## Authorities Checking Cause of Air Crash

FINDLAY, Ohio (UPI) — Aviation authorities Wednesday stepped up efforts to determine the cause of the crash Tuesday of a converted B28 bomber here in which three men were killed. Marvin Griggs of Chicago, an investigator from the Civil Aeronautics Board (CAB), arrived Wednesday and began taking witness accounts of the crash of the Phillips Petroleum Co. plane after viewing the wreckage.  
Killed in the crash were pilot James H. Creel, co-pilot William J. Hubbard and A. B. Leonard, rubber chemical sales director for Phillips. All lived in Bartlesville, Okla., where the big petroleum firm is headquartered.  
The plane was enroute here from Newark, N. J., to pick up Wayne Brewer, president of Cooper Tire and Rubber Co. of Findlay, and B. E. Esterly, vice president and secretary-treasurer of Cooper, to take them to a business meeting in Amarillo, Tex.

conflicted and investigators were sifting the witness accounts for accurate details. Little was left of the plane after it crashed and burned. Of major interest to the investigators were the engines and propellers and other equipment, which were to receive close scrutiny when the wreckage is moved to shelter.  
By late Wednesday the wreckage was still where it fell and had not been released for moving. The Highway Patrol was preventing anyone from getting near the crash scene until probers completed inspection of the site and the wreckage where it fell.  
The FAA said it had not been determined whether the plane lost flying speed, exploded in the air or crashed for some other reasons. Witness reports

# 45 Million Catholics May Worship in English by Spring

America's 45 million Catholics may be worshipping in English by spring.  
The U.S. hierarchy is moving swiftly to take advantage of the permission granted by the Vatican Council to substitute modern languages for Latin in large portions of the Mass, in the administration of sacraments, and in other forms of public worship.  
American bishops will meet

in the spring — possibly in Washington or Chicago — to approve official English translations of existing Latin liturgies.  
Under the Vatican Council's decree, the only thing that must remain in Latin is the "Canon" of the Mass — the climactic prayers at the altar in which the priest re-enacts Christ's sacrifice on Calvary.  
The bishops' action must be ratified by the Vatican, but Pope Paul VI has already made

clear that his assent will be granted speedily and enthusiastically. The Pope believes that the reforms will help to revitalize Catholic worship by making it possible for the laity to become active participants rather than passive spectators.  
The General Council of the United Presbyterian Church has served notice that it will not back down from its forthright stand in favor of racial integration.

In an unusual public letter addressed to the 3.2 million members of the denomination, the General Council this week took note of a "deep emotional reaction" on the part of many church members to recent actions committing Presbyterians to prompt elimination of all racial barriers in church life. The General Council is the top permanent advisory body of the denomination.  
It said churches were not merely meddling in a social problem, but acting out of "deep conviction rooted in scripture" when they oppose racial discrimination.  
"When men are turned away from God's house because of the color of their skin, their humanity is denied," it said. "When men, women and children, because of their color, are berated, beaten and bombed for trying to vote, get an education, work, buy a house or be served in a public place, their humanity is denied."  
"Every denial of a man's humanity is a denial of his likeness to Christ."

## Religious Writer Discusses 'Spiritual Dryness' in Article

"In every earnest life there are weary flats to tread, with the heavens out of sight — no when the only guidance is the light upon the path below; when the only guidance is the faith of brighter hours, and the secret Hand we are too numb and dark to feel."  
Those words were written in the 19th century by the Unitarian theologian, James Martineau.  
They describe a condition that is painfully familiar to every pilgrim.  
St. Teresa called it "the dark night of the soul." Other saints, less poetic, have referred to it simply as spiritual dryness.  
Their testimony is unanimous that the darkness is apt to fall suddenly and unpredictably, on those who have walked for years in the light of faith, as well as on those who have only recently set their feet upon the pathway.  
It is always a dismaying experience, even to veterans who have been through it many times before and know that it will pass. In fact, it is probably more distressing to true saints than to the rest of us. The better you know God, the more you miss the sense of His presence when it is withdrawn for a while.  
Why does God let this happen to those who love him? Is it punishment for spiritual pride, a way of reminding us that we can never be good on our own, that we cannot be faithful and loving for a single hour unless He gives us the grace to do so? Some of the saints have thought so.  
Sometimes, also, "dryness" may be brought on by sheer fatigue — including the emotional fatigue which results from caring a great deal about others.  
The New Testament records that Christ Himself frequently found it necessary to disengage from the rat race of daily life, and withdraw into a quiet place for a spell of battery-recharging. If the most self-giving person who ever lived could not go on indefinitely without running dry of feelings, it is surely presumptuous for the rest of us to expect to do so.

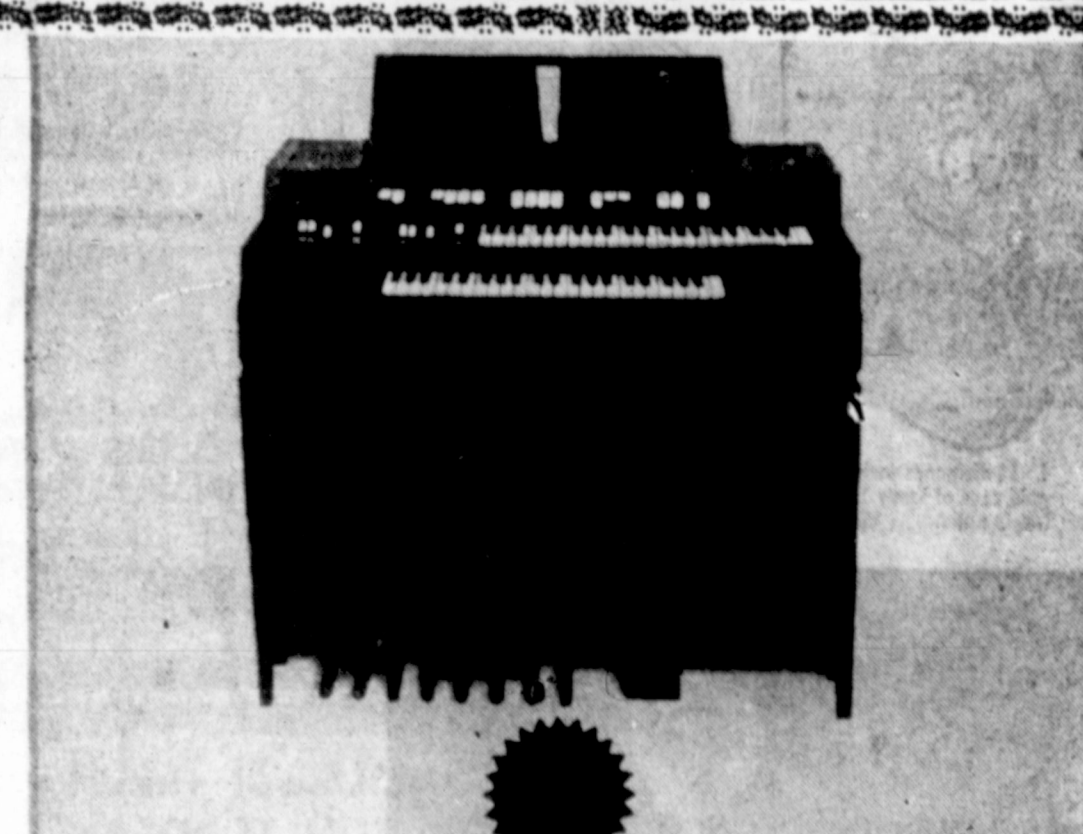
### Elders, Deacons and Trustees Will Be Ordained Sunday

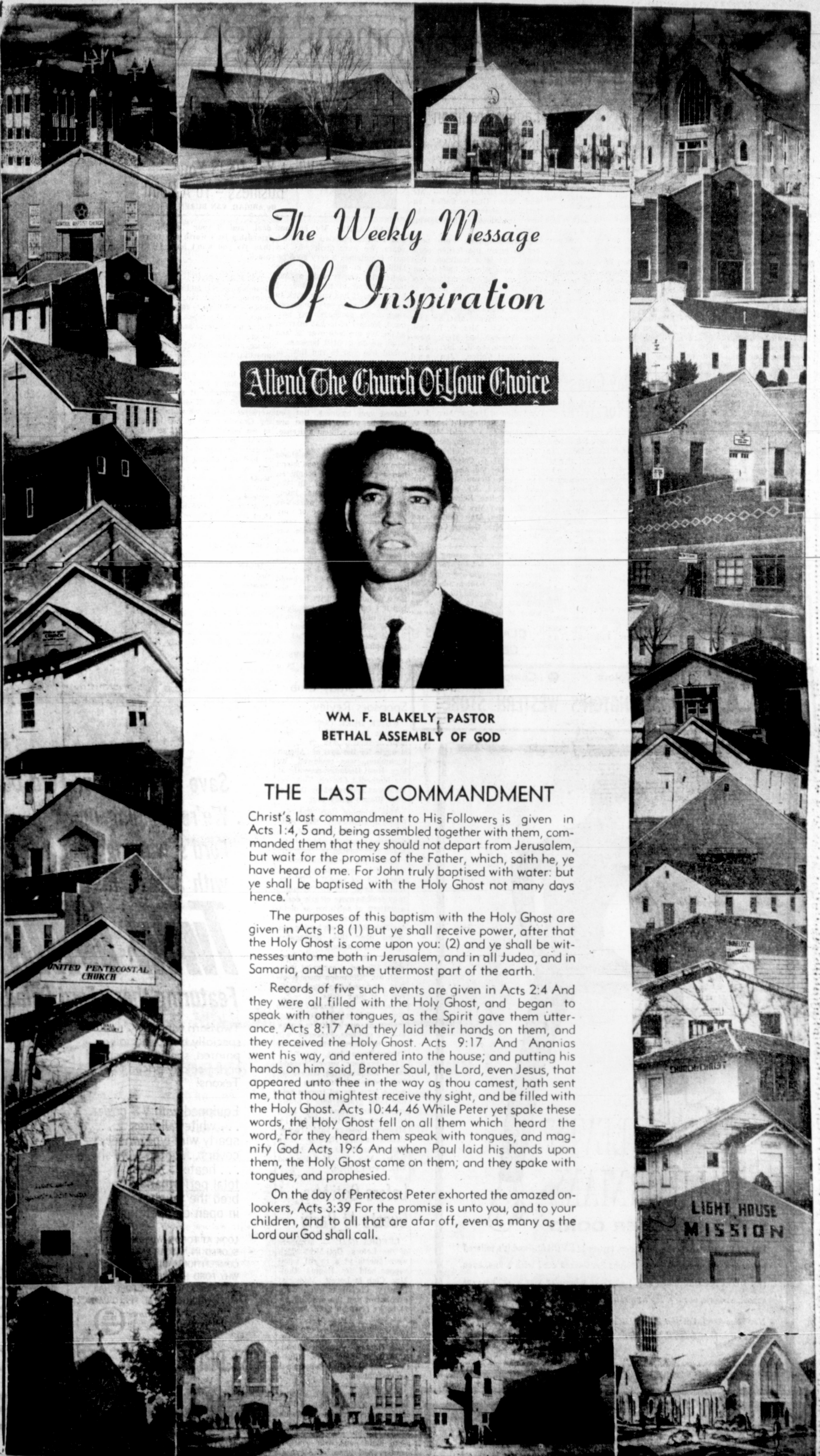

#### Don't Compete for Control of A Child

Dear Mrs. Lawrence: My mother-in-law keeps my 20-month-old girl while I work. She adores the baby who is never any trouble to her at all. But the child so resents any restraints from me that she has bitten me several times. My husband says that there is something in my attitude toward her that upsets her. She is never any trouble to him when he looks after her. This is my first child and I know very little about babies.

ANSWER: Your little girl may not know you well enough to accept restraints from you.

It is your mother-in-law who is creating intimacy with her from which trust of discipline develops. It is she who feeds your baby, bathes her, plays "This Little Pig Went to Market" with her toes, dresses her and introduces her to store windows and your neighbor's new puppies. You come home at night, a comparative stranger to her.

You've been tricked into competing with her for the title of "Best Controller of the Baby." You've allowed yourself to be made ashamed of your failure to match her easy authority over the baby without once asking yourself, "Is this competition fair? Can I reasonably expect this baby to trust me as much as her grandmother when her grandmother is the person who shares most of her waking life?"

You can't expect this. So start using what time you have with your baby, not in competitive displays of control, but for sharing experiences with her. Let the dishes wait for bedtime stories. Make Saturday lunches

into picnics on the floor. Window shop with your baby. Crayon pictures with her. Play with her, be with her until you have accumulated enough happy experiences between you to make your restrictions trustworthy to her.

It is quite possible, you know, that your baby resents your daily absence from her.

And that this resistance which so discourages you is a passionate wish for mother's presence, not rejection of her at all.

Such a view of it would alter its whole meaning, wouldn't it? It would replace your humiliation with pride. It would end competition with grandma. It would arouse tenderness for the resentment instead of fear. I'd like you to take this view of it, not only because it would restore your baby to you but because I believe it's the true one.

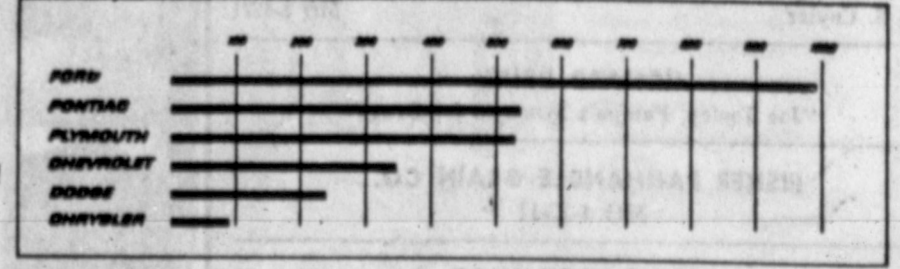

## Dart Gun for Army Under Development

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Defense Department is developing a rifle that shoots darts instead of bullets.

A top Pentagon research expert said this week the darts are only an inch long and about the thickness of a pencil lead, but are capable of inflicting a gaping wound almost as severe as that caused by a dum-dum bullet.

He explained that the darts have little fins that keep them stabilized in flight. But when they strike flesh, they lose their stability and turn end-over-end in the wound.

The early results were obtained in a project known as "special purpose individual weapon" SPIW, announced by the Army last February.

"The weapon could be used as both a rifle and a shoulder-fired grenade launcher," the Army said. "Fully loaded, it is expected to weigh no more than the current M14 rifle and will significantly increase the effectiveness of the combat soldier."

The Army did not identify the nature of the ammunition. The defense expert who described the tiny darts indicated that much of the increase in effectiveness would be due to the extreme light weight of the projectiles as compared with regular ammunition.

A soldier could carry thousands of the darts, and could fire them either in separate rounds or in a single deadly stream, he said.

The expert added that the new weapon would not replace the standard rifle, but could prove highly useful for anti-guerrilla purposes.

The Army said the new weapon could be delivered for tests in February next year.

### Ticket Dodger Gets New Trial

AUSTIN (UPI) — Homer K. Stecher, 75, who boasts he evaded 2,000 traffic tickets over the past 25 years, Wednesday was granted a new trial for a conviction and \$200 fine for parking his car in a loading zone.

Stecher claims his ancient car, used in deliveries, actually is a commercial carrier and that he can legally use loading zones in Houston, his hometown.

The Court of Criminal Appeals ordered the new trial on grounds the bailiff answered questions by the jury without consulting the judge.

## Airmen End 30-Day Stay in Pure Oxygen Atmosphere

SAN ANTONIO, Tex. (UPI)—Four teen-age airmen emerged Wednesday from a steel box and 30 days in an explosive atmosphere of pure oxygen, the longest known test of its kind. They underwent medical tests then returned to their simulated space capsule for five more days of followup. Their conditions were good.

The test, part of a continuing series of experiments to find out man's reaction to space capsule environment, was sponsored jointly by the Air Force School of Aerospace Medicine at Brooks Air Force Base, and the Manned Spacecraft Center at Houston.

The four airmen who breathed pure oxygen for 30 days were Jerry J. Huber, 18, of Hope, Mich.; Philip B. Jameson, 18; of Clearwater, Fla.; Thomas A. Rusiecki, 19, of Niagara Falls, N.Y. and Ronald D. Taskay, 19, of Westerville, N.Y., all airman-ten class.

Two other airmen, George G. Vandall, 21, of Milford, Mass. and Gary L. Morrill, 18, of Eaton Rapids, Mich., stayed outside the capsule as controls. Doctors checked the condition of the four against conditions of the two to compare effects.

Dr. Billy E. Welch, chief of the school's environmental systems branch, said "The men are in fine shape and we are very happy with the progress of the experiment."

The men entered the capsule Nov. 4 and spent five days breathing normal air. They then breathed oxygen through masks to purge their systems of nitrogen to avoid the bends, a painful malady caused by formation of nitrogen bubbles in the body fluids.

The atmospheric pressure in the capsule was then reduced to that found at 27,500 feet and the capsule was flushed of all gases but oxygen.

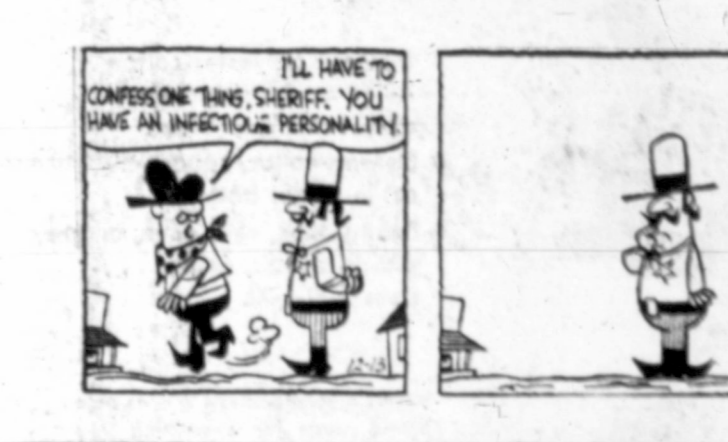
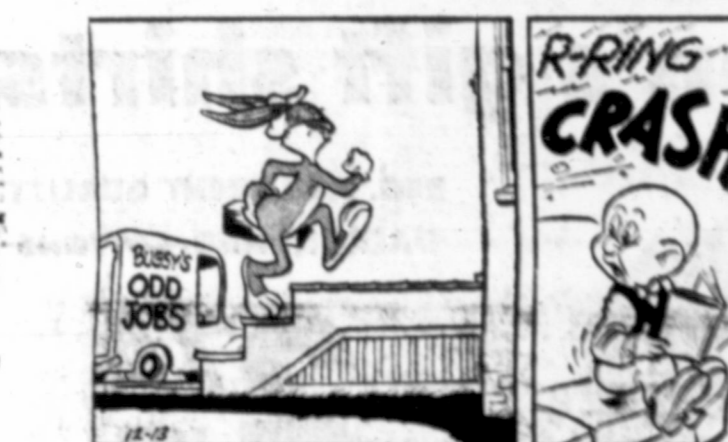
