It is the way Army Specialist 4th Class Ted Swindle and his wife Marilyn, now with the Berlin Brigade, decided to tell everyone here at their home of the thousands of Americans overseas whose "Christmas must be both memory and reality to be a reality at all".

Ted is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Peie Swindle of 916 E. Jordan. His wife is the former Marilyn Ayers, daughter of C. C. Ayers, Route 1, Hedley.

With the card, in German, came a letter, printed here in part:

"Hello everyone at home. From 6,000 miles away, this letter comes home to express our heartfelt wishes to all for a

Pilot Whales Die on Coast

PONTE VEDRA BEACH, Fla. (UPI) — Drawn by some mysterious force of nature, scores of pilot whales charged toward the shore here Sunday and drowned in heavy surf.

The air-breathing mammals, some weighing a ton, churned the Atlantic Ocean into a field of white foam as they battled breakers and undertow to reach the beach.

Police and volunteers, recalling an incident four years ago when a school of 75 pilot whales did the same thing here, abandoned the idea of going into the treacherous waters to try to turn back the whales. However, a crew from Marineland at St. Augustine saved five of the whales and took them back to the attraction.

When it happened four years ago, police risked death among the thrashing mammals to turn them back toward the open ocean. Each whale, when released, turned back to the beach.

"We counted 150 and stopped counting. There were probably a lot more out there than that because they were still coming at dark," St. Johns County Deputy Roy Landrum said.

"I saw one that was 16 feet long and weighed about a ton, but there were some smaller ones, too."

The dead whales littered a three-mile stretch of beach. A mass burial in deep trenches, carved by bulldozers, was planned on the beach.

and out of the Pampa economy. Commissioners Holmes and Fort exchanged words with Commissioners Nation and McDaniel during the discussion about the rate raise.

"We have only heard the gas company's side of the story," Holmes said.

Fort said:

"I don't think there is a man around this table who has enough of the facts to determine whether the gas company is entitled to a raise."

Commissioner Nation said he had made a prolonged study and was convinced that the 10 per cent raise was justified.

"I also believe that the taxpayers of Pampa will be better off with this raise than they would if they try to fight the increase and then wind up with a rate that would be even higher," Nation said.

Norman Henry, manager of Pioneer's local office, said today he could not state definitely just when the increase will take effect.

Machinery will be put into motion immediately," he said. "To work out the new rate schedule."

Henry indicated that it probably would be sometime after Jan. 1 when the new increased rate goes out on the monthly bills. The ordinance became effective today.

The new rate will give the gas utility approximately a \$65,000 yearly increase in revenue from Pampa gas consumers.

In other business today the commission approved purchase of 30,000 postcards for the water department at a cost of \$1,200, approved payment of a \$947.14 Continental Oil Co. invoice for gasoline and oil, and granted a transfer of franchise from the Vumore Co. to H & B American.

The franchise which runs into next year covers the right to install and operate "electronic hometheaters" in Pampa.

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Texan Goes Underground on Home and Adds Live Garden

By PRESTON MCGRAW DUNCANVILLE, Tex. (UPI)—When Len Rogers built his underground home he installed a special sound system so he could listen to the sounds of the world outside if he ever got a buried feeling. The only time Rogers turns the sound system on is when he is expecting visitors.

Rogers, a well-to-do developer, has become a confirmed underground dweller since he moved into his new home Nov. 1. He is even sorry he built a recepion room and a kitchen for cookouts above ground.

"The very livability of it is the first thing I noticed," Rogers said today. "The atmosphere is perfect. It is free of dust and noises. Maintenance and housekeeping are nothing. My wife never has to dust the furniture.

"Then there is the permanency of it. Civil defense estimates the life of my home at 1,000 years. We have a big underground garden with a patio, living garden and waterfall. But we never have to sweep the patio floor."

Gets his Idea
Rogers got the idea of an underground home last year when he visited the home of Jay Swayze, a Plainview builder. During a fallout shelter building scare, Swayze got the idea

of building a whole house—not just a shelter—underground. Swayze built himself a home underground and was so pleased with it he wondered why he had ever lived above ground. His home became so famous that 30,000 people visited it over a several-year period. Among them was Rogers.

There was a secret to the success of the Swayze underground home. The secret was a shell first built underground with the house constructed in the shell.

Air comes in, without machinery, through filters and circulates around the shell. It goes through a chimney, the cycle creating a continuous gentle draft. Rogers used the Swayze plans.

It has Windows
Rogers' home has windows, just like any other home. When he wants more air, he lifts a window. The outer concrete shell is 18 inches from the window, but Rogers has murals painted on the shell with lighting to create full daylight, twilight and moonlight effects.

The house, with slight modifications, would make an excellent fallout shelter, but Rogers did not build it as such. He was primarily interested in it as a home.

The Rogers home is 18 feet down on a 110 foot by 120 foot lot. There is three feet of soil

In April, 1955, in Bandung, Indonesia, 29 nations met for what Indonesian President Sukarno called "the first inter-continental conference of the so-called colored peoples in the history of mankind."

It also marked the beginning of Red China's determined drive to extend its influence beyond Asia and to the emerging new nations of Africa.

In the last two years, as the Soviet Union and Red China have become more deeply embroiled in their ideological war, the Chinese have intensified their drive in Africa, with the Soviet Union a major target and with the difference in the colors of men's skins noted at Bandung a major weapon.

At the third Afro-Asian solidarity conference held in Moshi, Tanganyika, in February of this year the head of the Chinese delegation told Soviet representatives "the whites have nothing to do here."

Bar Participation

At a meeting of journalists in Jakarta, the Chinese sought to bar Soviet participation on the grounds that the Soviet Union is not an Asian country.

As the Chinese have pressed their claims to being the only true friends of black Africa, they have referred contemptuously to the Russians as "white" and "European," and have stressed the solidarity of yellow and black races against colonialism.

Pressing the Chinese case in Africa with personal visits this week are Chinese Premier Chou En-lai and Foreign Minister Chen Yi, first stop the flag-decked streets of Cairo.

One objective is an attempt to undermine Soviet influence in personal conferences.

Another is to press for another Bandung-type conference. Red Chinese newspapers have been stressing the need for "solidarity and mutual support of Asian and African peoples on the basis of the Bandung spirit."

There could be no solace for the free world if either the communism of revisionist Russia or orthodox China should take root in Africa.

Tragic Consequences

But tragic consequences of an entirely different sort would be the result if the Chinese were to be successful in their attempts to divide the world between white and colored.

At least the early stages of Chou's tour were less successful than he might have hoped. President Nasser who was to have greeted him, was away in Tunisia.

The Cairo newspaper Al Gumbria noted that one of Chou's aims would be to try to end the "virtual international isolation" growing out of Sino-Indian border fighting "which showed China as the aggressor."

"Nor are the new African nations quite so unsophisticated as the Chinese seem to hope."

Last February's Tanganyika conference left many delegations angry at the thought that the Red Chinese had used them simply as a cover for an attack upon the United States and an attempt to present these attacks as representing the voice of Africa.

It led to this cold conclusion by Tanganyika Minister of Home Affairs Oscar Kambona: "We are not going to accept the enemies chosen for us by others."

Connally Out Of Hospital

AUSTIN (UPI) — Gov. John Connally, still disabled but recovering rapidly from gunshot wounds suffered on a Dallas street, was home Monday from his second hospital visit in two months.

Connally was taken to Parkland Hospital in Dallas Nov. 22 after he was shot by the same sniper who killed President Kennedy. He was thought well enough to leave the hospital and return to Austin Dec. 5 but developed complications.

Connally will have to stay in bed a few days, doctors said, but should be up and around by Christmas.

Mineral Rich Land Rights To Be Ruled Upon Thursday

AUSTIN (UPI) — Land commissioner Jerry Sadler will hold a hearing Thursday on an Austin man's claim to several thousand acres of mineral-rich land in Hidalgo County.

Sadler appointed Byron Simpson of San Antonio to survey the land. Simpson reportedly found about 2,000 unsurveyed acres in the land Strong claimed.

There are several producing oil and gas wells on the land in question. In his application for lease rights, Strong listed more than 2,000 parties who he said claim rights to the land. Included were persons from Texas and 32 other states, Mexico, Canada, Puerto Rico, Spain and Venezuela.

A state law awards a one-sixteenth interest in mineral rights to anyone who discovers such unsurveyed land. If Strong's claim is upheld, the state would get a one-eighth interest in the mineral rights and

DALLAS (UPI) — Scientists at a symposium on the deepest reaches of space discussed today four new radio stars — stars that produce distinct noises which can be picked up and listened to on earth with sensitive electronic apparatus and giant antennas.

The discovery of the new radio stars was announced Monday night by Dr. Maarten Schmidt of the Mt. Wilson and Palomar observatories in California. The discovery of the new stars brought to a total of nine the radio stars known to exist. There are undoubtedly others.

Dr. Schmidt and about 300 other scientists are attending a three-day symposium on "gravitational collapse and other topics in relativistic astrophysics."

The symposium, which ends Wednesday, is sponsored by the Southwest Center for Advanced Studies of Dallas and Yeshiva University of New York.

Theory Explains Stars
Gravitational collapse is a new theory to explain how the radio stars came into being and why they make noise.

The four new stars are named 3C245, 3C9—3C216 and 3C47. They get their names from the way they are listed in a catalog at Cambridge University in England.

Cambridge is one of the leaders in radio astronomy, the electronic probing of space by the use of great directional antennas that look like soup bowls and may be as big, as a football field.

All nine of the radio stars have been discovered in the past 10 years, and all by means of the noises they emit. Subsequently, astronomers were able to locate them with giant optical telescopes, or measure the light rays reflected from them.

Distance Set In Years
They are very far away from the earth. Schmidt said the 3C47 must be several billion light years from the earth. A light year is the distance light can flash in a year.

He noted that 3C 47 is moving so fast that the frequency of light from it is changed. Thus light which originally could not

be photographed on earth is changed to ultra-violet rays which can be photographed.

The new stars were discovered by astronomers in the United States, Australia and England. Schmidt shared the discovery of two. What generally happened was that a radio astronomer found the new star and passed the information on to an optical astronomer who confirmed the find.

Space is filled with noise that can be heard by radio. But the source of most of it is from sources that cannot be classed as stars.

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Secret Service Seeks Answers On Assassination

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Former U.S. Secret Service Chief U.E. Baughman said Monday that there were unanswered questions about President Kennedy's assassination that "should be resolved."

Baughman, who guarded presidents as chief of the Secret Service for 13 years, said "the plain fact is that you cannot protect the President from every danger. And the greatest danger is from a sniper hiding in a high building."

In a copyright interview with U.S. News & World Report, Baughman said he didn't know if the Secret Service did all it could to protect Kennedy because he wasn't in Dallas on the day of the assassination.

"But I can't understand why Mrs. Kennedy had to climb over the back of the car as she did to get help," Baughman said.

News photographs showed Mrs. Kennedy helping Secret Service agent Clint Hill into the presidential limousine after her husband was wounded.

Baughman said that one reason that agents weren't next to Kennedy on the running board of his car was that the White House wouldn't permit it.

"The White House has been trying to avoid making it conspicuous that you're guarding the President closely," he said.

Asked if they were any mistakes in the Dallas security preparations, Baughman said, "as an investigator, I can think of a lot of questions, but I wasn't there. The only thing I can say is that the Secret Service does not have enough men."

New Source of Energy Found in Gravity Pull

DALLAS (UPI)—Scientists today discussed a possible source of energy that may be greater than even a hydrogen bomb blast—gravity.

More than 100 scientists participated in the three-day International Symposium on Gravitational Collapse. They exchanged ideas on how to harness the gravity pull of stars far in space.

"Gravitation is capable of yielding a hundred times more energy than the most powerful nuclear reaction," two of the scientists wrote.

Prof. William A. Fowler of California Institute of Technology and Prof. Fred Hoyle of Cambridge University are the chief exponents of the idea that the primary source of energy is shrinking or gravitational collapse of a super-star.

The professors wrote a paper last February that said noises picked up by sensitive radio equipment was caused by gravitational collapse. The noises come from up to 1,500 million light years away from earth, so they contended these forces are greater than any nuclear reaction.

**Standby Dress Is Needed for P-TA

The standby dress is an essential in every wardrobe. Wear it for P-TA, for church, for business. Dress it up or down with scarves, jewelry, or a hat.

Perfect fabric for an all-purpose dress is a lightweight wool. There are some really lovely fabrics available—especially the blends of sheer wool with orlon. Such a dress keeps its shape, wrinkles almost not at all, stays clean and is so easy to wear. Search and find the perfect fabric for you. If you are older and inclined to be "pillowy," avoid stiff or bulky fabrics. A fabric must blend to the body to be becoming.

A woman I know who sews to perfection will buy a cotton or easy-care fabric of a weight similar to the wool or silk fabric she aims to use. She makes this dress, makes any fitting corrections necessary—rests width of skirt, length of skirt, waistline position, all before she cuts into her expensive fabric. When her dresses or coats are finally finished, made of the very best quality fabric, you can well believe that they were done by one of the best houses anywhere.

The yoke and belt of this type dress should be lined with lightweight rayon for body and to hold the shape well. A 2-inch band of interfacing is good also in the bottom of the sleeves.

This type dress would be good also in silk faille, a novelty silk, or a heavy shantung. The important thing is to have a fabric firm enough to hold shape. Remember sleeves are easier to put in without wrinkles if you run 3 rows of long-stitch machine gathers across the top, row's 3/4-inch apart. Draw up the bobbin threads of all 3 rows, ease the fullness along on the threads so that you can place the seam into the armpole without a wrinkle.

This special design for the not-so-tall figure is wonderfully slimming with the new side closing.

The shocking waste of public money by the national Defense Department military brass continues unabated and unrebuked despite claims from time to time that national defense has saved another billion here and another billion there. If the Pentagon were a private corporation, the stockholders would have fired the management long since. The comptroller general of the United States has been calling fouls against the Pentagon ever since the monstrous building was erected to house the consolidated armed services. The comptroller general is an arm of the U.S. Congress. The office was created to audit the expenditure of funds appropriated by the Congress. The comptroller's reports on national defense procurement consistently have revealed reckless waste of public money. There are annually many such audits of national defense spending. These tales of what the generals and admirals do with the taxpayers' dollars are almost incredible. They belong in a believe-it-or-not museum. Here is an example, dated Nov. 29, 1962.

Finds Reserve Funds
Toward the end of the 1962 fiscal year the Air Force discovered that it had a reserve of unexpended funds that had been appropriated for expenditure in fiscal 1962. The Air Force, of course, had asked for this money on grounds of urgent need. The facts seem to be that the Air Force did not need the money at all and was somewhat embarrassed to approach the year end with a large unexpended balance.

The Air Force had to spend the money or turn it back to the treasury. So the Air Force spent \$323,000 of its surplus funds for new furniture it did not need. The comptroller general called the expenditure largely unjustified. "Such waste and extravagance illustrates the need," the comptroller's report said, "for a greater sense of individual responsibility for economy in government operations."

Charges Army Waste
This outrageous waste of public funds is a pretty fair sample of the waste which has gone on year after year and which is reflected in reports prepared by the comptroller general. Rep. Earl Wilson (R-Ind.) told the House in a recent speech that the Army had wasted about \$35 million in purchases of radio equipment without competitive bidding. The Navy

Highway Patrol Investigates 21 Accidents in Gray County

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 21 accidents on rural highways in Gray County during November, according to Sgt. J. W. Wilson, Highway Patrol supervisor in the Pampa area. The accidents accounted for three deaths, 17 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$14,755. The rural traffic accident summary for this county from January through November shows a total of 153 accidents resulting in ten persons killed, 111 persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$119,195.00. Sergeant Wilson said there will be a rigid enforcement program to try to cut down traffic deaths during the holiday season. "We find ourselves confronted with the alarming fact," Wilson said, "that the past five year average indicates some 238 persons will be killed in traffic crashes in Texas this month. During December for the past five years there has been a 1,091 traffic deaths in Texas. Of this number, 432 or 36 per cent occurred during the holiday season. "It is almost certain that the death toll in traffic in Texas for 1963 will be the greatest on record, exceeding the all time record of 2611 in 1956." Sergeant Wilson gave some tips for driving during the holiday season: 1. Know and obey all traffic laws. 2. Do not drive after drinking. 3. Plan your trip so as to have rest periods about every 100 miles to combat fatigue. By complying with arrive at your destination alive. VISITORS CONTINUE WASHINGTON (UPI) — The stream of visitors to President Kennedy's grave in Arlington National Cemetery is continuing despite freezing weather. Thousands of persons visited the grave Sunday while the temperature hovered in the low 30s. At one point, it took 15 minutes for a person to get through the line. It is estimated that more than a million mourners have filed past the grave since Kennedy was buried Nov. 25.

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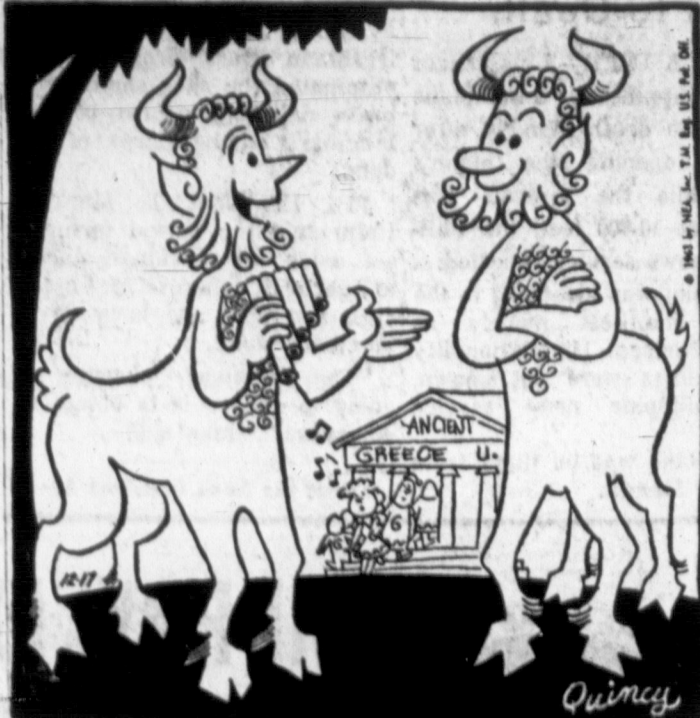
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
