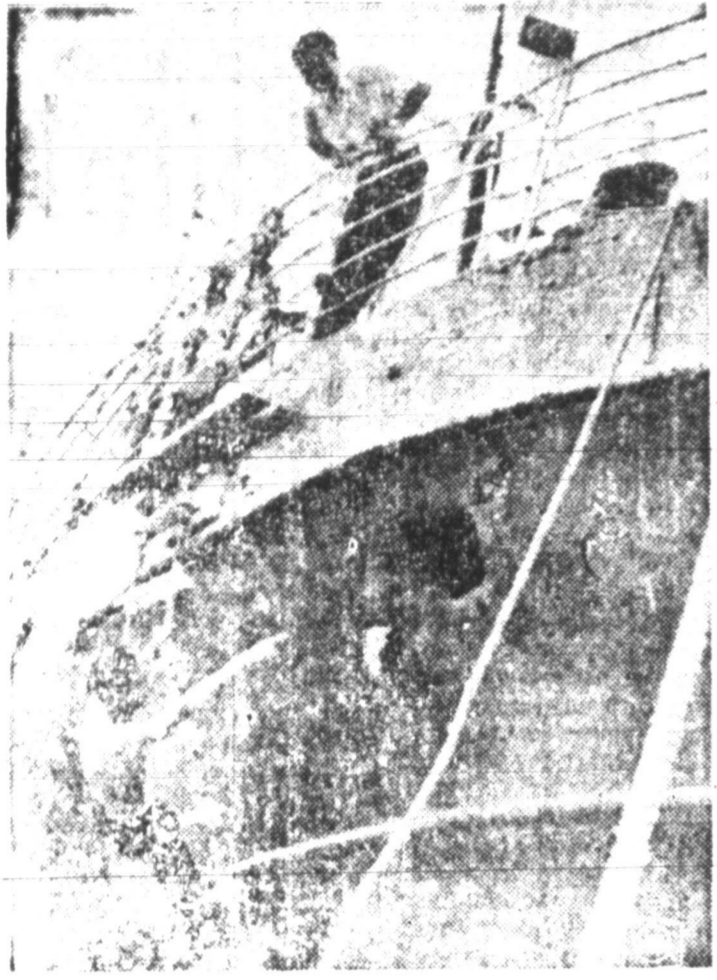

Texas who failed to pay their poll tax have another chance to register for a vote in the 1966 elections. This time it's "free!"

Registration period extends from March 3 through March 17. Any citizen eligible to vote can sign up with his county tax assessor-collector and his name will be placed on the poll list at no charge.

So reads the "emergency" provision in the new voter registration act just passed by the Legislature and signed into law by Gov. John Connally.

Hereafter, free registration will take place from October through January each year.

There is one possible hitch: Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr fears that names of those who sign up during March won't be available for local elections already slated on bond issues, local option liquor questions, etc. He asked the three federal judges who banned the poll tax to put off their order until Mar. 26.

Estimates of the number of Texans who will take advantage of the free right to vote vary widely — from 50,000 to 1,000,000. Any figure approaching the latter could make a substantial difference in the outcome of many local and some statewide elections. Indications are that the number of new voters will be nowhere near that high, however.

All who paid poll taxes by January 31 will be entitled to vote as usual, without re-registering.

PECOS SULPHUR BOOM — Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler compares reaction to the recent Pecos County sulphur discovery with California's Gold Rush days of 1849.

He said "operators are moving in both day and night attempting to locate and file

claims on state-owned land... to mine sulphur."

Sadler declined to accept 50 cents an acre per year for sulphur leases when, he stated, leading sulphur operators paid up to \$2,000 an acre bonus for five-year leases in a recent federal sale off the coast of Texas.

State School Land Board rejected a rash of filings under an 1895 claim law. Board set a sulphur lease sale, along with oil and gas bidding, for May 3.

APPOINTMENTS ANNOUNCED — Governor Connally appointed Hill County Attorney Steve Latham of Hillsboro to succeed Sam Johnson, resigned, as judge of the 66th District Court of Hill County. Latham formerly practiced law in Wichita Falls.

Governor chose former District Attorney Dan Walton of Houston as judge of Harris County's Criminal District Court No. 4, succeeding the late Judge A. H. Krichamir.

Connally's appointees to the new Texas Air Control Board are Clinton Howard of Irving, Henry J. LeBlanc Sr. of Port Arthur, Herbert Whitney of Corpus Christi and Dr. Wendell Hamrick, John Files and Dr. Herbert McKee, all of Houston.

Bob Cheatham of Texarkana and Clifford Hensley of El Campo were named by the Governor of the Texas Real Estate Commission.

WATER DEBATE RE-HEARD — Supreme Court of Texas has taken under advisement a long-standing dispute between city of San Antonio and cities in the Guadalupe River basin.

San Antonio is appealing a 1957 Texas Water Commission decision. Ruling denied the Alamo City's application for 100,000-acre feet of water a year from Canyon Dam near New Braunfels and awarded 50,000-

acre feet from the reservoir to Guadalupe-Blanco River authority for municipal use downstream.

Attorneys for San Antonio claimed the city must import 138,000-acre feet for its needs by 1980. Meanwhile, Guadalupe basin will have a surplus over necessities of 180,000-acre feet.

GBRA attorney denied a surplus is in sight. He said some cities, including Seguin and Port Lavaca, already have suffered from serious shortages.

Major legal point involved is whether the Commission can delegate to GBRA rights to release water to unspecified municipal users, while denying San Antonio's application to pipeline water from another basin for high priority city and domestic needs.

AG RULES — Attorney General has ruled that Texas Highway Department may grant the owner and operator of overweight mobile equipment, which transports frac oil in oil well servicing, a permit for the movement of the equipment.

In other actions he ruled that: —A county attorney isn't authorized to bring ouster proceedings against a city under the general laws of Texas.

—A chain referral selling plan to promote sales, containing a prize awarded under the element of chance, is a lottery in Texas.

—A County Clerk may use one or more volumes, properly labeled and indexed, to constitute "a well-bound book" to meet the requirements recording deeds, leases and declarations.

—Vehicles owned by an individual must be registered by law in the county where he lives.

—Fraternal or Veterans Clubs may legally sell alcoholic beverages to members on the prem-

ises without a special license.

—New act calling for deposit of justice of peace court fines and fees in officers' salary funds of counties is constitutional.

—Funds appropriated to National Guard Armory Board can be legally spent for addition to the building at Camp Mabry in Austin subject to necessary agency approval.

—Harrison County juvenile board or commissioners court has no authority to hire a secretary for the county juvenile officer, but can hire a child service worker with added duty of secretary.

—State Board of Control still has supervision of the Battleship Texas Commission.

ELEVEN TEST FOR BRUCCELLOSIS — Eleven counties—Atascosa, Brooks, Coryell, Falls, Hamilton, Hood, Jack, Limestone, McLennan, Milam and Roberts — are testing for initial brucellosis eradication certification.

Borden County has qualified for recertification.

During Jan., 16,331 back-tagged cattle originating in Texas were tested at slaughter. A total of 18,202 cattle were tested at Texas livestock markets for return to the county, and 284 reactors were disclosed.

According to a U.S. Department of Agriculture report, the screwworm eradication program in Texas has been successful. Only 75 cases were confirmed in January, as compared to 237 cases for the same period last year.

VISITORS INCREASE — Attendance at 22 Texas vacationland attractions increased 13 percent last year, with total admissions of 30,403,000.

Six Flags over Texas rated as top tourist stop with 1,713,000 visitors, drawing by 446,000 San Antonio's Alamo, according to

Tourist Development Agency. Biggest percentage gain was marked by Bishop's Palace on Galveston Island. Big Bend National Park reported another big increase, as did the Aquarena at San Marcos, Old Stone Fort of Nacogdoches, Fort Davis National Historic Site and Padre Island.

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BUILDING SALES DROP — Texas building and retail sales dropped during January. However, both December and January still were above the first month of 1965.

UT's Bureau of Business Research reported total retail sales in January off 28 per cent from a record December — due largely to the "greater-than-seasonal rise" during the Christmas month. Nevertheless, retail

stores generally posted gains of two per cent over January a year ago.

Building permits for the first month of 1966 dropped a whopping 22 per cent below December and four per cent below the 1965 average. But the \$1332,000,000 total was 16 per cent over January, 1965.

SHORT SNORTS — State Railroad Commission set hearing for March 21 on proposal to extend discovery allowable period for onshore oil wells to 24 months (from present 18). Governor approved \$116,048 Project Head Start Program in

Hidalgo County (for Mission, McAllen and Monte Alto public schools) and \$86,525 program for Abilene public schools.

All phases of the poverty program will be discussed at a briefing for the press to be held by the Southwest Regional Office of OEO at the Driskill Hotel in Austin on March 10-11.

Governor Connally has received delivery of the first official car ever provided the Chief Executive by Legislative direction.

Connally Charges Senators Trying To Run Military

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Texas Gov. John Connally charged "a handful of United States senators" on the Foreign Relations Committee wants to dictate military strategy and tactics "with neither the knowledge nor the authority to do so."

In a speech prepared for delivery to the National Petroleum Council, Connally urged support of President Johnson's foreign policy and took a slap at Sen. Robert Kennedy, D - N.Y. "A few days ago we saw on television the hearings of the senate foreign relations committee deteriorate into a public spectacle in which the President's top advisors were branded as warmongers for daring to say we were determined to defend South Viet Nam from aggression of Hanoi," Connally said.

NASSAU, Bahamas (UPI) — A policeman toppled from his motorcycle Monday while taking part in a police display for Queen Elizabeth II and Prince Philip on the second day of their visit to Nassau. The royal couple and many in the crowd of 20,000 smiled as police Constable Harrison Lockhart got up and dusted himself off. He was not hurt.

Defense Hints At Decorator As Possible Slayer

MIAMI (UPI)—The defense put before the Mossler murder jury today the image of a six-foot, 200-pound, dark-haired man named Fred Roy Weissel as the possible slayer in the crime the state says was committed by Melvin Lane Powers.

"I don't tell you Weissel killed this man," defense attorney Walter Gwinn said in his summation. "I say he might have."

Gwinn said that Weissel was found bloody and beaten, with cuts on his hands "exactly six miles from Governor's Lodge, which you can reach in four or five minutes if you're in a hurry."

Weissel, Coral Gables interior decorator, turned up at a city sewage disposal plant about the time of the pre-dawn murder of multi-millionaire Jacques Mossler, June 30, 1964.

Powers, 29, and Mossler's widow, Candace, 46, are accused of first degree murder in the slaying. The state alleges they were motivated by a burning incestuous love affair and their greed for Mossler's banking millions.

Powers was seen, according to the testimony of a bartender, in a lounge at the entrance of a causeway leading to the Key Biscayne murder scene less than an hour before the 1:45 a.m. slaying. Gwinn told the jury that the lounge was "about five miles further" from Mossler's apartment than the sewage plant.

set the value of the 800-pound shipment at only \$207,000.

The theft was not discovered until an Air Canada official called to inquire about the shipment at midnight—two hours after the Transair plane from Red Lake had landed.

The Air Canada truck, reported stolen earlier in the evening, was found abandoned less than three miles from the airport hijacking scene.

"Those two either knew what they were about or they were awfully lucky," a Royal Canadian Mounted Police officer said.

"It was almost a comedy of errors, it was all so easy," an RCMP officer said.

Both the RCMP and Winnipeg's city police admitted they had no clues and only "the sketchiest" of descriptions.

The two men were described as in their 20s, one slim, and the other "beefy and ruddy-complected." Along with the Air Canada parkas, they sported the white pants normally worn by freight handlers.

The bars of gold bullion, under government inspection and seal, were crated in 12 wooden boxes, each measuring 12-by-5-by-5 inches.

'Diseases We Fight' Discussed By Mrs. Chafin for La Cultura Members

"Diseases We Fight" was the program topic chosen by Mrs. William Chafin when she presented the program to La Cultura Club members recently.

The club met in the home of Mrs. Kenneth Friemel with Mrs. C. D. Mitchell, president, presiding.

Mrs. Davis Plunkett led the Federated Club Collect. During the business session standing reports were heard, the upcoming Guest Day Tea was discussed and those present voted to purchase a sustaining membership for the local Girl Scout Association.

"Disease," Mrs. Chafin began, "is departure from good health. Until the Second World War disease killed more servicemen than battle casualties.

"The United States has several contagious diseases of which, measles, chicken pox, whooping cough, diphtheria, mononucleosis and influenza are most serious. Today vaccines and immunization schedules prevent many of these.

"Emotionally induced illness is a common problem resulting from prolonged inner-tensions which cause chemical upsets in the body. Such problems as ulcers, strokes, and asthma can sometimes be counteracted by replacing tension with positive attitudes toward people and situations," the speaker stated.

"Heart disease is most often caused by arteriosclerosis, hypertension and rheumatic heart disease. It affects more men than women but can be prevented to some extent by smaller diets with low cholesterol and decreasing of tensions."

Cancer was discussed to some extent including the danger signals and regular checkups.

"Your prevention of disease depends much on the initiative you take in guarding your family from known diseases by taking advantage of known preventive measures," Mrs. Chafin concluded.

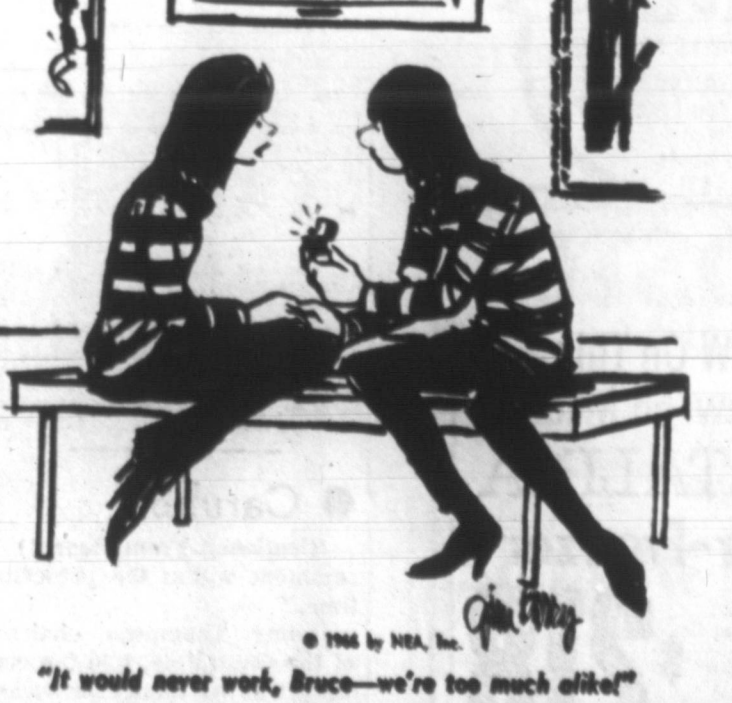

The March issue of the "Lawn Care Magazine" has an interesting article written by Dr. Joseph E. Howland, editor. He says, "Many years ago, I was entertaining visitors from Europe and as is customary, I asked them what has impressed them most about the United States. I expected they would name our skyscrapers or the Grand Canyon or Niagara Falls. Not at all. They said, "The lawns around the houses!"

"This puzzled me a bit until I went to Europe. Then I realized what they had meant. As you walk down a street over there you don't see any lawns at all. They are hidden behind hedges and fences and brick walls. And when you do find them they're the size of a pocket handkerchief.

"Here, in America, our lawns are big and broad and open and inviting. Put them all together and you'd have a green carpet that might be as big as our national park system. And just as we cherish our parks and our forests, so we should cherish our lawns, never allowing ourselves to take them for granted. If we want to preserve them for physical and spiritual refreshment, we must protect them. They are the nearest, most intimate of all our green assets.

"Stand at the end of a street in any American town. The houses may be large or small, new or old, or all mixed up as to age and architecture. But see how the green of the grass frames them in dignity and unites them in friendliness.

"You'll notice, too, that the vast majority of the lawns are neat and tidy. For although we rarely make mention of it, we seem to know by instinct, that good lawns make good neighbors, and good neighbors, good neighborhoods."

In observance of Arbor Day and to encourage young people to plant and care for trees a Johnny Appleseed Club is being formed. The requirements are: 1. Members must be school age, first grade through twelfth. 2. Purchase tree and be ready to plant in own yard on April 9. 3. Evidence accumulates that two of the three big issues on which the Republicans will challenge the Democrats in this year's congressional elections will be:
—High cost of living.
—High cost of government.
The third big issue, of course, will be President Johnson's conduct of the war in Viet Nam. But the Republican approach to the cost of living and government and the issue of war in Southeast Asia is likely to be subtly different. Congressional Republican can heat up the issues of living and government costs in the House and Senate, in committees and on any street corner where an audience can be assembled.

On the issue of war in Southeast Asia, the Republican are likely to sit by while angry congressional Democrats debate among themselves on war and peace in Viet Nam. This battle among the Democrats is helping to establish in the public mind the fears and lack of confidence on which the Republicans will seek to capitalize next November.

For their own part, the Republicans apparently intend to support LBJ's war while demanding more aggressive prosecution and victory. If the public is tiring of war costs, war casualties and war news, the Republicans will have good voter bait such as campaign offers to shorten the war with honor. The Korean war helped turn the Democrats out in 1952. The war in Viet Nam might repeat against the Democrats this year and for some time after.

Meantime, food prices are up at market check-out counters. That will be the basis of the Republican campaign against the High Cost of Living (HCL). HCL is the ideal campaign issue because nobody can be in favor of it. It can be argued, of course, that the issue does not exist and that the cost of living in fact is not high.

Such arguments are a sure loser if the womenfolk believe food prices are up. It is difficult to argue against the fact that the wholesale price index rose by one half of 1 per cent in January after a long period of comparative inactivity. That represents an increase of 6 per cent on an annual basis if the January rate continues. A 6 per cent increase in the wholesale price index would be so inflationary as to be unacceptable.

If prices continue to rise, LBJ surely will propose more taxes as a brake on currency inflation, which would hold the price line. There is no indication, however, that the Great Society will impose pay-as-you-go economy on government. Pay-as-you-go would compel the government to live on tax revenue instead of on borrowed money. The deficit spenders of borrowed funds have been nudging living costs higher for more than 30 years. LBJ is indulging in more of the same.

In the five Kennedy-Johnson years since President Dwight D. Eisenhower left the White House the public debt has risen about \$30.5 billion. The average annual Kennedy-Johnson deficit to date has been \$6 billion.

LBJ has budgeted for a \$1.8 billion deficit in the next fiscal year but his figures are challenged on grounds that the budget is gimmicked with income derived from sale of federal assets. Estimates of the real deficit likely to flow from LBJ's latest budget program range up to \$10 billion if the gimmicks were eliminated. It is likely to be several billions more than \$1.8 billion in any circumstances.

Western Scientists Fear Soviets Contaminated Planet Venus

 WASHINGTON (UPI)—The life we discover on Venus some day may turn out to be our own.

Some Western scientists, at any rate, are afraid the Russians planted earthly microbes on Venus when they hit that planet Tuesday with a 2,000-pound spacecraft.

If they did, and the microbes flourish, mankind may have lost forever its chance of finding out whether life independent of earth's ever developed in the Venusian environment.

The Western fears may be

groundless. Soviet scientists at many an international space conference have shown themselves to be as concerned as others about the possibility of contaminating other heavenly bodies.

Soviet politicians, however, may not share that concern.

or, at least, they may put a higher price on the propaganda value of getting somewhere first than they do on the scientific value of preserving a planet's biological purity.

Much depends on whether Soviet spacecraft confirm U.S. indications that Venus is too hot to sustain life. America's Mariner 2, which sailed past Venus in 1962, reported radio findings that the planet's surface temperature might be around 800 degrees, higher than the melting point of zinc.

If Venus is that hot, it doesn't make any difference whether the spacecraft that hit it was

sterile when it left earth. It was thoroughly serIALIZED the moment it crashed.

Many of our best scientists, however, have come to doubt false readings. Venus may be even a better bet than Mars as a site for extraterrestrial life.

If Russia's spacecraft support this idea—and it may be months before Russia tells—

the scientific world will demand to know how well Venus 3 was sterilized.

To sterilize a spacecraft inside and out, and leave it still able to fly is extremely difficult. U.S. space officials blame many of the early Ranger moon photography failures on the debilitating effects

of sterilization.

No Ranger successes occurred until the sterilization rules were relaxed on the theory that microbes from earth could hardly contaminate much of a body that possessed neither air nor flowing water.

Johnson Feels Reds Only Hope Is Negotiations

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Johnson said yesterday that the Communists in Viet Nam must know by now that total victory is beyond reach and that their only hope for peace is through negotiations.

"Let them not suppose that our desire for peace springs from weakness or hesitation," the President said. "It springs, rather, from a further recognition of our knowledge that the search for peace also requires great skill and great courage."

"If there are others, however, who do want peace and if it is equally true that total victory is beyond expectation for them—as they must now know it is—then there is only one answer: Negotiate peace and let war stand aside while the people of Viet Nam choose. For our part, we will be willing to abide by the outcome."

The President delivered his warning to the North Viet Nam regime at a ceremony in the East Room of the White House, observing the fifth birthday of the Peace Corps. Jack Hood Vaughn was sworn in as the corps' new director, succeeding Sargent Shriver.

Britain To Make Currency Change If Labor's Back

LONDON (UPI) — Britain will switch from the pound sterling to the decimal system if the Labor government is returned to power in the March 31 general election, Chancellor of the Exchequer James Callaghan said.

He said the proposed change would be made in February 1971.

The pound (presently worth about \$2.80) would be retained as a major unit but divided into 100 smaller units.

The issue is a major one in the controversy over whether criminals are being coddled by the judiciary.

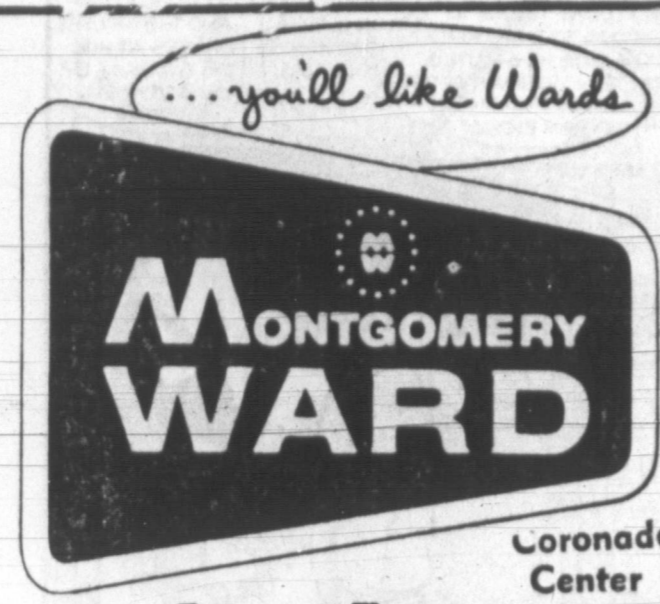

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Business Highlights

PITTSBURGH—United States Steel Corp. raised the price of many plate products 2 per cent effective Thursday, reduced prices on other items and withdrew all published prices on still others. The company conceded the price shakeup would increase total revenue. It remained to be seen how the White House will react to the increases.

WASHINGTON—The Labor Department says overall consumer price levels were fairly steady during January but moved somewhat higher in February. The department also said factory take-home pay slipped in January on higher Social Security taxes and a seasonal shortening of the work week from the December pace.

NEW YORK—Spreading strikes in the industry are accentuating the copper shortage. At Ruth, Nev., a walkout of 1,000 miners slowed Kennecott's output. One of Oklahoma's seven mines has been struck and a sympathy strike looked at Anaconda's Chilean mines caused by walkouts in other industries.

NEW YORK—General Electric announced a \$20 million contract with Lockheed Georgia Corp. to design and produce engine thrust reversers for the Air Force C5A jet transport plane. G-E also participated jointly with Pratt & Whitney Division of United Aircraft and Curtiss-Wright in a \$41.75 million contract to develop a propulsion system for vertical takeoff aircraft.

Price Challenges His Opponent in Congress Contest

Bob Price, GOP candidate for congressman from the 18th district of Texas, today issued the following statement involving charges against and a challenge to his Democratic opponent who is seeking re-election:

"Our congressman and his Farmers Union supporters are attempting to blanket the 18th Congressional District with verbose press releases stressing his seniority.

"The people of this district should be ever alert for any attempt of our congressman to hide his name on the ballots among the lesser known state races. I now challenge the incumbent congressman to have his name at the top of the ballot along with other federal office candidates, where the voters can readily see it. If his name appears anywhere else it will be proof that he cannot stand on his own merits, but is trying to slip through the back door by hiding among state candidates, some of which are not even opposed by Republicans.

"Our incumbent congressman should know better than to put his son on the government payroll in a job which was created for students who needed jobs, as a part of the 'War on Poverty' as has been reported by a nationally syndicated columnist. "Our congressman should not have accepted a new automobile from one group of constituents as he did recently in Castro county. During the Eisenhower administration the opposition made a major scandal out of the acceptance of a coat and deepfreeze by a public servant.

"Our present congressman ran the weakest race of any Democrat congressman in the state of Texas in the 1964 general election and failed to carry his home town and county. He has good reason to be running scared."

Expert Warns Planet Venus Contaminated

JODRELL BANK, England (UPI)—Sir Bernard Lovell, Britain's leading radio astronomer, charged yesterday the Russians endangered future studies of possible life on Venus by possibly contaminating its surface with organisms from earth.

Lovell, director of the giant radio telescope here, also said he hoped the Russians would produce further scientific evidence to prove their Venus space probe reached the surface of the planet as claimed.

"The delivery of the probe to the surface of Venus is a vivid technological feat," Lovell said. "But it is regrettable that at this stage of our knowledge the Russians should have endangered the future biological assessment of Venus by contaminating the planet in this manner."

Lovell said by contamination he meant the risk of putting organisms from Earth on the surface of the planet which is roughly Earth's twin in mass and size.

You, Your Child and School

How important is recruitment of staff to the quality of an educational program? The quality of the teaching staff is probably the greatest single factor affecting the school program. Obviously it is most important to attract and hire the most competent teachers available.

There are many ways to recruit teachers. A school system can wait for applicants and choose the most competent from this group. On the other hand a school system can aggressively go out and encourage teachers to apply.

This second approach takes planning and money but the results can be most rewarding. What are some of the methods which good school systems use? They make every effort to make their schools known in educational circles. Staff members attend conventions. They write articles for educational journals. News releases are sent to news media.

A high level of morale is maintained with present staff members. These staff members are encouraged to talk with and invite qualified candidates to apply for positions.

Teams of professionals from the district are sent to college campuses to talk with graduates and other prospective candidates.

The residents of the district are also a source of recruiters. Community members who have a pride in their school system spread this pride to friends and acquaintances. Over a period of time an image is developed which reaches prospective staff members. They hear that the school district is a good place in which to work.

Careful thought is given to salaries, fringe benefits and working conditions. A school district need not pay the highest salary in the nation to attract good teachers. This does not mean that a good salary is unimportant. It does mean that a combination of factors will determine a

district's attractiveness to a candidate.

Aside from location, such factors as community interest in education, administrative attitudes towards staff, class size, supplies, and facilities are all important.

A good school system is not developed by chance. It takes the cooperative efforts of everyone involved.

DISASTER WARNING

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Commerce Department is earmarking \$7 million of its fiscal 1967 budget to begin work on a system which would warn communities of impending natural disasters.

In a memorandum to President Johnson Wednesday, Commerce Secretary John T. Connor said the proposed system eventually would warn hundreds of communities of approaching hurricanes, tornadoes, tidal waves, floods and other hazards. The blueprint was prepared last fall by several government agencies, he said.

Players Behind Koufax, Drysdale in Money Fight

VERO BEACH, Fla. (UPI) — The world champion Los Angeles Dodgers are behind Sandy Koufax and Don Drysdale 100 per cent — the players, that is, not the front office.

Between them, Koufax and Drysdale are asking for one million dollars spread over three years or a pair of unprecedented contracts which break down to \$500,000 apiece.

F. J. (Buzzie) Bavasi, the executive vice-president and general manager of the Dodgers, whose job it is to deal with Koufax and Drysdale, claims he isn't overly worried because "both are sensible fellows."

Still, he says their joint demand is "way out of line" and adds the Dodgers simply will have to start the season without them if they don't scale down their figure.

The existing impasse puts the rest of the Dodger players in a ticklish position. They can't come out en masse in favor of the two holdouts because the brass would frown on that. And they can't very well knock Koufax and Drysdale because they still will have to live with the two aces when they eventually do sign.

All Behind Them

Nonetheless, you only have to speak with a dozen or so of the Dodger players here in camp to discover they're rooting for Koufax and Drysdale all the way.

Before he even began negotiations Koufax' prime concern was that his teammates might feel he was being too hoggish. Sandy can forget that fear because they're all convinced he is fighting their battle for them.

"As far as I'm concerned, I hope he gets as much as he can," said veteran relief ace Ron Perranoski.

"That goes for both of them," he said, glancing up at Drysdale's locker which, like Koufax', has his uniform hanging there, ready and waiting.

"Knowing Sandy the way I do, I'm sure he's concerned about what the rest of us think," Perranoski went on. "I can tell him, though, we are behind him 100 per cent."

As an afterthought, Perranoski smiled and said:

"I hope he shows up, though. I'd hate to have to pitch 162 of those games by myself."

Outfielder Lou Johnson feels the same way as Perranoski.

"They deserve every penny they're asking," he said, dividing his attention between a turkey sandwich and some orange juice in the Dodgers' clubhouse.

"I hope they get it," Johnson said, feelingly. "Only wish I was in a position to negotiate like that. Us resent what they're asking? Baloney. More power to 'em both. I'd love both of 'em to get what they want. And they know it's not just mouthing off, it's from here."

Johnson put the container of orange juice on the seat alongside his locker and pointed to his heart.

Without a single exception, every Dodger player spoken to said he hoped Koufax and Drysdale got what they wanted.

Even a few miles down the line, at West Palm Beach,

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Beasley, Malaise Top UPI SWC All-Star Team

DALLAS (UPI)—Scoring leader John Beasley of Texas A&M, Dub Malaise of Texas Tech and Carroll Hooser of Southern Methodist put in repeat appearances on the United Press International's 1966 all-Southwest Conference basketball team announced today.

The 6 foot-9 inch Beasley who was averaging 26.7 points per game for the season and 29 per conference game going into the final week of the season, and peppertot Malaise, the smallest man at 5-11, were the only unanimous choices.

Charles Beasley of SMU, no relation to the Aggie star, and Darrell Hardy of Baylor were the other two members of the mythical team picked by UPI sports writers and conference sports publicity directors.

Beasley and Hardy, both juniors and only non-seniors on the top five, were named on every ballot, but one second-team vote kept each of them from being unanimous selections. Hooser received three second-team ballots.

With John Beasley's potent average as a key—the mythical team boasts a scoring potential of 107.1 points per game. Malaise was averaging 21.1 points, Hooser 20.9, Hardy 20 and Charles Beasley 18.4.

There was no contest for the top four vote-pullers, but Hooser had a close race for the fifth spot with Texas Tech's Norman Reuther, whose late season, ineligibility a year ago kept him off the first team and knocked Tech out of the championship.

Randy Matson, the world's champion shot putter whose late decision to join the basketball camp at Texas A&M was instrumental in the Aggies' down-to-the-wire title contention with SMU, was the top player among the honorable mentions.
