UPI Financial Editor NEW YORK (UPI)-The desire of the young American niale to follow his own tastes in automobile, clothing, and amusements is well known to the American merchant.

Less apparent, except to those in the industry, but growing, is his interest in men's toiletries, said Donald Burr, vice president of marketing for Yardley of London, Inc. Burr said these items are growing in unit sales and in units of higher price than has been the experience with an older generation.

"Nothing much of this growth pattern shows among the older men," said Burr in a recent interview. "There is a steady market here, for shaving preparations, after shave lotions and the like. Perhaps 50 per cent of the male population now uses an after-shave fragrance.

"But the boys and young men now show an interest in a wider rage than the merely "utilitarian cosmetics."

Burr, who currently is directing Yardley's "London Look" campaign said that the stimulation of youth to sales was far from confined to the men's

"Young girls are asking for their own kinds of cosmeticsthe kind they like." he said.

Be of good cheer, fellow citizens. President Johnson's special ambassador to Indonesia scored a triumph. He sweet talked Indonesian President Sukarno into continuing to accept some U.S. foreign aid. Not much foreign aid, but some. And every little bit helps.

Sukarno qualifies for U. S. foreign aid by denouncing the United States on all occasions, by seizing American - owned properties in Indonesia and by permitting hoodlums to loot and burn U.S. government installations in that country.

Sukarno's most recent bid for U.S. goodwill was to permit Indonesian workers to seize the American-owned National Carbide Co. On March 20, Sukarno announced seizure of three foreign oil companies, two of them American - owned. These seizures followed Communist - led demonstrations demanding such

Mobs Attack Embassy Indonesian mobs have at tacked the U.S. Embassy in Jakarta and have raided U.S. information centers. Indonesian Minister Subandrio joined Red Chinse Foreign Minister Marshal Chen Yi in a February statement asserting that the United States and other big powers were manipulating the United Nations and thereby, discrediting the U.N.

Sukarno's Indonesia generally aligns itself with Red China. Sukarno has demanded withdrawal of U.S. forces from Asia, thus supporting the Communist position on Viet Nam. Sukarno equally objects to the existence of the state of Malaysia and is committed to its destruction. He is guilty of armed aggression.

Review Aid Program LBJ's special emissary to the Indonesian bully boy was Ellsworth Bunker who ended his mission last week. Bunker joined Sukarno in a statement announcing the end of U.S. Peace Corps operations in Indonesia and stating that American aid to Indonesia would be

reviewed and revised. The statement also revealed that U.S. teachers from the universities of California and Kentucky would remain in Indonesia on assignment to medical, engineering and agricultural schools. Sukarno occasionally has suggested that the United States go to hell with its aid But he generously said last week that the U.S. teaching programs were welcome and would have the full support of his government. That probably means that the teachers and their classrooms usually will be protected from mob action and their books usually will be safe from burning.

A Big Concession This is a big concession on Sukarno's part and no doubt will be chalked up as an American diplomatic victory. On the day that Sukarno and Bunker were making their joint statement and saying goodby, Sukarno was scratching around for someone to manage the newly seized American National Carbide Co. He announced the job would go to the governor of Jakarta. Immediately thereafter Sukarno joined Communist North Korean Premier Kim Il Sung in demanding withdrawal of U.S. troops from all of Asia.

The diplomatic triumph that Ambassador Bunker brings back from Indonesia is Sukarno's agreement that U.S. aid be reviewed and revised. What an American taxpayer might want to know would be this:

Why does Sukarno get as much as a dime's worth of U.S.
