

Clothing Now Subject To New Sales Taxes

AUSTIN (UPI)— An ordinary scarf which Sunday costs 25 cents will cost the buyer 26 cents effective Monday. At the same time, a customer will have to shell out \$10.15 for a \$9.95 blouse.

All of this is part of new changes in the state's 2 per cent sales tax. Effective July 1, the 1961 state sales tax undergoes its first major overhaul calculated to cost the taxpayer about \$7.5 million a year.

The most noticeable change in the 10 million buyers at retail will be that all clothing becomes subject to the 2 per cent tax. The original law exempted outer clothing selling for less than \$10.

New Tax Method
Probably the next most noticeable change will be a new method of computing state taxes on automobile sales. This means a car selling for \$2,500 will cost about \$12 more in taxes.

Auto sales now are subject to their own 1.5 per cent sales tax, but effective Monday they are bunched in with everything else at 2 per cent. But the tax, instead of being computed on the full selling price, will be based on the trade-in difference.

State Comptroller Robert S. Calvert estimates the state will realize \$15,394,310 over the next

biennium from revisions in the present sales tax, \$6,454,261—more from motor vehicle sales and \$11,492,380 in the one-year extension of the corporate franchise tax increase.

Calvert's office already has mailed out over 220,000 explanations of the tax revision to merchants over the state covering the new law passed by the 58th legislature.

In addition, the comptroller has written 26 new rule interpretations of the law, and is working on several others.

While the new clothing tax laws will cost the average buyer, it will clear up some big headaches for merchants. The old method of having to keep separate books on outer and under garments, and another set for garments costing over \$10 was costly.

More Changes
The new tax law also brings about a number of other changes. It exempts all fertilizers, for example. Previously only those fertilizers used by farmers on farms were exempt.

The law also spells out that vending machine sales under 25 cents are exempt. Venders previously were taxed on their gross receipts although they could not collect the tax from buyers on sales under 25 cents.

All food sales by restaurants are taxable under the new law. The old statute exempted food prepared to be taken out of restaurants.

Still exempt are meals to be served to passengers on board while traveling.

Agricultural exemptions were broadened to include horses, mules or other work animals used on farms and ranches and all feed for them.

One change was designed to protect one important revenue source. This section taxes gas and electricity sold for residential and commercial use. Commercial use was defined to include those engaged in selling, warehousing and distributing a commodity or service.

Laundries Included
This definition was put in to include laundries, which recently won a supreme court ruling that they are exempt from the sales tax. Others of similar standing probably would have been exempt under the old law, costing the state about \$5 million annually.

New reporting methods were designed to give grocery stores some relief. The law provides an optional system. A grocer with sales of \$100,000 or less annually may assume 15 per cent of his sales are taxable and report and pay on that basis.

Grocers with sales over \$100,000 a year may pay on the assumption their taxable purchases as reflected by invoices, are in the same ratio as its sales and pay accordingly. But they would be subject to audit by the comptroller and liable for back taxes if it were determined later the formula used was not accurate.

Meals sold by churches at church functions and all meals sold at elementary and secondary schools on school days are also exempt.

page letter from the Chinese Central Committee to the Russians. It warned that capitalism would "bury" communism if Khrushchev's policies were followed.

Not Confirmed Officially

The reported expulsion of the Chinese from Moscow has not been confirmed officially here but it became a foregone conclusion after the Soviets had branded the abusive Chinese letter as containing "unjustified slanderous attacks" against the Soviet Communist party.

A special resolution of the Soviet Centre Committee which concluded its plenary session last week, after hearing Khrushchev's accusation that the Chinese has "aggravated the Sino-Soviet dispute to the limit," rejected the letter and refused to accept Peking's challenge that it be published.

"Enough is enough," the Soviets said in effect, and further accused the Chinese of violation of an agreement not to jeopardize the July Sino-Soviet meeting by continuing public polemics.

The Chinese Embassy here completely ignored the Soviet protest against the distribution of what it considered a "scurrilous"

letter, and continued to disseminate it among hundreds of Soviet organizations, the diplomatic corps, the universities and foreign correspondents.

At the same time Peking Radio maintained a barrage of Russian-language broadcasts beamed at the Soviet Union in an effort to woo away the Soviet people from their leaders whom the Chinese consider "un-Marxists."

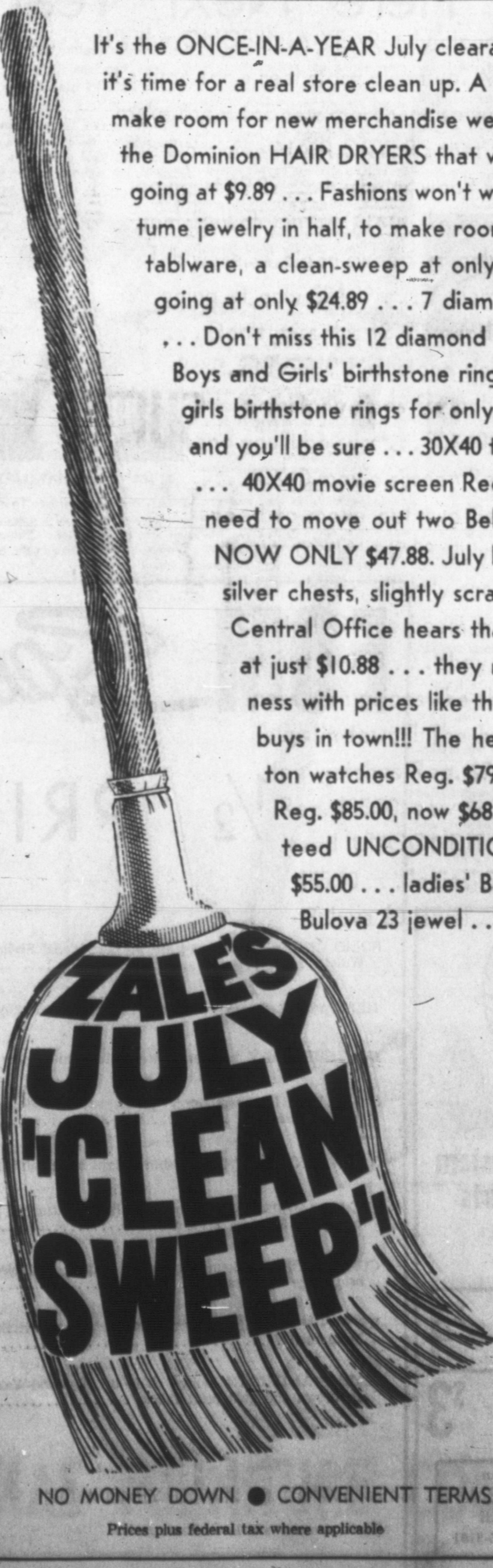

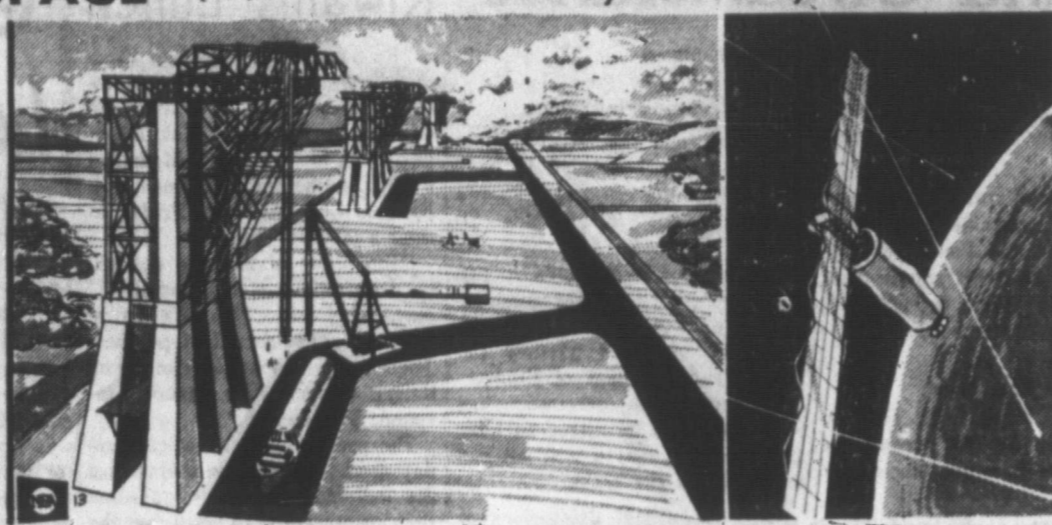
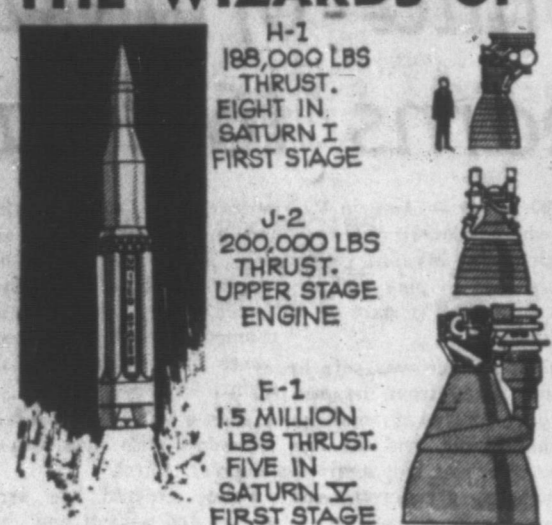

Big Bend Is Drawing Card for National Park Lovers

If you are a "National Park traveler" you'll want to see the sixth largest of America's national parks — Big Bend — presented to the United States by the State of Texas in 1944.

Located along the Rio Grande in southwestern Texas, this is an area of dramatic contrasts. Land of legend and range rider, Big Bend has been called the "Last Frontier."

You will experience new travel adventures when you drive into the mile-high Chisos Mountains or join a horseback party for an exciting ride to the lofty plateau of the South Rim, 7,200 feet in elevation.

The imposing canyons, colorful arroyos, flowering desert and the expansive plains offer unlimited sightseeing opportunities and excellent subjects for your camera.

There is an atmosphere of the old frontier along the Rio Grande, where the Sierra del Carmen and Fronterizo ranges of Mexico domi-

nate the landscape to the south. Approximately 400 miles from Abilene and San Antonio and 325 miles southeast of El Paso, the park is reached by two paved roads — U.S. 385, which intersects U.S. 90 at Marathon, and State Road 118, which intersects U.S. 90 at Alpine.

A paved road in the Park connects these State Roads, forming an east-west "loop" through Big Bend.

A new scenic road, the Camino del Rio, has opened a third route to Big Bend National Park over U.S. 67 from Marfa via Presidio

and Lajitas. Touring Big Bend by automobile provides access to much of the Park. Roads lead to the Rio Grande, where the desert terrain and mountain ranges of Old Mexico lend an atmosphere of drama and stark, rugged beauty.

The Santa Elena Canyon and Boquillas areas provide splendid all-day outings from the Chisos Mountains.

Among the tourist attractions is the centrally located park headquarters at Panther Junction, which boasts a small trailer park with utility connections, and where

a new visitor center is nearing completion.

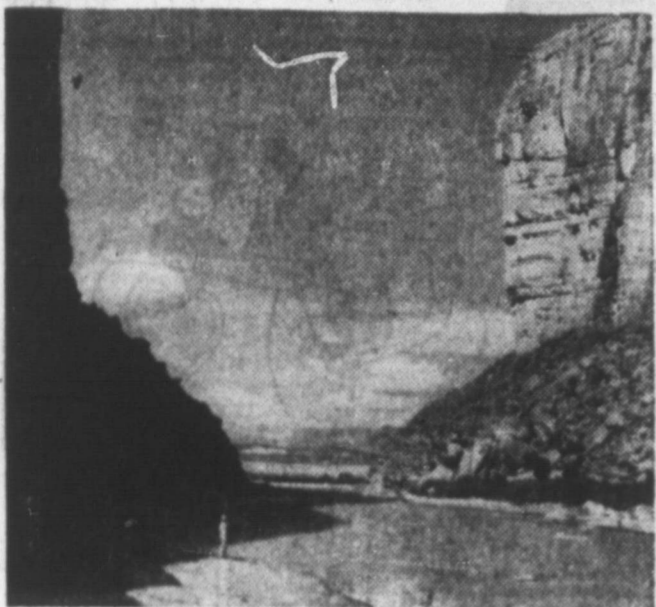
At the Basin, south of Panther Junction, there are cottages for rent, a store, restaurant and camp ground. However, the latter cannot be used by trailers because the road descending to the Basin is too steep.

Another camp ground is situated at Rio Grande Village on the river in the midst of an irrigated desert area where hundreds of trees have been planted around an artificial pond.

Trailers also can be accommodated at this camp which is near

Boquillas Canyon — the longest of Big Bend's gorges. The Chisos Mountains Cottages provide accommodations for more than 100 guests. Some cottages have private bath and others are adjacent to a central building with rest rooms and showers.

Iron Curtain Veils Rich Tourist Lures

VIENNA (UPI) — Little English is spoken behind the Iron Curtain and strict customs regulations will confront most foreign visitors. But Romania, Yugoslavia, Hungary, Czechoslovakia and Bulgaria do have off-beat food, souvenirs and tourist attractions to offer — at generally low prices.

Romania, has the Black Sea resort of Mamaia, Romanian caviar, such well-known meat dishes as "Gratar Romanescu" and embroidered blouses, handkerchiefs, scarves and wood carvings.

Yugoslavia, with its coastal areas bathed in sunlight from early spring until late fall, offers the walled-city of Dubrovnik, the Adriatic resort of Split, Velikes lake near the Austrian border and a Yugoslav cuisine noted for grilled meats and highly spiced foods.

Hungary, with its gypsy music wine cellars and red pepper paprika-spiced food, can be visited on a three-day group visit for as low as \$25. The outstanding tourist center besides Budapest (and the Danube) is Lake Balaton, one of the largest Central European lakes with very warm water and idyllic shores.

Czechoslovakia, where everything for a trip must be paid in advance, offers special one-week big trips from Vienna (cost about \$45) to Bruenn, Znaim and Prague — one of the most beautiful cities of Europe.

The agricultural country of Bulgaria, campaigning for central European tourist traffic since the end of World War II, is especially noted for the Black Sea resorts of Varna and the so-called Gol Strand.

Travel in each of these Communist East European countries is controlled by state-run tourist bureaus. No traveller is permitted to look for a hotel by himself and everything is booked for him by the bureau — be it the Soviet Intourist, Hungarian Ibusz, Romanian Carpati, East German a n Deutsches Reisebureau-as Czechoslovak CEDOK.

Detailed money forms are filled

out before crossing the border. It is forbidden to bring in Eastern money. Any amount of Western currency is welcomed.

A more detailed travel look behind the Iron Curtain shows:

YUGOSLAVIA: Formerly Yugoslav tourist visas were issued only by consulates and embassies. Now they can be secured at all entry points as well. New resort hotels are being set up, the country has embarked on new road building programs and prices for vacations have been cut by as much as 50 per cent compared to some years ago.

HUNGARY: Budapest is architecturally Vienna's twin. Many of the main buildings were built under the Austro-Hungarian empire; the opera and theaters are practically mirror images of the Viennese. Nearly every Hungarian speaks German. English is only spoken in the larger hotels and restaurants.

ROMANIA: Hotel prices, including meals, run from the luxury category of \$20 daily for a single room with bath to a double room with running water for \$7. Best visiting time is from May to the beginning of October, when swimming is possible in the Black Sea. German is the most popular foreign language although many people speak French.

CZECHOSLOVAKIA: Prices range from the luxury-single with bath and three meals at \$12.55 to a little more than \$5 for a second class room. German, again, is almost everywhere understood. The country is famous for its resorts (most famous Carlsbad and Marienbad), its medieval character cities (Znaim, Teltsch, Iglau an Eger) and its cuisine (dumplings and sauerkraut, roast goose, hams and Czech beers).

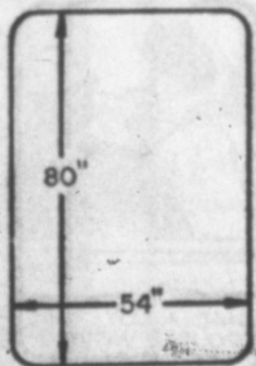
BULGARIA: Red tape is less important here than in other Communist country. Prices range from \$4.50 to \$11 a day, all costs included. Interesting ship journeys down the Danube to the Black Sea resorts.

Bells Will Ring All Over Land

NEW YORK (UPI) — Bells will ring out across the nation and overseas next Thursday, July 4, to remind Americans of their heritage of freedom.

Bells of all sizes, from the great bell in Philadelphia's Independence Hall to "cowbells and carillons" in Mt. Morris, Ill., will peal forth for four minutes as part of "let freedom ring" observances on Independence Day.

President Kennedy keynoted the celebration with a statement published Tuesday in "This Week," the Sunday supplement magazine, in which he noted that "bells summon the community to take note of things which affect the life and destiny of its people."

"Let freedom ring" is a movement aimed at having the nation's bells all ring at once on July 4 this year and hereafter to remind America of what it stands for. The movement was started by two Connecticut writers, Eric Hatch and Eric Sloane, and supported by "This Week."

Overseas, bells in all U.S. Air Force chapels, in Japan, Korea and Okinawa will ring one day early because of the time difference.

The projected time for the bell-ringing is 2 a.m. EDT and progressively earlier westward across the country so that the bells will all be ringing at the same minute.

Stubble Mulch Farming Helps Stop Accidents

Each year many people are killed and many others are injured in accidents caused by blowing soil. These accidents could have been prevented if farmers and ranchers along the roads had been practicing stubble mulch farming, according to a statement released by Van Mills of the Gray County Soil Conservation Service.

Stubble mulching not only prevents accidents by reducing wind erosion, it also increases yields and helps to reduce water erosion. The following results were obtained at the Bushland Experiment Station: where all of the stubble was destroyed by onewaying and 2.34 inches of water was applied in form of rainwater, 1.3 inches ran off. Where sweeps were used on the stubble and 2.24 inches were applied only 0.23 inches ran off.

On a seven-year average of continuous wheat, land that was moldboarded each year averaged 12.3 bu. per acre, wheatland that was onewayed averaged 13.2 bushels per acre, and where sweeps were used the yield was 15.1 bushels per acre, Mills stated.

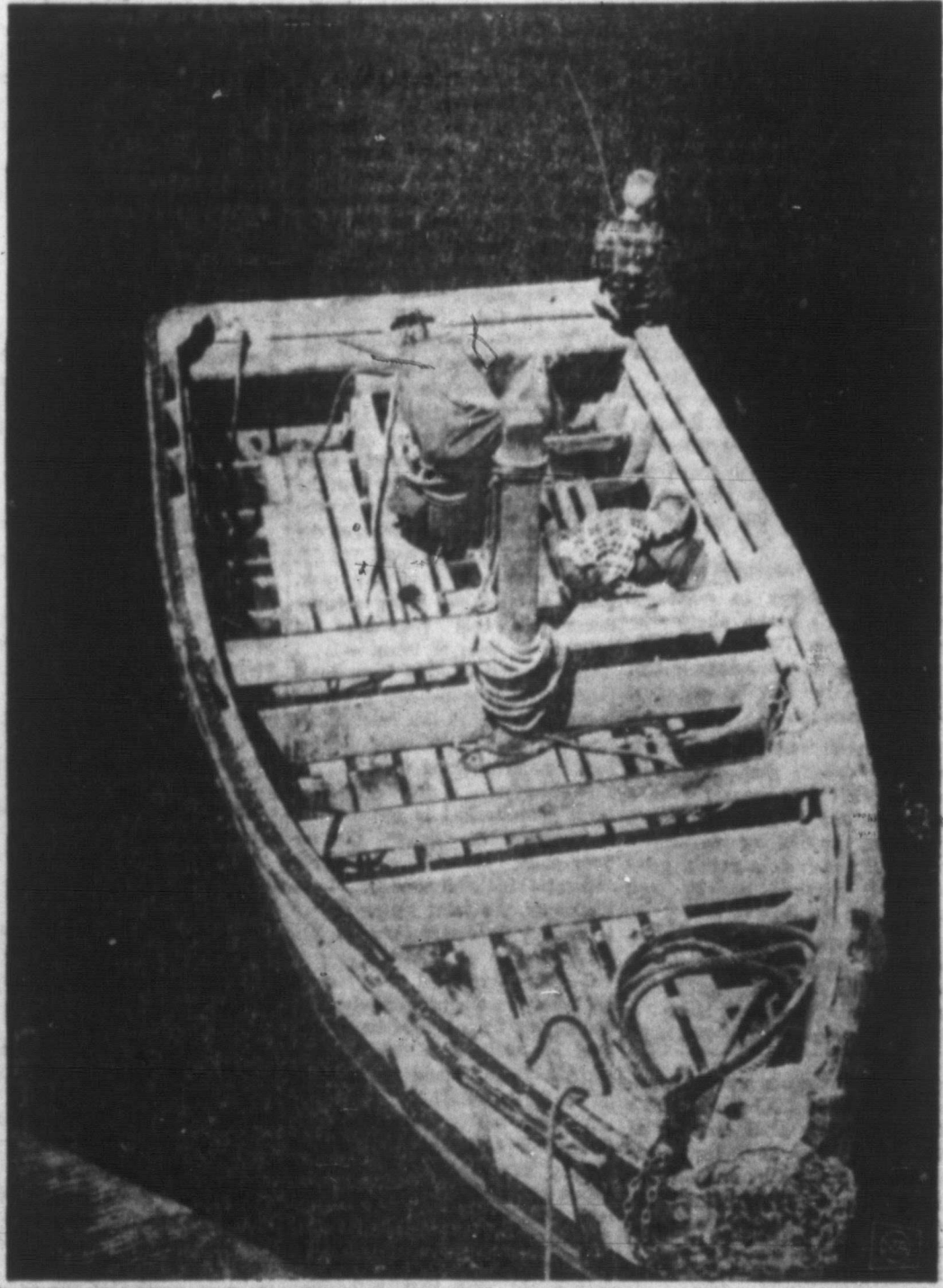

Celanese Plans Joint Venture With Japan Firm

A joint venture to produce and market a high-strength Celanese plastic in Japan has been approved by that country's government, according to word received here Saturday by Celanese Corporation of America.

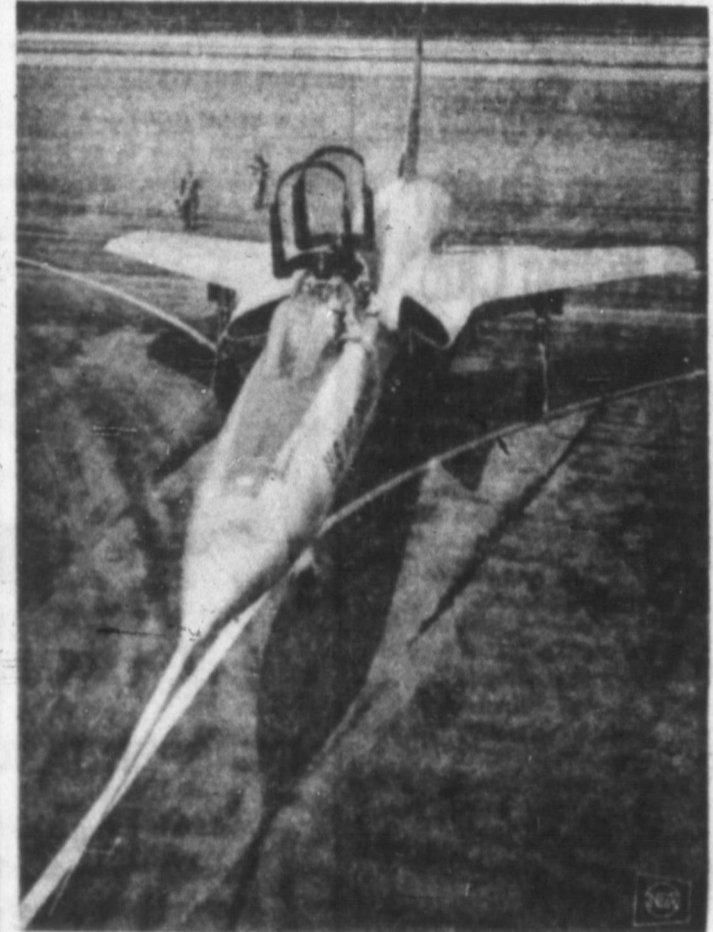
The agreement, now approved by the Japanese government, is between Celanese and Dainippon Celluloid Company (Daicell), of Osaka, involving the acetal copolymer known as Celcon in this country.

Under the agreement, Polyplastics Company Limited, to be owned 48 per cent by Celanese and 52 per cent by Daicell, will produce the engineering plastic, which will be sold in Japan under the trademark Duracon. It is planned to build a plant with an annual production capacity of 18 million pounds a year. No site has yet been chosen, but it is expected that a location will have been decided upon by about September 1.

Since the Celanese-Daicell joint venture was announced a year ago and pending receipt of government approval, Celanese has been supplying the Japanese market with quantities of the acetal copolymer from the output of its Bishop, Texas, plant. Plastic produced in the U.S. will continue to be sold actively in Japan so that when the plant there comes "on stream," markets already will have been developed for its output.

LOTS OF GREEN

PHILADELPHIA (UPI)—America's 42 million gardeners have a \$4-billion "green thumb," estimates the Federal Reserve Bank of Philadelphia. That's how much is spent in a year on every phase of gardening, the bank said.

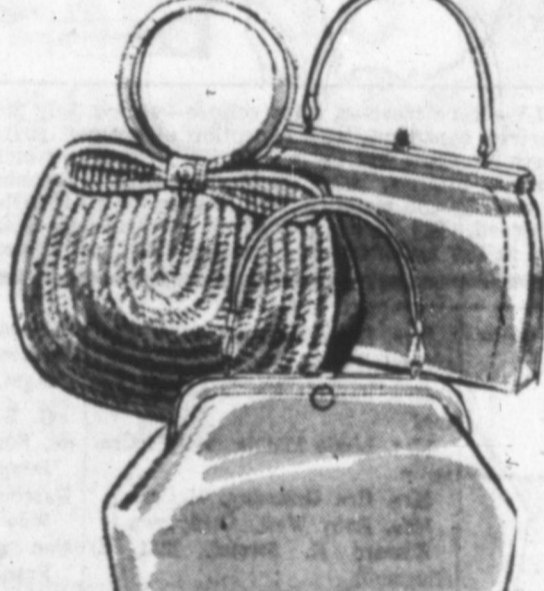

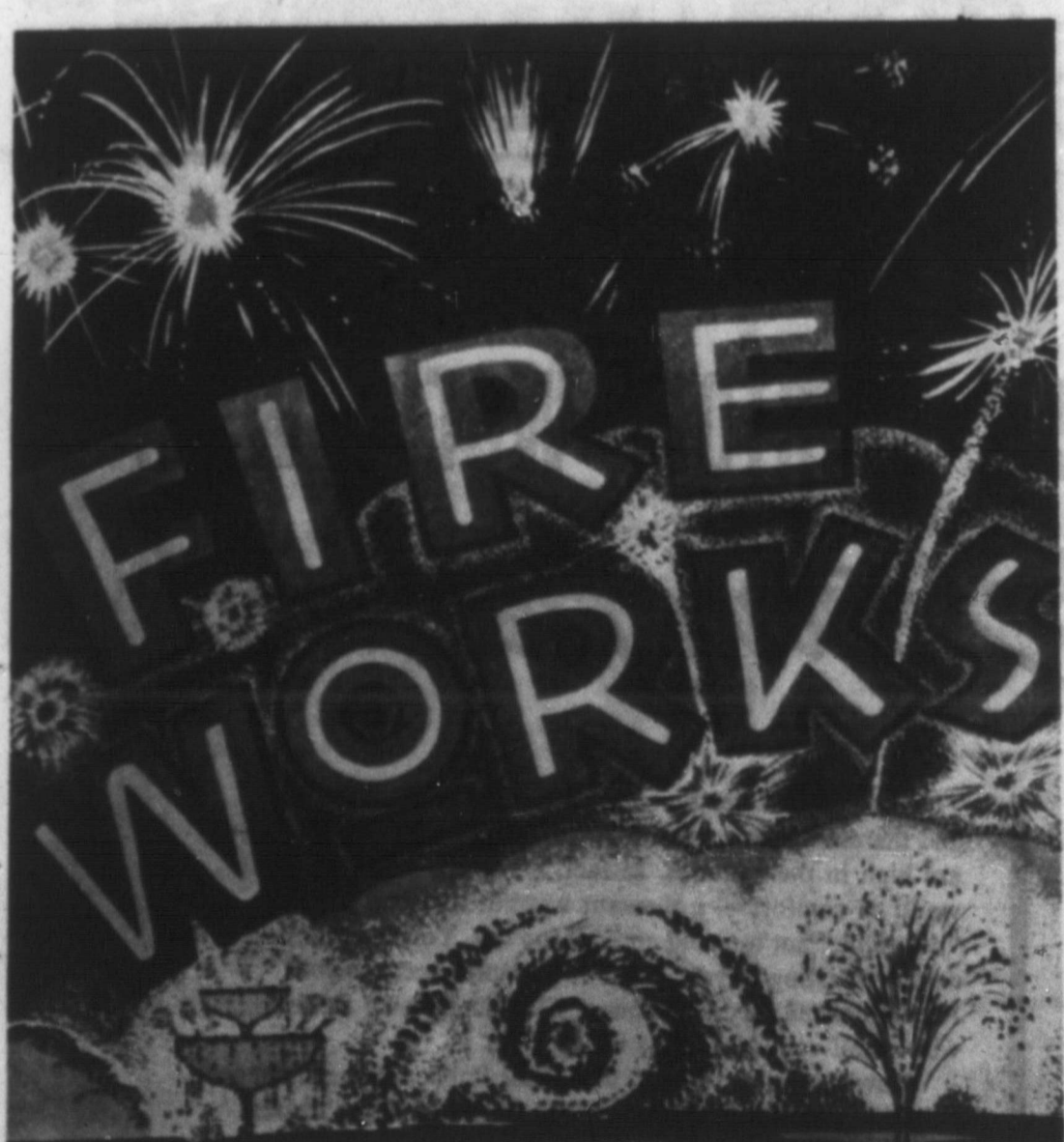

Plastic Containers Excellent Servers For Pleasant, Sandless Beach Picnic

Any homemaker who lives on vacations near a beach knows that the beach picnic will be a regular way of life — and the one commodity included on every beach picnic menu is sand.

There is no way I've ever found to delete sand completely from the menu. But a correspondent-homemaker who vacationed on an island beach figured one way to reduce the amount. She shopped in the variety stores for lidded plastic containers in which to tote the goodies.

A surprising variety of sizes and shapes in covered plastic containers are available. Plastic is a good picnic choice because it is light, unbreakable and easily cleaned.

Here are some containers my correspondent finds most useful: A party Susan with six compartments as a carry-and-serve receptacle for olives, pickles and such. Individual serving bowls with airtight lids to carry individual portions of fruit from house to beach.

A giant-size, covered canister can be used to carry pop bottles if a lightweight ice chest isn't available, or it can hold wrapped sandwiches or smaller containers of sandwich spreads. Another versatile container is square and

large, with a handle. This sometimes takes bread or rolls, sometimes fried chicken or the fixings for hero-size sandwiches.

A real find is a carousel caddy with six tumblers, each a different color (for each member of the family), fitted with lids and anchored upright. When a picnicker wanders off, he can recover his food or tumbler and keep it quite sand-free.

Cantaloupe halves make delicious, disposable dishes. Pre-packaged puddings. Prepare the pudding from your favorite instant mix and pour the cold pudding into seeded melon halves to set.

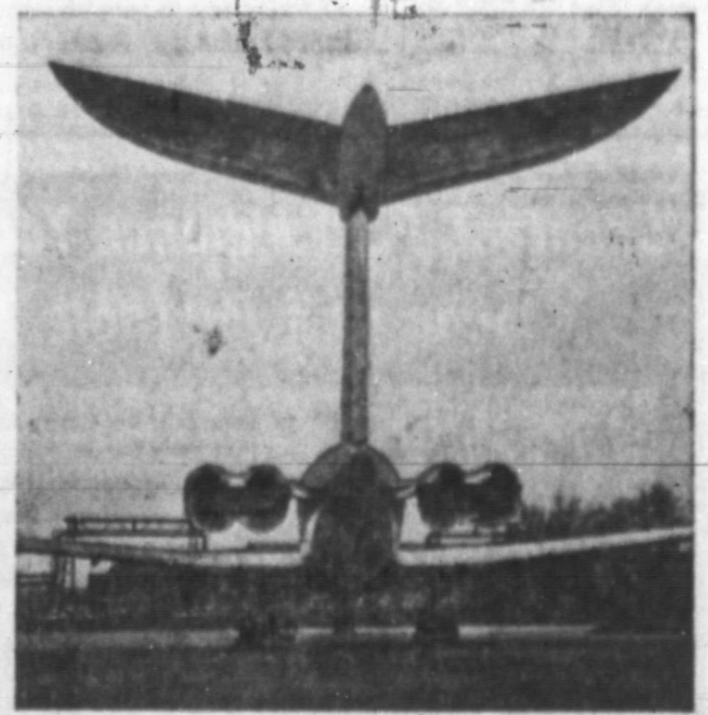

NEW YORK (UPI)— Broadway producers and actors who would retain their sanity — and their respect for the Big Street—should stay away from Minneapolis.

That is where the new Tyrone Guthrie Theater is located. This \$2.5 million house, opened in May for a 20-week season of four plays in repertory, is a dandy, both artistically and practically. There's nothing like it around here, more's the pity.

The exterior isn't too important, although it is unusual. It's what's inside that counts, even though that includes one of those "thrill" stages—a playing area plunging deeply into the auditorium, and surrounded by the audience on three sides.

There are still some partial to the traditional proscenium, or picture-frame, stage.

My only objection to the Minneapolis setup is that the planners didn't make it possible to have both apron and proscenium stages. It is such a simply resolved matter, which I will gladly diagram — for a fee. I think they will regret their one-way commitment from time to time.

Anyway, this is a remarkable theater plant.

First, there's space. Room for everything. Room for the spectators to promenade between acts without standing on each other's toes and igniting garments with intermission cigarettes.

There are wonderful dressing rooms for the actors at two levels below the stage area. These are showers, furnishings; not just make-up tables and a few electric fans. Actors can feel like people.

There is a rehearsal room that is twice the stage area. An even larger shop room for the construction and painting of scenery, complete with all of the proper power tools. And a dressmaking room almost as large. Also a wig room.

The actors have a greenroom where they can meet and relax while partaking of snacks dispensed from half a dozen machines full of liquid and solid goodies. There is a VIP room off the promenade area for the comfort of dignitaries who may drop by (but they do need a bar there).

FIVE & DINE?

NEW YORK (UPI) — Where do at least a million people eat each day? In the "5 & 10". A report by the F. W. Woolworth Co. showed the company's lunchettes and cafeterias now feed more than 1 million persons daily in the 50 states and Puerto Rico.

Last year customers put away 112 million cups of coffee and 6-675,000 pieces of apple pie, as well as more than 18 million hamburgers and 1.6 million turkey dinners, Woolworth said.

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
