





GROWING IN GRACE

Have you grown spiritually since you were saved? This question comes. to me because I am made to realize that many of us have not. And yet, according to God's Word, we are expected to show a spiritual growth. Paul, in talking to the Brethren at Corinth urged them to grow in grace which helped them to grow spiritually with the Saviour. They were to become adults in Christ, however, at the time of his writing unto them, they had not grown sufficiently. For he said, "And I brethren could not speak unto you as unto spiritual, but as unto carnel, even unto babes in Christ, I have fed you with milk and not with meat, for hither to ye were not able to bear it, neither yet now are ye able." 1 Corinthians 3: 1-2. Is this also an indictment against the Christian of our day? Perhaps so.

Let us think together about growing in grace. Since we are expected to grow in it, what does it mean? I feel that the answer may be found in II Peter 3:17-18, "Ye, therefore, beloved, seeing ye know these things before, beware lest ye also, being led away with the error of the wicked, fall from your own steadfastness. But grow in Grace and in the knowledge of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. To Him be glory both now and forever.

From the above scripture quotations we may draw these conclusions. Grace is God's preventive from falling from steadfastness. Therefore, as we grow in grace we grew in steadfastness. Not only is it preventive, but it is also, God's unmerited favor toward man. Therefore, we must grow in the realization of that which God has done for us, such as saving our souls and making daily provision for our lives. We must realize that we are to have an outstanding experience with grace and from that day forward we are to continually grow in Christian experience. Growing in grace is the act of maturing in Adult Christianity. Maturity produces works. Just as the child matures into adulthood it ceases play and assumes responsibility, so does ... the maturing Christian. Work does not produce maturity, but it is the sign of maturity.





By PHIL NEWSOM UPI Foreign News Analyst Pietro Nenni is a bald, hooknosed man in spectacles who affects a worker's beret instead

of the bourgeois hat. More than 50 of his 72 years have been spent in the turbulent arena of Italian politics, most of them in opposition.

In his career he has been a close friend and then bitter foe of Benito Mussolini, a member of three post-war governments under the late Alcide de Gasperi and then a leader of its opposition, an admirer of Josef Stalin and winner of the Stalin Peace Prize-an award which he returned in disillusionment after the Russians crushed the revolt in Hungary.

Last week as Italy's Socialists met to decide the terms upon which they would enter into a new center-left government and Nenni girded for what he believed would be his last battle, he looked sadly back upon his

own and his party's history.
"If I had to say in one sentence what struck me most in my long life as a fighter and a militant," he told the party ongress, "I would say it is the drama of the wasted opportunities, of the things that could be done . . . and were not . . . "

Moves Away From Reds Since Hungary, Nenni has sought to lead his party away from close ties with the Communists and toward collaboration with Italy's Christian Democrats who, though fragmented, remain the country's largest political party.

This week was to be the climactic battle. Nenni won it, but with a victory margin over his pro-Red

opponents so narrow and so hedged about with conditions that Italy's future again is in doubt The Socialists promised to refrain from attacks on Italy's

ties with NATO but attached other qualifications which the Christian Democrats would find hard to swallow. They included: -Opposition to all forms of nuclear armament in Europe. -A demand for a state-

planned economy that would increase the "real income" of workers.
