South Viet Leaving Vital Area

SAIGON, South Viet Nam, (UPI)-Government troops are abandoning an outmoded system of forts in the Mekong Delta in the face of mounting Communist pressure, it was learned today.

The delta, Viet Nam's rice bowl and main source of income, is also one of the heaviest areas of Communist penetration. It lies south of Saigon, between the capital and the South China seacoast.

The last remaining symbols of central government authority for thousands of Vietnamese peasants are now being erased as the small detachments of of government troops in the mud-walled forts are marched away.



PARIS (UPI) - President Charles de Gaulle is setting his sights on making France once more a power to be reckoned with in the Far East.

His aim is not military. But, slowly and cautiously, he

is unleashing what may expand into a full-scale French political and economic offensive in that

His aims, according to informed French sources, include opening up a vast market for French exports in Communist China coupled with possible recognition of the Peking regime, reunification of North and South Viet Nam and ultimate easing of the United States out of Southeast Asia.

The De Gaulle "offensive" in the Far East even may take precedence in coming months over his attempts to promote a French-sponsored "grand design" in Europe, it is said. De Gaulle's Red China drive is well under way.

Prosperous Possibility

Some French officials say De Gaulle believes the Chinese market could provide outlets for French exports that would guarantee prosperity for this country's industry for the next 20 to 30 years.

The De Gaulle campaign in Southeast Asia is unfolding more cautiously. He has no thought, French officials say, of becoming militarily involved in France's former Indo-China possessions abandoned in 1954.

He tipped his hand shortly before the downfall of the Dinh Diem regime in South Viet Nam in a statement indicating his belief that South and North Vjet Nam should be reunited and cautiously offering French help in promoting this.

French officials say De Gaulle long has been convinced that United States policy in Viet Nam is leading nowhere.

Officials say he believes the time will come soon when the only solution will be reunification of the Communist North and anti-Communist South, as provided under the 1954 Geneva peace settlement which never was carried out in this respect.




