U.S., South Viet Planes Pound Cong Stronghold

Marine Accidentally Shot, Killed by Buddy

SAIGON (UPI) — American jet fighters attacked army barracks and other military targets in North Viet Nam today and teamed up with Vietnamese fighter-bombers to kill an estimated 50 Viet Cong guerrillas in 165 sorties in the south.

No major military action was reported but in a series of small actions the Viet Cong was disclosed to have wounded an American Medal of Honor winner. A U.S. Marine accidentally shot and killed another Marine and a Vietnamese militiaman in actions near Da Nang.

The Navy disclosed that two U.S. destroyers were ranging up and down the coast of Da Nang and 120 miles to the south hitting Viet Cong targets with their five-inch rifles. They were the destroyer Stoddard, assigned to the Da Nang base, and the destroyer Ingersoll.

In Saigon the government published a decree providing death penalties for a series of offenses ranging from rumor-mongering to neutralism. It also provided prison terms for persons found guilty of evading price controls or indulging in currency speculation.

The government-owned Viet Nam Press News Agency reported that Viet Cong guerrillas exploded a mine at the U.S. aid headquarters for Lam Dong Province Wednesday but the blast caused only slight damage and no casualties. The explosion came in the town of Bao Loc, 95 miles northeast of Saigon.

In the air war in the south a military spokesman said American and Vietnamese planes destroyed or damaged more than 260 buildings, and sank two sampans, touching off secondary explosions.

In the north U.S. fighter-bombers hit Dien Bien Phu, the fortress where the French surrendered 11 years ago, and highway targets north and south of there near the border of Laos. One of the heaviest raids was against the Ban Pa Huone highway bridge 25 miles northeast of Dien Bien Phu.

A military spokesman reported that two U.S. Navy F4 Phantom jets from the carrier U.S.S. Independence ran into radar controlled anti-aircraft fire as they attacked the Hon Me radar site 120 miles south of Hanoi on an island in the Gulf of Tonkin.

The wounded Medal of Honor winner was identified as Lt. Col. Lloyd L. (Scooter) Burke, who commands a battalion of troops at Bien Hoa, Burke, of Stuttgart, Ark., was reported in good condition. He won the Medal of Honor during the Korean War.

In South Viet Nam, a U.S. Air Force observation plane pilot was killed today when his aircraft crashed while he was directing air strikes 50 miles south of Da Nang air base. A Vietnamese observer aboard the plane died also.

The pilot became the 519th American to die in Viet Nam since the United States stepped

GOP File New Redistrict Suit

HOUSTON (UPI)—The Republican party has charged the 59th Texas Legislature's congressional redistricting act is a mass of gerrymandering and asked a federal court to draw up new districts.

Republicans from Dallas, Fort Worth, Midland, Odessa, Beaumont, San Antonio, and Richardson, filed the suit.

They are the areas Republicans contend were most affected by deviation from the "one man, one vote" rule.

The plaintiffs are technically asking the court to allow them to enter the original suit against the redistricting plan. Originally, Republicans in the suit attacking the districts had a partial victory, in that the special three-judge federal court agreed the districts were unconstitutional.

Effective Date Delayed
 But the court delayed the effective date of its ruling long enough to let the legislature draw new districts.

Secretary of State Crawford Martin, who heads the list of state officials named as defendants in the suit, said the intervenors should not be allowed to enter the suit.

Circuit Judge John Brown "will have to set aside his original order if they are going to get into court because he has ordered no further parties be allowed to intervene," Martin said.

"George Bush (GOP candidate for the U.S. Senate in 1964) and the original plaintiffs are satisfied with the redistricting plan," Martin said.

"I think the redistricting law is very constitutional," he said. Gov. John Connally and Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr previously said they approved the plan.

'Botched Up Job'
 The new suit accused the legislature of botching up the job of redistricting and asks the court to draw up new districts with strict adherence to the population guidelines set out in U.S. Supreme Court decisions.

The suit says the districts vary up to 20 per cent from each other in size. In many areas, the suit contends, parts of populous urban areas are shoved into rural districts, submerging urban and predominantly conservative voting strength into a majority of rural territory.

In Dallas, it said, a portion of 64,000 population is scooped out and put in a district consisting of 18 predominantly rural and democratic counties that stretch to the Oklahoma border to the north and to near the New Mexico border on the west. Parts of Tarrant, Bexar and Jefferson counties had the same thing done to them, the suit charges.

As a result, the plaintiffs feel the Republicans and metropolitan votes are hurt by being put with rural areas.

Business Highlights

 WASHINGTON: Actual defense spending was \$2 billion less in the year ended June 30 than anticipated. The Treasury disclosed. The various purchasing programs simply could not be pushed as rapidly as scheduled.

WASHINGTON: Senate Republican Leader Everett M. Dirksen says Federal Reserve Board Chairman William McChesney Martin has been expressing much more concern in private about the state of the economy than he has in public. He said Martin also is concerned about Britain's economic outlook and its effect on the Free World.

INDIANAPOLIS: A receiver for the bankrupt business of an Indianapolis dealer who was killed July 10 in a helicopter crash says his customers may lose large sums. The receiver said that so far he has not been able to find assets to cover huge claims against the business.

NEW YORK: Chairman Herman Nolen of McKesson & Robbins, Inc., said Glen Alden Corp. is dickering with his firm to buy the McKesson & Robbins shares Glen Alden received as a result of a recent tender offer. But Nolen said no firm deal has been reached.

NEW YORK: General Electric Co. said Thursday it has obtained a \$6.06 million addition to an existing contract for work on the John Day Lock and Dam at Pasco, Wash.

NEW YORK: Martin Marietta Corp. said Thursday it has obtained a \$4.75 million addition to an existing contract for supplies and services for the Air Forces Titan II missile program.

Racial Tension In Georgia Near Peak

Racial tension mounted in Georgia today and civil rights leaders promised to fill the jails in Americus in a fight for voting rights.

The Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC) sent Hosea L. Williams, one of its most militant leaders, to Americus, a city that was torn by racial strife during the summer of 1963.

Williams told a group Thursday night that their theme would be "jail—not bail." Some 100 Negroes and whites made a peaceful march through downtown Americus following the speech.

Negroes also staged demonstrations in Columbus and Newton in a day marked by arrests, picketing, charges and counter charges.

Police arrested 15 demonstrators during a daylight demonstration in Columbus. Demonstrators came back 150 strong Thursday night but there were no incidents or arrests.

Elsewhere:

Bogalusa, La.: Nine Negroes and a white civil rights worker failed in one bid to integrate a restaurant Thursday, but were successful at a second previously segregated cafe. About 270 Negroes marched down an empty street shortly before sunset without incident. Two Negroes were to take civil service exams today for jobs as policemen.

operation, however, many persons who needed pain alleviation the most were too weak to withstand such surgery. Mullan's new technique involves only local anesthesia.

Mullan said his technique is particularly suited for persons who have severe pain only for a limited duration, such as cases of severe burns, herpes (shingles) and some nerve diseases.

An important by-product of the procedure is that it avoids habit-forming drugs and the possibility of addiction.

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Mansfield Leaning Toward Remap Amendment Proposed by Dirksen

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield, Mont., said today he was "leaning very strongly" towards a proposed constitutional amendment aimed at upsetting the U. S. Supreme Court's orders on apportionment of state legislatures.

The amendment was proposed by Senate GOP Leader Everett M. Dirksen, Ill., who maneuvered it to the floor after being stymied in committee by liberal senators.

Dirksen's plan would allow one house of state legislatures to be apportioned on a basis other than population provided the state's voters approved. It would offer a means of getting around the high court's "one man, one vote" ruling last year that state legislatures must be apportioned entirely by population.

Liberals threatened a filibuster against the amendment, which requires two-thirds approval by each house before it can go to the states for ratification. Thirty-eight of the 50 states must approve for the amendment for it to go into effect.

The threatened filibuster led Mansfield to say there was a chance Congress might not be able to adjourn by Labor Day, as he had hoped.

Other congressional news:

Goldberg: The Senate Foreign Relations Committee scheduled a hearing on President Johnson's nomination of Supreme Court Justice Arthur J. Goldberg to be U. S. ambassador to the United Nations. Goldberg was named to the post to succeed Adlai E. Stevenson, who

died in London last week.

Guns: The House Ways & Means Committee continued hearings on legislation to ban interstate sales of firearms to private individuals. The measure is among those recommended by President Johnson in his anti-crime message to Congress earlier this year.

have the backing of 10,000 U. S. soldiers, promised to them before Kennedy came to office.

Another of Kennedy's close aides—Theodore C. Sorensen—published an excerpt from his book in Look magazine. He summed up the situation surrounding the planning for the invasion in this way:

"The key to Kennedy's error," Sorensen said, lay in the fact that he had approved an invasion plan "bearing little resemblance to what he thought he had approved."

According to Sorensen, "that so great a gap between concept and actuality should exist at so high a level on so dangerous a matter reflected a shocking number of errors in the decision making process, errors that permitted bureaucratic momentum to govern instead of policy leadership."

Sorensen, who admitted he was not in on the invasion planning, said Kennedy labored under misapprehensions about the actual invasion plan because of three reasons:

—He was new in office and did not know the strengths and weakness of his advisers.

—Secrecy did not permit enough time for the plan to be evaluated by anyone other than its authors and advocates.

—Since the Kennedy administration was new, it was not organized for crisis planning. Because of this, Sorensen said, the Central Intelligence Agency and the Joint Chiefs of Staff exercised a dominant influence.

As for the man who ran the CIA part of the show, he offered his hindsight in a copy-right interview in the Washington Evening Star on Tuesday.

Richard M. Bissell Jr., who was in charge of planning the invasion for the CIA, said everyone involved in the operation miscalculated the ability of the United States to stay behind the scenes.

Bissell, now in private business, said that in actual fact the attempt to keep the U. S. influence at a minimum "seriously diminished the chances of success."

But Bissell said Kennedy was kept fully informed and made the key decisions.

Under Kennedy's instructions, Bissell said the invasion was planned in such a way that it could be called off within 24 hours of its D-day.

Bissell said he was also inclined to agree with Schlesinger, who said the CIA people were so involved with the invasion plan that they accepted modifications they should not have.

"Because we were so involved in seeing it go ahead, we did not insist on as great freedom of action as we needed," he

Lefors Voters Okay Purchase Of Gas Company

LEFORS (Spl)—Voters in Lefors gave the city council authorization to purchase the Gray County Gas Co., yesterday by passing a revenue bond issue.

The election carried by a margin of 126 to 14. Only about half of the registered voters in Lefors turned out to cast their ballots.

The election gave the city council authorization to purchase the gas company for \$50,000 from a corporation in Amarillo.

The gas company will be run by the city of Lefors with revenue going toward paying off the bond. The project will be financed for 15 years.

The election was called by the city when it was feared the privately owned gas company would again raise gas rates.

Three years ago, gas rates were jumped from 42 cents to .75 in a much disputed move.

Following the election last night, the Lefors City Council went into a called session to canvass the ballots and begin negotiations to purchase the gas company.

When Lefors officially takes over the Gray County Gas Co. there will be no increase in gas rates or taxes.

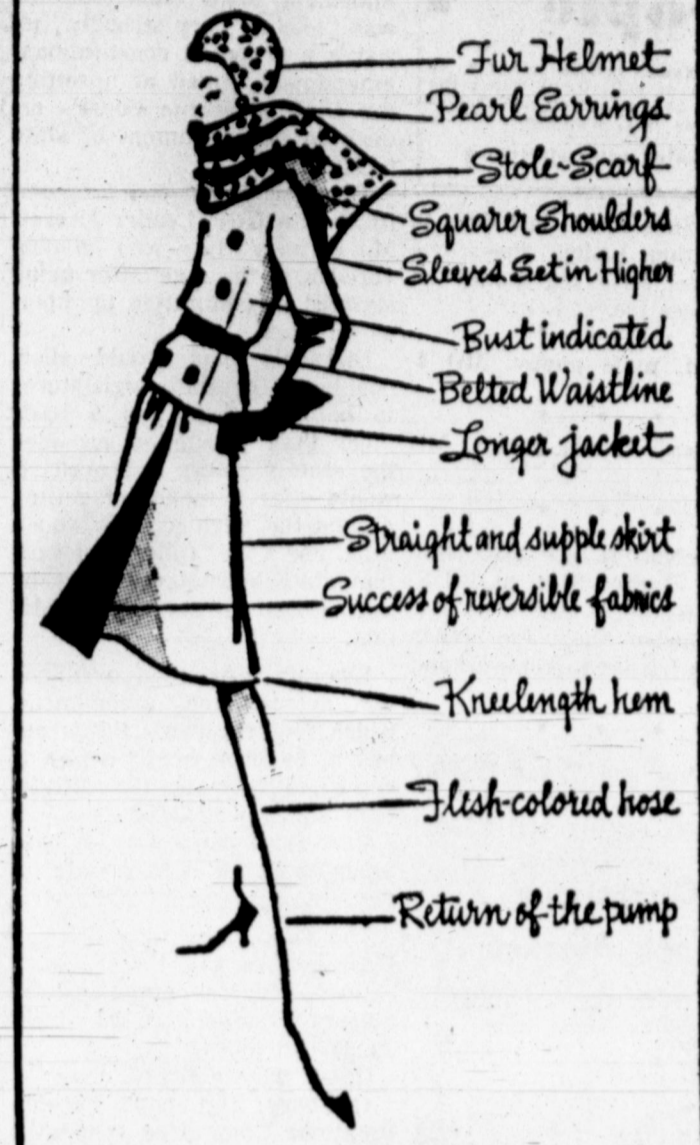

PARIS (NEA) — Despite the sultry late July days and the feverishness of presenting a new fashion collection, few designers here can escape a frightening chill. London couture is trying to wrest the spotlight from the City of Light. And in the United States there is a growing assuredness of design independence. Many reputations, and France's major industry, again are at stake in the coming nine days (July 25 to August 4) of fall-winter collection showings.

No wonder only the deft fingers of their seamstresses seem to keep the frayed nerves of the great and near-great gods of haute couture from unraveling into hysteria at this point. They know only too well that even a Balenciaga or a Bohan can be swamped with ignominy for one bad collection.

With such pressure it is a wonder any leading designer put pencil to paper. Fortunately, all did, with happy results for women this fall and winter. A new woman will emerge from the soon-to-be revealed fashions. Matching the aura of such creations—Madame 1966 bears a closer resemblance to the James Bond heroines than to the delicate clinging-vine type assayed last year.

She will be tall, lithe, athletic, redolent of the new sexy appearance as typified by actress Ursula Andress in "Dr. No."

Tapping sources close to leading designers we find the line swings to skirts of the straight variety. Pleated skirts are out of favor and supple sheaths will be the order for late day and night. Redingotes give way to slim, straight coats often in burly fabrics.

Suits will have longer jackets, often double-breasted and belted at the natural or slightly lower waistline.

Meanwhile the vital problem of skirt length seems to have reached a status quo. Nobody, the oracles predict here, is going to raise the hem any higher than Courreges did last season. Few competitors can resist slapping the wrists of this "bad boy" and the hardest cut of all is to call his designs "too young for the average." Holding the hems to just above or just below the knees reflects designers' resistance to his notoriety.

soft, deep-piled and luminous fabrics.

Over at Nina Ricci, young Gerard Pipart, still the maverick of haute couture, has concentrated on the new deep, lustrous fabrics for both coats and suits. His décolletés this season apparently are very restrained. They appear in simple evening dresses topped by very "Ole Russia" evening coats in fabulous fabrics.

Jacques Heim has definitely abandoned pants—either tailored or frilled—in favor of dresses topping the knees. He has used many reversible fabrics for daytime and an orgy of laces for evening, along with ultra-daring décolletés.

At Jean Patou, another young designer, Michel Goma, has

played all sorts of artful variations on the basic sheath, with a tendency to a raised bustline and hide-and-seek belts. He also will launch the long, skinny sweater in various mediums.

A Mexican influence will prevail in Pierre Cardin's collection. It was he who designed the costumes for the film "Viva Maria," starring Jeanne Moreau and Brigitte Bardot. Full-gathered skirts, frilly sleeves, stupendous décolletés and vivid colors will be featured.

At Jeanne Lanvin the 1966 details are: geometrical décolletés, lots of fancy buttons, new ideas in fastenings and feather trimmings.

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Foreign Commentary

 MOSCOW (UPI)—With the recent visit here of W. Averell Harriman, the United States appeared to be trying to rescue a major casualty of the Vietnamese conflict — improved contacts between Moscow and Washington.

Those contacts, a product of the Kennedy - Khrushchev era and maintained during the first year of Lyndon B. Johnson's presidency, have waned since the U.S. bombing of North Viet Nam began.

diplomats here speculate that the bombing could have two major effects on Kremlin thinking:

—It could end the Sino-Soviet split by driving the Soviets into support of the Chinese "hard line" belief that any form of coexistence with the "imperialists" is illusory.

—And, according to the same thinking, it could lead the Kremlin to send more arms, and even troops, to Viet Nam, increasing the threat of an "eyeball to eyeball" confrontation.

Diplomatic observers believe Harriman came to Moscow at least in part to sound out Soviet intentions and to try to keep Soviet-American relations from deteriorating further.

Premier Alexei Kosygin was interested enough to talk at length with Harriman. But, on the day that the American roving ambassador arrived, anti-American posters — reading "Stop the Murderers" — went up on Moscow streets for the first time in years.

The talks ended and Harriman left with no indication that anything was achieved.

And Kosygin, after talking — reportedly in "stern tones" — with Harriman, said publicly that U.S. policy in Viet Nam was "blocking" any improvement in relations.

Observers here believe that Kosygin and his Kremlin colleagues may be genuinely perplexed by the situation.

When ex-Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev fell last October, new Communist party chief Leonid I. Brezhnev told U.S. Ambassador Foy D. Kohler that "if there is any change at all (in Soviet foreign policy), it will only be for the better."

But that change for the better has not materialized. The Soviet leaders give every appearance of being torn between Khrushchev's anti-China policy of greater accommodation with the West, and their often-expressed "duty" to support a fellow Communist country in trouble.

Allied with this is the apparent Kremlin fear that it may be handing leadership of the "liberation" movement in the Afro-Asian nations to the Chinese if it weakens in its support for the Viet Cong.

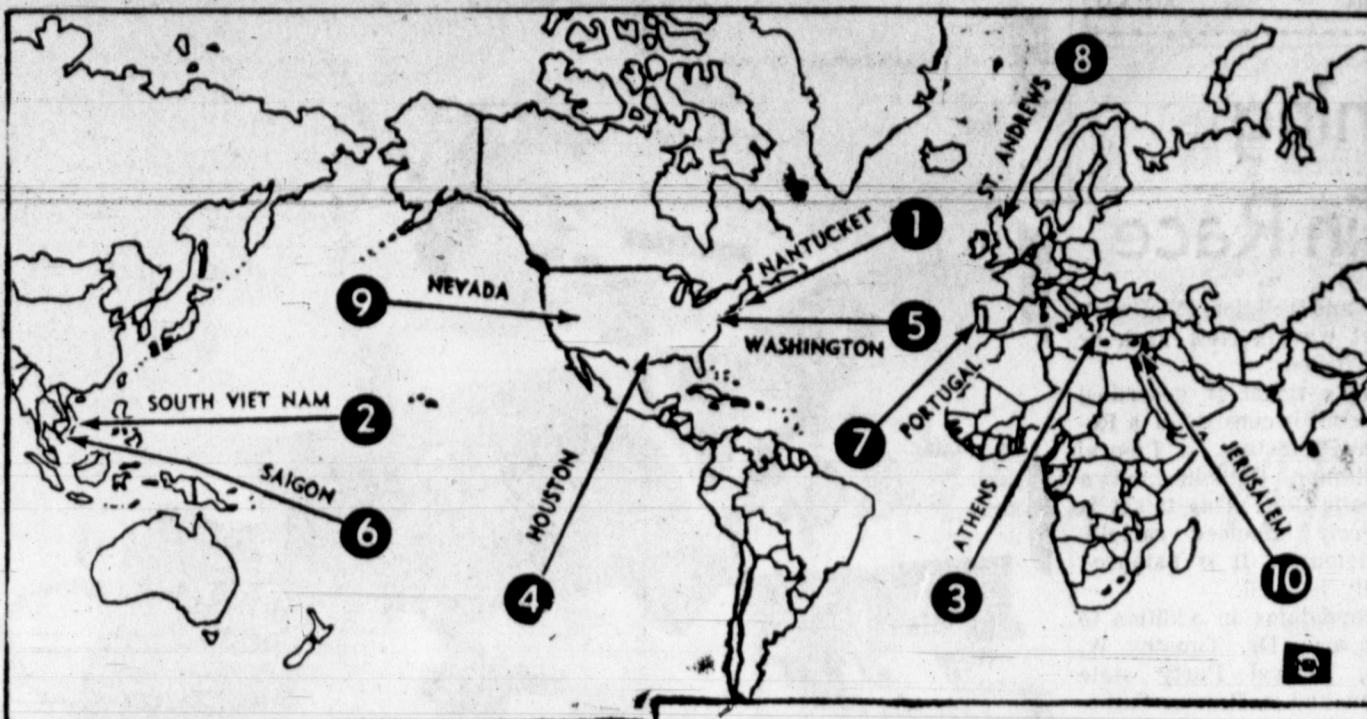

'Spy' Plane Encounter Adds Fuel for De Gaulle

 PARIS (UPI)—The case of the American "spy plane" is likely to add to French President Charles de Gaulle's determination to make drastic changes in the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) setup.

The belief is growing among foreign diplomats and French officials.

According to the French version published Monday a U.S. Air Force reconnaissance jet made four photographic passes over the French nuclear power plant at Pierrelatte in the Rhone Valley.

The French government handed an official protest to the U.S. Embassy here.

The U.S. State Department has disputed the French version and said it was based on a "misunderstanding."

Whether that is so or not, officials agree this is the kind of incident that gets under De Gaulle's skin.

French official and press comment since Monday has been mild. There were no violent blasts against the United States. Some French newspapers even asked what, in fact, the United States with its 20 years' advance on France in nuclear know-how could have hoped to learn from photographs of the Pierrelatte plant.

But De Gaulle was reported to have blown his top.

His anger was said to have been aroused particularly by the fact that the intruder plane was reported to have made no less than four reconnaissance passes over the plant.

Ever since 1940 De Gaulle has been ultra-sensitive where he thought French sovereignty and national honor were involved. And this appears to be a case in point.

The fact the plane was on a NATO mission over French territory, according to the first U.S. Air Force version, could only have made it seem all the more objectionable to him.

Responsible Western diplomats have been taking increasingly seriously the possibility De Gaulle may try to tear NATO apart and perhaps kick Supreme Allied Headquarters (SHAPE) out of France.

De Gaulle has not yet spelled out in detail the changes he wants in the NATO setup. But those at which he has already hinted look ominous for the future of the organization.

To begin with, De Gaulle wants to erase the supra-national features of NATO and its integrated command setup. He wants all French forces to be under purely French command rather than NATO command which means in the final instance the command of an American general.

De Gaulle also strongly objects to the presence of foreign forces on French soil as part of the NATO layout but not under French control.

The Pierrelatte incident illustrated this latter point.

The plane came from an American air base at Laon in France, but was under NATO command and apparently was carrying out a mission over French territory on NATO orders and without any specific French say-so.

That is the kind of thing De Gaulle undoubtedly wants to end.

Whatever may be the final diplomatic outcome of the Perrelatte "spy plan" incident, De Gaulle can be expected to store it up in his computer-like memory as one further argument for ending the present NATO arrangements in Europe.

Between the Bookends

HISTORY OF GOVERNMENT INTERVENTION

It has long been the practice of "people in the know" to talk about the "booms and busts of capitalism". To support this phrase, one has had only to look back over the history of this nation — with the ups and downs of its "free enterprise" system.

Those who have felt that there must be a mistaken premise somewhere in this assumption — that freedom should not be a breeder of depressions — have been hard put to find an answer. For there has been little literature to turn to for the facts regarding this country's economic history.

Murray Rothbard's monumental work, "America's Great Depression" documented government's role in bringing on the 1929 crash. Now, additional histories are coming forth to set the record straight on previous government intervention.

Although it is not necessarily the book's main purpose, the fact of governmental, economic intervention a century ago is brought out quite clearly. Professor Daniel J. Elazar points out that "The expansion of federal domestic programs, which began around the middle of the century, reached such points during the War years that one could easily call Lincoln's presidency the 'New Deal' of the 1860's."

Among the measures enacted between 1861 and 1865 were (1) the National Banking Act of 1863, which created a national banking system and a national currency; (2) the Morrill Land-Grant College Act of 1862, (3) the great transcontinental railroad land grants of 1862, 1863, and 1864, (4) the Homestead Act of 1862.

Hunt for Truth

BY H. L. HUNT POSSIBLE NEW U.N. AGGRESSION IN AFRICA

Reliable reports indicate that the United Nations, under the direction of Secretary-General U. Thant, is preparing for new aggression in Africa along the lines of the infamous invasion of Katanga three years ago.

Three U.S. spokesmen and officials, Jacob Malik of the Soviet Union, D. Malachuk of Tanzania, and Dr. Diza Gonzalez of Venezuela, have been touring Africa and spreading the word that the United Nations will use force to expel Britain, South Africa and Portugal from African territories they now control. All three indicate that their views are fully shared by U. Thant.

Detailed military studies have been made of the probable cost in money and casualties of this new United Nations venture in African conquest, and are now in U. Thant's possession.

Whether or not such a savage violation of the peace of the U.N. is pledged to protect is actually attempted, the very fact that it is now being so seriously considered shows the enormous potential danger inherent in the United Nations. The U.N. claims the right to intervene by force in the internal affairs of any nation and many far left of center are willing to honor its presumptuous claim.

Thus, an organization created for the purpose of collective security against aggression, becomes itself an aggressor, as in the Katanga invasion. In this new case, it would not even have the feeble excuse of being called on by a local government to suppress alleged "rebels".

Johnson Pen to Make First Coin Change in 173 Years

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Johnson today makes the first major change in American coins in 173 years with a few strokes of the pen.

Johnson was scheduled to sign into law legislation to take all the silver out of dimes and quarters in order to preserve the nation's dwindling supply of the metal for industrial and defense uses.

Enactment of the bill means the end of a silver tradition going back to 1792.

To replace the old - style coins, the legislation provides for dimes and quarters to be made of a copper base sandwiched between outside layers of a copper - nickel alloy — the same way five - cent pieces are now made.

The new dimes and quarters will be similar in appearance to the old ones except for a reddish - tinged edge caused by the copper base.

In anticipation of the enactment, the Treasury Department has already begun to change its coin - making processes over to the new formula. Present plans call for the first of the copper - nickel dimes and quarters to go into circulation early next year.

The measure also calls for the silver content of 50-cent pieces to be reduced from 90 to 40 per cent. The administration asked Congress to leave some silver in these coins, which bear the portrait of the late President John F. Kennedy, so that the nation would still have a "prestige" coin.

The Lighter Side

ROME, Italy (UPI)—One of the first things that an American, particularly one from Washington, likes to do upon arriving in a foreign capital is get a briefing on the political situation.

I came to the Italian capital after spending two days in Florence looking at fashion shows, where I was completely out of my element.

When I asked a lady fashion expert for guidance, she told me: "Nobody understands women's fashions. If people understood them, there wouldn't be a fashion industry."

After that experience, I figured it would be nice to get back to something as simple and rational as politics. So I contacted an Italian political expert and requested that he give me a clear and concise picture of what was going on. "I'll be happy to," he said. "There's really nothing to it. Just bear in mind that the government is in the hands of the Christian Democrats, who are allied with the Socialists, the Social Democrats and the Republicans.

"The Social Democrats are to the right of the Republicans, who are left of the Socialists. All of them are badly split. "The Socialists, for example, have been identified by seven sets of initials—PSIUP, PSI, PSLI, PSU, US, PSDI and PS (SIIS).

"The Christian democrats are practically everything. Their candidates have ranged from a Sicilian, described by police as king of the Mafia, to a former mayor of Florence who talks to birds.

"Unlike the Socialists, Social Democrats and Republicans, who are badly split, the Christian Democrats are terribly split. They have up to nine factions, but since the members keep switching from one to another, it's difficult to pin down the exact number.

"Christian Democrats are only united in support of unpopular causes. Right now, in a rare display of unity, they are defending a former minister accused of corruption in office.

"That takes care of the in group. The out group is composed of the Communists and the proletarian Socialists, who broke with the Socialists and are now almost more Communist than the Communists. Got it all straight?"

"Got it," I said, bolting for the door.

"Wait," he called. "This only covers the left wing parties. On the right wing we have the Liberals, the Free Enterprisers, the Italian Social Movement and the Monarchists. All of them are badly split.

"The Liberals, who are ultra-conservative, are... But I was out the door before he could finish.

Astronauts Soon May Wear Street Clothes in Orbit

SPACE CENTER, Houston (UPI) — America's astronauts may soon wear conventional street clothing as they orbit the earth. But for spacemen Gordon Cooper and Charles (Pete) Conrad, it will be spacesuits as usual on Aug. 19.

Cooper and Conrad will pilot the Gemini-5 spaceship on an eight-day mission.

They said they suggested to space officials that they might make the upcoming flight without spacesuits, citing lack of emergencies in previous Gemini missions. But the national space agency vetoed the idea, at least for the present.

Both men talked to newsmen Monday in the midst of their almost non-stop training for the new mission.

"We felt the Gemini spacecraft had two very successful flights," Cooper said. "It is an extremely safe way to go."

POSTPONE VOTE
WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Senate Thursday postponed until Monday its confirmation vote on former Mississippi Gov. James P. Coleman to be a judge on U.S. 5th Circuit Court of Appeals.

On Monday, Winston Churchill's private secretary from 1949 to 1955, Mrs. Jane P. Welby, is pencilled in as a "Today" guest. She is currently running the Churchill pavilion at the New York World's Fair and will, of course, reminisce about her ex-boss.

On Tuesday, one of the scheduled "Today" guests is Cyril Ritchard, a star in Broadway's "The Roar of the Greasepaint, The Smell of the Crowd." In addition, Burr Tillstrom, who is filling in as host of "Today," will entertain with his puppets Kukla and Ollie.

Wednesday is a once-in-a-lifetime day. First off, there is a fellow from a criminal research company who tells about the snooping devices his firm manufactures. And then there is a Peruvian Indian chief who wrote a book about his experiences as a headhunter and how he reformed.

Thursday's okay too. There's a fashion show with six top models displaying the designs of the new fall collections for some of the biggest names in the business — Bill Blass, Christian Dior of New York and Pauline Trigiere.

Animals Getting Most Attention At Scout Roundup

FARRAGUT STATE PARK, Idaho (UPI) — Animals — both real and artificial — are attracting the major share of attention at the fourth international Girl Scout Senior Roundup here.

The real animals are two dozen specimens of wildlife native to the Idaho woods, where this gathering of 9,000-teen-age-girls is being held.

The artificial animals include a talking mockup of Smokey the Bear and his outlandish companion named Guberif. Smokey chats with his visitors, throwing in a little safety talk along with the pleasantries. Guberif, when touched, spews smoke at giggling girls.

Meanwhile, weather continued hot and dry for the roundup, as the girls began tours of the Kaniku National Forest and participated in a series of forums.

The forums cover such topics as "I Am Engaged in My Government and My World," and "Living the Principles We Believe."

The tours, for 1,700 persons in 51 busses at a time, include a stop at Priest Lake in its setting between two mountain ridges with evergreen forests crowding close on sandy beaches.
