New Phone Books To Be Out Tomorrow

Copies of the 1964 Pampa, Skellytown and Lefors telephone directories will go into the mails tomorrow and customers should receive them by Wednesday or Thursday. George Newberry, telephone company manager, said that almost 19,320 copies of the new directory have been printed but that not all of them will be mailed to customers. He explained that additional copies are always prepared to have on hand for new customers and for replacements for books in heavily used locations like public telephone booths. The cover of the new directory is of white stock, overprinted in black ink. Last year blue ink was used. There are 66 "white" or alphabetical pages and 132 classified or "yellow" pages. Newberry said there are approximately 300 more subscribers to this year's book than last year. However, it has the same number of white pages and 12 less yellow pages than last year.

Head-On Crashes Caused by Inability of Driver to See

HOUSTON (UPI) — Many head-on crashes on the nation's highways are caused by the inability of one driver to see the other vehicle, an Indiana University researcher said Saturday. Dr. Merrill J. Allen, professor of optometry says the sun, surrounding scenery and factors in the car itself produce a camouflage effect on the highways. Dr. Allen's studies disclosed that light-colored cars are six times more visible than dark-colored ones. Lowest in visibility, he said, are two-tone cars. Some of them, which display a broken pattern because of decorations, strikingly resemble wartime camouflage patterns and "are easily lost in a complex scene." Many visibility hazards are built into cars, Allen said. "The sun striking the chrome of the windshield wiper can effectively blind a driver for several seconds," he said. A dangerous glare is produced by any chrome decoration around the driver, he added. The reflection from a shiny hood adds to the danger. Another hazard, he said, is the reflection of the dashboard lights in the eyes of the driver at night. Allen says the only certain way now known to make cars clearly visible at all times are running lights mounted on each side of the car which automatically turn on with the ignition. DIVORCE CAPITOL CHANGES WASHINGTON (UPI)—Nevada has lost its reputation as the divorce capital of America to Alabama, according to a survey of the National Vital Statistics Division. Alabama had 17,320 divorces in 1963 compared to only 8,455 for Nevada. The Alabama counties of Geneva, Marion, Randolph and Winston all logged more divorces than marriages; there was no county in Nevada in which divorces exceeded marriages.

July Safe Month On City Streets

July has been a safe month to drive on Pampa's streets and highways. So far this month there have been only two automobile accidents involving injuries and both of those were minor. Police Chief Jim Conner said this morning that a National Safety Council report showed that there had been a total of 294 accidents in Pampa for the first six months of 1964 as compared with 235 for the same period last year. The report also indicated that through the month of June there were 38 accidents, this year, injuring 11 persons. Drivers under 20 were involved in the majority of these, the chief said. It was also pointed out in the report that females had fewer accidents than males and speeding was the major cause of the wrecks. The 38 accidents in June caused an estimated damage of \$9,245.
