Officials Await Message On Viet From Ghana President

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Administration officials today awaited the arrival of a special message on Viet Nam from President Johnson from President Kwame Nkrumah of Ghana. But there was no evident expectation it would move the war closer to the conference table.

The Ghana government made the dramatic announcement of the pending more complete information on the nature of the message. But there was considerable skepticism concerning the possibility of any major breakthrough in the bloody conflict.

The message was being carried to Washington by Alex Quaison-Sackey, Ghana's foreign secretary, who was scheduled to arrive in New York early today then proceed on to Washington as soon as arrangements were made to receive him.

NEW YORK (UPI) — Americans in Saigon walk down the streets heads slowly scanning right and left like spectators at a tennis match to make sure the innocent looking pedestrians alongside them will not turn suddenly into Viet Cong assassins.

"It's a pretty frightening place these days," said Stephen Fleischman, award-winning writer-producer who is busy preparing an ABC-TV documentary, "The Agony of Viet Nam," for broadcast Aug. 25 (8:30-9:30 p.m. EDT).

Fleischman spent several WEEKS IN THE Viet Nam cap and in the battle areas filming the story behind the military headlines. His assignment was not primarily the conflict itself — ABC considers that its news teams are covering that fully. "We wanted to know among other things how the people of South Viet Nam feel about the war," Fleischman said, "and how they feel about Americans. We filmed the first interview ever given television by the American commander, General Westmoreland. We also spoke to Premier Ky, to retiring ambassador Maxwell Taylor, to the man-in-the-street, to practically everybody but the water buffalo.

"We have some film we made ourselves of South Viet Nam villages in the war zone and some Communist Viet Cong film of their army in action. We will give the background of South Viet Nam, its people and its history but we will not draw any conclusions about whether this war can ever be won or where it may lead us.

"We think the viewers can make up their own minds."

Fleischman said the South Vietnamese were interviewed for the program in their own language. A translation will be spoken over the native voices. He feels the speakers come closer to their true thoughts in their own tongue than they do when trying to struggle with English — unless they are bilingual.

Fleischman said American advisers have a low opinion of the fighting heart of the South Vietnamese and are apt to call the native soldier "Marvin the Arvn" (an abbreviation for Army Republic Viet Nam). It is not a compliment.

2 Brothers Sought In Policeman's Death

GARY, Ind. (UPI) — A massive search centered in this Indiana steel city today for two brothers sought in the slaying of a veteran Chicago police officer.
Authorities in Illinois, Wisconsin, Michigan and Iowa were also on the lookout for the two men. The Federal Bureau of Investigation entered the case Thursday.
Chicago police said Richard Black, 20, and his brother, Horace, 21, were believed hiding in Gary. They were last seen in Gary by a cousin of the two men who drove them there Wednesday night. Earlier that day, Sgt. Charles Eichorst, 43, was shot down while searching one of two holdup men at a northwest side supermarket in Chicago.
Gary police conducted a "room by room" search through 36 hotels and rooming houses Thursday but failed to turn up a trace of the fugitives.
Edward Barsley, chief of detectives, said the search was continuing. Police were staked out at likely hideouts and at the homes of relatives of the brothers in Gary.
Gary police Det. Harlan Boyce said about 35 officers were running down leads Thursday night. He said the police department had been flooded with telephone calls from persons who believed they saw the brothers.
The two bandits, both Negro, fled after Eichorst was shot and killed. A giant search was started with helicopters and canine corps dogs, but the brothers slipped through the dragnet.

Ford Calls For LBJ to Discuss Viet in Congress

WASHINGTON (UPI)—House GOP Leader Gerald R. Ford, in the latest chapter of his political exchange with President Johnson, thinks the President should ask Congress to declare war on North Viet Nam.
"It would be the honest thing to do under the circumstances, considering our present commitment," the Michigan Republican said in an interview Thursday night.
Ford said, however, there might be "extenuating circumstances" under which Johnson should not ask Congress for a declaration of war. He said such circumstances would include the detrimental effect a declaration could have on peace negotiations through the United Nations or elsewhere.
But in any case, said Ford, "the President should come before Congress and lay his cards on the table. . . if there are extenuating circumstances, Congress should be told."
The GOP leader's comments marked the second time Thursday he took aim at the White House in the continuing squabble over various aspects of the Viet Nam situation.
Earlier in the day, Ford sent Johnson a letter requesting a post mortem on Johnson's charges last Sunday of a Republican betrayal.
The congressman asked Johnson for a meeting to explore how the President could have been "erroneously informed" of a violation of confidence stemming from a secret White House briefing for congressional leaders last week.
The White House, however, said that Johnson "has no plans to see Congressman Ford."

Last Sunday Johnson charged that a "prominent member of another party" had broken and distorted his confidence. He referred to news stories about the briefing or its plans for the stepped-up U. S. commitment in Viet Nam.
All eyes immediately focused on Ford, who was known to have held a "background" session for newsmen on the briefing.
But Ford denied the charge and said the President had been mistakenly informed if he

Hush Falls Over A-Bombed City

HIROSHIMA, Japan (UPI)—A hush settled over this normally bustling city at 8:15 a.m. today, 20 years to the minute after it was devastated by the first atomic bomb ever used in combat.
Traffic stopped in the streets and normal activity came to a standstill as Hiroshima's 500,000 people observed a minute of silence in memory of the 78,000 victims of the atomic blast.
More than 30,000 persons gathered before the curved, flametopped memorial in a downtown park that marks the center of the disaster zone.
Mayor Shinzo Hamai, appealing for peace on earth, opened a memorial vault and placed in it a book listing the names of 499 bomb victims identified within the past year. The list includes 69 who died during the year from after effects of lethal radiation two decades ago. It is the 17th such volume in the vault, which contains the names of 61,443 identified victims of the bomb.
Members of two rival anti-bomb conferences took part in the 30-minute memorial observance.
National and municipal officials laid wreaths on the memorial site. Stark and grey in the background stood the skeletal ruins of one of the few buildings left standing by the bomb.

the terrible walls which imprison men because they are different from other men."
Johnson said he has requested the Justice Department to work through the weekend so that by Monday morning it could designate the many counties where past experience clearly showed that federal action would be necessary to register voters without discrimination.
He said when the prospect of discrimination is gone, federal examiners would be withdrawn. Any county that does not want federal intervention need only open its polling places to all its people, he added.
The bill signing ceremonial was rich in memories of Lincoln and attended by the Rev. Martin Luther King and other Negro leaders prominent in this century's civil rights struggle.
Johnson's trip to the Capitol recalled a similar journey made by Lincoln 104 years ago to the day when the Great Emancipator signed a bill freeing Negro slaves who were being used to aid the Southern rebellion.

The President today spoke to the nation in a televised appearance from the rotunda of the Capitol before going to the historic "President's Room" just off the Senate chamber to sign the voting measure.
Lincoln worked in the same room just 104 years ago and, like Johnson, had his cabinet around him. But Johnson also had millions of persons, in the United States and abroad, watching over his shoulder via television.
The bill Lincoln signed was little more than a gesture. On Aug. 6, 1861, the government of the United States was in no position to enforce an emancipation law. Only two weeks earlier, its armies had been routed at First Bull Run, and Washington was trembling at rumors of Confederate advances.
The measure today was something else again. Backed by the resources of the strongest national government America has ever known, the Voting Rights Act of 1965 charted a course aimed at eliminating, without further delay, the long-standing barriers Negroes have had to face on their way to the ballot box.

Two Bills By Rogers Nearer Final Approval

Two bills by Rep. Walter Rogers of Pampa—one making the name, "Lake Meredith," official and the other establishing a national monument on its shores—were a step closer to final approval today.
A Senate sub-committee has approved and reported both bills out for action on the Senate floor.
The House approved both pieces of legislation in July. Early action and approval is expected in the Senate.
One bill will give Lake Meredith its official name. The other will create a national monument at the site of the Alibates Flint Quarries on the shore of the lake.
Two weeks ago the National Park Service, which will supervise the recreational areas of Lake Meredith, recommended that the Meredith site be elevated to the status of a national recreation area.
When Rep. Roger's bill gets its final approval in the U. S. Senate it will mark the establishment of the first national monument in Texas.

Burdens—And Faith And Hope

There are the "destroyers" and the "fulfillers," those who encourage and those who discourage, and surely there will be an added reward and satisfaction for those who encourage, for those who lift, for those who help others bear their burdens. The degree of burdens ebbs and flows, but all of us have them. There are burdens of sorrow, accident, illness; the burden of debt; loss of jobs; loss of loved ones. There are days of disappointment, days of deep discouragement. But blessedly, with time, and with the help and understanding of others, the acuteness of our problems tends to lose some of its sharpness. And in all these things we should sustain and comfort and encourage one another. "What do we live for," asked George Eliot, "if it is not to make life less difficult to each other?" "We can easily manage, if we will only take each day, the burden appointed for it," said John Newton. "But the load will be too heavy for us if we carry yesterday's burden over again today, and then add the burden of the morrow to the weight before we are required to bear it." Among the hardest of the burdens to bear is the burden of a heavy conscience, the burden of knowing we have cluttered our lives with things we shouldn't have done. Heaviest of all is the burden of sin—a burden which requires change and transformation within ourselves, and reconciliation with others, if we are to live in peace and self-respect. Blessedly, even with this burden there can be repentance and improvement, and a return to hope and faith for the future. President Is Pleased With Latest Employment Figures

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Johnson is "extremely pleased" at the nation's latest employment figures, which show that more than half the 2.9 million teen-agers flooding the labor market last month found jobs.

The Labor Department, in releasing the figures Thursday, said the rate at which youngsters had been able to find jobs was an unexpected degree of success.

Officials termed the teen-age job trend the major factor in an unusually bright employment picture for July. Employment reached a record high of 74.9 million and unemployment sank to a seasonally adjusted rate of 4.5 per cent, the lowest in eight years.

While noting his pleasure at the improvement, Johnson said in a statement that unemployment among teen-agers and non-whites was still too high.

"This unnecessary waste of our manpower must be cut," the President said.

The Labor Department said 6.5 million teen-ages were at work last month, a 1.6 million

TV Director, Rock 'n' Roll Idol in Wreck

CHATHSWORTH, Calif. (UPI)—A television director and a rock 'n' roll idol who figured prominently in a television special for Sargent Shriver and President Johnson's youth opportunity program were among 17 persons injured Thursday in a train wreck.

Director Barry Shear, 42, and Jan Berry of the Jan and Dean team, played key roles in the CBS television presentation, "It's What's Happening, Baby," which aired earlier this year to attract teen- aged school dropouts to the federal program.

Shear directed and Jan and Dean appeared on the 90-minute show, filmed at remote locations in New York, Detroit and on the West Coast. Shear also had directed a special for NBC television, "The Live Ones."

The accident happened when a train smashed into a railroad flatcar during filming of a movie scene under the aegis of paramount studios.

Attendants at West Park Hospital, where all of the injured were taken except Berry, said Shear of Studio City had possible internal injuries.

Berry was driven to the Northridge Hospital by a passing motorist. He had a compound fracture of the left leg.

Three ambulances took 16 of the injured cast and crew of "Easy Come, Easy Go" to West Park Hospital.

Police Hunting 2 Men in Deaths Of Two Coeds

AUSTIN, Tex. (UPI)—Police concentrated today on a search for two men they think dumped into a Goodwill Industries collection box a number of items which belonged to slain University of Texas coeds Susan Rigby and Shirley Ann Stark.

It has been one week since the nearly nude bodies of the Dallas beauties were found in a weed-covered field.

Martha Blount, who was to have roomed with Miss Rigby, identified a straw purse, desk lamp and suitcase as Miss Rigby's.

Detective Maj. K. R. Herbert said police are now trying to find out who put the items—and possibly some pots, pans and clothes—in the charity box.

An Austin bank teller told police she saw two men with dark features shoving items into the box shortly before midnight last Saturday. Then, she said, they got in a light-colored late model convertible and sped away.

That would have been more than 24 hours after the bodies were found.

Herbert said the position of the goods in the bin indicated they were placed there about the time the woman saw them. The collection bin where the items were left is in a section of the city far away from all other evidence in the crime.

"There are people who are very close to this investigation who have some theories," Herbert said. "We feel we are making some progress. Some things are being eliminated."

Herbert declined to specify what had been eliminated—or where the areas of progress were.

NAMES GWIAZDA WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Johnson has named Henry J. Gwiazda, a probate judge of New Britain, Conn., as chairman of the National Selective Service Appeal Board.

He also appointed Thursday as members of the board Dr. Kenneth W. Clement, a Cleveland, Ohio, surgeon, and Charles N. Collatos, of Massachusetts, commissioner of veterans services.

Gwiazda has served since 1961 on the board—the final panel in all appeals for deferment on exemptions from the draft.

PLEADS GUILTY LEWES, England (UPI)—George Norman, Southern England's "one man crime wave," pleaded guilty to 335 offenses in a court here and was sentenced to serve eight years in prison.

The United States apparently has concluded Russia does not have enough leverage in Hanoi at present to persuade North Viet Nam to risk Red China's wrath and talk peace.

U.S. officials, when speculating privately on Russia's possible role in peacemaking, now talk mainly of whether the Kremlin can be induced to join some United Nations effort.

This switch from the previous emphasis on the possibility of driving a wedge between Hanoi and Peking came after roving Ambassador W. Averell Harriman's two long talks with Soviet Premier Alexei Kosygin.

Propaganda Line Harriman's subsequent report to President Johnson on his latest mission to Moscow was described by high officials as an elaboration of his earlier cabled reports. In these he said he had found Kosygin simply repeating the standard Soviet propaganda line, demanding the United States pull out

from using its veto power. Anxious For U.N. Move Administration officials are anxious to get some U.N. move under way if at all possible.

They face the prospect of another and probably more intense "neutralist" peace offensive touched off by Premier Lal Bahadur Shastri of India and President Tito of Yugoslavia.

Tito and Shastri early this week called for a cessation of U.S. air attacks on North Viet Nam to create what they consider a necessary climate for a Geneva peace conference on Viet Nam.
