Amarillo Mayor Will Welcome Barry Tuesday

Pampa's Bob Price to Introduce Goldwater to Estimated 20,000

Sen. Barry Goldwater will bring his bid for the presidency to the Panhandle tomorrow in his second trip to Texas since his nomination.

Goldwater's airplane is scheduled to land at Amarillo Air Terminal at 11:45 a.m. Mayor F. V. Wallace of Amarillo will lead a welcoming committee including GOP gubernatorial candidate Jack Crichton of Dallas, U. S. Rep. Ed Foreman of Odessa, Republican candidate for congressman - at-large Bill Hayes of Temple and Bob Price of Pampa, GOP nominee for 18th District congressman.

Following the airport welcome, Goldwater will participate in a motorcade through downtown Amarillo and then deliver a major address at the Potter County Baseball stadium in the Tri-State Fair grounds.

The program at the ball park is scheduled to get under way at 12:15 p.m. Price will introduce Goldwater to the 20,000 persons expected to hear Goldwater speak. Also appearing on the program will be Crichton, Hayes and Foreman. Master of ceremonies will be Wes Izzard, Amarillo newspaperman.

Members of the welcoming committee from Pampa will be Clayton Husted, Gray County Republican chairman, and Mrs. Warren Fatheree, Republican district committeewoman. After the Amarillo speech, Goldwater will fly to Albuquerque, but will be back in Texas by Tuesday night for a 7 p.m. rally in Odessa.

He will campaign in Fort Worth Wednesday morning and address the American Legion convention in Dallas Wednesday afternoon.

Beatles Even Up Score for Britain, Take Back Million

NEW YORK (UPI) — The mop tops from Liverpool wing away from the former colonies today, probably having evened the score for the American Revolution.

Above and beyond the effect of their 33-day guerilla war against this nation's social mores, the Beatles also liberated an estimated one million Yankee dollars during their American campaign.

But, like a general gallantly refusing to accept the sword of a vanquished foe, the British quartet closed out its tour with a benefit performance Sunday night in Times Square's Paramount Theater — the \$75,000 proceeds from which were left here for charity.

When the curtain rose, all 3,862 seats in the house were filled by persons paying \$5 to \$100 for the distinction. The audience included society matrons who came in limousines and leather-jacketed youths who screamed into Manhattan on motorcycles.

Warning Given on Incident

MOSCOW (UPI) — The official Soviet Tass news agency said today it was "reported" that U.S. warships fired on five unidentified ships in last Friday's Gulf of Tonkin incident and "three of them were sunk."

Tass carried the report in a statement warning that American interference in Viet Nam "may lead to very dangerous consequences, the entire responsibility for which will rest with the United States."

The official Soviet agency did not give any source for its report.

U. S. authorities, in describing the incident, have never said any ships were hit or sunk in the incident off the Vietnamese coast Friday night.

"Another military incident took place in the Gulf of Tonkin on Sept. 18," Tass said. Two United States destroyers, which were in international waters, opened fire on ships they had not identified.

A statement issued by Defense Secretary (Robert) McNamara on Sept. 19 admits that the unidentified ships had taken no hostile actions what ever and the United States destroyers opened fire only conjecturing that the above mentioned ships allegedly had hostile intentions.

"It was reported that five unidentified ships were allegedly fired at and that three of them were sunk," the Tass statement added.

"The world public remembers only too well," Tass said, "that similar events in the Tonkin Gulf were used by the U.S. armed forces as a pretext for piratical actions against the shore facilities and inhabited localities of (North Viet Nam) in August this year."

"Therefore, the report about the incident in the Tonkin Gulf has caused anxiety and apprehensions lest this is a pretext for new aggressive actions in that area."

U.S. Defense Secretary McNamara told a Washington news conference Saturday that four U.S. destroyers fired on four threatening but unidentified vessels Friday in the latest Tonkin Gulf incident.

McNamara said the night time incident 32 miles off Communist North Viet Nam ended when the approaching vessels disappeared from the U.S. destroyers' radar screens. The marauders never got close enough to attack the American warships, the U.S. defense secretary added.

'Winged Missile' Makes Historic Maiden Flight

EDWARDS AFB, Calif. (UPI) — The revolutionary XB70 "winged missile" made its historic maiden flight today to become the world's first forerunner of future supersonic airliners to take to the sky.

Flames gushed from the undercarriage as the wheels of the XB70 touched the landing strip but were fanned out by the time the big plane came to a stop on the runway.

The triple-sonic six-jet ship, one of the most controversial planes ever built and aviation's heaviest aircraft, swept over the Mojave on a brief but crucial one hour and five minute test hop.

Campaigning Tightens As Election Nears

Campaigning becomes intense in Texas this week as both nominees for president make forays into the state and candidates for other high offices pick up momentum.

Only six full weeks remain until the Nov. 3 general election.

Republican Barry Goldwater, who spoke at Longview only Friday, invades the Texas Panhandle Tuesday morning and then — after a side trip to Albuquerque — goes to Odessa for a rally that night.

On Wednesday Goldwater will be in Fort Worth and Dallas, speaking in the latter city to the national convention of the American Legion and to a GOP rally that night. Meeting the Republican hopeful in Amarillo will be the party choice for governor, Jack Crichton and three men running for Congress — U. S. Rep. Ed Foreman of Odessa, at-large nominee Bill Hayes and Bob Price of Pampa.

Johnson Trip
President Johnson is scheduled to be in both El Paso and Texarkana on Friday — his second trip home since getting the

Democratic nomination. An initial birthday party speech at Stonewall, Tex., Aug. 29 started his own campaign.

In El Paso Johnson will meet President Adolfo Lopez Mateos of Mexico to seal the agreement on the Chamizal land trade. The two heads of state will shake hands on the previously arranged swap which will restore to Mexico an area in dispute ever since the Rio Grande changed course a century ago.

Grotewohl Dies, Stoph Eyed as Likely Premier

BERLIN (UPI) — East German Premier Otto Grotewohl, who had suffered from leukemia for years, died today at the age of 70.

It was expected he would be succeeded by Willi Stoph, who had been acting premier.

Grotewohl's death was announced jointly by the government and the "Socialist Unity party," which was formed in 1946 when Grotewohl merged the Soviet Zone Socialist party with the Communists. Grotewohl had been nominal head of the government since its formation 15 years ago.

For agreeing to the Russian-sponsored merger, he was rewarded with the premiership of the German Democratic Republic.

The announcement said Grotewohl died at 12:35 p.m. (7:35 a.m. EDT).

It did not give the cause but for years leukemia had made him unable to carry out the duties of his office.

He was the fourth prominent Communist to die within six weeks. Others included Elizabeth Gurley Flynn, first woman chairman of the U.S. Communist party; Palmiro Togliatti, leader of the Italian Communist party, and Maurice Thorez, head of the French Communist party.

Four Awaiting Rescue From Blast Chamber

NEVADA TEST SITE, Nev. (UPI) — Four men, trapped more than 36 hours in an underground chamber used for nuclear detonations, were patiently awaiting rescue crews today which have been working round the clock to reach them.

The workmen, employees of an Atomic Energy Commission (AEC) support contractor, Reynolds Electrical and Engineering Co., Inc., were trapped Saturday night when an auxiliary elevator cable snapped. One man was killed and three others injured when the heavy cable whiplashed upward.

The men were working in what was described by an AEC spokesman as a "large room bigger than a house" to one side of the elevator shaft when the cable snapped. The room, located 1,800 feet below the surface, is one of numerous chambers on the Nevada test site used for underground nuclear tests.

The AEC said the men were in no danger. They were identified as Leland Roeder of Pioche, Nev.; George R. Cooper Sr. of Tucson, Ariz.; Art Luhnoff of North Las Vegas, Nev.; and Lloyd L. Shaw of Santa Barbara, Calif.

Negotiators Hope To Halt Walkout

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Rail management and union representatives worked today to head off a threatened major rail strike Tuesday.

Unless an agreement is reached, the unions representing 150,000 shop craftsmen who handle repair work have indicated they would walk off the job at dawn Tuesday.

The strike would cripple 147 of the nation's railroads except the Pennsylvania, the Long Island, the Southern and the Florida East Coast.

Federal Mediator Francis O'Neill met separately with both sides Sunday in the hopes of ending the dispute, but no progress was reported.

Police Seek Two in Early Morning Thefts

Charges of burglary are expected to be filed today against a 24-year-old man while police search for two others in connection with three burglaries early Sunday morning.

Enraged Negroes Crowd Streets After Bombings

Two dynamite bombs set off in Negro sections of McComb, Miss., sent angry crowds of Negroes into the streets early today.

The enraged Negroes hurled rocks and bottles at police investigating the bombings and Chief George Guy called for reinforcements. He ordered his men out of the area until the reinforcements arrived.

Guy estimated that as many as 4,000 Negroes poured from their homes shortly after the first blast was touched off at 10:50 p.m. CST.

The crowd milled around for about two hours and the situation apparently quieted down.

One bomb seriously damaged the home of a civil rights worker and slightly injured three children. The other caused heavy damage at a Negro church.

Elsewhere in Mississippi, a federal grand jury at Biloxi begins an investigation today into the slaying of three civil rights workers.

Reliable sources report that the government plans to seek at least nine indictments in connection with the slayings, which occurred at Philadelphia, Miss., June 21.

More than 100 persons are scheduled to testify. Sheriff Lawrence Rainey of Neshoba (Philadelphia) County was to be the first witness.

The three workers — Andy Goodman and Michael Schwerner of New York and James Chaney of Meridian — were last seen when they were released from Rainey's jail where they had been held on a traffic violation.

Refinery Hit By Flames in Port Arthur

PORT ARTHUR (UPI) — Flames erupted today from the Texaco Refinery Pumping Station No. 10 near downtown Port Arthur. No injuries were reported.

Police said the flames shot 100 feet into the air and billowing black smoke could be seen for miles.

Traffic was snarled and all available fire fighting units were sent to the scene — some 10-15 blocks from downtown Port Arthur.

Other pumping stations were in no immediate danger as firemen succeeded in turning off all valve lines that feed the station.

It was believed that kerosene and crude oil were burning. No cause for the fire was immediately determined.

The fire was in a pumping and distribution station in a tank farm. The station distributes kerosene to one tank, crude oil to another, and so on.

Five units from the Port Arthur fire department and all Texaco units were at the scene. A towering pumper-ladder unit poured foam not only on the burning station but also on surrounding tanks so they would not catch fire.

The fire was expected to burn until it exhausts fuel in the pumping station. All lines to the station were shut off so the fire could not spread.

The fire was on the north side of town, 15 blocks from the main downtown area. It was just north of a predominantly residential section, which did not appear to be in any danger.

6-Year-Old Reported Drowned Body of Boy Found at Hideaway

JONESBORO, Ark. (UPI) — The body of a 6-year-old boy was recovered Sunday night from a shallow grave on a secluded farm where the leader of a militant anti-Communist cult was arrested Saturday.

The head of the cult, John Robert (Jonny Bob) Harrell, 47, of Louisville, Ill., told police the boy was the son of a cult member, and drowned last month in a 20-gallon garbage pail.

He said he and the others on the farm near Strawberry, Ark., did not report the death because he was a fugitive from the federal government and they did not want to attract attention.

Widow of Estes Kefauver Is Now Art Consultant for U. S. Embassies

NEW YORK (UPI) — Mrs. Estes Kefauver sat in her hotel room and talked of her latest mission.

It's one far removed from politics, and that's the way Nancy Kefauver wants it.

"After 25 years of active political life, I've just had it," said the auburn-haired, hazel-eyed widow of the Tennessee senator who died August, 1963.

"There was terrific pressure for me to follow Estes in the Senate," she said. "But I've no training for politics. It is one thing to go around the country meeting people when it's your husband in office. But a true politician has to be dedicated as Estes was. He was a natural politician. He loved campaigning."

I pointed out that Maurine Neuberger of Oregon had succeeded her husband in the Senate when he died and had continued in politics. Mrs. Kefauver's answer to that fact was, "well, don't forget Mrs. Neuberger had been in politics before her marriage."

"A life in politics means very little privacy for a family," she added. "It is difficult to raise children. One's house is always filled with constituents."

"It's not that I feel a widow shouldn't step in if she wishes. It just wasn't for me."

Mrs. Kefauver currently is putting her art training to work — as consultant on art for U.S. embassies and chancelleries abroad. It is a completely new job in the State Department and she was appointed in it last November by the late President Kennedy.

"Simply put," she said, "I'm trying to locate good examples of American art from all periods to fill some of those bleak, blank walls."

"The idea is to show the United States' cultural image abroad. We're looking for originals — paintings, sculptures, graphic arts."

Mrs. Kefauver's task is to talk museums, galleries, and individual and corporate collectors into loaning works for at least two years and longer if possible.

In addition to her State Department job, Mrs. Kefauver runs in partnership with Mrs.

Church Leaders Divided on Minister's Role in Politics

WASHINGTON (UPI)—From the pulpit of Washington Cathedral, one of the nation's best-known preachers recently delivered a blistering denunciation of both presidential candidates.

Very Rev. Francis B. Sayre Jr., dean of the Episcopal Cathedral, said American voters face a "sterile choice" in this election. He described the alternatives as "a man of dangerous ignorance and devastating uncertainty" or "a man whose public house is splendid in its every appearance, but whose private lack of ethics must inevitably introduce taints at the very foundation."

Dean Sayre's blast is still echoing across the country. It perhaps has stimulated as many lively arguments as any campaign development to date. One question is whether he was right. Another is whether a minister should make such a forthrightly political statement from the pulpit.

Church leaders are as sharply divided over the latter question as voters are over the former.

Range Of Viewpoints
The range of viewpoints is illustrated by statements from two prominent members of the United Presbyterian Church (UPC).

Rev. Dr. Eugene Carson Blake, stated clerk of the UPC, told UPI that clergymen "must speak out on political issues."

"We are living in a period where the decisions made in the political arena are the ones that really determine what human life is going to be like," he said.

J. Howard Pew entered a vigorous dissent. A Philadelphia oilman, he is an active layman in the UPC and president of the Board of Trustees of the United Presbyterian Foundation.

"The great need of today is for the church to be the church and to manifest the spiritual power with which God has endowed her," Pew said. "Our people have a spiritual hunger; they desire the bread of life, not secular pronouncements."

Msgr. George G. Higgins, director of the Social Action Department of the National Catholic Welfare Conference, took the view that clergymen should waste into the political arena as they did in fighting for passage of the civil rights bill when "an absolutely clear-cut moral issue" is involved.

But he said "the clergy has no business telling people how to vote in the coming presidential election."

Higgins continued: "It is my impression that the overwhelming majority of Americans—Republicans, Democrats and independents—are opposed to, not to say resentful of, clerical support or opposition to a candidate for political office."

Rev. Albert P. Shirkey, pastor of Mount Vernon Place Methodist Church in Washington, also expressed the view that ministers should "speak on the great moral principles at stake, rather than come out for or against candidates."

Rev. Dr. R. Ray Gibbons of New York, director of the Council of Social Action of the United Church of Christ, said that he endorsed "strong utterances from the pulpit" on politics as well as other topics of

human concern.

"The idea of keeping religion apart from politics is a great mistake," he said. "Politics needs religion as much as any field of human activity."

But Gibbons added that "in general, ministers are well advised to discuss issues rather than personalities from the pulpit."

Believes It Duty
Sayre said that he preached the controversial sermon because he thought it was his duty to voice his honest opinion about the presidential nominees.

"I believe that clergymen are failing in courage if they shy away from political matters," he said. "God's will applies to the large questions of our public life as well as to the smaller ones of private life."

Sayre's own bishop, Rt. Rev. William F. Creighton, voiced public disagreement with the dean. Without questioning Sayre's right to speak on political problems, Creighton said:

"I would prefer to judge the candidates on the basis of their programs for international peace and human rights and for the alleviation of human need, rather than on the basis of questionable analyses of their personal characters."

Monsoon-Like Rains Bring Heavy Flooding Over State

Monsoon-like rains up to 17 inches brought a summer's supply of rainfall to Texas in 24 hours Sunday and today, setting off flash flooding.

Chicago remained two games off the pace by beating Washington 4-3, Minnesota blasted Boston 12-4 and Cleveland trounced Detroit 7-2 after losing 6-5 in the opener of a double header.

Entering the final two weeks of the season, the Phillies have a 6½ game bulge over St. Louis and Cincinnati and a seven game margin over the Giants.

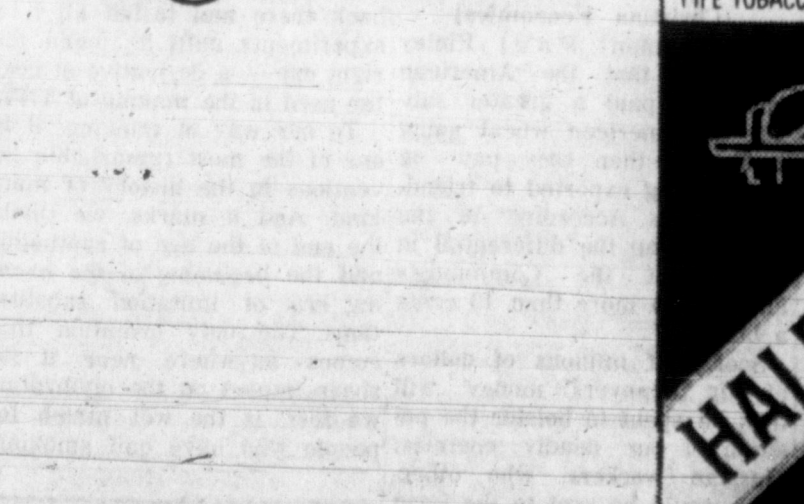
Yarborough Stops Mobeetie, 32-8

The Hornets host Wheeler B Saturday night in their homecoming game.

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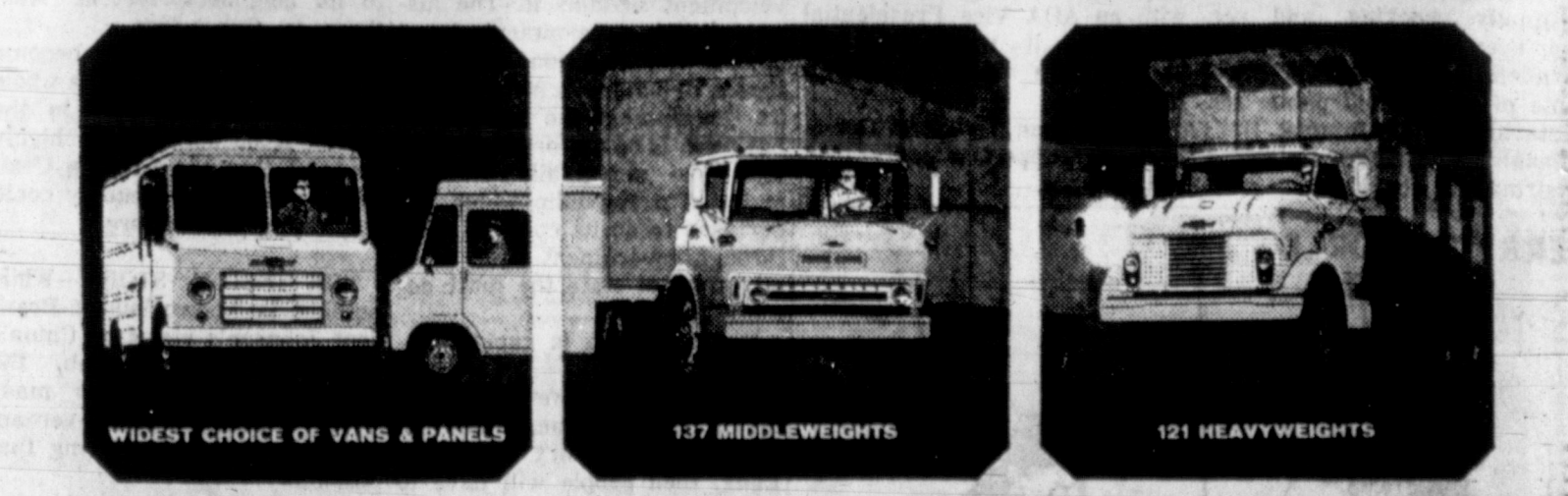

Time For Facts, Not Sugar-Coating

The continuing civilian unrest and political uncertainty in South Viet Nam make gloomy reading for every American—the gloomiest since the Syngman Rhee government was overthrown in South Korea and revealed to have been corrupt. The military situation in South Viet Nam is bad enough. After the expenditure of untold millions of dollars and hundreds of American lives—not to mention thousands of Vietnamese lives, both civilian and military—the most the United States can hope for is a military stalemate, according to a "think piece" leaked from the Central Intelligence Agency. The recent deposing of President Nguyen Khanh by massed demonstrations of students, Buddhist and others along with his quick return to apparent power, reveals that South Viet Nam, like Korea, is still far from establishing a viable democracy. It would be easy to fall prey to a feeling of despair over the future of democracy in Asia. But if South Korea and South Viet Nam, two places where American blood has flowed so freely, are not yet safe for democracy, neither are they lost to communism. The Korean War was so unpopular and so little understood that most Americans would like to forget it completely. Yet it was in Korea that outright Com-

Anti-Communist "Conspiracy"

The GOP program of national strength, fiscal responsibility and preservation of Constitutional freedoms, as enunciated by the Republican standard-bearer, has been denounced by US Communists. Party boss Gus Hall as an "ultra-right conspiracy" that is highly offensive to Communists and their fellow-travelers. Thus, as Elizabeth Gurley Flynn, the lately deceased chairman of the US Communists had said: "Our Party is mustering its forces and all people under its influence to defeat Goldwater." But Big Brother Gus, as reported in the Communist Sunday Worker, would broaden the Red crusade into a popular front ligation with the Democratic Party - in spite of the fact that he doesn't go along with the Johnson Administration on Southeast Asian, Cuban and South American policies. These differences will not, said Hall, "paralyze us from joining a broad people's democratic alliance that will defeat Goldwater and will smash the ultra-right conspiracy and will become an alliance that will influence policies long after the election." (As you can imagine for yourself!) Equally shocking, and perhaps even more alarming is the parallelism in the statements of some of our elected public servants and of Communist Hall: Senator J. William Fulbright, Chairman of the Foreign Rela-

Question Box

Question: "Is there in your opinion any hope for the cause of libertarianism in our nation which has been and is being raped so unmercifully by the socialists in and out of government? I ask this in all seriousness and in full view of the fact that those who control the 'enlightened majority' will also control government."

A. M. Answer: Since A. M. has asked for our opinion, we will give our answer as an opinion and not as fact. But we think that our opinion is pretty well backed up by history.

We do not think there is much chance of changing the trend for some time. We have been betrayed by those who profess to believe in libertarianism but are badly mistaken as to what it is. We are being betrayed by those who claim to be educators and by the bureaucracy at the head of organized religion who have joined the national Council of Churches of Christ and who seem to worship the state rather than God. We believe the great majority of protestant members do not believe what the bureaucrats at the head of the organized religions are doing.

The state has grabbed control of the minds of the youth of the land and indoctrinated them to believe that there are no standards of right and wrong. They are teaching them to worship the state, which is no standard at all because the state's ideas of right and wrong change with the majority. When everyone has a right to vote and votes are not weighted, history shows that they invariably eat up the savings of generations. This is a rich nation and it will take sometime before we consume what has been produced in the past when we had more nearly a Libertarian government. This country was not based on democracy. Madison in "The Federalist Papers" said, "Hence it is that such democracies have ever been spectacles of turbulence and contention; have ever been found incompatible with personal security or the rights of property and have, in general, been as short in their lives as they have been violent in their death." Madison's predictions seem to be coming true.

John W. Burgess in his great book, "The Reconciliation of Government With Liberty," written in 1915, wrote concerning modern democracy: "A changing, shifting, Government, a Government representing either the property class, or the propertyless class, especially a Government representing the propertyless or small-property class, a Government representing the modern democracy under universal suffrage, a Government representing the class to be benefited by the confiscation and redistribution of wealth through government force, cannot be safely trusted with any such power."

Concerning the destruction of property he wrote, "It would become a temporary despotism, which would destroy property, use up accumulated wealth, make enterprise impossible, discourage intelligence and thrift, encourage idleness and sloth, and pauperize and barbarize the whole people. This is no idle prophecy. The whole history of the world's political development sustains it. The history of that development shows beyond any question or cavil that a Republic, which makes its Government the arbiter of the business, is of all forms of state the most universally corrupt, and that a Republic which undertakes to do its cultural work through government force, is of all forms of state the most demoralizing."

His prediction is rapidly becoming true. However, after we have eaten up the seed corn and made the dollar so it doesn't buy anything, then people will have to go to work or perish. People will work if they cannot be supported by votes. So, in the long run, we believe, we will go back to more near libertarianism than we have had for many years.

Peking Expected Soon to Announce Plans to Test First H-bomb; Soviet-Chinese Fighting Could Follow

Pull Up A Chair
By Frank J. Markey

WASHINGTON — Don't be surprised if Peking answers Soviet Premier Khrushchev's latest super-bomb threat with a world-shaking announcement of its own. The Chinese Communists are expected to report soon that their scientists have developed their first H-bomb and are making plans to test it. That's the supercharged report now circulating in Moscow among Western diplomats. This unconfirmed news comes from aides of Khrushchev, who are carefully leaking out information about the growing Soviet-Chinese Communist "border dispute."

One report given to the British by the Russians indicates that the Chinese Reds' announcement may be made before Thanksgiving. While there is no way to check on this Communist-inspired warning until Peking actually explodes a bomb, the Moscow report is not being taken lightly by British intelligence. This column's most reliable source in Europe has sent word that almost all Western intelligence authorities are forecasting that Peking will have at least a crude atomic device by the end of the year, if not sooner.

Although they stress it will be a long time before Peking acquires a significant arsenal of bombs and delivery vehicles, they predict almost immediate diplomatic repercussions and possible Soviet military action. This latter forecast is puzzling, since a single test will not increase China's military threat to its neighbors for at least three to five years. Also, no nation can become a nuclear power without a whole series of nuclear tests in the atmosphere, and it is highly doubtful that the Chinese Communists' sagging economy could stand this expenditure.

THE INSIDE STORY—While nothing is known about President Johnson's views on China's possession of an H-bomb, the late President Kennedy made a very significant but never announced decision involving that possibility. According to a Washington correspondent, who was a very close personal friend of the late President, Kennedy and his inner circle of advisers in early 1963 agreed in principle that China must be prevented, by whatever means, from becoming a nuclear power. He reported that a plan for the "nuclear sterilization of Communist China" was drawn up inside the administration but never put into effect because of Kennedy's assassination. This highly secret plan called for the bombing of China's nuclear plants with conventional-type "iron bombs." Experiments in using the high-flying U-2 for specialized weapons carrying were conducted.

EVERYBODY'S BUSINESS

Union Officials Are Silent On Right-to-Work Offer

By SAM CAMPBELL Let us suppose that the ministers of this church were compensated in proportion to the number of members it had and that, in order to get more members, a number of the ministers came up with a plan to compel American citizens to join the church. Would that plan of compulsory membership have defenders? Well, the situation that pertains to union membership in a great number of cases throughout the country's factories and plants is very like that. Employees must join the union or they can't continue to hold their jobs. Right-to-work would recognize the employee's right to keep his job whether he joined the union or whether he stayed out.

To date two replies have been received, one of which favors right-to-work. **One-Sided Offer** Now, the offer was not made to the people who favor right-to-work legislation. Rather the offer was made exclusively to those who oppose such legislation. The purpose for that oneness is to draw out of union officialdom the reasons that they feel American citizens should be compelled to join their organization. If we can get those reasons out into the open, we can then see whether they are valid or not. On the other hand, if union officials remain silent, if they do not offer a logical case for compulsory membership, if they are given ample time and opportunity and still refuse to offer, if the offer is repeated and doubly repeated, still without response, then our readers will be entitled to draw a conclusion that union officialdom is not willing to divulge why it opposes exercise of a man's right to join an organization.

In fairness, it should be noted that one anti-right-to-work response has indeed been received. The problem with the reply is that it doesn't deal with the subject. The burden of the writer's message (he did not sign his name) is that the union is good. Whether or not the union is good (or bad) is another subject entirely. The question at issue is whether a man should be FORCED to join the union, even if he believes it to be good. **Church, For Example** Just to zero in on what the real question is, let us suppose momentarily that we are not talking about the union at all. Let us suppose we are talking about some other organization. Indeed, let us suppose we are talking about an organization that the multitude believes to be good—a church, for example.

How Sweet It Is NEW YORK — Having seen the wonders of science in other places, we have never bothered to inquire into the true nature of soft drinks. As long as they do not eat through the bottle, we figure we are ahead of the game. Consequently, we did not pay much attention to the boom in low-calorie, artificially sweetened foods — and especially beverages — that are crowding the stores nowadays. But when the Food and Drug Administration announced last week that it was investigating artificial sweeteners to make sure they had no effect whatsoever on people, we fell called upon to go into the matter. Of all the miracle pills science has produced, we could not remember ever hearing of one designed to have no effect whatsoever. And if it were true, then civilization was most certainly at the dawn of a new era more wonderful than the present.

Now, there is nothing new about artificial sweeteners. The oldest, of course, is a substance called sugar which has been losing popularity in the past several years for its side effects of nutrition, energy and calories. And while there are many other genuine artificial sweeteners such as arsenic which do not add calories, they have certain other drawbacks limiting their use. The answer to the problem has been the development of an imitation artificial sweetener of the saccharine type. This is a nonnutritive, nonbeneficial, nonlethal, non-everything chemical compound. It does absolutely nothing. It is guaranteed to do nothing. It is advertised to do nothing and on the basis of that recommendation, people rush out and buy it. Anybody can invent something that does not work. But only science of the highest discipline, carefully trained in counting the smallest details, can invent something that works perfectly and does nothing. That is exactly how saccharine was invented. A young student named Fahlgberg at Johns Hopkins University noticed that all the food he ate had an overpowering sweet taste. Paying strict attention to detail, Fahlgberg eventually tasted his hands and arms and rightly deciding the sweet flavor had come from the laboratory, went back there and tasted all his experiments until he found the right one — a derivative of coal tar used in the making of TNT. To our way of thinking, it is one of the most remarkable inventions in the history of mankind. And it marks, we think, the end of the age of synthetics and the beginning of the exciting era of imitation-substitutions. The only invention that comes anywhere near it for sheer impact on the civilization we feel, is the wet match for people who have quit smoking.

THE NATION'S PRESS VOLUNTEER MARTYRS (Dallas Morning News) Public officials are always catching it — such as the comment from Groucho Marx that politics is "the art of looking for trouble, finding it everywhere, diagnosing it incorrectly and applying the wrong remedy." And there was the anonymous sage who declared that "in politics the path of glory leads but to the grave."

In addition to all the other troubles they must hear are the slings and arrows of outrageous editorial writers, such as this comment, made by the pro-Conservative London Daily Express: "David Douglas-Home, son of Sir Alec, has failed his Oxford preliminary exams for the second time. He passed on economics... but failed in logic. His ambition is to follow his father into politics."

It's almost enough to make a body feel sorry for the sore-set army of politicians, except for one thing: In spite of all their talk about draft movements, most of the members of the army seem to be volunteers. **SUBSIDY TO RUSSIA (Christian Economics)** Congressman Paul Finley points out that the American taxpayers paid a greater subsidy on American wheat going to Russia than they pay on wheat being exported to friendly countries. According to the Congressman the differential in favor of the Communists amounts to more than 13 cents a bushel. Scores of millions of dollars of our taxpayers' money — will be spent to bolster the position of our deadly enemies. Russian workers, who otherwise would be sent to the farm to produce food, will be retained in factories making arms.
