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discuss the Chamber of Commerce and to submit new ideas for operating the Chamber.

Derrell Oliver acted as moderator for the program. The first 15 minutes was used to discuss past Chamber of Commerce projects and activities. The group was then split into six or seven groups where each group listed the 10 things they thought the Chamber needs to be active in.

## Litter Ordinance Effective In City

The Muleshoe City Council passed ordinance number 101A, an ordinance to prohibit littering in Muleshoe and to provide a penalty for violators, and it was approved by Mayor Irvin St. Clair November 16, 1971. Citizens of Muleshoe had been

working on the ordinance for several months and Corky Green, chairman of the Muleshoe Community Improvement Board, presented the ordinance to the city council Tuesday.

The ordinance states in part "That no person shall litter any public place or public road situated in the City of Muleshoe, Bailey County, Texas. Littering as used in this ordinance, means the discarding of garbage,

paper, or other forms of refuse in any place other than properly designated refuse containers or disposal units."

Violation of this ordinance will be termed as a misdemeanor and the fine will be any amount up to \$200. This ordinance is effective immediately.

This ordinance was passed to prevent the unsightly appearance and to reduce the risk of fire in Muleshoe.

During the half time show the Muleshoe Mighty 'M' Band announced their favorites for 1971. Favorites were Becky Miller escorted by Bruce Chapman. The Muleshoe Mighty 'M' Band put on a fine performance for their home town fans, Fridays nights performance was the final show of the 1971 football season.

The Mules came back fighting in the third stanza but failed to hold Perryton's David Flowers as he found daylight in the Mules defensive line and traveled 30 yards for his se-

## Temperatures Drop To Low Twenties

The first hard freeze of the season struck most of the panhandle and south plains of Texas Friday morning, including Bailey County.

With temperatures in the low 20's, a heavy frost fell covering the ground with white ice during the early morning hours.

Most of the area farmers were waiting for a killing freeze before starting the cotton harvest. This should increase the harvesting now and bring the grain harvesting to a stop.

Much of the county's cotton crop is reaching the mature state and some of the area fields have already been stripped. If the weather stays clear and dry, cotton stripping should begin next week on most fields.

### Legal Notice

#### AN ORDINANCE TO PROHIBIT LITTERING; AND PROVIDE A PENALTY

WHEREAS, in the City of Muleshoe, Bailey County, Texas, there has been a scattering of paper and trash of all kinds, including but not limited to circulars, handbills, paper bags, wast paper and wrapping paper; and

WHEREAS, the City Council of Muleshoe desires to prevent the unsightly appearance and to reduce the risk of fire created thereby;

NOW, THEREFORE, be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Muleshoe:

Section 1: That no person shall litter any public place or public road situated in the City of Muleshoe, Bailey County, Texas. Littering, as used in this Ordinance, means the discarding of garbage, paper, or other forms of refuse in any place other than properly designated refuse containers or disposal units.

Section 2: Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of Section 1 of this Ordinance, or shall fail to comply therewith or with any of the requirements thereof, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be liable to a fine and upon a conviction of any such violation shall be fined in any sum of not more than \$200.00; and each and every act which constitutes a violation of Section 1 of this Act shall constitute a separate and distinct offense.

Section 3: This Ordinance shall become effective as provided by the Charter of the City of Muleshoe, Bailey County, Texas.

Little children should never be left alone in rooms where there are open fires and gas heaters are within reach. Many children have been severely scalded by tipping over hot liquids, or

All children should be taught that the most effective way of extinguishing a fire is by smothering it, or by pouring water on it.

Some accidents will happen at times, and very serious results will follow unless people generally learn how to give first aid.

A fire can be put out by rolling the person in a quilt, carpet, blanket or any material that is thick and strong.

Wrap the body in hot blankets. Leave the clothing alone. Get the burned person to the hospital where doctors will apply the necessary medication.

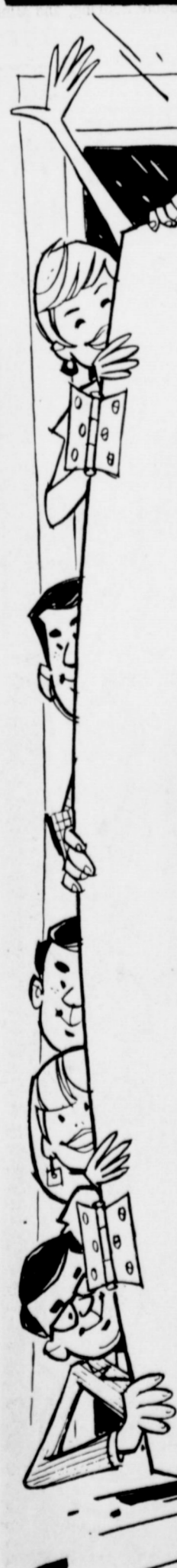

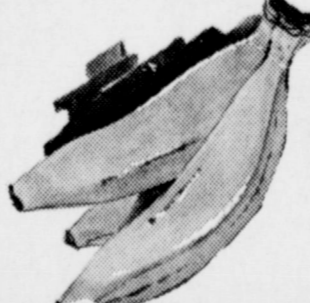

### Market Report

Consumers rejecting meat with bones removed because of the product's per pound purchase cost are overlooking an important consideration, according to Frances Reasonover, Extension foods and nutrition specialist.

Boneless products are usually slightly higher in per pound purchase cost than meat with bones due to labor involved in removing bones. Miss Reasonover says, "But there is little difference in the per pound serving cost of boneless meat as compared with bone-in meat, she points out.

When buying meat, purchase one pound for two servings if there is a large amount of bone, with a medium amount of bone, buy one pound for three servings. One pound of boneless meat is adequate for four servings.

Flavor differs little in boneless and bone-in products except where moist heat is used in cooking, as in the case of a pot roast.

When freezing meat, use aluminum freezer foil or some other moisture-vapor-proof wrapping. Wrap the meat tightly, since air that enters the package draws moisture from the meat's surface and results in 'freezer burn.' When 'freezer burn' occurs, meat turns white and is tough and tasteless.

Fresh beef can be kept frozen up to nine months; pork, six months; and processed items, such as bacon, ham (cured and smoked) and frankfurters, one to two months.

It's best to thaw frozen meat in the refrigerator or cook it frozen rather than thawing it out uncovered on the kitchen cabinet. Although it takes longer to thaw out meat in the refrigerator, less moisture is lost and the product will be juicier, the specialist explains.

If meat is not frozen after bringing it home from the market, keep it in the coldest part of the refrigerator for quick use, or freeze it.

### HEALTH AND BEAUTY

This is the season when cold sores or fever blisters are most prevalent.

It's surprising that cold sores (Herpes virus) are not more common because most people carry the virus with them all the time.

Natural resistance to this organism is lowered by certain factors, most common of which is the cold, sudden elevation of body temperature, gastrointestinal up-

sets, over-exposure to sun and wind, and unusual stress.

A cold sore starts with a little itching and burning of the affected area. This becomes more intense. One or more sores will occur--usually about the lips, nose or other areas where skin and mucous membranes meet.

Most often cold sores dry up on their own. They leave crusts which take about a week to fall off. Discomfort can be relieved by camphor menthol or spirits of camphor.

In some few cases, cold sores are so recurrent and numerous that drastic treatment is needed. A doctor should be consulted and given a background picture of the patient's trouble with cold sores. He might advise a series of small-pox vaccinations.

Stay away from the use of make-up on the affected area. The straw-colored fluid carries the virus, so be considerate of other people. Never resort to picking a cold sore--this is a good way to get into serious trouble.

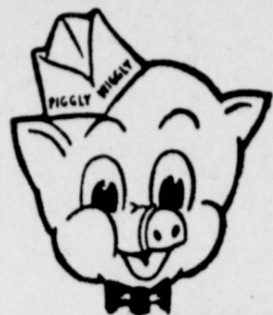
