VERTICAL JET

MUNICH, Germany (UPI) — West Germany's Dornier aircraft works Tuesday unveiled what it hopes will be the world's first vertical takeoff jet transport.

The 10-Jet D031, designed to carry about seven tons of cargo and take off and land vertically or from limited runway space, has not yet been flown but has been thoroughly tested on a stationary stand.

MILITARY STRENGTH

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The armed forces recorded an increase of 35,640 men during October, bringing combined strength to 2,759,440.

The Defense Department said Tuesday that the Army and Navy gained more than 14,000 men each, the Marines more than 5,000 and the Air Force more than 1,000. The Army now has 1,016,921, the Navy 704,811, the Marines 203,811 and the Air Force 833,897.

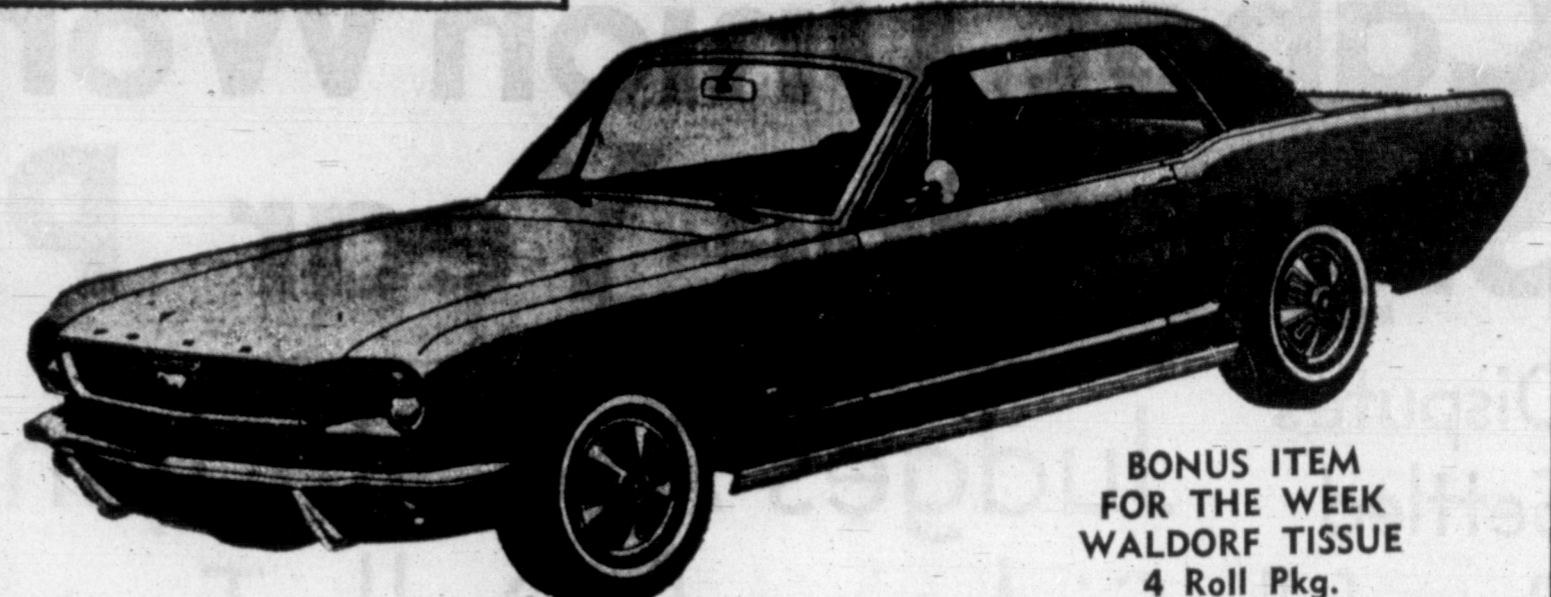

Food Buying Guide
EDITOR'S NOTE: The following guide to the nation's food shopping buys for this weekend was prepared by the U.S. Departments of Agriculture and Interior for United Press International.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Weekend shoppers should find plentiful quantities of vegetables, meats and fruits.

Check for specials in the meat sections. Harvests of nuts and vegetables continue in the South and in the West, giving a good selection of main dish choices.

Beef headlines the meat plentiful in most areas, with special emphasis on ground beef and steaks. Pork follows with chops, roasts, and hams in good supply. Lamb roast should be a good buy.

Broiler-fryers and turkeys are in bountiful supply. They are reasonably priced in most sections of the country.

This weekend eggs are not only plentiful, but they have become a good budget item to add to the shopping list.

Plentiful in the vegetable section include broccoli, cabbage, carrots, cauliflower, celery, corn, greens, lettuce, mushrooms, onions, potatoes, radishes, rutabagas, squash, sweet potatoes, and turnips.

In the fruit section, apples, bananas, grapefruit, lemons, oranges, and tangerines are in good supply. Put a special plus mark next to pecans and frozen orange juice on your list of special buys for this weekend.

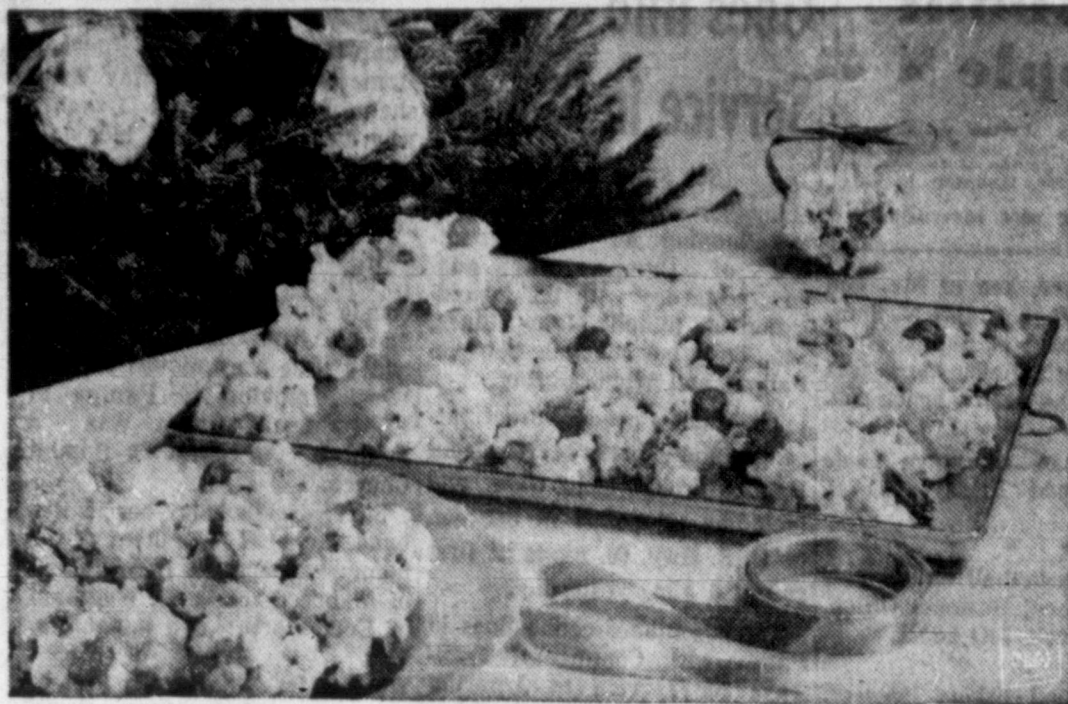
Nationally, fish sticks and portions, canned tuna and canned red salmon are the best fish buys.

Peppermint Popcorn Trims Tree

Something different for the Christmas tree — peppermint popcorn balls with pecans, almonds and candied cherries, wrapped in cellophane and tied with red ribbon.

It's a fun idea, really, and these remarkable popcorn balls make distinctive Christmas gifts, also.

PEPPERMINT POPCORN
10 cups popped corn
2-3 cup pecans
1-3 cup toasted blanched almonds
Candied cherries, cut up

(optional)
2-3 cup light corn syrup
16 regular marshmallows sifted
1 pound confectioners' sugar
2 tablespoons water
1/4 teaspoon peppermint extract
Spread popcorn, nuts and cherries in 2 greased jelly roll pans or large trays. Combine corn syrup, water and about 1 cup confectioners' sugar in medium saucepan. Cook over low heat, stirring constantly, until sugar is dissolved. Gradually add remaining sugar. Cook over low heat, stirring constantly, until mixture comes to full

boil. Add marshmallows; stir until melted. Remove from heat. Pour mixture over popcorn, nuts and cherries. Toss until all is well coated or when cool enough to handle mold into balls. Let set at least one hour. Break apart into clusters and store in tightly covered containers. Wrap balls in cellophane and tie with a ribbon.

A slightly flared lamp shade gives a better spread of light than a straight or drum-shaped shade.

Expectant Mother's Diet Costs More

Q — Our family food budget is limited. I expect my baby next March and, of course, want to eat the kind of diet that will insure my baby and me good health. Will an adequate diet for me cost more than when I was not pregnant?

A — Yes. According to government experts on cost of feeding a pregnant woman for one week for a 20-to 35-year-old woman living in a family of four (June 1965 figures):

(Low-Cost Plan) Pregnant woman — \$7.80 (Moderate - Cost Plan) \$10.10 (Liberal Plan) \$11.30.

(Low-Cost Plan) Not pregnant — \$6.60, (Moderate - Cost Plan) \$8.70, (Liberal Plan) \$9.90.

A — We use a lot of avocados in our family but have heard that there will be very few on

the market because of damage done by hurricane Betsy. Is that true?

A — No, because the California harvest will meet expected demands, according to Ralph Pinkerton, manager of the California Avocado Advisory Board. It is reported that hurricane Betsy left 500,000 bushels of avocados on the ground in Florida, only a small portion of which is salvageable. Florida growers had succeeded in marketing only about 10 percent of their expected crop before Betsy hit. But the crop now on California trees is sufficient to meet all normal market requirements nationally. At prices expected to remain firm, the California avocados will start moving in volume soon, including shipments to markets usually supplied by Florida growers.

More Than Youthquake to British Designs

NEW YORK (NEA) — If you are a ready-to-wear designer and happen to hail from London, it seems you're automatically lumped with Britain's youthquake — the mod look that is rapidly taking over here.

This has happened to 32-year-old Jean Muir, designer for Jane and Jane, a leading British ready-to-wear house. And it makes her angry.

"I DON'T make clothes for teen-agers," she said. "Most of my dresses are bought by women between 25 and 45."

Miss Muir was in New York on a short visit last week and she admitted that the one question that cropped up again and again was: "When do you think British fashion is going to make clothes for mature women?"

"You know," she said, "I have been asked this so many times recently on my tour of shops in Boston and Philadelphia. Why does everyone think that we all design only for the very young?"

"I think the reason people assume that my clothes are for teen-agers is that I don't use stiff fabrics such as those often

used by the Paris couturier. I don't think women should walk around feeling encased. And I only hope the women who wear my designs feel happy, free and pretty in them no matter how old they are."

Having met Jean Muir in London and seen her clothes at her showroom this summer, I can understand her pique at being included in the current youth fad. Her designs are young, but they are not ingenuously and they certainly aren't kooky. They are a marvelous combination of femininity and sophistication. And she does have a way with soft British wool and chiffon.

"Maybe because my skirts are short it is thought I design for teen-agers. I don't mind if the women who buy my clothes wear them at the knee. I don't think skirts for anyone should be below the knee," she said. "But two inches above is only for young girls."

Since the boom in British fashion is new and has made such terrific impact on America I asked Jean how long she thought it might last.

She thinks it's just about over and that Seventh Avenue will now make its own interpreta-

tions. But she feels the London imports have had a great reception here.

"When I was in New York last year, girls were wearing high heels and skirts were a little longer than I was used to. But this time the girls on Fifth Avenue looked more like the girls on Regent Street."

Most of the young London designers, including the popular Mary Quant, are now manufacturing in America. Jane and Jane exports to us but manufactures only in England. I asked Jean Muir why.

"Well, I think it is important to keep the 'Made in Britain' label on everything we do," she said. "I don't want to sound too patriotic, but I do believe Britain makes some of the best fabrics in the world — especially British wool — and I love to work with them."

Some of Jean Muir's sportier clothes in wool have stockings of the same fabric and pattern. I asked whether she thought textured stockings were more in demand in England than here.

She feels that perhaps more girls in England wear them (it is colder there) but that we have a much greater variety.

"The point, of course," she said, "is to know when and what they are in good taste." Miss Muir, whose first job in

fashion was at a sales counter at Liberty's on Regent Street, still uses many of Liberty's printed fabrics in her collections. She graduated from selling to sketching there and later joined Jaeger as a designer.

She left Jaeger for the now internationally famous Jane and Jane, which was created to produce and sell her designs. And from its inception it has been a success. Official recognition of Jean Muir's contribution to British fashion came in March 1965, when she was presented with the Ambassador Award for Achievement by Princess Margaret.

Because of the current vogue for the young, uninformed sources mistakenly presume that success in fashion, as in pop music, must be related to way-out things. Jean Muir's success is firmly based on the premise of beautifully made clothes for women who understand fashion. She is British. She is young. But she is not part of the youthquake. You don't have to be a little girl to wear her clothes.

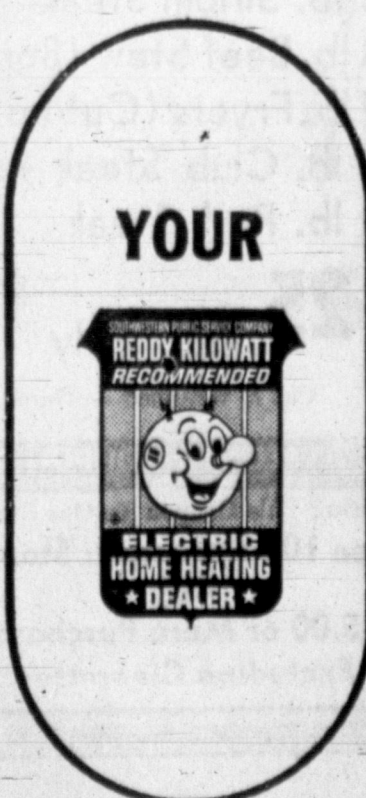

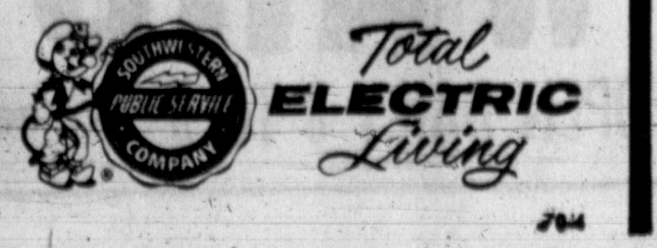

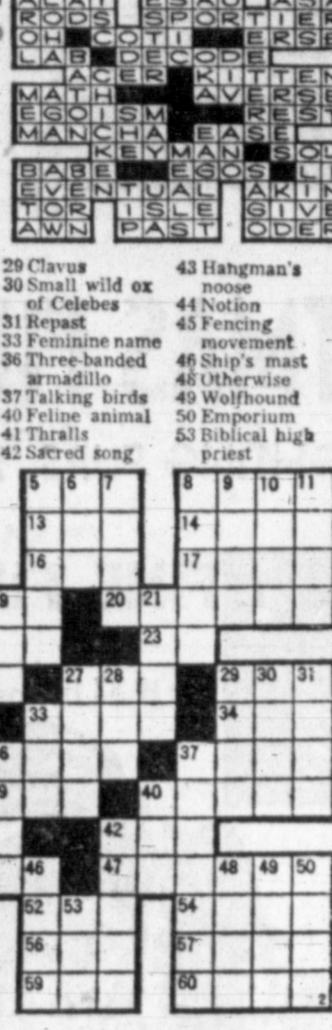

Planes, Soldiers Mar Beauty of Ancient Cuzco

Ten thousand feet up in the Peruvian Andes, a statue of the Christus gazes down upon Cuzco, ancient capital of the Incas.

Cuzco's cathedral stands upon the ruins of an Inca temple and to Cuzco's public market each day, bearing for sale bananas, other fruits and vegetables, come the Indians who still speak the Quechuan tongue of their Inca ancestors.

High above Cuzco and the statue, almost daily, planes of the Peruvian air force streak northward to machinegun and plaster with napalm suspected hideouts of Communist guerrillas who seek the violent overthrow of the Peruvian government in the same manner that they also seek it in Venezuela, Colombia, Ecuador and Bolivia.

Elite, U.S.-trained Peruvian rangers pursue the guerrillas on the ground, seeking them out in

nearly inaccessible ridges and plateaus.

Gradually, the government appears to be winning. But a measure of the difficulty may be seen in the government's 30-day extension of a state of emergency first proclaimed last July.

When Peru's athletic President Fernando Belaunde came into office in August 1963, he brought with him a dream desperately needing reality.

On the surface, Peru prospered. But it was a prosperity enjoyed only by Peru's approximately 2 million whites, enjoyed not at all by the country's 10 million Indians, most of whom lived in the high Sierras.

In and around Cuzco, the descendants of the proud Incas earned perhaps 17 cents a day and forgot their cold, hunger and fatigue with the help of the narcotic coca leaf.

They were the special far

Peking-sponsored Communists mixed in with a sprinkling of Trotskyites.

Geographically, Peru is divided into three parts—the coast, the Sierras and the jungle. Most of the Indians live in the mountains, the whites on coast and the jungle lies almost uninhabited. But within the jungles are rich soils, timber and minerals. Between the three there are almost no communications.

It was Belaunde's dream to bring the country's 10 million Indians inside the economy, to give them land and to build roads which in turn would open the way to education and a better standard of living.

In his sun-filled study in a suburb of Lima in 1963, Belaunde laid out for this correspondent the maps explaining his \$500-million dream. It was a 3,000-mile road which would link Colombia, Ecuador, Peru and Bolivia, opening up 2,000 square miles of virgin

land.

To further his plan, the United States provided \$40 million under the Alliance for Progress.

But \$500 million is a lot of money to come by in Latin America and time is pressing.

In December 1963, 1,500 Communist-led Indian peasants attacked a farm in Cuzco province, attempting to take over the land. Eight persons were killed and 22 wounded. In the face of mounting terrorism, Belaunde finally declared his state of emergency.

In the end, Belaunde must have his road. But meantime, his dream remains a nightmare.

WASHINGTON (UPI) —The Committee for a Sane Christmas Policy met at my house one evening this week to review the situation.

The first item on the agenda was the escalation of Christmas cards. As chairman, I called on the vice chairman for a report.

"All of the cards we ordered with our names printed on them have been addressed and we are still at least 15 short of the number required to meet our present commitments," she said.

"Can't something be done to stop this buildup?" I asked.

"First it was 50. Then 75. Then 100. This year the quota jumped to 150 and now that is being called inadequate."

"Our involvement is a matter of principle," she replied.

"As long as friends, neighbors, old college chums, Army buddies and the like keep sending us cards, we have no choice but to retaliate."

Negotiate Sending

"Couldn't the exchange be limited by negotiation?"

"In theory, we are willing to negotiate at any time. But it is difficult to initiate negotiations without creating the impression that we are soft on Christmas."

"How about a unilateral withdrawal?"

"That almost surely would have far-reaching consequences. According to the 'domino theory,' if we stopped sending Christmas cards we wouldn't get invited to New Year's parties."

"Doesn't this steady enlargement of our Christmas card list produce counter-actions that will only lead to additional increases later?"

Beginning Of Sending

"A few years ago, we ordered 75 cards when we only had 60 names on our list. That was the point of no return. How so?"

"Rather than waste 15 cards we added 15 more names to the list. However, we still received 10 more cards than we sent. Those names brought the list to 85, so the next year we ordered 100 cards."

"Why did we order 100 cards when we only needed 85?"

"They are cheaper that way."

"This year we ordered 150 cards and we are 15 short. Does that mean we now have 165 names on the list?"

"No, we only have 150 names, but we are stockpiling 15 cards for emergency use."

"At this rate, we will soon run out of names. What happens then?"

"We will have to draft some from the telephone directory."

The Committee for a Sane Christmas Policy stands adjourned.

Bureau Invades Religion

That busy, busy Department of Health, Education and Welfare is moving into a new field—that of religion.

The magazine These Times reports that a research grant from that department, fastest growing of all the federal bureaucracies (our description, not theirs), has been granted to the Lutheran Medical Center, Brooklyn, for a psychological and linguistic study of glossolalia, or speaking in tongues.

Though the theological implications of the Biblical phrase "speak in tongues" is open to dispute and has been interpreted in a number of ways," says the magazine, "many churches today accept it at its face value and speak in tongues—tongues that are translatable, it is reported, by only those who have been given 'divine ability to do so.'"

But These Times raises a question: "Does the government have the right to investigate or at least financially sponsor such an investigation that has to do with religion?"

When whole communities have been torn apart by such spiritually less precise issues as prayers in the public schools or bacalaureate services or Christmas carol singing, it is nothing less than baffling that Federal funds would be used to delve

into so specialized a phenomenon as speaking in tongues. It would make as much sense for HEW to pay for a comparative study on the second coming."

School for Mules

The Labor Department has got this little problem up in Maine. It's going to have to run a school for mules.

But, we don't want to get ahead of the story. You see, it all began when the Labor Department launched its current drive to use American labor instead of foreign labor wherever necessary. While this has increased unemployment in Mexico and Canada, it has allegedly lessened it here.

Many trees in Maine, under a World War II agreement, are felled by French-Canadian lumberjacks. The French-Canadians are axes at a time, cutting, being able to chop one so that it falls within an inch of the desired place and all that. After the war, when there was no real shortage of lumberjacks, there seemed little reason to change a happy arrangement.

Now, however, lumberjacks will be brought from the great Northwest, Oregon and Washington to cut the trees in Maine. Whether this is practical is beside the point. Of more interest is that the woods of Maine are full of mules, all of whom understand commands only in French.

The mules are used for hauling the trees out of the way, etc. And, as any old skinner can tell you, getting a mule to do anything calls for a pretty good command of the language—any language, French, English or blue.

Theft Defined

A reader interested in but puzzled by the philosophy of the Freedom Newspapers, recently commented: "You people are always pontificating about theft being wrong no matter where, or for what purpose, or by whom committed. Just what do you mean by theft, anyway; how do you define it?" Well, that brought us up rather short; we had assumed that most people know what theft is. Actually, and we replied to the reader in this vein, our definition of theft is amazingly simple. However, to fully grasp the total meaning of the definition,

it must be prefaced by two other definitions: of property and ownership. Property consists of an individual's life, his body and mind, and all they combined are capable of producing plus what that individual may obtain from another in voluntary exchange. Ownership consists of the control of property. Theft, then, is defined as the involuntary transfer of the control of property.

EVERYBODY'S BUSINESS Scrambling Chicks Usually End Up Getting It in Neck

By now, the comment is widespread that the Washington Authority will switch policies in an endeavor to avert abrupt price increases.

The problem involved here is both political and economic. It is political in that spending programs, once launched, can hardly be reversed without damage to the party in power, but if allowed to continue will result in price increases so dramatic that they will arouse popular resentment.

The economic aspect of the problem is that the Washington Authority, faced by such a dilemma, will seek to head off price increases by permitting rises in interest rates and possibly by resorting to a hike in reserve requirements.

Switches in Washington policy are dangerous. Some businessmen may not understand what is going on and move in the wrong direction at the wrong time. Or something else might happen, like an excess housing inventory, that combines with the monetary move to produce an exaggerated and dramatic effect that damages business confidence. Or the Washington Authority may move too far or too slow.

Moral: The business that solves the marketing problem while other firms scramble after easy pickings will have the jump on the flock.

The defect of a managed economy is that managers don't always guess right, and some are worse than others.

Generally, it is conceded that Washington has an economic role to play, but there is general disagreement on what that role ought to be. What happens, for instance, when the Authority decides to stimulate the economy by spending is not readily understood, and many financial observers are perplexed.

My opinion is that they are perplexed because they overlook the simple and the obvious. To see what happens, let us envision a flock of chickens pecking away at a feed trough. The farmer comes along, picks up a handful of grain out of the trough, and scatters it on the ground.

Immediately the chickens leave the trough and scramble to retrieve the scattered bits. Now the farmer has not added to the amount of chicken feed; he simply has re-distributed that which already was there. The consequence of his action is a spectacular flutter and activity as each chicken tries to get more than he thinks he would be pecking away at the trough in an orderly manner. The farmer indeed has stimulated activity, but he has not stimulated wealth.

Perhaps the foregoing is not a complete picture of what happens the fact that young men are still buying wedding rings, and young ladies are still filling hope chests.

They aren't called hope chests nowadays, of course. They're called sweetheart chests, hope being one of those four-letter words not used in polite society at present.

BUMS AWAY!

The State Department, caught redhanded, has now confessed that it rejected a year ago an offer to enter into peace talks with the North Vietnamese. Thus the Johnson administration has been caught rejecting the peace talks it claims it wants. And some people are terribly upset. So what's new? The Kennedy administration made "news management" a fine art and the Johnson administration took up where the Whiz Kids left off. Why not lie to the people? As Senator Fulbright has opined, the people are incapable of understanding foreign affairs anyhow.

Secretary of Defense McNamara, the Disarmament genius, has told the Country that there was no connection between the administration decision to sell its stock pile of aluminum on the one hand, and the aluminum industry's prior "decision" to raise aluminum prices on the other.
