### LIVING ONE DAY AT A TIME

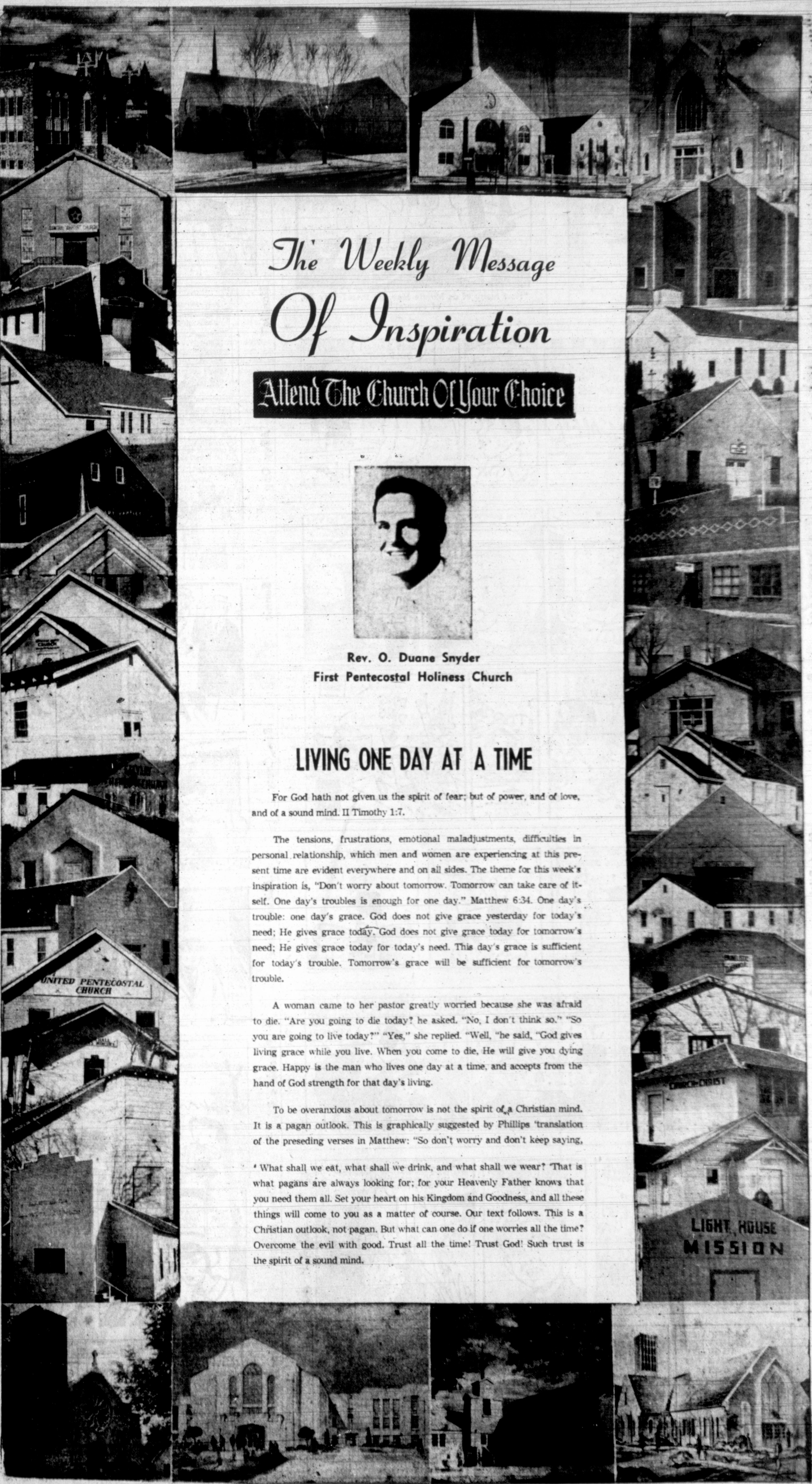
For God hath not given us the spirit of fear; but of power, and of love, and of a sound mind. II Timothy 1:7.

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## Miami's Overcast New Clarendon JC Coach

MIAMI — Miami head coach Lawrence Overcast accepted the job of basketball coach at Clarendon Junior College yesterday afternoon and immediately designated his ace player, 6-4½ Ramon "Big Ray" Guerrero for a scholarship.

Overcast, 31, becomes the youngest coach in the Western Junior College Conference, and indicated he will go all out to make Clarendon a winner.

The tall former West Texas cage star had resigned recently at Miami and had been considering offers from a number of high schools before accepting the Clarendon job.

"I know it will be tough at first, they haven't had a winner for a long time, but this is a tremendous opportunity for me and I will do my best to give them a winning team."

Clarendon was in the Region Five cellar last season, posting a 1-21 record, splitting a pair

with West Texas frosh for their only win.

"There are two or three good sophomores left to build around, and I hope to get some fine boys

out of Pampa and this area to start off with. If I can get the boys I want, I feel we can win some games next year."

Overcast believes his top returning players at Clarendon are 6-7, 248-pound Gene Campbell of Amarillo Carver, a former all-state Johnny Powers of McAdoo.

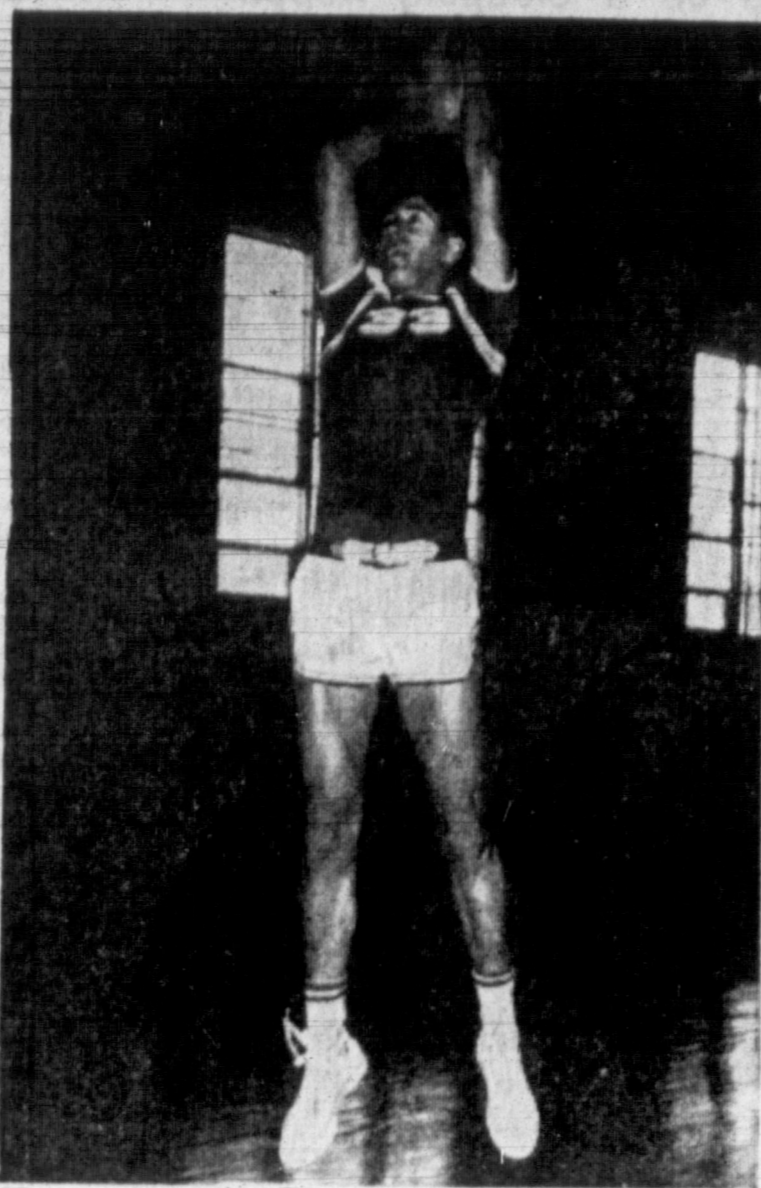
In addition to Guerrero, three-time all-district and twice all-state nominee, Overcast hopes to get several of Guerrero's teammates from the Pampa Newsboys team that just lost out in the "Top O' Texas" Tournament. Overcast is very high on Gary Sikes, 6-4½ former Pampa Harvester, and 6-0 Lanny Lewis, this year's Hustling Harvester, and is also interested in Ron Curlee of this year's PHS team. Overcast also expects to sign up Deadly Dale Morris of Quail and David Kendrick of Samnorwood.

"With the support of the local people and strong backing, and the recruiting of some fine boys, I feel that Clarendon can be a strong entry in the WJCC in years to come," concluded Overcast.

Also head football and track coach at Miami, in three years there, Overcast won one boys and two girls district cage championships, two bi-district titles, and his 1962-63 boys team lost by two points in the regional finals to state champ McAdoo. Prior to coming to Miami, the Samnorwood native had coached one year at Quail and three at Canadian.

Overcast replaces Billy White, who resigned recently after coaching two years at CJC.

Overcast does not assume his post officially until this summer when he will teach night classes, but intends to put on a strong program of meeting supporters and recruiting as often as his teaching and track coaching duties at Miami allow.

## Aggie's John Beasley Takes Scoring Honors

DALLAS (UPI)— Official Southwest Conference basketball statistics released Thursday showed Texas A&M's John Beasley finished atop the standings in season and league scoring.

Beasley scored 395 points in the 14 conference games and 619 for the season. He averaged 28.2 in loop play and 25.8 over the 25-game season.

Dub Malaise, Tech's all-conference guard, was runner-up in both categories. He had 324 points and a 23.1 average in SWC play and 547 points for a 23.7 mean overall.

Tech's Red Raiders were the leading offensive team. They averaged 88.7 points per game while scoring a record 1,242 points in conference play. Tech had an even 2,000 points and an 86.9 average over the season.

Top rebounder was TCU's Gary Turner, who pulled down an average of 12.3 per contest both for the season and conference play. He had 172 in the SWC and 296 over the year.

Top shooter was Doug McKendrick of last-place Rice. McKendrick led for both the loop and season, with 64.5 per cent accuracy in conference action and 60.8 over the entire route.

Most accurate at the charity line were Malaise and Ricky Suggs of Arkansas. Both hit 87 per cent, Malaise on 106 of his 122 in conference play and Suggs with his 77 of 89 for the season.

TCU yielded 1,258 points, 89.9 points per match, to rank as the poorest defensive quint. The Horned Frogs gave up 2,058 points during the year for a 85.8 average.

## Weather Mars Rice Tennis

HOUSTON (UPI)— All but one seeded player survived the first day's action Thursday in the Rice Intercollegiate Invitational Tennis Tournament, marred by fog and intermittent drizzle.

The big upset of Thursday's play came when Robert Travis of Rice whipped Lance Lumsden of Southern Illinois 7-9, 6-2, 8-6 in a second round match.

Lumsden had drawn a bye in the first round and Travis had whipped George Kon of Pan American College 2-6, 6-2, 6-4.

Second-seeded Jim Parker of Rice, who advanced on a first round bye, easily whipped Detley Nitsche of Pan American 6-3, 6-3 in the second round.

Butch Newman, seeded third, had to play twice, beating Ray Salazar of Texas A&M 6-2, 6-1 and Pat McDavitt of TCU 6-1, 6-1.

## Jesse Valdez In AAU Fights

TOLEDO, Ohio (UPI)— Several popular heroes were emerging from the crowd as the National AAU boxing championships headed into the quarter-final round today.

Twenty fights were on tap for this afternoon at the Lucas County Recreation Center with the 20-bout semi-finals scheduled for tonight. The finals, consisting of 10 fights, will be staged Saturday night.

Among the better fights on today's program was the first appearance of 242-pound heavyweight Roy Williams of Philadelphia, who last year lost a split decision to Joe Frazier, against Fleming Mosley of Cleveland. Frazier went on to win the Olympic heavyweight championship at Tokyo last fall and Mosley, 194, qualified for the meeting against Williams by taking a split decision from Alonzo Johnson of New York Thursday.

Two crucial showdowns were on tap in the 147-round division. Jesse Valdez, of Texas, the AAU defending champion in this class, moved into action after an opening-round bye against the Ronald Pryor of Washington while Hedgeman Lewis of Detroit, last year's national golden gloves champion at 135 pounds, was paired against Ronnie White of Pittsburgh.

Pryor scored a technical knockout over Eddie Betson of Peoria, Ill., Thursday, Lewis outpointed Lee Warren of Toledo, and White stopped Oscar Dufrene of Galliano, La., in the second round.

## Keane Aims for Same Spot - Top

FORT LAUDERDALE, Fla. (UPI)— Johnny Keane has pulled the biggest switch in baseball and aims to finish exactly where it started—the World Series.

If he makes it, however, it will be as the manager of the New York Yankees, the club he beat in the World Series last year when he piloted the St. Louis Cardinals to the National League pennant.

"I feel the responsibility of winning," Keane says, "and if I didn't think I could win with this club I would not have taken the job."

"This club" he talks about is the same one which won the American League pennant last season — the Yankees fifth straight pennant. No team ever has won it six years in a row but the odds-makers say it will be done his year, for Keane's Yankees are a 6-5 favorite.

Keane inherited a set ball club—with power, speed and pitching.

"We haven't any problems," he insists, "or we wouldn't be talking pennant."

Three Positions Open  
At the most there are only three positions open on the 1965 team and they are not in starting roles.

The Yankees start off with an outfield of Mickey Mantle, Roger Maris and Tommy Tresh; an infield of Joe Pepitone at first base, Bobby Richardson at second, Tony Kubek at short and Clete Boyer at third, and the game's all-around best catcher, Elston Howard.

Then there's the pitching, beginning with starters Whitey Ford, Jim Bouton, Al Downing and Mel Stottlemyre and Pedro Ramos in the bullpen. The Yankees were hurting for a starting pitcher and a relief hurler last season, so first they called up the 23-year-old Stottlemyre and he won nine games while losing three. Then they got Ramos from Cleveland and he responded by winning one game and saving 13 in the pennant.

But that isn't the end of Yankee talent.

Linz Good Sub  
Phil Linz, the harmonica player, is rated one of the best utility infielders in the business; Hector Lopez can play the outfield or infield and has a knack of coming up with hits in the clutch; and Johnny Blanchard not only can catch but also play the infield and outfield.

The other utility men figure to be infielder Pedro Gonzales, bonus boy Jake Gibbs as the third string catcher and one of three rookies — Elvio Jimenez,

Ross Moschitto or Roger Repoz for the final outfield post.

Keane is looking for a fifth starter with Steve Hamilton, 7-2, Bill Stafford, 5-0 and Roland Sheldon, 5-2, the leading candidates. The two who don't make it will form up the bullpen corps with Ramos, Pete Mikkelsen (7-4) and Hal Reniff (6-4).

It's a tip off on the kind of horses Keane has going for him as he strives to become the first manager in baseball history to win two pennants and two World Series in separate leagues in successive years.

Not many baseball men will bet against him.

## Underdog Pro Fives Favored

The Philadelphia 76ers and the Baltimore Bullets, two teams which had to battle behind all season, move into the second round of the National Basketball Association divisional semifinals tonight with the odds finally in their favor.

Philadelphia meets the Cincinnati Royals at Philadelphia while the Bullets engage the St. Louis Hawks at St. Louis. The 76ers and Bullets are the choices to win the best three-of-five series following their opening game victories.

Philadelphia won the first game of the Eastern Division series 119-117 Wednesday night in overtime despite a so-so performance from Wilt Chamberlain, bothered by a stomach ailment, scored just 26 points in the contest but came up with two key free throws in the overtime period. Chamberlain figures to get better, but Cincinnati's Oscar Robertson is another matter.

Robertson, who injured an ankle last week, could not run sufficiently in Friday night's game and thus the Royals were robbed of the key figure in their offense. Their fast break could not function properly without the "Big O" in top shape and just how fast he can recover remains a question.

Baltimore defeated St. Louis 108-105 in the their Western Division opener and the Bullets seem to be running smoothly at the moment. Walt Bellamy, who was a major disciplinary problem for the Bullets a few months ago, has played well since regaining the favor of Coach Buddy Jeannette. Gus Johnson is also in top form after recovering from a late season injury.

The Hawks, meanwhile, do not have a completely healthy Bob Pettit and their other key veterans, Cliff Hagan and Coach Richie Guerin, can not play a full game anymore.

## No Home in Beantown For Cassius Muhammed

BOSTON (UPI)— Heavyweight champion Cassius Clay may be forced to delay his arrival in Boston for his May 25 title fight with Sonny Liston if he can't find a suitable training camp.

Clay, who prefers to be known by his Black Muslim name, Muhammad Ali, currently is training at Miami, Fla. and is supposed to arrive here not later than May 4 to meet a contract stipulation that his final three weeks of drills be held in Massachusetts.

The young champion does not want to work out in the 500-seat Boston Arena annex which he used last time. He and his backers don't believe that gym is large enough to "accommodate the people that want to see the heavyweight champion of the world in action."

That was the line Clay used when he visited Boston City Hospital last Feb. 8 for a final examination of the hernia surgery he underwent Nov. 13.

"I'd like to find another place to train," the champion said. "Maybe some college or something like that."

But officials of the dozens of colleges in the greater Boston area have shown no interest whatsoever in Clay's plea.

The problem of finding a spot for Clay to work out has fallen on Harold Conrad of New York, publicist for the title bout-promoting Inter-Continental Promotions, Inc.

"I've talked with the champ and his manager, Angelo Dundee, about this," Conrad said. "It's our job to keep the cham-

pion happy and he's not happy with the arena annex where we worked out before."

"The ideal spot would still be a college gymnasium or a summer resort. Liston's set-up at Plymouth Resort Hotel is ideal. But we haven't been able to find another one."

"I can't understand it, either. Having the heavyweight champion of the world on the premises for three weeks would be worth \$8 million in publicity to anyone. But nobody seems to be interested."

Where Are They?

There is no doubt that Washington officials make unemployment statistics as accurate as the present state of knowledge permits, but it is hard to understand where the 4 million or so Americans listed as "unemployed" may be found.

Influential Congressmen Urge Counter Measures Against De Gaulle's Anti-U.S. Provocation

WASHINGTON — Strong bipartisan sentiment is rapidly crystallizing in Congress for direct and forceful retaliation against President De Gaulle's increasingly anti-U.S. provocations.

Both legislators are citing the ironic fact that while the U.S. is making these heavy expenditures for the defense of France, De Gaulle is steadily pulling out of NATO and using these dollars to raid the country's increasingly declining gold reserves.

Representative Rogers, Fla., demanding that the administration take steps to require France to resume payments on its \$6.34 billion World War I debts, pointed out that De Gaulle has ample funds to do so.

Senator Symington, Mo., member of the equally important Armed Services and Foreign Relations committees; Representative Henry Reuss, Wis., Joint Economic and Banking committees; Representative Paul Rogers, Fla., Interstate & Foreign Commerce Committee.

Foremost among the tough counter measures they are calling for are: Demand immediate resumption of payments on the \$6.34 billion France still owes the U.S. in World War I debts.

Senator Symington charges flatly that both militarily and economically De Gaulle "seems to be making a fetish of being anti-American."

They say tax the workingman on his outgo to make up the deficit that was caused when the Socialist-crats wasted too much of the revenues from the tax on his income.

They say tax the industrialist so he can't expand and that way we can finance a commission to study the lack of jobs. They say tax the law-abiding in order to feed the crooks and criminals in jails.

They say tax parents in order to provide a lounging spot for fifth-breeding non-students at state universities.

They say tax because we've always taxed. They say tax because we do not know any better.

They say tax because we can not envision anything different from tax. They say tax even though tax involves the power to destroy. As the prophet counseled, "Where there is no vision, the people perish."

But let us examine an alternative. Instead of saying that we must continue a necessary evil, let us say that the necessity can be brought to an end.

Instead of taxing the old folks out of their homes, let us take the tax off their homes. Let us leave them undisturbed if they so choose, in the dwellings where they reared their children, amid memories of the morning in surroundings friendly and familiar; yes, where even the dents and scratches have a story to tell.

Take the tax off the workingman so he can save toward his retirement. Some won't make it, but many will. The insurance and mutual fund salesmen will see to that. As to the others — brotherly concern is the best reliance against famine.

Take the tax off the businessman. Let competition eliminate the inefficient and greedy. Let the buyer's educated judgment weed out the fraudulent.

Let the tax off the industrialist. Allow him to make more jobs. If we do that, we won't need a commission on unemployment.

Let the crooks and criminals in jail earn their keep. Let them experience the rehabilitating joy of honest wages and honorable toil. As that great humanitarian Paul of Tarsus said of the saints, "If any would not work, neither should he eat."

Let the universities be owned by corporations of teachers. Let them be capitalized by persons who have savings and who desire income. Let them draw revenue from the future earnings of students whose earning power will have been increased, by their own education. That arrangement will drive the trouble-makers off the campus.

Stop Wrong, Start Right Stop doing things the wrong way.

"That she was confident and self-possessed is borne out by the pet names she gave herself. She admitted she called herself the 'pretty baby' in the store."

But, alas, along with her beauty Nelida obviously had a well-developed Latin temperament. And so she lost the case.

After weighing all of the evidence, Powell concluded that the store manager was justified in firing her.

It was alleged that Nelida didn't care for some of the working conditions that the manager had decreed for the cashiers. Therefore, she cooked up a protest demonstration. Her plan was to let the store fill up with customers and then stop operating the cash register.

No Show  
She was said to have told three of the other cashiers that if they didn't go along with the plan she would tear off their clothes in front of the customers.

According to Powell, the store "employed beautiful and well groomed young ladies as cashiers." The manager figured that if they were disrobed, it would not be conducive to the orderly conduct of business.

Consequently, he gave Nelida
