Tags Go on
Sale Monday**

PI 1969 License Tags

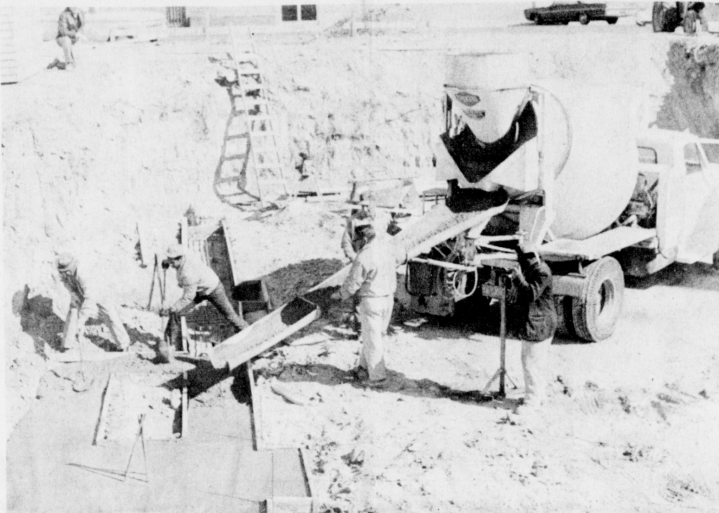
License tags for automobiles, trucks and other vehicles will go on sale at the tax assessor's office on Monday, February 3, according to Jean Lovelady, county tax assessor.
The 1969 tags are white re-reflectized background with black letters. This means that oncoming headlights will "light up" the plates for easy visibility and identification.
This year's numbers begin with BYD300-BYD999, BYF999 and BYJ0-BYJ249, Commercial tags will begin with BK350-IK4474 and farm truck tags will be 8D1350-8D2549.
Tags must be installed on vehicles by midnight March 31. Vehicle title registration plus last year's tag receipt are required to obtain the 1969 plates.

In December of 1968, preliminary papers were approved by the Texas State Farmers Home Administration in Temple, which authorized a completion of the final loan docket for the Muleshoe Labor Housing project.
The final loan docket was resubmitted on January 14, 1969. On January 21st, 1969 the loan docket was returned to the Muleshoe FHA office for some additional information.
Clinton Kennedy, local FHA manager said the additional information that has been requested is now being obtained and final papers are to be resubmitted to the Temple office in the next two or three days.
The proposed Labor Housing project is to consist of 14 buildings. The plans call for 12 apartment buildings that will have a total of 72 family units, one building to have an office, storage and dormitory. The remaining buildings to be the manager's residence and one family unit.

The total cost of the project is estimated to be \$384,000, of the amount \$294,000 is to be a FHA loan and \$290,000 is to be a Federal Grant.

Area Cotton Meeting Slated Wednesday

LUBBOCK.—The third annual meeting on the production of quality cotton sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service will be held at the Koko Palace here at 9:30 a.m. on Wednesday, February 5. A top slate of speakers will be on hand to discuss the current cotton production situation for the South Plains.
Headlining the event will be a discussion by Dabney S. Wellford, top economist with the National Cotton Council. Wellford's address will touch on the overall outlook picture for cotton in 1969 to include domestic and foreign consumption as well as mill demands

and promotional efforts to increase the consumption of this area's top cash crop.
Of vital interest to area cotton producers is the development of new and better adapted, high quality producing varieties. Discussing this aspect will be Dr. Levon Ray who is in charge of the cotton breeding program at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Center north of here. Ray will stress the need for continued production of a high quality cotton which South Plains producers are quite capable of growing as shown by the tremendous change to long staple varieties

clude marketing, lowering of production costs and use of scientific instruments for measuring the various quality characteristics of cotton. All cotton classing will eventually be done by instruments, and the effects of such classing on cotton producers will also enter into the discussion.

In announcing the appointment, Mutscher said that Clayton's service in the Legislature for the past three sessions and his experience as a Chairman of other committees during the 59th and 60th Legislatures will prove to be invaluable to the Committee and to the House of Representatives.

Artificial Recharge May Solve Problems

A new idea in the design of an artificial recharge well may eliminate or reduce the problem of sand pumping, one of the major problems in multiple-purpose wells.
Studies on an artificial recharge well involving this new design are being conducted by the High Plains Research Foundation at Halfway, a number one exponent of water recharge as one of the solutions to the High Plains water problems.
In tests conducted on a multiple-purpose well installed in January of 1968 northeast of the Barwise community in Floyd County, sand pumping after water was recharged was not increased significantly as with some multiple-purpose wells.

According to Jim Valliant, Foundation soil scientist, no increase in the amount of sand pumped by the tailwater recharge well may be due to the use of a Green Machinery Co. "shutter screen" perforated well casing placed in an inverted position (openings pointed up instead of down) in the middle section of the multi-purpose well.
Valliant said that samples taken before recharging showed the multi-purpose well producing .66 pounds of sand per 1,000 gallons of water.

The well was recharged with water containing 3.30 pounds of sand per 1,000 gallons.
"One and a half hours after pumping had resumed, water

samples contained 2.80 pounds of sand per 1,000 gallons and at the end of five hours the amount of sand being pumped was reduced to .88 pounds per 1,000 gallons." Valliant said, sand that the sanding problem occurred when sand in the Ogallala Formation was "stirred up" by the force of water being recharged.

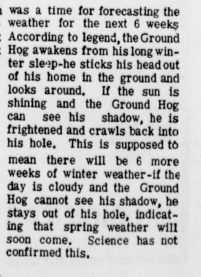
"Since most well casing is perforated with vertical slots, pressure exerted by gravity and water falling into the casing causes water to 'jet' into the underground sand formation," Valliant said.
The uniform "shutter screen" perforation, perfected by the Green Machinery Co., when installed in an inverted position, offered a possible solution to the "jetting" problem by forcing the water to enter the underground formation under pressure of 25 to 30 degrees from vertical fall and with reduced force.

"Results from this study indicate that when we were recharging at rates of 655 gallons per minute, with this new well casing, the amount of sand pumped was less than that contained in the recharge water," Valliant said.
Although this "inverted casing" idea appears to have worked well, Valliant said this was the first study and would be repeated this year after re-plant irrigation and again after this season's crops have been harvested.

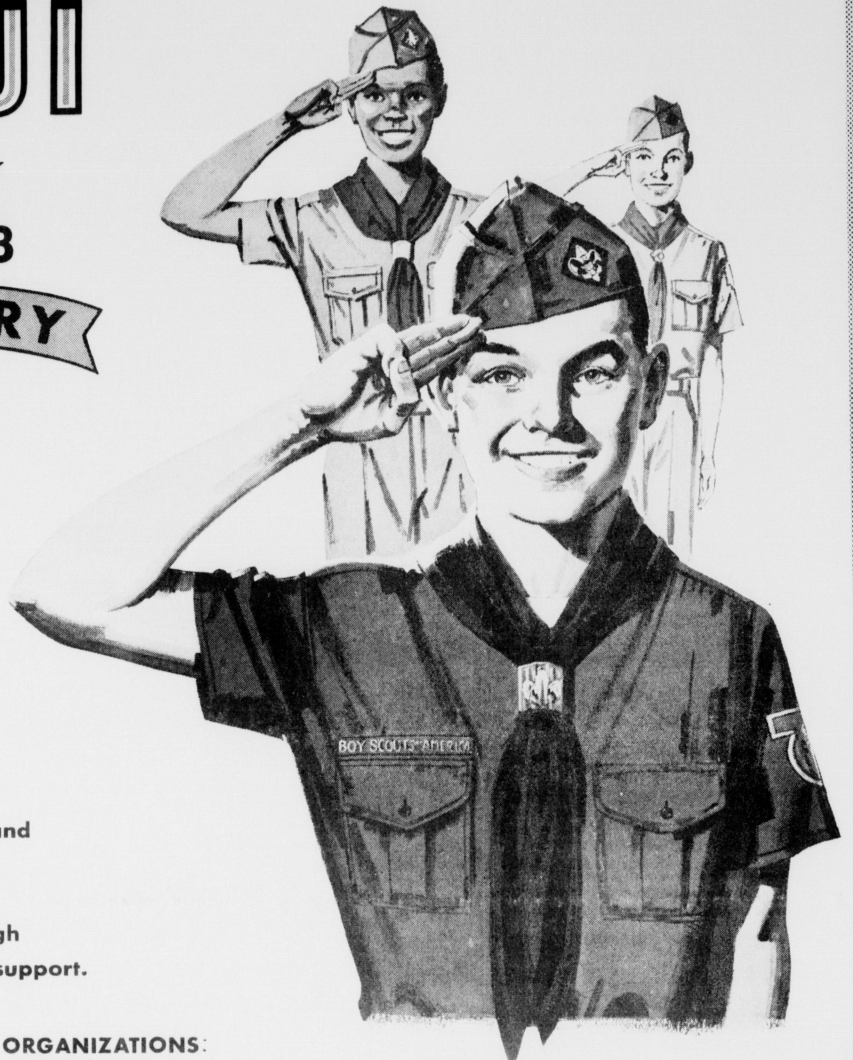

A well rounded person, while helping at church and school, she was a member of a home demonstration club and at the same time "kept house nicely and sewed beautifully and always helped on the farm. She is half of that team, they are just a pair."

Long time friends recall periods of illness when the Arns came regularly to see that they were supplied with water and other necessities. In seeking for words to describe Verda Nell, one friend said she is a "strong, steady, 'Verda Nell', very straightforward and unpretentious."

Another long time friend said, "When the vicissitudes of life which hit every family come, she is always optimistic."

Mrs. Dearing Hosts Circle

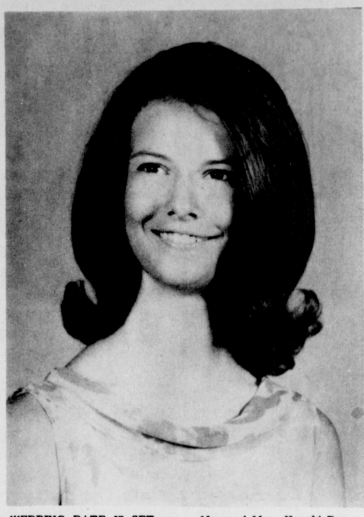

POINTS ON POINSETTIAS

In response to a recent letter pertaining to the care of poinsettias, my desk is overflowing with information from many readers. My thanks to you all and to the Extension Service of Rutgers University.

To all those who would like to keep those gorgeous holiday plants, the following information will be helpful.

After the leaves have fallen, rest the plant by moving it into a basement or attic and place it in a well-ventilated spot where the temperature will range from 45 to 55 degrees F. Each week give it only about a cup of water to keep it from drying out entirely.

In late spring the stems will start to show new growth. This is the time to repot the plant. Remove all of the old soil from the roots and repot it in fresh, rich soil. Use the same pot or one only a size larger than the previous one. Put in an inch or broken pieces from flowerpots or pebbles into the bottom for good drainage. Root the plant in the pot using a good rich soil mixture and after repotting, cut the plant back to within 3 or 4 inches of the soil. Place it in a light, warm place and water it moderately until new growth starts in earnest. Continue to water the plant moderately, do not get the soil too wet.

When the weather becomes settled and no more cold or frosty days are expected, set the plants out into the garden, burying it in the soil up to its rim. Water and feed the plant through the summer so it makes good growth.

When the weather starts to get cool in the fall, bring the plant back into the house and keep it in an airy room where the plant will get plenty of sunlight. The best room temperature is 60 to 70 degrees F. Keep the temperature from varying and keep the plant out of drafts.

Nursery News

LAUNDRING BY A.L. WOODBURN GARDEN CENTER NURSERY CLOVIS, N.M.

We often hear the expression "I would like to have a garden, if I had time to plant it". Speaking of time to plant, we will go into the time to plant in this area. Of course the better gardeners have already spaded or otherwise cultivated the flower beds, vegetable plot and some of the other areas for annuals. It is some better to add plant food before the operation but is better to add it after than to miss the plant food entirely.

There are some of us who will use the ground hog for an excuse to do what we want to anyway and others will go ahead and get ready anyway. Another "sign" to watch is the timing of Easter. It is the first Sunday in April this year. This is some ten days ahead of our average last killing frost.

After the preparations are made and other factors considered, we can plant a variety of vegetables during the month of Feb.-yes Feb. Spinach, "English" or some varieties of garden peas and some of the other more hardy greens plants March is time to put out onions and the latter part of March we can plant a number of plants in the more protected places by using hot caps. April is the larger planting month and usually considered finished by May.

Some of the flowers should have already been planted to give maximum bloom this year. Sweetpeas, allysium, phlox and dianthus are among some of these. Some of the warmer natured plants such as petunias, ageratium and a variety of others need a soil temperature of around 60 to 65 degrees.

A number of plants can be secured in the "bedders" and planted later and still give good results. Some seem to like the idea in that they can wait until later and start gardening. Most greenhouses have a better means of keeping plants in the bedders than the average house or home. For that reason, a number of people will wait until along in April to buy and then suddenly try to catch up on the gardening. Adv.

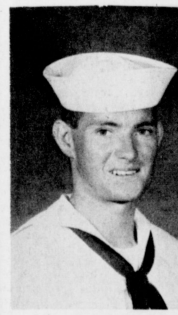

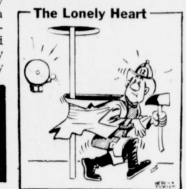

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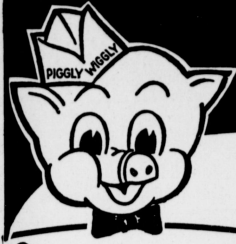
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
