

LBJ's Aim; Peace for The World

WASHINGTON (UPI)-President Johnson said Saturday the foremost goal of his administration would be the achievement of peace in the world.

He told a federal committee on arms control that the United States would lead from strength in its search for peace. He added that his administration would continue on the path charted by the late President John F. Kennedy when the nuclear test ban treaty with the Soviet Union was signed.

The Chief Executive's remarks were reported by White House sources after he addressed the inter-agency committee on arms control as it opened a two-day meeting.







Q - I have been treated for a peptic ulcer for about a year. The X-ray shows that the ulcer. is healed but I still have my symptoms. Can an ulcer be cured after it becomes chronic?

A - With any of a number of methods of treatment most ulcers heal within eight or 10 weeks. If the stresses that caused the ulcer are not eliminated the ulcer may come back but even the most chronic ulcer can usually be cured with prop-, er treatment and appropriate control measures should help to prevent recurrence.

Since the X-rays showed that your ulcer did heal, it is important to have your doctor determine whether your present symptoms are due to a new ulcer or to some other cause. Several conditions can cause the symptoms commonly associated with ulcers.
