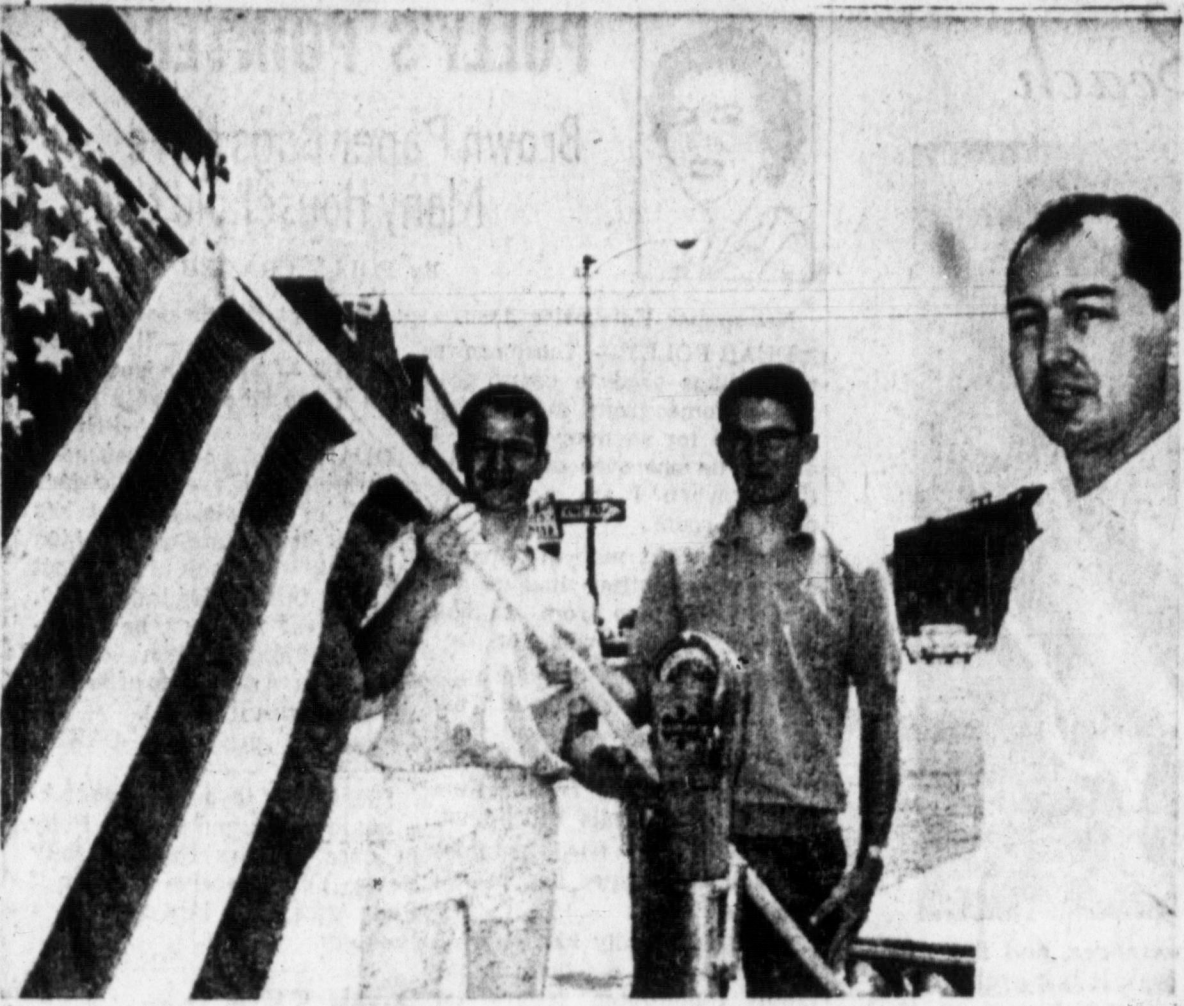

Solution to Dominican Troubles Still Not in Sight

SANTO DOMINGO, Dominican Republic (UPI) — More than seven weeks have passed since the revolt in the Dominican Republic started, but a solution to the country's deep division is still not in sight. The Caribbean island nation is showing signs of settling down to live with its crisis almost indefinitely.

An inter-American force composed of American, Brazilian, Honduran, Nicaraguan and Costa Rican units is firmly established here and Paraguayans are scheduled to join them later this month.

The Organization of American States (OAS) negotiating team of Ellsworth Bunker of the United States, Ramon de Clairmont Duenas of El Salvador and Ilmar Penna Marinon of Brazil shuttles back and forth between the "Constitutionalist Government" and the "Government of National Reconstruction (GNR)" almost daily.

With the help of OAS Secretary General Jose Mora, they are attempting to work out an agreement acceptable to both sides, presumably leading to new elections under OAS supervision.

So far, they have not been able to achieve agreement. Jack Hood Vaughn, assistant U. S. secretary of state for inter-American affairs, said in Washington Sunday that Dominican elections probably will not

be held for 12 to 18 months. Vaughn, who visited Santo Domingo recently, said "we apparently aren't any closer to a coalition government than when we arrived."

Vaughn said during a television program that the danger of new fighting exists because "very large quantities" of arms have been distributed to the populace. An estimated 5,000 supporters of Maj. Gen. Antonio Imbert Barrera's junta regime held a rally in front of the Embajador Hotel Sunday. The hotel is the headquarters for the OAS mediation team.

"We are demonstrating to the world that Dominicans are anti-Communist," Imbert said. He told the noisy rally that his movement favors democratic rule in the Dominican Republic.

"ONE OF GOD'S WARNINGS?" Sanderson Faithful Line Churches to Give Thanks

SANDERSON, Tex. (UPI) — A hot June sun. It climatically was a typical day in this near desert country. With an estimated \$3.5 million in damages the town was expected to be declared a disaster area. President Johnson Sunday personally requested a situation report from federal agencies.

Younger residents had never seen anything like the 15 foot high wall of water that had come roaring into town early Friday like one of the Southern Pacific freights. The town is an important rail head for West Texas.

But some remembered other floods in Sanderson. "This last one was about four feet higher and a lot rougher than that one," County Judge Sid Wilkerson remembered. He was talking about "the only other real flood" in 1935. "We didn't have anyone killed then," he recalled.

Another body was found Sunday, a 10-year-old boy, 20 miles down river from town. Texas Rangers on horseback found the body. Sheriff Bill Cooksey said "the only thing left now is to pick up our dead and start all over. We may never find some of the missing."

The hungry and homeless sat at the Army field kitchen set up by a detachment from Ft. (See SANDERSON, Page 3)

"Continued wet weather will put a severe crimp in Gray County's wheat harvest, according to Gray County Agriculture Agent Foster Whaley.

Dropout Students In State Could Reach 55,000

AUSTIN (UPI) — Some 55,000 Texas youngsters will become "dropouts" in 1965. If they are not employed or returned to school, the cost to the state will run into the millions of dollars, the chairman of the Texas Employment Commission estimated today.

"If effective action is not taken, including increasing summer and part-time work opportunities for disadvantaged youth as advocated by President Johnson in his Youth Opportunity Campaign, I submit that we will pay ten-fold in retraining as well as in unemployment insurance, welfare costs and other forms of dependency," Col. S. Perry Brown said.

The TEC is opening a full campaign to find work for these youngsters so that they can obtain "orientation to the world of work" and "personal encouragement and financial assistance that in many cases is needed to continue their education."

The efforts are in step with Gov. John Connally's proclamation of June as Youth Opportunity Month in Texas. Connally called on "all citizens and private employers, using the facilities of the Texas Employment Commission whenever available, to develop work opportunities for our young people."

Whaley said today the County's wheat crop is in the critical stage due to the four day rains and if a drying-out period didn't start soon the wheat would start to fall.

The weatherman didn't appear to be helping any either. More thunderstorms have been forecast for Pampa and the Panhandle tonight and Tuesday.

Showers moved into Pampa about 5:30 a. m. today, dumping .11 of an inch in the city. Sunday's high was 78 and the overnight low was 55 degrees.

Temperatures Tuesday are expected to range in the middle 80s and tonight's low in the mid 50s. Whaley said hail damage had been slight in the northern part of the county. However, in the southern part hail damage has run as high as 30 per cent.

Moderate losses have been sustained on both dry land and irrigated wheat from reduction and test weight and shattering. Whaley said most farmers were very concerned about the extended wet spell. Further losses are anticipated if wet weather continues.

"With four to five more days of wet weather we can expect wheat to start falling. In addition to losses to grain harvesting expense is also increased. Weeds also take over in a hurry with continued wet weather," Whaley said.

Most ranchers are jubilant over the rain that has definitely been a drought breaker. Some ranchers are reporting up to as much as seven to eight inches of moisture within the last rainy spell.

Thunderstorms built up rapidly and unexpectedly over North Central Texas today and the U. S. Weather Bureau placed a 120 mile-wide band of the Southwest from Wichita Falls to near Shreveport, La.,

under a severe weather forecast until late afternoon.

The area covered from 11 a. m. until 5 p. m., included much of North Central Texas, all of Northeast Texas, South Central and extreme Southwest Arkansas and extreme North-

west Louisiana. "A few severe thunderstorms with large hail and locally damaging windstorms are expected in an area along and 60 miles either side of a line from Wichita Falls to 20 miles south-

Barry Calls for LBJ To Let Army Run Viet

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Barry M. Goldwater, the 1964 Republican presidential nominee, says President Johnson should "stop trying to be general" and let the military decide strategy and tactics in Viet Nam.

The former Arizona senator also said Sunday night in a television interview that the Reds should be put on notice that Hanoi itself could be bombed unless they gave in.

"I fully think that if we do this that some time in the early winter or fall Hanoi will say they have had enough and they won't take that next step," Goldwater said.

Goldwater said that he would favor attacking Red China's nuclear production if the Chinese Communists came into the Viet Nam war, but he added he did not think nuclear weapons were necessary in the war "that we are fighting over there."

"I would certainly think it would be to the advantage of the United States and all the free world for us to destroy China's limited atomic capability if China gives us the provocation," he said. "We just can't do it willy-nilly."

Goldwater's criticism of Johnson came when he was asked whether he thought the U. S. objective in South Viet Nam should be a negotiated peace with a likely Red double-cross or a military victory that involved a gamble on enlarging

Rights Marches Called Off

CHICAGO (UPI) — Astronauts James McDivitt and Edward White received a warm-hearted, riproaring salute from miles of cheering Chicagoans today. Civil rights groups called off plans to mar the celebration with demonstrations.

CHICAGO (UPI) — Astronauts James McDivitt and Edward White flew to Chicago today for a rip-roaring civic reception threatened by civil rights demonstrations.

The space twins landed at O'Hare International Airport for the first stage of a daylong welcome which Mayor Richard J. Daley promised would be "the most sensational, magnificent, dramatic, and enthusiastic in the history of our country."

A million Chicagoans greeted the astronauts in their parade down Michigan Ave. to Cety Hall. So did civil rights demonstrators, who have been arrested by the hundreds in street sit-downs protesting alleged racial discrimination in Chicago schools and against Chicago School Supt. Benjamin C. Willis.

The National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP), announced during the weekend it was withdrawing from the mass protests. Leaders of other civil rights organizations, however, said they would march again today.

"We will act in relation to the astronauts," said Al Raby, a public school teacher and one of the leaders of demonstrations that have seen hundreds of persons arrested since Thursday. "We plan to demonstrate in a manner which will bring the attention of the whole country to the city of Chicago, and at the same time not embarrass the civil rights movement," Raby said.

He said plans for demonstrations do not indicate "any lack of respect for the astronauts," who had been invited to participate but were reported to have ignored the invitation.

"It's far more embarrassing that thousands of children are going uneducated in Chicago," Raby said.

The National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, which has been in the forefront of the protest action against Willis, announced Sunday night it would not participate in today's scheduled street demonstrations. The group said it felt it could work better through the courts.

Daley, in a statement issued by his special events director, Jack Reilly, said, "the mayor can't conceive of anyone in Chicago so un-American that they would do anything to ruin the reception for these two great Americans."

Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey will also be here for the reception.

U.S. Forces in Viet Offensive Position

SAIGON (UPI) — A combat-ready battalion of U.S. Army paratroopers assembled today at an airfield about 20 miles south of embattled Dong Xoai. The move put American ground forces in an offensive position for the first time in the Viet Nam war against the Communists.

A U.S. military spokesman said the paratroopers were moved up to Phuoc Vinh "at the request of the government of Viet Nam."

An official announcement here said that South Viet Nam's military officers had formed a national leadership committee composed of 10 general officers who have assumed control of the country. The announcement said the chairman and highest-ranking member is Defense Minister Maj. Gen. Nguyen Van Thieu.

The military took over following the resignation of Premier Phan Huy Quat and Chief of State Phan Khanh Suu last week.

The official announcement gave the name of only two other generals beside Thieu, but listed an additional seven military commands that would entitle the assigned commanders to a position on the committee.

The post of secretary general was given to Maj. Gen. Phan Xuan Chieu, chief of the now-defunct National Legislative Council. Air Vice Marshal Nguyen Kao Ky was named commissioner in charge of administration.

Five days of fighting in the Dong Xoai have caused an estimated 2,000 casualties — 1,000 South Vietnamese soldiers and 1,000 Communist guerrillas.

The Texas area involved is bounded approximately by a line running from Wichita Falls to Breckenridge to Corsicana to Hemphill to Tarrant. It includes the Dallas-Fort Worth area.

An early morning thunderstorm, accompanied by hail, peppered the Paris area along the Red River, but otherwise a few showers near Sulphur Springs and thundershowers in the Panhandle were the only signs of moisture reported by the Weather Bureau.

Early morning temperatures ranged from 63 degrees at Alpine, 64 at Dalhart, 65 at Amarillo, 66 at Lubbock and 67 at El Paso and Midland to 80 degrees at Galveston.

Twenty-four hour rainfall figures ending at 6 a.m. today included .96 inches at Valley View, .62 at Gainesville, .60 at Slidell, .50 at Celina, .23 at Dallas and .17 at Rockwall—all in North Central Texas.

A tornado swooped down just south of Archer City in West Texas Sunday.

The Archer City twister caused little damage. A farm building was smashed but no one was injured.

There were no reports of damage in the Paris area.

The twister Sunday occurred while a wide swath of North Texas from near Lubbock to south of Fort Worth was under a severe thunderstorm forecast. After three hours the Weather Bureau canceled the forecast.

The rain early today in East Texas was residue from the light to heavy, but spasmodic rains that splashed in North Central Texas Sunday.

High temperatures were general Sunday with Presidio reporting the nation's maximum of 108.

Dalhart, with a relatively cool high of 81, was the coolest reporting station in the state.

Wichita Falls reported 1.51 inches of rain, Dallas 78 and Fort Worth 54.

BEATING DEATH PROBED DALLAS (UPI)—The body of Effie Jean Randall, 26, was found today lying in the blood-splattered bedroom of her East Dallas home. Police said she had been badly beaten and may have been shot. An autopsy was ordered to determine the cause of death. Police were holding one suspect pending further investigation.

Vegetable Prices Are On Way Down

WHITE SULPHUR SPRINGS, (UPI)—An Agriculture Department official said today that retail prices of fresh vegetables were on the way down and soon would be lower than a year ago.

However, George L. Mehren, assistant agriculture secretary, said fresh meat prices likely would remain pretty high.

Mehren discussed fresh vegetables and meat supplies and prices in a speech prepared for a mid-year meeting of the Grocery Manufacturers of America.

"Seasonally heavy supplies of fresh vegetables will be reaching retail markets soon," he said. "Production over the next 8 to 10 weeks is expected to be about 5 per cent higher than in 1964, and fresh vegetable prices this summer should be lower than a year earlier. Prices are already coming down."

Up 1.5 Per Cent Higher Mehren said food prices were about 1.5 per cent higher than a year ago—or about a third as much as the increase in per capita income over the same period.

He noted these increases have centered largely in fresh meat and in some fresh vegetables.

"After about two years of low cattle prices," Mehren said, "farmers today are receiving about \$6 to \$7 more per hundred pounds everywhere than a year ago. Hog prices have advanced \$5 to \$6 per hundred pounds. Retail meat prices, as a result, are about 3 per cent higher than a year ago."

Mehren said increased meat prices are a result of "two factors which tend to reinforce each other—higher personal incomes and a decrease in red meat production."

"Red meat production in May was 4 per cent below a year ago. Looking ahead cattle feeders are preparing 2 per cent fewer cattle for slaughter than a year ago. And the number of heavy cattle for spring and summer slaughter is down about 10 per cent. This means that meat supplies are not likely to change greatly and that meat prices likely will remain at about current levels but go no higher."

Mehren said that weather conditions were the dominant factor in causing fresh vegetable prices to go up this spring. He said drought in the Eastern states and a wet spring in the Midwest combined to retard vegetable crops.

SECOND TO U.S.

WASHINGTON (UPI)—A leading American oceanographer says that Russia is now second only to the United States in marine sciences and the Soviet program is "one-half to two-thirds the size of our own."

The appraisal was made by Dr. Robert S. Dietz of the U.S. Coast and Geodetic Survey. Dietz visited Russia last fall with other American oceanographers. Soviet scientists will repay the visit, possibly this fall.

SEEKS MEETING

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Sen. Karl E. Mundt, R-S.D., wants President Johnson to confer with French President Charles de Gaulle to seek a "better understanding" of American and French differences.

Mundt said in a television interview Sunday night that Johnson, whom he described as "a pretty good horse trader," would not have "much to lose at this stage of things" by meeting with De Gaulle.

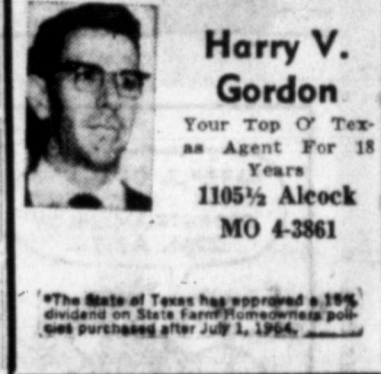

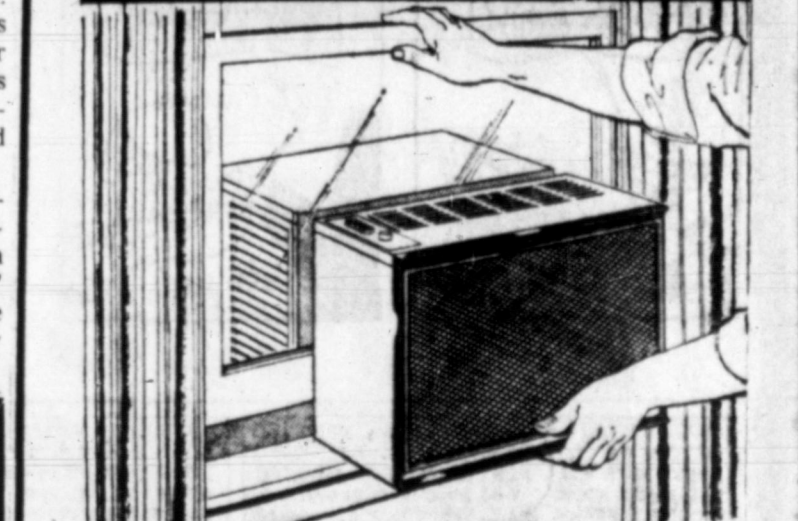

'Old Guard' Heads LA To 3 1/2 Game NL Lead

All the Los Angeles Dodgers' famed youth and speed would not be enough to keep them in first place if it weren't for the clutch heroics of Walter Alston's "Old Guard."

The Old Guard doesn't make the headlines as often as the Dodgers' young stars but they come through when the team needs them most. They did it again Sunday when the Dodgers swept a doubleheader from the New York Mets, 5-2 and 4-3, to increase their National League lead to 3 1/2 games.

Four players whose ages total 135 years — Johnny Podres, Wally Moon, Jim Gilliam and Johnny Roseboco — supplied the key pitching and hitting before 57,125 at New York's Shea Stadium — largest crowd in the majors this season.

Podres, 32, made a rare relief appearance when the Mets filled the bases with one out in the ninth inning of the nightcap and preserved the one-run lead by retiring Roy McMillan and Charley Smith on foul popups. Moon, 35, had climaxed the Dodgers' two-run winning rally in the top of the frame with a double that drove in Ron Fairly.

Delivers Key Hits
Gilliam, 36, and recently reactivated from the coaching ranks, delivered a key hit in each game while Roseboco, 32, capped the Dodgers' four-run fourth-inning outburst with a double. Claude Osteen received credit for his fifth victory in the first game and Ron Perranoski was credited with his second win in the nightcap.

Ron Swoboda, the Mets' 20-year-old "hope of the future," went 3-for-6 with his 13th homer, a triple and a single.

The Dodgers gained a full game on the Milwaukee Braves, who beat the St. Louis Cardinals, 4-2, but then were walloped, 12-2. The Pittsburgh Pirates nipped the San Francisco Giants, 2-1. The Philadelphia Phillies defeated the Houston Astros, 5-0, and the Cincinnati Reds bounced back from a 9-7

loss to beat the Chicago Cubs, 7-0, in other NL games.

In the American League, Chicago edged Washington, 2-1, Detroit nipped Minnesota, 5-4, New York downed Los Angeles, 3-0, Baltimore topped Boston, 1-0, and Cleveland defeated Kansas City, 5-2, after an 8-4 loss.

Triandos Four-Hitter
Gene Oliver's two-run tie-breaking single in the eighth inning and Wade Blasingame's four-hit pitching — paced the Braves to their opening-game victory. But the Cardinals returned with seven unearned runs in the fourth inning of the nightcap and romped behind the eight-hit pitching of Bob Purkey. The Braves have won 10 of their last 13 games.

Chris Krug and Ron Santo hit three-run homers and Cal Koonce went 8 1-3 innings for his fifth victory for the Cubs, but the Reds gained a split behind Joey Jay's five hit pitching in the nightcap. Frank Robinson drove in three runs with a double and a single for the Reds in the second game. Billy Williams homered for the Cubs in the opener.

Vernon Law scored his fifth straight victory after starting the season with five consecutive defeats when he pitched a three-hitter against the Giants. Law scored the winning run for the Pirates in the seventh inning when he singled and tallied on Bill Virdon's triple. The victory was the Pirates' 20th in their last 23 games.

Big Wilt Hit With \$750 Fine

NEW YORK (UPI) — Wilt Chamberlain, unlike most authors who must contend with verbal criticism about their writing, was fined \$750 by the National Basketball Association Sunday for an article he wrote last April entitled "My Life in a Bush League."

The 7-foot-1 Philadelphia 76er star drew heavy criticism from NBA President Walter Kennedy who termed the article "detrimental to the best interests of the league." Kennedy, and others connected with the NBA, contend the article contained "many inaccurate statements of fact, all of which drew conclusions from an erroneous premise."

Chamberlain himself was dissatisfied by the way the magazine treated the article and last April made a statement that he was contemplating legal action against the publishers.

The NBA, not wanting to interfere and possibly prejudice the case, took no action at the time against Chamberlain. But the huge center failed to take legal action, so the NBA levied its fine.
