(Continued From Page 1) indication the administration was ready to budge from its stand that it would not back any further wheat legislation this year. Despite the national outcome, Southern wheat farmers approved the controls. Georgia, North Carolina, Tennessee and South Carolina farmers cast overwhelming votes in favor of controls. Those in Virginia, Mississippi and Florida rejected them.

Meaning of Vote. This is what the vote meant for wheat farmers: The 1964 crop will be grown without marketing quotas and no fines for overproduction. Price supports will drop from the present \$2 a bushel to \$1.25 and will be paid only to growers who stay within their acreage allotments.

The decision could have far-reaching effect on other farmers, especially in government programs dealing with farm surpluses. Kennedy's "supply management" plan probably would have been proposed for other crops if the wheat farmers had accepted it.

Denounce Plan. The Farm Bureau disagreed, denouncing the administration plan as a long-range attempt to dictate "the future way of life" for U.S. farmers. It said that "when farmers indicate they do not want supply control, Congress will be ready to act."

In a victory statement Farm Bureau President Charles B. Shuman said the vote showed that farmers favor a change in the direction of national farm policy. "The way now is open for Congress to solve the wheat surplus problem on a basis consistent with the maintenance of the market system," he said.

Such congressional farm leaders as Reps. W. R. Poage and Graham Purcell, both Texas Democrats, pledged new efforts to get wheat legislation but said it was "highly unlikely" Congress would go along.

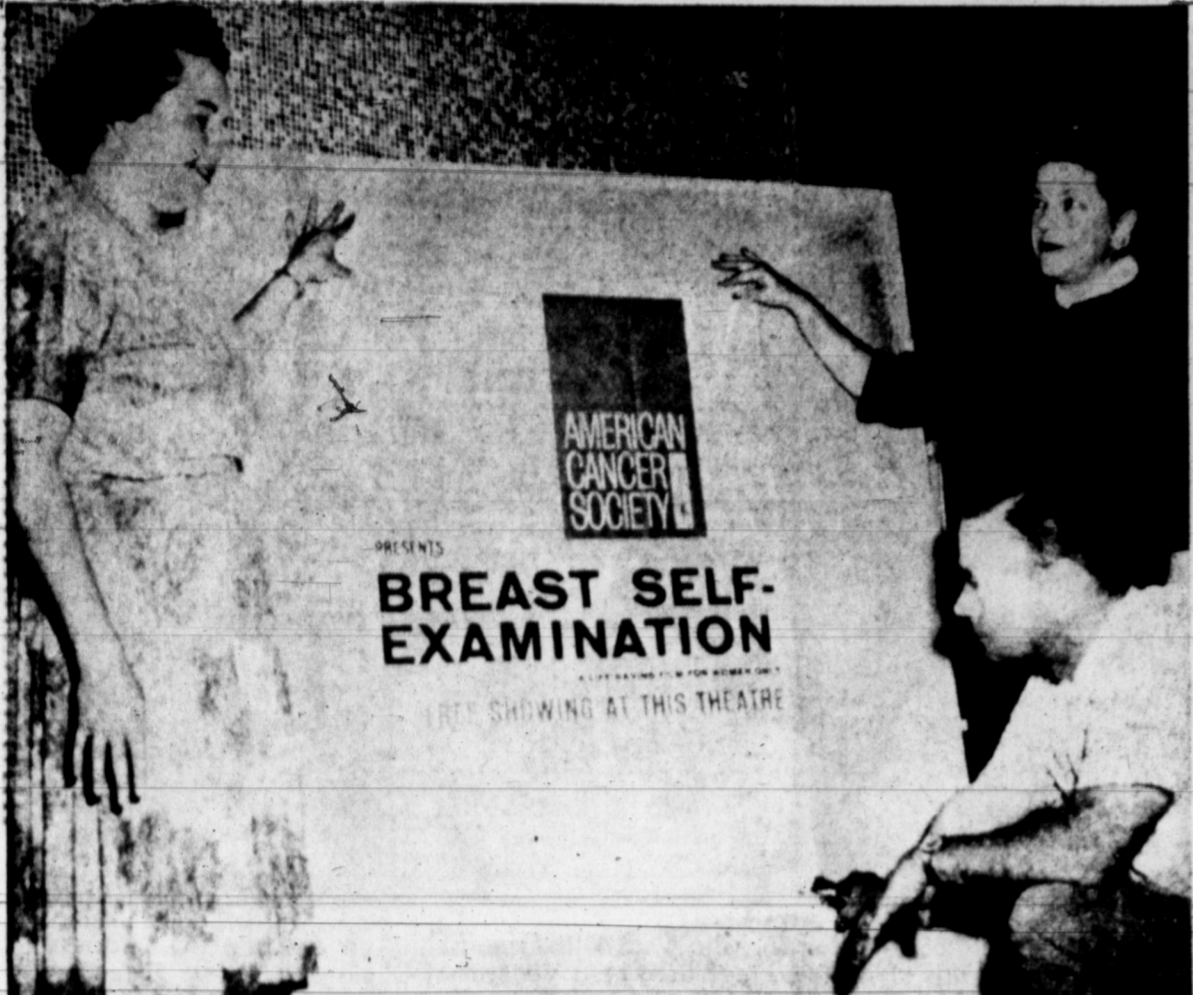

Sting Gone, but Main Issue Remains

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Supreme Court has momentarily removed the sting from Southern sit-in prosecutions, but the great issue posed by the cases remains undecided.

It is: Does a business establishment open to the general public have a right to choose its own customers?

This blockbuster was reserved by the court at least until next term.

It could be speculated that the short step the court took Monday was all it felt the country could stand in view of current racial unrest. But the truth is that no one out of the nine justices knew why they do things, and they aren't telling.

Overtures Convictions
The court overturned trespass and criminal mischief convictions in four lunch-counter cases on the ground that local governments—not storekeepers—were actually to blame for the racial discrimination.

Chief Justice Earl Warren held in the court's decision that local laws and edicts had deprived businessmen of their freedom of choice as to who could be served on their premises.

The thrust of the court's opinion was that so long as these laws are on the books the proprietor of a store is presumed to act under them. What he would do if left to himself is beside the point at the moment, under the decision.

In one case, from New Orleans, there was no local segregation ordinance. But Warren said statements by the mayor and the police superintendent amounted to the same thing.

Will Free Demonstrators
This handling of the touchy "sit-in" issue was urged on the court by the Justice Department in accordance with the time-honored

principle that a major constitutional decision is always avoided if a case can be disposed of on narrower grounds.

As it is, the decision will free hundreds of demonstrators who took part in the 1960-61 sit-in movement in places having similar segregation ordinances. They have been free on bond awaiting the results of Monday's cases, which came from Greenville, S.C., Birmingham, Ala., and Durham, N.C., in addition to New Orleans.

The ruling had the peculiar result of barring discrimination in cities where there are local ordinances requiring segregation, and leaving the whole matter up in the air in cities which do not have such ordinances.

The suggestion was made during November arguments that a decision like Monday's might well result in a rush to get such ordinances off the books.

Justice Harlan Dissents
Only Justice John M. Harlan dissented from the court's reasoning in the sit-in cases. He said: "Freedom of the individual to choose his associates or his neighbors, to use and dispose of his property as he sees fit, to be irrational, arbitrary, capricious, even unjust in his personal relations are things all entitled to a large measure of protection from governmental interference."

Harlan said the mere existence of ordinances requiring segregation in public eating places did not remove the businessman from the sphere of private choice. He said it should be shown in each case whether the proprietor was motivated by the ordinance or by some purpose of his own.

A case argued last fall first pinpointed the rights of the operator of a private business. It concerned five Negroes who insisted on riding the carousel in privately operated Glen Echo Amusement Park in Montgomery County, Md.

The court announced Monday that the case would be re-argued some time during the term starting next October.

Judge Maintains Whipping Is Best

WILMINGTON, Del. (UPI)—The judge who recently sentenced two men to the whipping—post-staunchly defended the punishment as better than imprisonment which only "feters criminals."

"Institutionalism is only to keep bad dogs off the street, it doesn't do any good," Judge Stewart Lynch said. "I want to punish."

"Somebody should think of the victim, not the criminal. Somebody should think about the public who should have law enforcement. I can't get concerned about one who perpetrates the crime."

Judge Lynch invoked a state law enacted in 1893 in sentencing 40-year-old Talmadge P. Balster to 20 lashes and 25 years in jail for a \$4 mugging and robbery.

He had given a 20-lash sentence last year to 20-year-old Franklin W. Cannon Jr. for violation of probation in an automobile theft case.

Both whippings have been delayed pending Cannon's appeal to the U. S. Supreme Court testing the whipping law's constitutionality.

World Chess Champ Idol Of Russians

MOSCOW (UPI)—Tigran Petrosyan, a 34-year-old Armenian, was the new world chess champion and the idol of the chess-loving Russian public.

Petrosyan defeated the great Mikhail Botvinnik Monday night in the 22nd game of a grueling match played on the stage of a Moscow variety theater over a span of nearly two months.

The theater audience of 2,000 cheered wildly when Botvinnik, 52, finding himself stymied after Petrosyan's 10th move, reached across the table and shook the hand of his younger foe as a sign of congratulation.

The gesture broke almost unbearable tension. Millions had followed the match on television since it started March 23. A world chess championship means as much to the Russians as the World Series or a heavyweight boxing championship to Americans.

Botvinnik had been world champion since 1948, except for two one-year periods. He lost the crown to fellow Russian Vasily Smyslov in 1958 and Mikhail Tal in 1961, but won it back a year later in each case.

LABOR BILL KILLED
A bill which would prohibit bringing professional strike-breakers into Texas failed Monday on an attempt to pass it in the House.

The proposal, by Rep. J. D. Weldon of Port Arthur, won tentative approval in the House Saturday by a narrow vote. But it wound up in a 66-66 tie Monday, which amounted to failure on final attempt at passage.

Old Age Grants Payments Given To 219 Persons

Gray County had 219 recipients who were paid \$43,633.23 in 1967 for hospital and doctor services under the State's Old Age Assistance grants.

The report was revealed at the Tuesday meeting of the Texas Hospital Association convention in Dallas.

The health care plan for needy aged citizens, which went into effect on Jan. 1, 1962, was approved in a constitutional amendment submitted to Texas voters in 1958.

The Texas plan provided hospital, medical, surgical and nursing home care for some 223,000 Old Age Assistance recipients in the state last year.

Officials said the same service had been given to an equal number of recipients in previous years, but now the services are being paid for.

The Kiowas were expected, in return, to continue to give relics and Indian clothing and ceremon-

ial costumes to the Panhandle-Plains museum at Canyon, Tex. The museum has one of the most complete collections of Kiowa and Cherokee Indian objects.
