First is Saturn I, the first stage of which has been successfully launched three times. It will place the Apollo capsule carrying three men into earth orbit for up to two weeks.

Five times more powerful is the Saturn V, whose huge F-1 engines will start the three

Apollo astronauts on the way to the moon. Between these two is a hybrid model, Saturn IB, consisting of the first stage of Saturn I and third stage of Saturn V. It will be used in early development and training phases of the Apollo project. Same size as Saturn I, it will use the powerful J-2 engine as its upper stage. Eventually, production models of the Saturns

will be manufactured at the Michoud Plant near New Orleans, La. From there, barges will carry them 50 miles to the \$93 million Mississippi Test Facility now under construction (second panel). Finally, barges will transport the boost-

#### **Cabot Receives Order for Carbon** Black for Aid An order for \$153,702 worth of

carbon black has been received by the Pampa Cabot Corp. plant for overseas delivery under the U. S. Foreign Aid program.

The announcement was made in Washington by Rep. Walter Rogers of Pampa who said the order is being filled under a contract awarded by a firm in India.

The purchase is being financed under a federal development loan to India. This type loan a greement, Rogers said, is administered by the U. S. Loan Agency for International Development, and requires that all commodities purchased outside the nation receiving the loan must be procured from American firms.

Rogers said that shipments of the carbon black to India will bear a distinctive color emblem carrying information to the people of India that the goods are provided through the United States Aid Pro-







## Stubble Mulch Farming Helps Stop Accidents

Each year many people are killed and many others are injured in accidents caused by blowing soil. These accidents could have been prevented if farmers and ranchers along the roads had been practicing stubble mulch farming, according to a statement released by Van Mills of the Gray County Soil Conservation Service.

Stubble mulching not only prevents accidents by reducing wind rosion, it also increases yeilds and helps to reduce water erosion. The following results were obtained at the Bushland Experiment Station; where all of the stubble was destroyed by onewaying and 2.34 inches of water was applied in form of rainwater, 1.3 inches ran off. Where sweeps were used on the stubble and 2.24 inches were applied only 0.23 incres ran

On a seven-year average of continuous wheat, land that was moldboarded each year averaged 12.5 bu. per acre, wheatland that was onewayed averaged 13.2 bushels per acre, and where sweeps were used the yield was 15.1 bushels per acre, Mills stated.





## **Celanese Plans Joint Venture** With Japan Firm

A joint venture to produce and market a high-strength Celanese plastic in Japan has been approved by that country's government, according to word received here Saturday by Celanese Corporation

of America. The agreement, now approved by the Japanese government, is between Celanese and Dainippon Celluloid Company (Daicell), of Osaka, involving the acetal | copolymer known as Celcon in this

Under the agreement, Polyplastics Company Limited, to be owned 45 per cent by Celanese and 55 per cent by Daicell, will produce the engineering plastic, which will be sold in Japan under the trademark Duracon. It is planned to build a plant with an annual production capacity of 16 million pounds a year. No site has yet been chosen, but it is expected that a location will have. been decided upon by about September 1.

Since the Celanese-Daicell joint venture was announced a year! ago and pending receipt of government approval, Celanese has been supplying the Japanese market with quantities of the acetal co-polymer from the output of its Bishop, Texas, plant. Plastic produced in the U.S. will continue to be sold actively in Japan so that when the plant there comes "on stream," markets already will have been developed for its out-

## Last View of Solar Eclipse in Many a Moon



EYE CELESTIAL EXTRAVAGANZA CAUTIOUSLY—Rare treat—a solar eclipse—occurs July 20 and will be visible, weather permitting, all over the North American continent, with exception of a small portion of the Pacific coast in Mexico. Next solar eclipse visible in North America will be in 1970. • Degree to which the sun will be eclipsed depends on how close you are to the "path of totality," some 60-70 miles wide. Percentages on Newsmap indicate amount of the sun's area apparently covered by the moon in each locality. • CAUTION should be taken in viewing the eclipse. The eye can easily be burned. DO NOT use smoked glass or field glasses. Safest way: view eclipse on television. Map data as presented in the astronomical magazine "Sky and Telescope.

DISRESPECT OF COURT Because the stakes are high-a person's life, his good name, his iberty, or his property - courtrooms sometimes become supercharged with drama and anger. Despite the excitement, the judge has to be impartial and open-minded as to issues, evidence, parties, witnesses and lawyers. To fail in this may cause a case to be tried again or reversed

This makes a judge's job a hard one. For he must first keep order so that the facts go to the jury in a way to lead to sound, unpredudiced verdicts. The judge must also instruct the jury on the law, and decide what testimony goes

on appeal.

Meantime lawyers on both sides are duty bound to work with skill and vigor to protect their clients and to advance their cause.

In this tense atmosphere some people break over the line and do things which may be termed "foul play" or show disrespect for the court.

When this happens, the judge has "inherent" power-power that grows out of his hard job-to crack down and punish violators for "contempt of court". Within wide limits he can levy fines and give jail sentences on the spotwhen the offense takes place before him. He can sometimes do the same for things that It a ke place outside the court-like the disobedience of a court order. But such indirect contempt of court calls for hearings to prove that an offense has been commit-

sentences to protect the due administration of justice: A juror or a lawyer for being tardy. impugning the judge's honesty, a witness to refuse to testify, for improper attempts to influence the jury or the court, for deceiving or taking advantage of the court, making personal attacks on the character and motives of the other side or its lawyer, for appealing to prejudices, and for re-ferring to facts in court not admissable in evidence.

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



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




