# Florida Meet Starts For Editors' Group

MIAMI BEACH (UPI)—Hemisphere newspaper editors attending the Inter-American Press Association (IAPA) opened a three-day general assembly Wednesday with an official welcome from Miami Mayor Robert King High.

Outgoing IAPA President Romulo O'Farrill, Jr. of the Mexico City newspaper Novedades presided as the organization, which inaugurated its sessions last Saturday, moved into the most important phase of this 19th annual gathering.

The editors—some 400 persons including families and observers are attending the meeting—were to hear addresses by Florida Gov. Farris Bryant, and University of Miami President Dr. Henry King Stanford during the afternoon session.

O'Farrill was to present a report on his one-year of service in the presidency and the delegates were expected to hear a brief address by Knight newspaper executive Lee Hills during the morning session.

Tuesday the editors permitted a lull in their continuing round of meetings following Monday evening's address by President Kennedy.

The general assembly is scheduled to hear a detailed report on the state of hemisphere press freedom today from the IAPA Freedom of the Press Committee.

In his address, High reported that more than 300,000 Cubans have fled to Miami since the

Fidel-Castro regime came to power. "This city in the past few years has been the refuge for one of the greatest influxes of troubled people in this continent's history," he said and praised the way Miami has given asylum to the exiles.

High told the editors that Miami has been "honored with visits from presidents" of many Latin nations. An "example" he cited the visits earlier this year of Venezuelan President Romulo Betancourt and Costa Rican President Francisco J. Orlich.

Miami has been host "not only to visitors of renown," he said, "but just as importantly the average citizen and student" from Latin America as well as from elsewhere in the U.S.

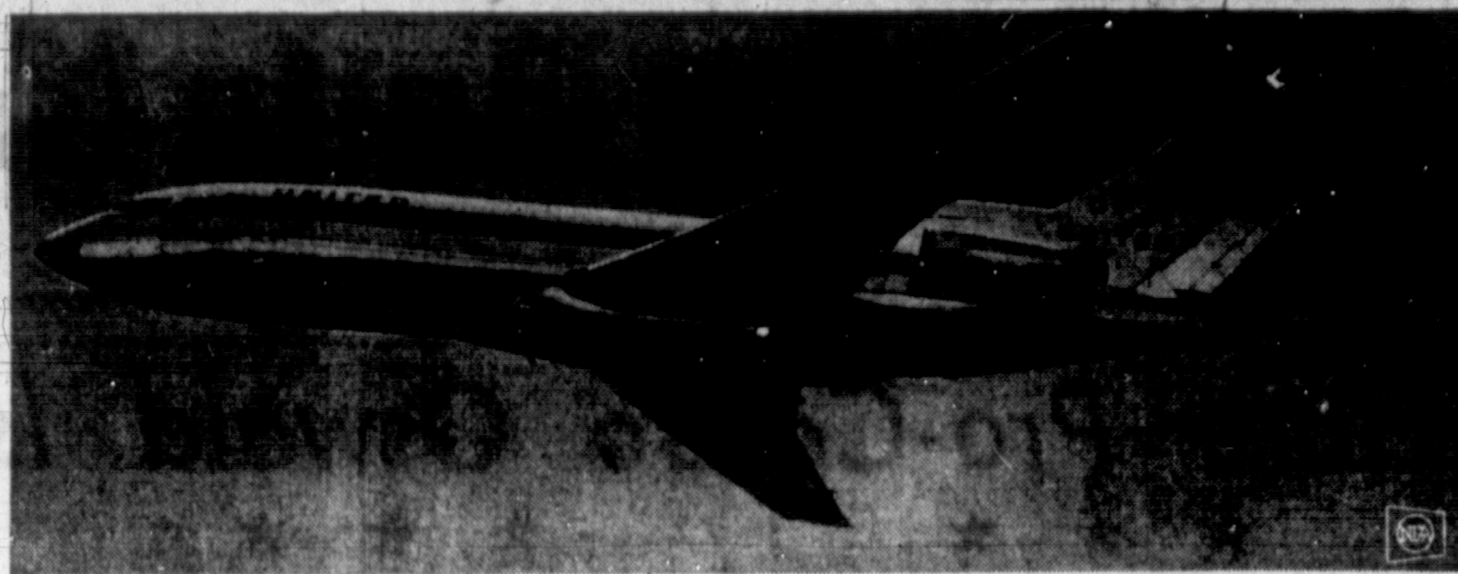
## Catholics Asked To Change Stand

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# Assassination Brings Tragedy To Dallas Policeman's Family

DALLAS (UPI)—There is another funeral, another grief-stricken family. Mrs. J. D. Tippitt shares with Jacqueline Kennedy the sorrow of widowhood, for her husband was slain too. One man is charged with their deaths. But there all similarity ends.

President Kennedy was a man of history and wealth. J. D. Tippitt, 39, made \$400 a month as a policeman to support his wife and three children. He had no insurance. The city provides none.

Tippitt was shot and killed on a Dallas street while pursuing President Kennedy's accused assassin.

His careworn widow and their children, Allen, 14; Brenda Kay, 10; and Curtiss Glenn, 5, live in a neat suburban area of medium brick homes on the southern edge of Dallas. She is 36.

"Daddy had just come home for lunch at 11:30 (a.m.). He had a sandwich and some milk before he went back to duty," Mrs. Tippitt said.

"Then the next thing I heard was that he was dead," Mrs. Tippitt said she "certainly knows" how Mrs. Ken-

edy feels. She said the slain President's brother, Atty. Gen. Robert Kennedy, called her Friday night.

"He said he was calling on behalf of Mrs. Kennedy," Mrs. Tippitt said. "He expressed their sympathy and sorrow over our loss. I told him to express my concern to Mrs. Kennedy and tell her I certainly know how she feels."

Mrs. Tippitt said she was grateful for the thoughtfulness of the Kennedys in calling their concern.

Mrs. Tippitt's neat, three-bedroom brick home was filled with friends and relatives. Food in abundance was spread over tables and the kitchen sink. Her children, surrounded by friends, were eating lunch quietly.

"I just don't know how we'll get along without him," Mrs. Tippitt said of her slain husband. "He was such a good man — he was so good to the children."

# The President's Final Minutes

DALLAS (UPI) — Here is a chronological breakdown of the final minutes of President Kennedy's life. Some times are approximate:

11:35 a.m. EST — Presidential airplane lands at Dallas Love Field.

11:45 a.m. — President Kennedy motorcade through downtown Dallas delayed momentarily to allow the President and Vice President Lyndon Johnson to shake hands with greeters at airport.

11:50 a.m. — Motorcade starts from airport.

12:16 p.m. — Motorcade reaches fringe of downtown area.

12:35 p.m. — Motorcade moves through downtown area.

12:28 p.m. — Motorcade moves from downtown area toward Dallas Trade Mart, where President was to speak.

12:31 p.m. — President and Texas Gov. John Connally shot.

12:38 p.m. — President rushed to Parkland Hospital.

12:40 p.m. — Staff surgeon and neurosurgeon called. They performed tracheotomy (opening throat) and applied breathing stimulants.

1 p.m. — President dead.

# Family Breaks News of Death To Aged Father

HYANNIS PORT, Mass. (UPI) — A heart-sick family broke the sad news Saturday to ailing Joseph P. Kennedy that his son was assassinated.

A doctor was in the family midst for fear disclosure of the tragedy might worsen the condition of the 75-year-old patriarch of the Kennedy clan.

The elder Kennedy's reaction was not known outside the sprawling white house overlooking Nantucket Sound where he and President Kennedy sailed and frolicked in happier days.

Perhaps indicative that the father took the news hard was the apparent delay in the family's previously indicated plans to fly to Washington shortly after noon.

Mrs. Rose Kennedy, the President's 72-year-old mother, attended two Masses in a Catholic church and then went home to tell her husband what the world had known for nearly 20 hours—that their son was mortally wounded by a sniper.

Mrs. Kennedy, her son, Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, and a married daughter, Mrs. Eunice Shriver, all were present when father Kennedy was informed.

Kennedy, former ambassador to Great Britain, suffered a stroke in December, 1960, which left him virtually unable to talk. He spends most of his time in a wheel chair.

mer President Harry Truman. Despite a White House request that Americans express their condolences with gifts to charity, baskets of flowers kept arriving at the Executive Mansion until a spare room had to be set aside for them.

All federal offices will be closed. Even before issuance of the proclamation business establishments across the nation signalled their intent to be darkened during the day.

The casket with the late President's body was closed as it lay in the somber East Room of the White House.

And according to White House officials was to remain so throughout all services.

Today the body will be taken to the rotunda of the Capitol where it will lie in state for some 21 hours for public viewing. Thousands were expected to file past.

In Berlin, 80,000 West Germans, many weeping, marched in a torchlight parade during the early morning hours. Mayor Willy Brandt, meeting them at city hall, asked Berliners to place lighted candles in their windows during the night.

In Moscow, Nikita Khrushchev expressed the "indignation of the Soviet people against the culprits of this base crime" and dispatched his deputy, Anastas Mikoyan, for Monday's Pontifical High Requiem Mass that will be the official state funeral.

At those solemn ceremonies, France will be represented by President Charles de Gaulle, Britain by Prince Philip and Prime Minister Sir Alec Douglas Home, and West Germany by Chancellor Ludwig Erhard.

At 12 noon CST today, to the muffled cadence of a corps of drummers, the body in its heavy mahogany casket will be borne from the White House to the Capitol on a caisson drawn by seven horses.

There it will lie in state in the Capitol rotunda until 10 CST, Monday. It will then be moved to St. Matthew's Ca-

# Doctors State President 'Never Had a Chance'

DALLAS (UPI) — Staff physicians at Parkland Hospital and the University of Texas Southwest Medical school who attended fatally-wounded President Kennedy all agreed Saturday the late President never knew what hit him.

"He was dead for all practical purposes when he arrived in the emergency room," Dr. Malcolm Perry, one of the corps of surgeons and specialists who were with the late President the fading minutes of his life.

Kennedy was rolled into Parkland Hospital emergency room within five minutes after a sniper's bullet pierced the mid-section of the front part of his neck and emerged from the top of his skull.

"The severity of the wound made it instantly noticeable that it was mortal," Dr. Perry, an assistant professor of surgery at the medical school next door to Parkland, said.

"He never had a chance. I guess we worked on him about 20 minutes — I couldn't tell how long, we were working so frantically. After a while Dr. M. T. Jenkins turned to me and said, 'It's too late, Mac.'"

"I was never able to detect a heart beat after the President arrived. It was obvious he never knew what hit him."

**Foreign Students Will Mark First US Holiday**

Pampa's two American Field Service students, Evelyn Roberts of Auckland, New Zealand, and Juhani Karmakoski of Turku, Finland, will observe their first American national holiday next Thursday, Thanksgiving Day. They are planning on a typical turkey and cranberry sauce dinner with their American families. Evelyn makes her home with the Dr. Joe R. Donaldson family, 2530 Duncan. Juhani is living with the Robert Johnson family, 1104 Sirroco, during his year's stay in Pampa.

The students have been in Pampa nearly three months. They are participating as senior students in the studies and activities of Pampa High School, under the sponsorship of the American Field Service Scholarship Program.

The program is the largest secondary school-age exchange program in the United States. Selected students are boys and girls 16 to 18. They must have a working knowledge of English before they are considered for selection, and are chosen for qualities of character, leadership, personality and adaptability.

They live in the U.S. homes as members of the family with the same responsibilities and rights as other children of the family. They cannot stay in the U.S. longer than one year. The purpose of the A.F.S. program is not to Americanize them but for them to learn about American life so they can explain it to friends and families when they return home.

Responsibility for the student is shared by the host family, the local A.F.S. chapter and the A.F.S., New York. The program is planned and supervised at all times by A.F.S. It is a community-wide project reaching and benefiting as many students and local groups as are interested. All local A.F.S. activities are carried out on a volunteer basis with a great deal of the work done at A.F.S., New York, and abroad.

Lasting effects on students of the A.F.S. programs are shown

in the following ways: expression of education and governmental authorities at all levels in the U.S. and foreign countries and their support, show the increasing importance of the program.

In his message to the A.F.S. students in Washington last summer, where they stopped for a brief visit before returning to their countries, the late, President John F. Kennedy said the following in his message to them:

"This effort which has been made to bring you to the United States has not been made merely to give you an interesting year. It has been made because a judgment has been reached that you will be among the future leaders of your country; that you carry with you a sense of responsibility and commitment, and that when you go home you will not only be a friend of the United States but rather a friend of peace, a friend of all people; that you will desire to see good will among all nations, and that you will stand in your community, in your state, and in your country for those principles which motivate us all around the globe."

Returnees continue to take part in A.F.S. activities in their home countries. They form local and national A.F.S. committees and attend their meetings. Former Pampa A.F.S. students, Turan Soloymer and Chris Johnson have been assisting A.F.S. work in Turkey and Sweden. They recommend other students to apply for A.F.S. scholarships and are active in screening the applicants.

Returned students originated the Americans Abroad programs in appreciation of their stays in the U.S. They secure host families and schools abroad to volunteer to take U.S. students, look after the U.S. students while they are there, and supervise the overseas operations of the Americans Abroad programs. Vince Johnson of Pampa spent a profitable year in Switzerland under the Americans Abroad program, and returned to share his experiences

by speaking to various local organizations. A committee for the Americans Abroad program met recently and accepted applications from the local high school candidates.

Lasting friendships have been formed between foreign students and their American families and others in the U.S. communities. The 10 students who have lived in Pampa during the last several years continue to maintain very close ties with their families here.

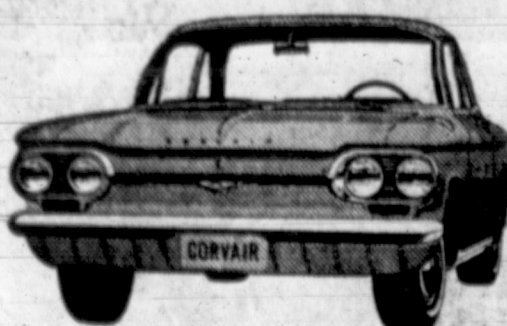

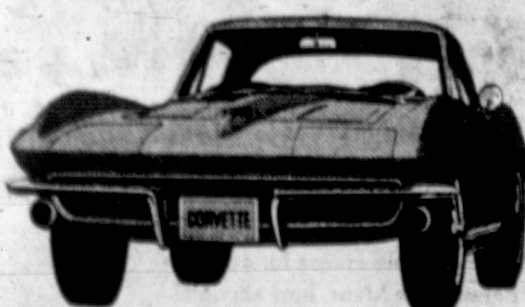

# Cities Seeking Ways To Collect More Tax

Like a man with a compact auto and a growing family, Texas cities have found available tax sources are not enough.

The state turned to a sales tax two years ago to solve the problem and cities may follow suit.

Pressure is greater than ever for the legislature to give cities a wider choice of revenue-raising approaches, and a municipal sales tax is mentioned often as a solution.

**Other Choices Listed**

There are other choices:

- In some states, city participation in gasoline taxes has been effective.
- Some cities have an earnings tax or salary tax—a city income tax.
- Some cities in the country

have turned to selective excise revenue.

Texas cities' organized voice, the Texas Municipal League, will not be pinned down yet on what solution it prefers.

But what it opposes is clear. Against Dole

"The league does not want the aspect of a dole—it wants broadened powers that it can carry out its own way," a spokesman in Austin said.

The league adopted a resolution along those lines at its recent convention in Houston.

That sentiment seems to rule out a sales tax arrangement in which the state gathers the tax and pays part of it back prorated to the cities.

It seems also to rule out increases in the property tax, which cities are fast considering a dead horse whipped too often for tax money.

# Pickles Passe For Moms-to-be

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — Pickles are passe for pregnancy, a noted anthropologist said today.

Speaking before a meeting of the American Anthropological Assn. — which is holding its 62nd annual conference in San Francisco — Dr. Steven Polgar of the Planned Parenthood Federation of America said that in a study he conducted in the Bay area into the eating habits of pregnant women only nine per cent named pickles as their favorite food.

Polgar told the group that 30 per cent of the women interviewed named fruit juices as their most popular food while expecting. Meat and fish polled a close second place.

He said on a national level pickles ranked in fifth place as the food most craved by pregnant women.

Breeding, stocking and managing game fish requires the expenditure of \$40 million annually in the United States.

# Woman Flier Hits NASA on Policies

DALLAS (UPI) — Viola Gentry renewed an old squabble Thursday and took a swipe at the federal space agency for not having as much faith in American women as they do in monkeys.

Miss Gentry, who flew Curtiss bi-planes before most astronauts were born, told Dallas Times Herald science editor Bob Fenley it burns her up because the United States will not let women be astronauts.

A pilot's license in Miss Gentry's purse is dated 1925. In 1928, she set the first official solo record for women and knew Orville Wright and Amelia Earhart.

Now desk clerk of a resort hotel at East Hampton, L.I., Miss Gentry would only say that she is "past 60."

But she still flies, in spite of her apparent non-flying job. Her boss has a plane.

Following a social hour, members of Twentieth Century Allegro heard a double program presented by Mrs. H. V. Wilks and Mrs. George Cree during a recent meeting held in the home of Mrs. J. R. Reeve, 1811 Dogwood.

Mrs. Wilks spoke on the topic, "Historic Findings in Our Area," stating that nature had taught man the art of provision, providence and prudence. She displayed samples of flint, petrified wood and fern, crystal, meteor flag and charcoal. Finds of stone tools, weapons, jewelry and mural prove high skills of early inhabitants of this area. There are five major points which helped our civilization toward today's standard: Economic provisions, political organization, Moral tradition, Unity of basic belief and Pursuit of knowledge and the arts.

Mrs. Cree started her portion of the program with a brief history of the early oil industry in our country; including some interesting statistics on oil production and costs of exploration and drilling. She then told of the oil and gas boom in the Panhandle, which started in 1918 when a gas well on the ranch of Capt. S. B. Burnett in Carson County, was discovered in 1921, and when oil was found north of Borger. By 1925 some 800 oil outfits were exploring the country.

There were approximately 4,000 active locations in Gray County alone which produced 11,000,000 barrels of oil in 1962. A whole new industry has come to life since the discovery of oil and gas: petrochemicals, including synthetic rubber, fibers, resins, plastics, carbon black, solvents, agricultural chemicals and many more.

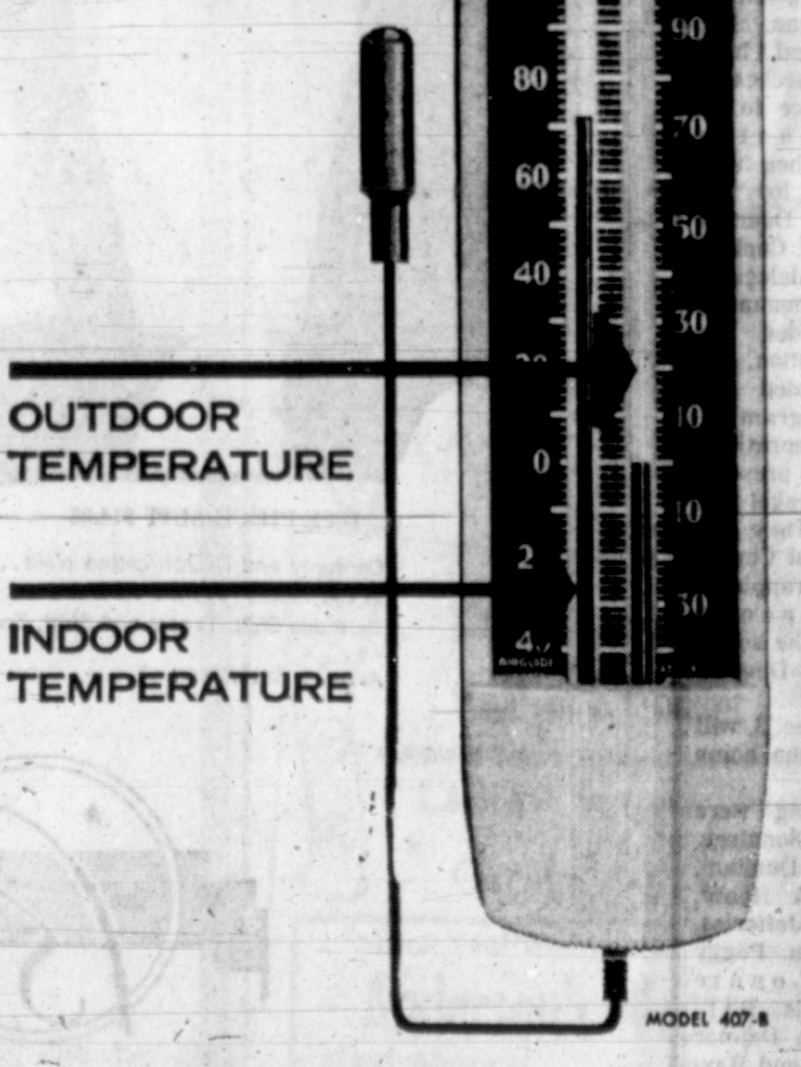

## Texans Remain Partial To Beef, Expert Finds

LUBBOCK (Sp.) — With variety being sought in holiday meals, many Texans still are mighty partial to beef.

Dale W. Zinn, director of the Texas Tech beef improvement laboratory and a man who hasn't forgotten this, makes three recommendations for improving the quality of beef cattle.

He first advises breeders to make selection of calves early, on the basis of inherent ability to make rapid gain, and then to feed for rapid growth and development until the calves reach their market weight.

"It would seem that the production of more desirable carcasses could be accomplished most quickly with cattle that have the inherent ability to grow fast and reach the desired weight for slaughter at an early age when less fat is being deposited in relation to muscle and bone," Zinn says.

Secondly, Zinn recommends selection of carcasses with an eye to minimum amount of fat thickness. He cites data taken from research projects at Texas Tech which show that each 0.1 inch increase in outside fat over the loin eye accounts for a 0.52 per cent increase in fat trim and a decrease of 0.59 per cent in boneless primals.

Zinn's final suggestion is for breeders to select carcasses

which have a small amount of marbling.

"Here I am not concerned with marbling as it affects tenderness, but rather as it affects marketability," he says. "A small amount of marbling appears to be helpful in maintaining the shape of a cut of beef in the retail package by firming the meat and making it less watery."

Zinn has a few things to say about projects aimed at "educating" consumers.

"It is advantageous from a merchandising standpoint to sell the consumer beef she prefers rather than trying to educate her," he declares. "The meat producer, processor and retailer have finally recognized that the consumer does know what she wants in the way of beef. Thus the time has come when we in the beef industry should stop trying to 'educate' the consumer, but rather let her educate us."
