up his mind to be or not to be a candidate. But Rocky is stumping the country in search of political support. One of Rockefeller's most important political appearances was in Albany, N. Y., before the New York State conference of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People. The Republican party desperately needs to regain the support of Negro voters. That is precisely what Rockefeller undertook to do in his March 5 Albany speech. He called the roll of civil rights accomplishments in New York State. It is impressive. Then Rockefeller analyzed the Kennedy administration record. Platform Abandoned The President's legislative recommendations, said Rockefeller, "ignore three of his most important campaign promises. They are two years too late. His recommendations cover only five out of 28 legislative recommendations of the Federal Civil Rights Commission. They ignore 23 proposals of the commission in the fields of housing, employment, education, voting rights and administration of justice. Legislation to implement the civil rights section of the

Television In Review

By RICK DU BROW United Press International HOLLYWOOD (UPI) — Ever since Marilyn Monroe died of an overdose of pills, her hand clutching a telephone, various film companies have been competing feverishly to be first to tell us her story again. Twentieth Century-Fox, which fired Miss Monroe from the movie "Something's Got to Give" shortly before her death, now is planning a full-length picture feature about her life, narrated by Rock Hudson. David Wolper's documentary factory is also reported at work on her history, for television. But Sunday night, for those captivated by this cheerful competition, both of these efforts were edged out by ABC-TV, which presented a half-hour film biography of the star, narrated by Mike Wallace. Unable to acquire much of the prize movie footage of Miss Monroe owned by competitors, the program was a modest accumulation of newsreel shots, early film efforts and still photographs; and this modesty was the chief virtue of the half hour, which pretended to little, restrained itself from moralizing and generally let the facts speak for themselves in a relatively low-key way. But the pointed use of these few materials was effective, for instance, in the showing of early still photos with her sad, wistful quality. These wonderful shots reminded one of the words of the muckraking writer William Hard in an article about the old boss of the House of Representatives, "Uncle Joe": Cannon: "No face makes you want to know more. No face tells you less." In Monroe's case no face told you more; but few persons spared the time to notice. On the other hand, the show also focused pointedly on the fact that though Hollywood's hard shell in a sense murdered her, her thirst for fame and filmland glamor unwittingly made her an accessory to her own undoing; a fact conveniently overlooked in some of the incredibly driving poetry and eulogies which vomited forth after her death, and which, more than anything, revealed examples of uncontrolled frenzy and blindly juvenile, anti-Hollywood provincialism. As Miss Monroe once put it herself: "I just want to be wonderful."

Built-In Conflict Manning said the "dilemma" which sparked the news management dispute "might be more bluntly described as a built-in conflict between the easier way of conducting certain important governmental negotiations in privacy, and the right and need of the democratic public to know the facts and policies on which the national business is being conducted." "Such a paradox exists, and it lies at the center of the questions before this committee today," he added. Manning said it was difficult to offer "specific guidelines" to govern handling information "in periods of high crisis" but "certain set principles" must be applied with "flexibility" in each case. He said: "Foreign policy in the United States must be evolved by open public discussion of proposed policies, of the objectives of those policies and in most cases of the means to be used to attain those policies."
