## Grim Yule Faces Sea Survivors

**FUNCHAL, Madeira (UPI)**—The 877 survivors of the fire and explosions on the Greek cruise liner Lakonia headed for this port and Casablanca today for a grim Christmas Eve reliving the horror of their escape. After a day of intensive search and rescue operations by ships and planes from many nations, 24 bodies had been recovered and 135 persons remained unaccounted for. The abandoned 20,314-ton ship listing and in danger of further explosion, drifted 180 miles northeast of these Portuguese islands while the rescue effort continued.

At first light this morning, U.S. Air Force pilots reported no sign of life aboard the ship or the waters around it.

Madeira was to have been the first stop on the Lakonia's 11-day Christmas cruise from Southampton, England, with 451 passengers—all but 31 British, and including four Americans—and 385 crewmen.

Now, it was the rescue reception center for more than 600 of the survivors. The others were en route to Casablanca, Morocco, about 550 miles southeast of the disaster site.

Ambulances stood by at dockside and hospitals were prepared for burned or injured survivors. Hotels, boarding houses, and private homes offered free lodging to passengers and crewmen, who were to have spent a day and a night here, including Christmas Eve.

In Casablanca, the city's governor, Gen. Griss Ben Omar, said "we want these unfortunate people to be treated here as they would be in their own families."

As the blackened hull of the ship rolled with the waves, officials of the line sought an explanation for the fire that broke out late Sunday night and rescue ships and planes still at the scene criss-crossed the area looking for possible survivors.

A U.S. Air Force report of sighting about 100 bodies in life jackets Monday dampened hope that many more would be found alive.

**Arrive at Scene**  
The British liner Stratheden, which has hospital facilities, arrived at the scene Monday night, and the British aircraft carrier Dentaur, with 21 aircraft aboard, was ordered to steam toward the area, interrupting its journey to the Far East.

In London, the ship's agents said that the Lakonia, although newly refitted at a cost of \$840,000, had no automatic sprinkler system to douse fires in its cabins. It was explained that the 33-year-old vessel, a former Dutch passenger line ship, was built long before such sprinkler safeguards were required by law.

## Fear of 'Conspiracy' Caused Delay in Kennedy Death Story

**WASHINGTON (UPI)**—Fear that President Kennedy's assassination might be part of a "worldwide conspiracy" to kill all officials in line for the presidency prompted President Johnson to order news of Kennedy's death withheld for a time. Assistant White House Press Secretary Malcolm Kilduff said in a radio interview Monday that Johnson ordered word of Kennedy's death withheld at least until he could leave Dallas' Parkland Hospital Nov. 22. Kilduff quoted Johnson as saying there was no way of telling whether the death of Kennedy was the beginning of a chain of assassination attempts aimed at himself and the next two men in line for the presidency. Speaker John W. McCormack, D-Mass., and Senate President Pro Tempore Carl Hayden, R-Ariz. As a security precaution against this threat, Johnson felt that he should get back to the presidential plane "Air Force One" at Dallas' Love Field before the news of Kennedy's death was released, Kilduff said.

He quoted Johnson as saying, "We don't know whether this is a worldwide conspiracy, whether they are after me as well as they were after President Kennedy, or whether they are after Speaker McCormack, or Sen. Hayden."

Kilduff said that when Johnson first learned of Kennedy's death, the new President's thoughts turned to the circumstances surrounding the assassination of Abraham Lincoln 98 years before.

On the night Lincoln was shot by John Wilkes Booth, other assassins broke into the home of Secretary of State William H. Seward and wounded him severely, but failed in an attempt to kill him.

There were five witnesses for the state and defense, including "Little Lynn," who was led crying from the stand to jail before bond was posted. Melvin Belli, who led the dramatic defense, said he would offer more witnesses at the Jan. 10 hearing. Belli also asked that the murder trial be postponed from Feb. 3 to Feb. 10 "because of a conflict," but Brown did not rule on the request.

The San Francisco lawyer also said he will formally request that the trial be moved from Dallas to another Texas city "because of statements that have been made and are being made by the Dallas News."

The defense sought freedom on bail for Ruby on the ground that he was temporarily insane when he dashed in front of national television cameras Nov. 24 and fired a snub-nosed pistol into Oswald's body. They contended he needs psychiatric aid outside of jail.

## Commission Moves to Acquire Site for Plant

Pampa today took its first step to acquire a 12-acre site as a location for a treatment plant when water becomes available in 1968 from the Canadian River dam project. City Atty. Bob Gordon was authorized by a 4 to 1 city commission vote to enter negotiations and draw up papers to close a deal on the purchase of the site on Kentucky Ave. a half-mile west of Price Rd. The land is owned by the Chris Baer estate and DeLea Vicars.

Mayor H. R. Thompson told commissioners this forenoon that the land can be purchased for \$1,000 an acre. The commissioners agreed this was a reasonable price. Commissioner L. P. Fort voted against purchase of the land.

"I am not voting against it because I think the price is too high," Fort said. "I am just opposed to the entire project as far as Pampa is concerned."

The proposed plant site is located at a point where the Borger-Pampa pipeline comes to a termination from the dam near Sanford. Commissioner Fort also stated he thought the commission should have given consideration to a joint water treating plant with the City of Borger.

"In their original recommendations," Fort said, "the survey engineers, Forrest and Cotton of Dallas, told us we would save a considerable sum of money by going together with Borger and operating a joint treatment plant."

There's Lots of Room at Inn In Holy Land This Christmas  
JERUSALEM, Jordan (UPI) —Thousands of Christian pilgrims converged on Jerusalem today by foot, car, plane and even donkey to celebrate Christmas in the Holy Land.

The pilgrimage was somewhat overshadowed this year by the visit of Pope Paul VI next week. Hotel owners said Christmas in the ancient city promised to be quieter than usual, apparently because hundreds of Christians changed their reservations so they could be here during the Pope's pilgrimage-Jan. 4-6.

More than 5,000 Christian pilgrims were in Jerusalem, however, and thousands more were pouring in from other parts of Jordan. The Mandelbaum Gate from the Israeli sector of Jerusalem is scheduled to open at dawn Wednesday, permitting the entry of more than 3,000 Christian Arabs who live in Israel. They are allowed 36-hour visits to relatives in the Jordanian sector at Christmas and Easter.

The weather promised to be perfect for Christmas, with bright sunshine, cloudless skies and balmy 75-degree temperatures. Pilgrims strolled around the city in shirt sleeves, seeing the famous sights and visiting the tourist shops.

## White Christmas Out for Pampans

## Group to Adjourn Dec. 30

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Johnson won his first big struggle with Congress today in an unprecedented dawn session when the House voted down its own attempt to curb wheat sales to Communist nations. The roll call vote was 189 to 159.

Voting in support of Johnson's position were 187 Democrats and 2 Republicans. Voting against were 134 Republicans and 25 Democrats.

The House then agreed to adjourn the longest congressional session since World War II at the close of business, Monday, Dec. 30.

The administration victory took 10 days, three tries and a lot of bruised feelings that all but destroyed the Christmas spirit on Capitol Hill — and the honeymoon with the White House. The House voted for a motion to reverse an earlier House stand — twice affirmed

—against use of U.S. credit to help make trade deals with Communist nations. In a daybreak meeting, red-eyed members of Congress barely rested up from an all night session Friday night and early Saturday fired up a few more of the bitter exchanges that have marked the struggle throughout and then agreed to a compromise plan under which the final decision on Red trade credit would be left to the White House.

With this out of the way, members scattered in a rush to airports and the railroad station, and some to their automobiles, in a last weary effort to get home for Christmas.

Long Session  
The session already had been the longest in 21 years, and sine die adjournment still was at least three days away. The Senate still had to give routine approval of what the House did today, and senators had a "no business" agreement that prevented a vote until Friday and possibly later.

For practical purposes, however, the session was over. And after the climactic House battle, so was the initial era of good feeling for President Johnson.

Hunter Hits Doe, Two Other Deer With One Blast  
QUERO, Tex. (UPI) —Newton Smith, who had three hunting companions to verify his story, aimed closely Sunday and shot at a deer with his 30-06 rifle at 175 yards.

Smith said the bullet passed through the neck of the doe he saw, pierced the neck of a second doe then hit a third one in the head. The first two dropped dead on the spot and the third ran 25 yards before it fell to the ground dead.

Whenever you hear Bing Crosby sing "White Christmas," remember that an IBM machine on New York's Madison Avenue is making note of the event, and as a result Irving Berlin, the composer, will be paid for it. The same applies to any other popular song you may hear on TV, radio, records or from the band in a local dine and dance spot. Just 50 years ago ASCAP (American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers) was organized to combat piracy of creative work, and since then song writers have been paid for their labors. Last year ASCAP collections totaled \$35,279,000, which was divided among its 9310 members. ASCAP relies on the copyright law to obtain its revenue from 40,000 licensees, who pay for the privilege of using the society's library of about 1,000,000 songs.

## Allen-Scott Report

IRS Generous Santa Claus to Foundations But Cracks Down on Individuals



PAUL SCOTT

WASHINGTON — Woe to the taxpayer who fails to file an income return, but it's a very different story where a \$122 million DuPont foundation is concerned. The Internal Revenue Service is rough and tough in cracking down on negligent taxpayers, but it is a kindly and generous Santa Claus in dealing with equally remiss foundations.

Penalties for not filing tax returns are the same in both instances — fines up to \$10,000 and jail terms. The big difference is the way the IRS treats them.

The taxpayer gets clobbered. The foundation goes scot-free. A graphic illustration of this remarkable backstage policy has come to light as a result of the extended probing by Representative Wright Patman, D-Tex., chairman of the Banking & Currency Committee, of more than 500 tax-free foundations and their complex financial and business operations and manipulations. The assets of these foundations, many of which are deeply engaged in business enterprises, run into billions of dollars.

Patman has ascertained that the Longwood Foundation, of the DuPont family and headed by Henry B. DuPont, did not file tax returns for the four years of 1955 through 1958. The Longwood Foundation, with \$122 million in assets, had receipts of more than \$32 million between 1951 and 1960.

In fact this DuPont foundation filed returns only after Patman's investigation uncovered its failure to do so.

But this disregard of the law went unscathed. The IRS did nothing about it.

The foundation's president has admitted this in a letter to Patman. Henry DuPont stated no penalties were imposed by the Revenue Service against the \$122 million foundation for failing to file four years' tax returns.

"This is shocking and outrageous," declared Patman. "Foundations, like everyone else, must file tax returns and are subject to penalties for failure to do so. While uneducated sharcroppers are presumed to know the law and are held responsible for violations, many foundations are examining and their well-paid and well-educated officials and advisers are apparently exempt from this rule. That is indefensible."

GETTING THE WORKS — In striking contrast to the Longwood Foundation's gentle treatment by IRS is what happened to a little taxpayer in Lake County, Calif.

He was literally hounded by the Revenue Service. That's the late account received by Patman in a letter from a neighbor of this taxpayer. ## The Doctor Says

See Your Doctor if Child is Doing Poorly in School

How important is it for your child to get a better-than-average education? In this age of rapid scientific advance and heightened competition it is more important than ever before; yet about 20 per cent of our children are showing poor interest in school and have poor grades.

Many parents do not realize that this is a problem their family doctor may be able to help them with. Often it is harder than setting a broken bone or treating an acute infection.

Poor school performance may result from physical or emotional disorders and is often a mixture of both. The case of Robert, 9, will illustrate what I mean. Robert had done well enough in the first, second and third grades but in fourth grade he was falling behind. His mother mentioned this to her doctor one day and he suggested that she bring the boy in for a physical checkup.

The doctor checked Robert's hearing and vision. In many children, trouble here can cause school failures. In Robert's case these were O.K. Speech defects, too, could be ruled out. Robert's muscular coordination was adequate and his intelligence was above normal. Brain waves, however, indicated mild epilepsy.

On close questioning it was learned that the boy had recently had a couple of attacks of momentary unconsciousness. Instead of telling his parents, he had kept his worries to himself and had become inattentive in school.

The doctor, now on the right track, knew that he could help Robert control any future attacks with appropriate medicines but he was not satisfied to let the matter rest there. He was extremely curious as to why Robert had not told his parents about his attacks. This part of the problem wasn't easy to solve.

Finally, the doctor learned that the boy's mother was a perfectionist, who expected more of Robert than he was able to achieve.

It was learned, furthermore, that the lad's father was an overly stern disciplinarian. The doctor felt that these factors would have to be corrected before Robert could do his best work in school.

Parents who lean too much in the opposite direction of overindulgence, poor discipline and permissiveness could also have had an adverse effect on Robert's school work.

With new insight into Robert's problems, both physical and emotional, corrective measures were taken. There was a slow but steady improvement in his performance.

## TRUTH FORUM

### Citizen Can't Get Same Treatment as Foreigner

By ED DELANEY

If the lowly American citizen is delinquent on his income taxes, the federal authorities may confiscate his property to get what they declare is due. The U.S. Agriculture Department may, without court action or trial by jury, latch onto land or personal property of a farmer who grows more wheat or raises more pigs than the master minds in Washington say is permitted — by them. There is no hesitation about collecting from our own citizens. But in the case of foreigners, especially foreign governments — well, that's different.

Some countries in Europe owe us more than \$27 billion, and have been owing much of it for over 40 years. Many of those debtors are in position to make substantial payments on what they owe us. If we collected a sizable fraction of what is due, there would be no worry about our balance of payments abroad and since many of those European countries have large reserves of gold, we could reasonably demand that payment be made in that precious metal.

But nothing of that kind is even discussed by the Harvard experts on economics in the many bureaus in Washington. For some time members of Congress have been discussing ways to bolster the dwindling stock of gold in Fort Knox. Our balance of payments abroad is causing worry to bankers like Sen. Harry Byrd (D. Va.) who warns that unless we take effective measures to halt the out-go of dollars — what we now call the 46 cent dollar may fall to an unsteady 25 cents. Of course that does not worry Dr. Walter Heller, the chief economic adviser to the administration in Washington. The same Walter Heller prescribed a neo-communist kind of industrial and economic program for West Germany — when sent there by the Truman administration. Dr. Ludwig Erhard, then West Germany's minister of economics, now chancellor of the country, deposited the Heller program in a waste basket and promptly steered his country in precisely the opposite course to that urged by the one who is now our chief adviser on economics. West Germany's amazing industrial and economic recovery proves that Erhard was right and Heller, as an economist, is a successful failure.

But instead of taking measures to collect some of the billions owing to us by other nations, we enter into "negotiations" like the wheat deal with the Soviet, which eventually will mean that we lose more millions of dollars. The Soviet owes us now some \$23 billion, marked down from \$9 billion. What effort is made to collect at least token payments on that debt? None whatever.

France owes us for money and materials supplied them over 40 years ago — from World War I to W.W. II, and since. A little item of about \$7 billion. Presently France is in a prosperous condition and could make payments on those debts. What action has been taken to collect? None. Britain is our largest debtor. The over-due amount from World War I, combined with what was lent during World War II, and after, together with hundreds of millions in

war materials amounts to something like \$9 billion. Naturally it is repugnant to discuss money matters with the British. Beastly bad form, you know. So being polite, our foreign affairs experts find it convenient to avoid distressing the Britishers by reference to such mundane matters as money. Our national debt mounts to astronomical figures, we continue to dole out billions for mendicant nations around the world when we have no money to meet our own obligations. Britain is in as prosperous condition as they have been for 40 years. Payments could easily be made by Britain, and in gold. They buy much of the yellow stuff from the Soviet. Also they take the greater part of the gold that is exported from South Africa.

When we were given a mandate to provide support for all the under-developed parts of the world and many of the developed areas? Our so-called foreign aid program has been rejected by little Cambodia. Their high-and-mighty prince says they can get along without our money and military support. What he implies is that they do not want us meddling in their affairs. Now if that attitude were copied by some of the other mendicants, it would be a saving for us. But can we hope for that?

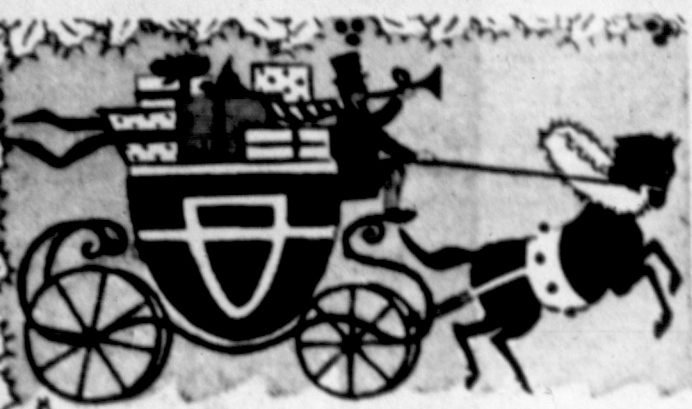

In the opener, the Pampa Shockers kept their slate clean by walloping Perryton's Deputies 74-40.

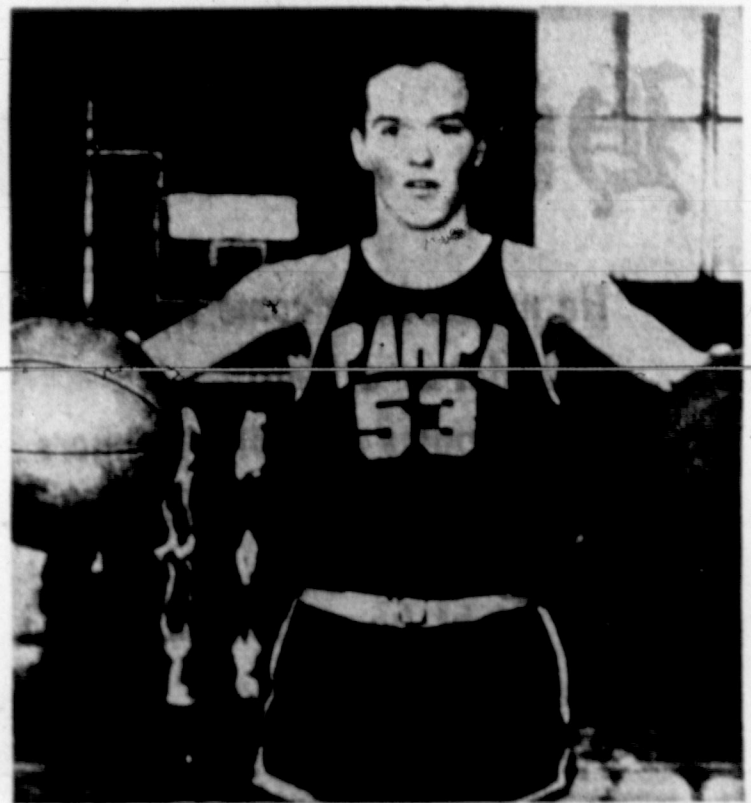
David "Sugar" Cain paced the Shockers to their 11th win in a row with 26 points while

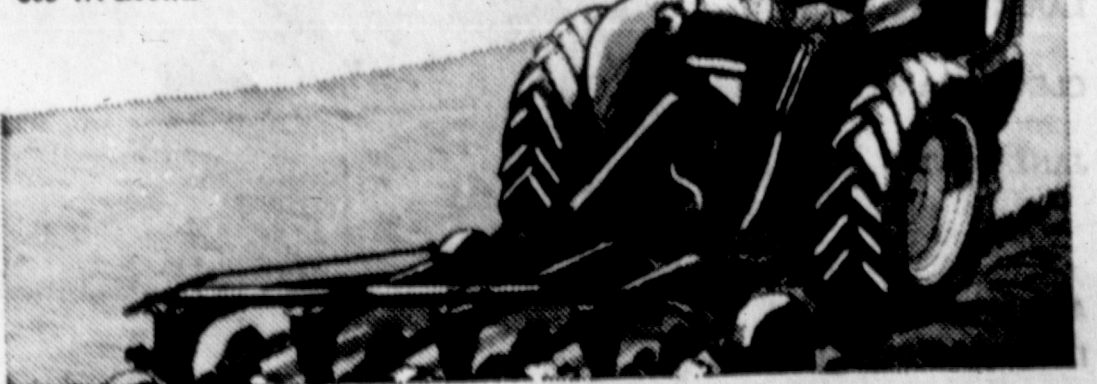

### Bulgaria to Open UN Aide's Trial

VIENNA (UPI) — Communist Bulgaria will try a former official in its U.N. mission this week on charges of spying for the United States. It accuses Ivan-Asen Georgiev of receiving \$200,000 for his espionage work and spending much of it on women and immoral living. The 56-year-old Georgiev, international lawyer and former counsellor to the Bulgarian mission to the United Nations, is charged with delivering Bulgarian political, economic, and military information to the "American intelligence service." The charges were announced Saturday night by the Bulgarian Telegraph Agency (BTA) which said Georgiev's trial would be held Thursday.

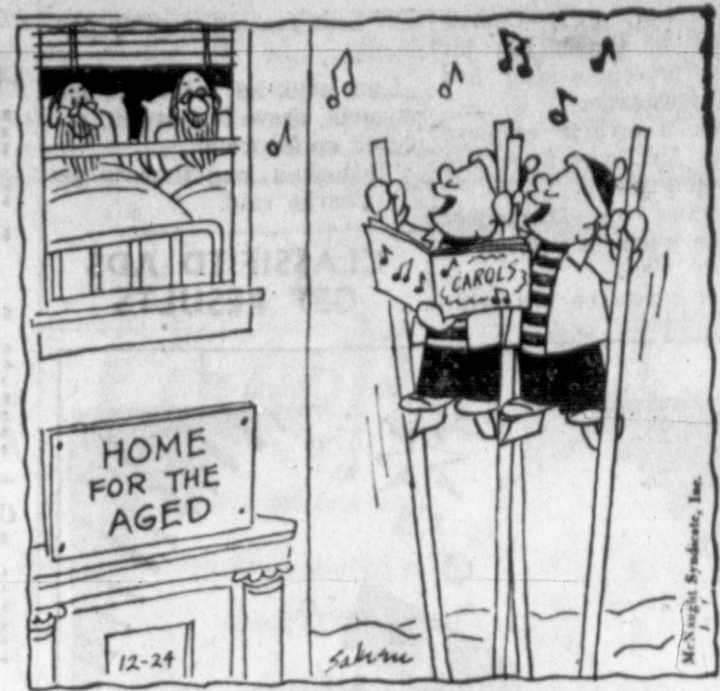

### Connally Hopes To Visit Johnson

AUSTIN (UPI) — Gov. John Connally said today he hopes to get to visit with his close friend, President Johnson, when the President comes to his ranch home near Austin for the Christmas holidays.

Connally, who has been confined to his bed almost constantly since he was gravely wounded by the assassin of President Kennedy Nov. 22, met with members of the capitol press for a 30-minute "pre-Christmas" conference today.

The governor said doctors had placed a "plastic stocking" over the blood clot area of his right leg and began letting him get out of beds for short periods last Thursday.

He said he definitely plans to go to Dallas Jan. 1 for the Cotton Bowl game between the University of Texas and Navy, weather permitting "and if I feel up to it."

### Wheat Support Gets Union OK

DENVER (UPI) — The executive committee of the National Farmers Union was on record Monday in favor of a wheat program with 100 per cent of parity price support.

The program, unveiled Sunday in Denver, would increase farm income substantially for family farmers, reduce the cost of the federal farm program, and simplify administration of the farm program, according to James G. Patton, president of the organization.

Patton said the proposal would set a price support level of \$2.50, or 100 per cent of parity, on domestic consumption and exports for farmers who signed up.

Farmers who did not sign up would receive no price supports and would sell wheat at the free market price.

To qualify for the program, farmers would cut wheat acreage by 10 per cent, or by 5.5 million acres nationally.

STANTON, Calif. (UPI) — Paul Hardeman, Inc., said Monday it has obtained a \$3.7 million federal contract to build an 84-mile 230-kilovolt power line in Colorado as part of the Colorado River water storage project.

#### BUILDS INDIA PLANT

NEW YORK (UPI) — Allied Chemical Corp. said it will build a \$35 million fertilizer plant at Kothaguden in the state of Andhra Pradesh, India, as a joint venture with Andhra Sugars, Ltd. Allied Chemical will own 43 per cent of the project.

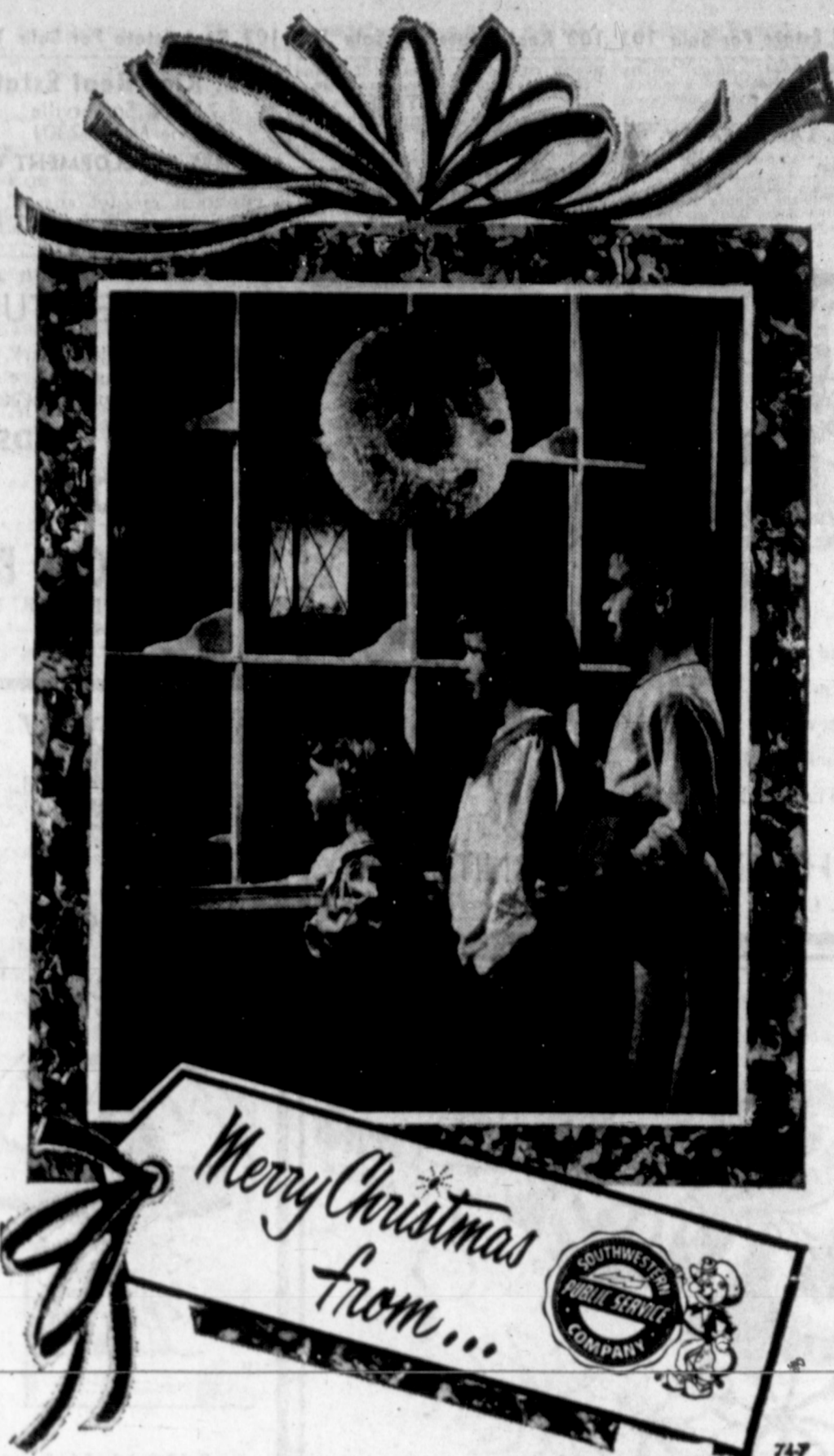
