Lawmakers' Wives Have Rights, Too

By DICK WEST WASHINGTON (UPI) — As little as you might think about it, which in most cases is very little indeed, a congressman's wife is also his constituent. She has a right, just like any other citizen, to buttonhole her congressman and seek a redress of grievances. She also has a right, if things don't work out to her satisfaction, to vote against him in the next election. A congressman may not pay much heed to his spouse when she speaks to him as a wife. But when she addresses him as a constituent, he is duty-bound to listen.

**Plagues Constituent**  
If, then, a congressman introduces legislation specifically designed to please his wife, he is only doing what he would do for any other constituent. No more, no less.

Bear this in mind, please, as we consider a resolution introduced in the House this week by Rep. Compton I. White Jr., an Idaho Democrat and husband. White's resolution resolves that "The Committee on House Administration shall issue to the spouse of each member of the House of Representatives an appropriate identification card."

At first glance, the need for this particular type of legislation might not appear acute. I'll confess that its significance eluded me in the beginning. But after talking with White, and reading a companion-press release, I can see how it would serve a worthy purpose.

White explained that his wife and the wives of some of his colleagues have had difficulty identifying themselves while out shopping in Washington.

**Check-Cashing Difficult**  
When they tried to cash checks or open charge accounts and were asked for identification, they could only produce documents from their home states. Some stores balked at accepting these.

The ladies reasoned that it would be simpler to carry a congressional identification card than it would to take a husband along every time they went shopping, which sounds logical. So White introduced his resolution to accommodate them. It might be argued that the measure is a form of nepotism, since a congressman is using his official position to promote legislation for a member of his family. But that is clearly nonsense.

No husband in his right mind would do anything to make it easier for his wife to cash checks and open charge accounts while shopping. A congressman would only do that for a constituent.

Hope May Spend Christmas at Home

HOLLYWOOD (UPI)—Globe-trotting comic Bob Hope may have to spend Christmas at home this year for just about the first time in 22 years. Spokesmen for the entertainer, who turned 60 this year, said an eye ailment has started giving Hope trouble again and may force him to cancel his scheduled Christmas junket to entertain troops in Greece, Turkey, Cyprus, Crete and Libya.

Hope began his annual Christmas tours of overseas armed forces bases at the start of World War II.

### Party Chairman Asked to Stay

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Johnson has asked John M. Bailey to stay on as Democratic national chairman to prepare for the 1964 election campaign.

Bailey said the President called him to the White House late Tuesday and requested him to stay as boss of the party's national headquarters.

Bailey said he replied that he would be happy to stay and was gratified by the vote of confidence given him by Johnson.

Bailey was the late President John F. Kennedy's choice when he was elected to the chairmanship in January, 1961. A White House source said Johnson's invitation to Kennedy appointees to remain with the new administration included Bailey and other key officials in the party headquarters.

### \$300,000 Suit Settled Against Oil Company

From Helen Hughes, a shrimp fancier, comes this unusual recipe. Enough for 100 or more crackers.

## CANDLE-LIGHT SHRIMP WITH CHEESE MOLD

- 3 cans (4½ ounces each) shrimp
- ½ pound mild cheddar cheese
- ¾ pound Roquefort or Blue cheese
- 1 8-ounce package Philadelphia cream cheese
- 1 garlic clove, chopped fine
- ½ teaspoon Worcestershire
- 1 teaspoon prepared horseradish
- ½ teaspoon cayenne
- 1-3 cup minced fresh parsley
- Drain, rinse shrimp, reserve mixture firmly into 1-quart mixing bowl; chill in refrigerator overnight or longer. When ready to serve, unmold it on base of cake stand or other suitable

# Flour Is Flour, Usually That Is

Q—I make my own bread. What kind of flour should I use to keep the caloric content lower? I have to watch my weight.

A—Use any flour you like. The type of flour will not make any difference in caloric content of your bread, provided shortening, milk solids, sugar and such ingredients are the same. Also, the nutritive value of various kinds of flour, provided the white is enriched, are practically the same. There are about 55 to 60 calories in an average slice of bread.

Q—I am 60 years old. Certainly my body growth is completed. Then why must I continue to eat protein foods when I really have a very small appetite?—Mrs. M. M.

A—So your body is completed. Well, don't you want to keep it repaired and in good condition? Older people still need protein for repair and upkeep of body tissues, say nutritionists in the U.S. Department of Agriculture. A study made by food scientists shows that after 40 years of age the average woman consumes less than the daily needed amount of protein. Women between 40 and 59 years had diets 9 per cent below par in protein; women 60 to 69, 18 per cent; and those 70 to 79 years about 12 per cent short.

Although protein needs must be assessed along with other nutritional requirements, older women should check their daily protein intake. Foods important for protein include milk, cheese, eggs, meats, poultry and fish. Others that can be counted on to give good amounts are dry beans, peas, lentils and nuts. Although cereals provide smaller quantities of protein in a usual serving, their contributions can help out in meeting daily protein needs.

# For Christmas Stockings or Gift Boxes, There's Nothing Like Nougat

## NOUGAT (About 2 pounds)

- 1½ cups light corn syrup
- 2 cups sugar
- ¼ teaspoon salt
- ¼ cup margarine or butter
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 2 egg whites
- 1te aspoon vanilla
- ½ cup chopped pecans
- ¼ cup chopped candied cherries

Combine syrup, sugar, salt and water in a heavy saucepan. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly, until sugar is dissolved. Cook without stirring to hard ball stage (250-degrees) or until a small amount forms a hard ball which holds its shape when dropped into very cold water. Just before syrup reaches 250-degrees, beat egg whites until stiff but not dry using large bowl of electric mixer. Pour a small amount, not more than one-fourth of the syrup, slowly over egg whites, beating constantly. Continue beating until mixture is thick and holds shape. Meanwhile, cook remainder of syrup over low heat to hard crack stage (300-degrees) or until a small amount of syrup separates into threads which are hard and brittle when dropped into very cold water. Add syrup slowly to first mixture beating constantly. (Syrup may become firm in mixture at this stage, but will soften again, and blend smoothly with further additions of the hot syrup.) Continue beating until mixture begins to hold its shape. Beat in margarine and vanilla. Beat until mixture becomes very thick and satiny. If mixture gets too heavy, beating may be finished with spoon. Stir in pecans and cherries. Turn into 2 well-buttered pans, 8 inches square. Nougat should be about ¼-inch thick. Press down evenly. Let stand until firm enough to cut; cut into pieces and wrap in wax paper. Store candy several days to develop best nougat texture.

# Swiss Carrot Christmas Cake Adds A New Variation to Holiday Baking

The age-old spirit of Christmas—"Peace on earth and good will to men"—doesn't change. But a slight variation in the traditional fruit cake is welcome to many hostesses and that is why you might want to try this Swiss Carrot Fruit Cake. We have found it to be very popular.

## SWISS CARROT CHRISTMAS CAKE (10 to 12 servings)

- 2-3 cup grated raw carrots, firmly packed
- 1 2-3 cup finely ground unblanched almonds
- ¾ cup fine dry bread crumbs
- ¼ teaspoon ground mace
- ½ teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon ground ginger
- 1 teaspoon double-acting baking powder
- 6 large eggs, separated
- 1½ cups sugar
- 2 teaspoons grated lemon rind
- 3 teaspoons fresh lemon juice
- Confectioners' sugar glaze
- Candied fruits for garnish
- Combine carrots and almonds in a mixing bowl. Mix bread crumbs with spices and baking

powder and blend with the carrots and almonds. Beat egg yolks until thick and lemon colored. Gradually beat in sugar, lemon rind and juice. Beat until thick. Stir into carrot mixture. Beat egg whites until they stand in soft peaks and fold in until well blended. Line an 8-inch spring form pan with waxed paper. Grease and sprinkle bottom and sides with fine dry bread crumbs. Turn mixture into pan. Bake in a preheated moderate oven (350-degrees) 1 hour or until cake tester inserted into center comes out dry and clean. Cool. Remove from pan. Spoon confectioners' sugar glaze over sides and top of cake. Garnish with candied fruits. Store in a tightly covered cake box. This cake improves with age.

## CONFECTIONERS' SUGAR GLAZE

- 1 cup sifted confectioners' sugar
- 1 tablespoon water
- ¼ teaspoon pure vanilla extract
- Blend sugar and water together until smooth. Add pure vanilla extract.

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# Easy-to-Fix Pork and Apple One-Dish Meal

- 4 loin pork chops
- 1½ teaspoons Kitchen Bouquet
- 1 tablespoon cooking oil
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 quart diced tart red apples, about 1½ lbs.
- ½ cup seedless raisins
- 2 tablespoons brown sugar
- ½ teaspoon basil
- ½ teaspoon ground cloves
- 3 tablespoons lemon juice

- 3 tablespoons water
- Brush entire surface of pork chops with Kitchen Bouquet. Brown in oil in heavy skillet, over moderate heat, then sprinkle with salt. In a mixing bowl, place diced apples and raisins. Sprinkle in sugar and spices, tossing lightly, then sprinkle with lemon juice and toss again. Place in well greased 6 x 10 x 2 inch baking

### Foreign News Commentary

The marble ruins of ancient cities along Turkey's coastline, the remains of a Roman aqueduct, Istanbul's winding narrow streets and its covered bazaar are symbols of Turkey's past.

Modern dress, the alphabet and a western-style parliamentary system are the outward symbols of an evolving modern Turkey, which started on its own more than 40 years ago by Kemal Ataturk.

Yet just as Turkey, astride the Dardanelles and the Bosphorus, lies both in Europe and Asia, so its social structure stands astride both ancient and modern times. More than half its population is illiterate. Erosion is eating away the topsoil of its farmlands and unemployed peasants are flocking to mushrooming cities.

Despite \$4 billion in aid, Turkey still is unable to carry it- self.

**Constant Tension**

And between the peasants, resentful that they now must pay taxes to help Turkey help herself, and students and young officers impatient at the slow pace of Turkey's revolution, there is generated a tension which leads to a perpetual state of crisis or near crisis.

The problem is not one of encroaching communism but one strictly made-in-Turkey.

From the regime of the deposed and later executed Premier Adnan Menderes, Turkey inherited galloping inflation and the headaches left by pell-mell but unplanned industrialization.

Two attempted military coups failed but political unrest has continued to mount.

Finally, in last month's local election the Justice party emerged the chief winner and this week Premier Ismet Inonu, Turkey's 78-year-old link with Ataturk, stepped down.

**Blasts Tax Program**

The Justice party widely is regarded as the heir to the outlawed Democratic party which was led by Menderes and traditionally favored the Turkish farmers from whom it drew its chief support. Reflecting the farmer's rising discontent, the Justice party centered its fire on the new taxes necessary to pay for Turkey's ambitious five year development program.

Since Inonu opposes a coalition with the Justice party which also is regarded with suspicion by the Turkish military, Turkey now seems destined for an extended period of political uncertainty at a particularly unfortunate time.

Turkey's development program still is in its first year and is at a critical stage.

The first year has been devoted to road construction, communications, harbor facilities, schools and clinics.

They were necessary but were not immediate income producers. To pay for them taxes were raised and must be raised again if an ambitious program to invest more than another billion dollars in the Turkish economy in 1964 is to be realized.

Included are plans to increase oil production, the manufacture of a new oil pipeline and plants to manufacture fertilizer, plastics and synthetic rubber.

Turkey needs an annual increase of 7 per cent in her gross national product if she is to keep ahead of an annual population growth of 4.5 per cent. Political unrest makes achievement of the goal uncertain at best.

HOUSTON (UPI) — Domestic Relations Judge Wendell A. Odum signed an order last week granting Glenna Lee McCarthy Pontikes, daughter of oilman Glenn McCarthy, an uncontested divorce from former Rice University football player George Pontikes.

The judge gave the redheaded Mrs. Pontikes title to the couple's home and one of the automobiles and granted Pontikes another auto. Pontikes was ordered to pay \$200 monthly child support.

The couple eloped after the Rice - Baylor football game in 1950. She was a senior in high school and he was a university sophomore.

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# Jackie Recalls 'One Brief Shining Moment'

EDITOR'S NOTE: The following is from the current issue of Life magazine where it appears under the title, "For President Kennedy, An Epilogue":

HYANNIS PORT — She remembers how hot the sun was in Dallas, and the crowds—greater and wilder than the crowds in Mexico or in Vienna. The sun was blinding, streaming down; yet she could not put on sunglasses for she had to wave to the crowd.

And up ahead she remembers seeing a tunnel around a turn and thinking that there would be a moment of coolness under the tunnel. There was the sound of the motorcycles, as always in a parade, and the occasional backfire of a motorcycle. The sound of the shot came, at that moment, like the sound of a backfire and she remembers Connally saying, "No, no, no, no."

She remembers the roses. Three times that day in Texas they had been greeted with the bouquets of yellow roses of Texas. Only in Dallas they had given her red roses. She remembers thinking, how funny—red roses for me; and then the car was full of blood and red roses.

Much later, accompanying the body from the Dallas hospital to the airport, she was along with Clint Hill—the first Secret Service man to come to their rescue—and with Dr. Burkley, the White House physician. Burkley gave her two roses that had slipped under the President's shirt when he fell his head in her lap.

All through the night they tried to separate him from her, to sedate her, and take care of her—and she would not let them. She wanted to be with him. She remembered that Jack had said of his father, when his father suffered the stroke, that he could not live like that. Don't let that happen to me, he had said, when I have to go.

Now, in her hand she was

holding a gold St. Christopher's medal.

She had given him a St. Christopher's medal when they were married; but when Patrick died this summer, they had wanted to put something in the coffin with Patrick that was from them both; and so he had put in the St. Christopher's medal.

Then he had asked her to give him a new one to mark their 10th wedding anniversary, a month after Patrick's death.

He was carrying it when he died and she had found it. But it belonged to him—so she could not put that in the coffin with him. She wanted to give him something that was hers, something that she loved. So she had slipped off her wedding ring and put it on his finger. When she came out of the room in the hospital in Dallas, she asked: "Do you think it was right? Now I have nothing left." And Kenny O'Donnell said, "You leave it where it is."

That was at 1:30 p.m. in Texas.

But then, at Bethesda Hospital in Maryland, at 3 a.m. the next morning, Kenny slipped into the chamber where the body lay and brought her back the ring, which, as she talked now, she twisted.

On her little finger was the other ring: a slim, gold circlet with green emerald chips—the one he had given her in memory of Patrick.

There was a thought, too, that was always with her.

"When Jack quoted something it was usually classical," she said, "but I'm so ashamed of myself—all I keep thinking of is this line from a musical comedy.

"At night, before we'd go to sleep, Jack liked to play some records; and the song he loved most came at the very end of this record. The lines he loved to hear were: Don't let it be forgot, that once there was a spot, for one brief shining moment that was known as Camelot."

She wanted to make sure that the point came clear and

went on: "There'll be great presidents again—and the Johnsons are wonderful, they've been wonderful to me—but there'll never be another Camelot again."

"Once, the more I read of history the more bitter I got. For a while I thought history was something that bitter old men wrote. But then I realized history made Jack what he was. You must think of him as this little boy, sick so much of the time, reading in bed, reading history, reading the Knights of the Round Table, reading Mariborough. For Jack, history was full of heroes. And if it made him this way—if it made him see the heroes—maybe other little boys will see. Men are such a combination of good and bad. Jack had this heroic idea of history, the idealistic view."

But she came back to the idea that transfixed her:

"Don't let it be forgot, that once there was a spot, for one brief shining moment that was known as Camelot—and it will never be that way again."

As for herself? She was horrified by the stories that she might live abroad. "I'm never going to live in Europe. I'm not going to 'travel extensively abroad.' That's a desecration. I'm going to live in the places I lived with Jack. In Georgetown, and with the Kennedys at the cape. They're my family. I'm going to bring up my children. I want John to grow up to be a good boy."

As for the President's memorial, at first she remembered that, in every speech in their last days in Texas, he had spoken of how in December this nation would loft the largest rocket booster yet into the sky, making us first in space. So she had wanted something of

his there when it went up—perhaps only his initials painted on a tiny corner of the great Saturn, where no one need even notice it. But now Americans will seek the moon from Cape Kennedy. The new name, born of her frail hope, came as a surprise.

The only thing she knew she must have for him was the eternal flame over his grave at Arlington.

"Whenever you drive across the bridge from Washington into Virginia," she said, "you see the Lee mansion on the side of the hill in the distance. When Caroline was very little, when Caroline was one of the first things she learned to recognize. Now, at night you can see his flame beneath the mansion for miles away."

She said it is time people paid attention to the new President and the new First Lady. But she does not want them to

HOLLYWOOD (UPI) — Experts continued their painstaking investigation Wednesday of notes made by starlet Karyn Kucpincet before she was strangled.

The victim had kept extensive notes of her telephone conversations on a pad that also contained names and telephone numbers of acquaintances.

But Lt. George Walsh of sheriff's homicide said it was "not exactly a diary," just random quotes and notes.

The 22-year-old daughter of newspaper columnist Irv Kucpincet was eulogized Tuesday as a woman "born to be a star" at funeral services held in Chicago.

More than 1,500 persons, including Illinois Gov. Otto Kerner and Chicago Mayor Richard Daley, attended the services.

Miss Kucpincet was found in her apartment Saturday night by friends. The coroner's office said she had been dead since early Thursday.

One of the last persons believed to have talked to her was television actor Andrew Prine, her former steady boy friend.

Prine revealed both he and Miss Kucpincet had received threatening messages pasted to the doors of their apartments several months ago. However, Prine said they had not attached any significance to them at the time.

too. "When winter's been bad, spring makes me glad.

"Even if winter comes again, it will always go..."

Mitchell says the letter to the late President's daughter will tell Caroline that her father is in Heaven, where there is no winter, and not to be sad.

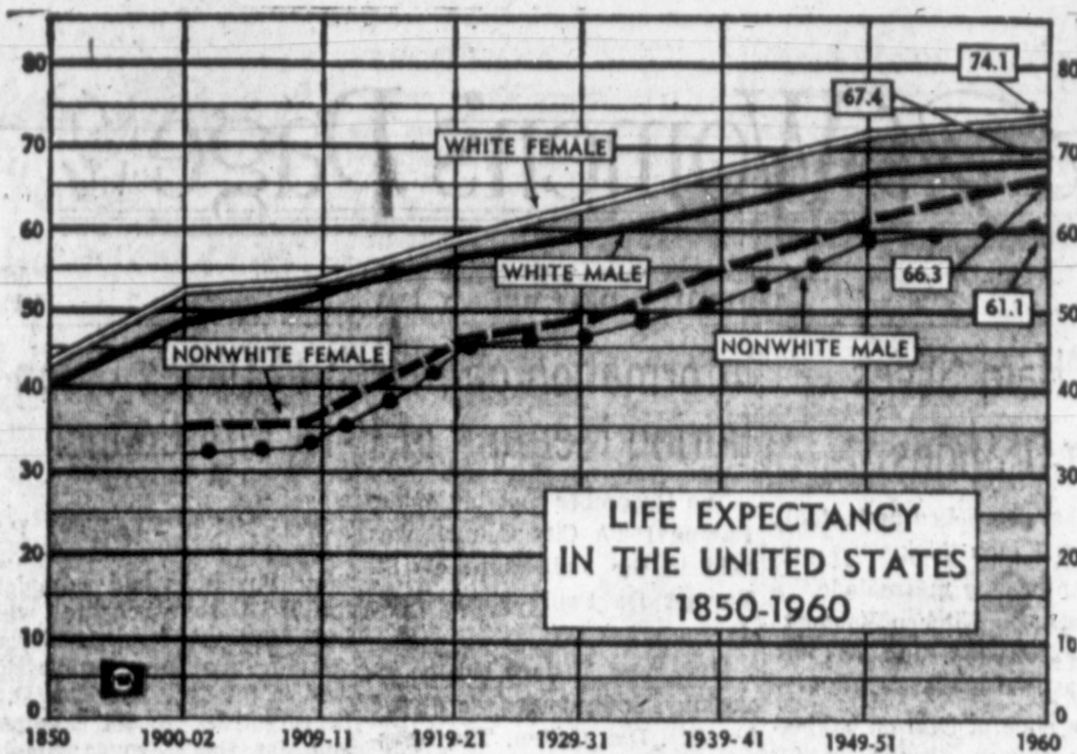
## Notes From Wall Street

## Title Chosen for Historical Record of Kennedy's Death

NEW YORK (UPI) — "Four Days—The Historical Record of President Kennedy's Death" has been chosen as the title of the book to be published shortly by United Press International and the American Heritage Company.

Material was being assembled today with a view to making the book available to the public in record time. It will be distributed early next month through UPI subscribers exclusively and through retail book stores in February.

Mims Thomason, president of UPI, and James Parton, president of American Heritage, said the elaborately illustrated documentary account would contain a preface by Bruce Catton, historian and senior editor of American Heritage magazine. It will be published in hard covers, the content based on UPI's news and picture coverage, beginning with the late President's arrival in Dallas on Nov. 22, and ending with his burial in Arlington National Cemetery Nov. 25. Many of UPI's more striking dispatches will be reproduced just as they were carried in the service from reporters who covered the momentous events in Dallas and Washington. "Four Days" will be issued in the regular format of American Heritage magazine.

*Double-Duty Dining Chairs*

Extra seating space in a living room is a need that shows up strongly when autumn entertaining brings guests indoors. When I was fretting over the need for more dining room chairs and more seating space in the living room, a professional decorator suggested a solution: Add two dining chairs which can double as occasional chairs. Dining chairs, he pointed out, don't have to match the dining table. Or, if you have four matching chairs, add two arm chairs of compatible design. These will swing into the living room handily when company comes.

Dining chairs usually have higher seats and straighter backs than occasional chairs, but some are being designed now with this double duty in mind. Seats are more padded, backs softened. Conversely, some occasional chairs now are (See DOUBLE DUTY, Page 11)

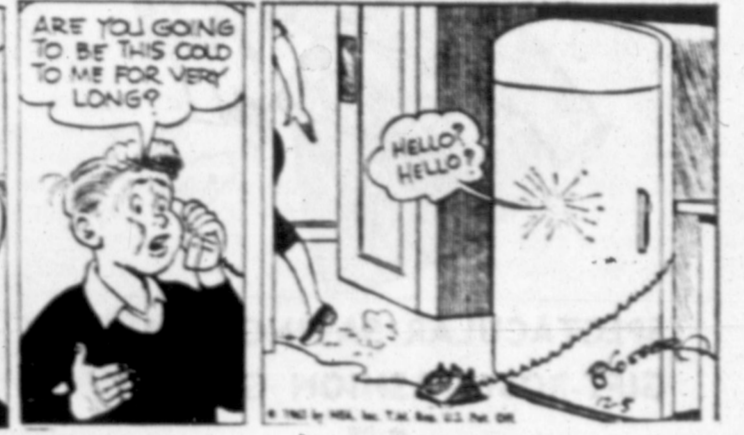

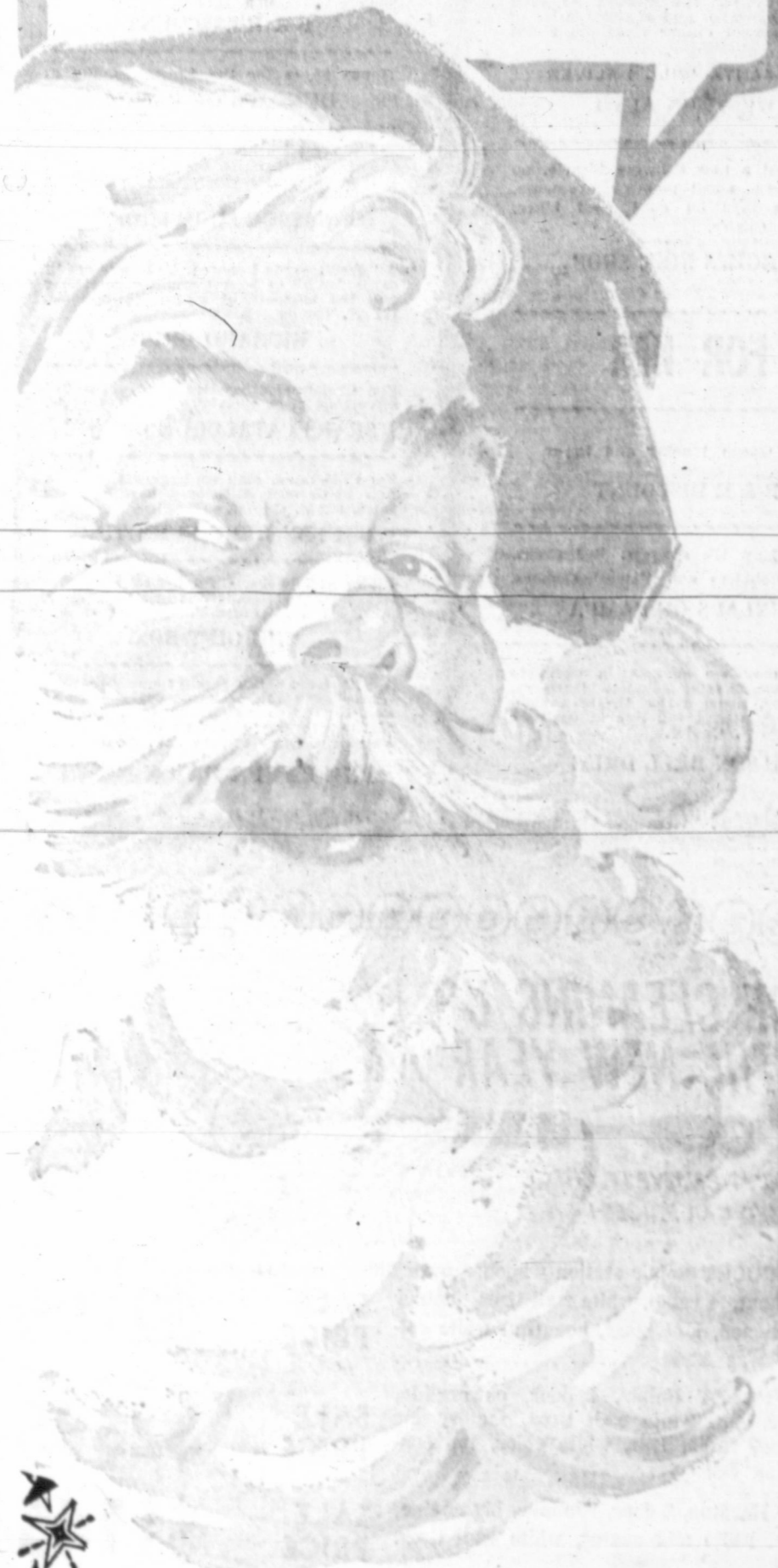

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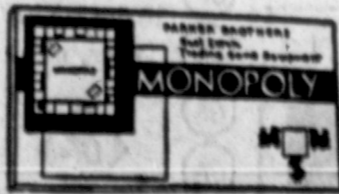
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
