# John XXIII--Pope of the People

Unusual ability to project the warmth of his nature marked the reign of Pope John XXIII, which began with his ascension to the throne of St. Peter Nov. 4, 1958. The most-traveled Pope of modern times, he left confines of Vatican State frequently in connection with religious affairs. He granted a precedent-shattering audience to Alexei Adzhubei, son-in-law of Nikita Khrushchev and representative of the Communist ideology which is the arch foe of Christianity. The ecumenical council called by Pope John may, if it finishes sitting, point the way to widespread changes within Roman Catholicism. But, perhaps, the lasting monument of John XXIII in the perspective of history will be his monumental encyclical, "Pacem in Terris" (Peace on Earth).



### Cows Have The Right Of Way

A few maps show an emergency landing field at Grasshopper Junction. The owners of the land withdrew their property from their classification, took down the wind sock and stopped clearing the strip several years ago and today cattle were grazing calmly when a light plane upset the even tenor of their day. In this part of the country, cows have the right of way over anything and everything and when the plane disputed their right of way they started running around and talking to themselves about the intrusion. On the other side of the highway, Mr. and Mrs. Young began talking to themselves, also, since they own the property. Three or four patrons of their establishment joined in the conversation and I guess the kindest comment at that time had something to do with cattle buyers who didn't have any more sense than to land a plane on

grazing land.

In the meantime, four miles away in our ghost town, we were unaware of what was going on at Grasshopper Junction. Fortunately for all of us, Mrs. Young did not get out her .30 - .30 and start shooting. She just/ waited while Capt. Kidd and Ralph Moffatt tried to explain why they landed on her land and in so doing, chased a few cows. She pointed towards State 62 and suggested that the strangers could start walking if they intended to visit us in Chloride, and they did. After they had walked a couple of miles, John Bishop drove by, then stopped and brought the visitors to our door. Under other circumstances, Mr. and Mrs. Young would have urged our visitors to run back to the plane and get going. At this point, I'd like to warn anyone else who might ecnsider landing on what was once an emergency field, not to take a chance on landing on the private property which belongs to Mr. and Mrs. Young of Grasshopper Junction. tle grazing on this and adjoining land and these Arizona cattle raisers take a very dim view of anything which might upset the digestion of their potential profit

makers. The cattle raisers don't wait to find out if the cows will grow up psychologically disturbed, they become angry right now, As a matter of fact the cows have the right of way, even on the highways and roads or in your own backyard. If you don't want cattle grazing on your petunias, fence your yard in and the cattle out.

I will win no friends in Arizona by stating my belief that the owner of a cow should be liable for any damage done by his property to my property. The fact that tradition may say I'm wrong, does not mean that the tradition has any validity, in fact. To put this another way while a plane should not land on private property, fenced or otherwise, cows should also stay out of my yard and the owners of the cows should willingly assume responsibility for any damage the cows might do to my property.

As with too many other things, the cattle owner believes his right to own cattle is absolute but he declines to view my right to my property in the same light.

So it came to pass that two more men who believe in the philosophy of freedom are no longer strangers to my wife, my daughter, my grandson and to me and we enjoyed the unexpected visit. We were able to sit here quietly and without interruption as we discussed what each of us is doing and why. This old ghost town has witnessed a good many of these informal seminars during the past 33 months and it seems logical for this to be in a townsite which has never been plagued by formal government.

And so it will be whenever human beings who believe in their right to be free meet and pause and talk and exchange ideas and relate their experiences, in freedom and no amount of legislation and no amount of tyranny and no combinations of tyranny and force will ever be able to still the voices - even if sand or on the rocks, again. Good luck and good health to

you, in freedom.







## Television In Review

HOLLYWOOD (UPI) - How highly do you regard your local television stations? Do you think! their program content would improve if they were not compelled by affiliation with a network to accept certain national shows? You may find out sooner than you think.

A major decision by the Feder-(FCC) has banned "option time," under which the national networks can pre-empt various hours of their affiliate stations - usually the best hours - to present programs of their choice.

What this means is that the individual stations will have the right to accept or refuse each network show, to put on their own or to buy programs from syndicates (which in many cases offer reruns) and also from independent producers. This is supposed to increase competition. And though the FCC ruling does not go into effect until Sept. 10, and the networks may win delays by appealing the decision, it seems almost certain at present that the ban will hold up.
