Sensing the pyschologic-al situation, Mr. Alphonse said: "But you must not die within two weeks, for you owe some money, and it will take at least three weeks for you to pay me back. He convinced him that he must pay him, and he had two helpers to work along with him the whole time. Nothing was sa.d in doubt or contradicition to the dream he had had. But he was expected to pay the debt before he died. The two weeks passed — and then they were able to laugh at his superstition.

A Christian woman at Nhome Mission had a spell cast upon her, and she lay on the grass mat of her hut until she died, although the Dr. said there was absolutely nothing wrong with her.


