## Rusk Reiterates US Desire to Talk Peace

### Claims Chinese Reds Will Not Negotiate

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Secretary of State Dean Rusk says the United States is prepared at any time for discussions with Red China on peace in Viet Nam "but the other side keeps hanging up the phone."  
Rusk said the United States has held 129 meetings with Chinese Communist representatives in Warsaw. "We have been in touch with them on more serious subjects and more persistently than perhaps any government that has diplomatic relations with Peking except perhaps... the Soviet Union," he said.  
"But always, the secretary added, "we get no response."  
Rusk made the statement Sunday during a television interview when asked about Sen. Jacob Javits' suggestion that the United States include Peking in any unconditional discussions to end the Viet Nam war.

### Soviets Believed Testing Superior Rocket Warhead

UPPSALA, Sweden (UPI) — The Russians set off a powerful underground nuclear explosion — the second in five weeks — in Soviet central Asia at Semipalatinsk Sunday, apparently aimed at perfecting a warhead for the world's most powerful rocket.  
The high-intensity explosion was registered here by the Seismological Institute at 6.4 on the nine-point Richter scale — equal in intensity to a similar Russian explosion Feb. 13.  
Western experts in Moscow at the time of the earlier explosion — described as the strongest blast since Jan. 15, 1965 — said the Russians were trying to develop a warhead for huge new rockets which would have about 3 million pounds of thrust.  
"In Washington, an Atomic Energy Commission spokesman said that U. S. scientists had also recorded seismic signals from the Semipalatinsk testing region. The spokesman said the apparent underground nuclear blast had an explosive force equal to between 200,000 and one million tons of TNT.  
There was no official announcement in Moscow and none was expected. The Kremlin never makes such tests public.

### Bob Price Insists WT Be Included In Water Study

Speaking at the noon meeting of the Pampa Board of Realtors today Bob Price, candidate for Congress, urged residents of the 18th Texas Congressional District and other areas of West Texas to insist on inclusion of West Texas in an important water study currently under consideration in Congress.  
"HR 4671 is a bill to authorize the Secretary of Interior to investigate means of adding to the supply of water for use in the Colorado River Basin," Price said. "Eleven western states are backing the proposed study, but West Texas is not among the sponsors. It is unthinkable that this great area will not be included in the planning for vital water resources in the future."  
"The High Plains of Texas would benefit directly from surplus water in the Columbia River channeled into the Colorado and fed down to the basin area. Experts have warned us for a long time that great amounts of water must be imported from out of the state if Texas is to remain among the agricultural leaders in this nation."

### H-Bomb Recovery Attempt Delayed By Rough Seas

PALOMARES, Spain (UPI) — High winds and rough seas today again delayed U.S. Navy efforts to recover a missing American H-bomb from an underwater ridge 2,500 feet down in the Mediterranean Sea.  
Navy crews had hoped for good weather to begin lifting operations today. But high winds kicked up white caps throughout the search area five miles offshore.  
Units of the 6th Fleet stood by waiting for a break in the weather. Search teams had been delayed previously by rough seas and mechanical problems in one of the undersea craft searching for the bomb.  
The bomb, missing for nine weeks off Spain's southeast coast, was sighted Wednesday — its parachute still attached — from a midget submarine. Three other weapons lost in the collision of a B52 bomber and a KC135 jet tanker Jan. 17 were recovered on land, but only after spreading some radioactivity.  
A squall Saturday and high winds Sunday forced the Navy to delay recovery operations. Recovery teams also were hampered Sunday by electrical troubles aboard the 51-foot underwater research craft Albatross which had to dock for battery recharging.

### Teenager's Birthday Spent Trying to Save Dad's Life

MCALESTER, Okla. (UPI) — Brenda Sharp turned 13 years old today but there will be no celebrations. Brenda is too busy trying to save her father's life.  
Three years ago Brenda, the oldest of five children, watched her drunken father beat, stomp and drag her mother to death in their western Oklahoma home.  
Saturday she learned that her father must die in the electric chair March 28. In battling to save him, the olive-eyed, 90-pound blonde is using the only weapons she has — paper and pencil.  
After learning of her father's date with the executioner, Brenda sent a note to Oklahoma Gov. Henry Belmon pleading for mercy for her father, Dallas Quinton Sharp.  
The note, containing several misspellings, said: "Dear Governor Belmon, My name is Brenda Sharp. I love my father and I don't want him to be electrocuted."

### TO MOLD FUTURE DEVELOPMENT House Committee to Take Up Rep. Rogers' Television Bills

WASHINGTON, D.C. (Sp) — Congressman Walter Rogers said today the future development pattern of American television service may well be determined in hearings beginning Tuesday before the House Committee on Interstate and Foreign Commerce, of which Congressman Rogers is ranking majority member.  
The Committee will receive testimony on two bills — one introduced by Congressman Rogers to prohibit the Federal Communications Commission from controlling or regulating the reception of broadcast signals. The other bill, supported by the Federal Communications Commission, would grant FCC regulatory jurisdiction of all community antenna television systems, such as the one now being installed in Pampa.  
Congressman Rogers said the FCC-supported legislation would, in effect, "expand FCC jurisdiction to cover the reception of signals broadcast into the airwaves and received by anyone, and could permit a Federal bureau to dictate what a person can receive."  
The Congressman added, "The exercise of control over broadcast reception by a Government agency borders closely on censorship and could measurably damage broadcasting."

### UNUSUAL EXPERIMENT Police Chief's Image Sought in Child's Killing

ELIZABETH, N.J. (UPI) — Photographs of Michael Roy were sent to cities around the nation today as part of an unusual police experiment to find the killer of a little girl.  
Michael Roy is the chief of police of Elizabeth, N.J.  
Roy is not a suspect in the slaying. He was miles away from the murder scene — but he fits the description of the man who plunged a sharp instrument into the chest of 7-year-old Wendy Wolen March 8. The attack occurred in broad daylight while the girl was returning home from school.  
Thirteen persons saw the man who slashed Wendy to death. But after questioning hundreds of men and running down countless numbers of leads, Chief Roy and his men still had no suspect.  
With public pressure mounting for an arrest and parents too frightened to permit their children on the streets alone, Roy hit upon the idea of creating a "living model of Wendy's killer using costumes, Hollywood makeup and Broadway actors."  
All 13 witnesses were brought to the wide ballroom of the Elizabeth-Carteret Hotel Sunday. Roy also enlisted the services of a wardrobe expert and a makeup artist.  
Two actors were brought in — Charles Reynolds, who played a gangster in the Broadway show "Kiss Me, Kate," and Richard Hoh, the colonel in "Student Gypsy."  
The stage was set, with Reynolds and Hoh "auditioning" for the role of killer. A police inspector began ticking off questions for the 13 witnesses. For more than an hour it continued:  
"Is this one too thin?"  
"Does the hair color match?"  
"Were the shoes this color, brown, or darker?"  
"You think the man was taller with broad shoulders?"  
While the questioning continued, the actors stood silently by. A few times they were ushered to a small room to undergo makeup changes or a switch of clothes.  
Then, the unexpected happened.  
"How thick were the shoe soles?" the inspector asked. Roy stepped forward and raised (See POLICE, Page 3)

BOSTON (UPI) — Batman is television's poorest driver and a "vicious example" for the nation's youth, the Automobile Legal Association said today.  
The auto owners' group protested that in one program alone Batman was guilty of these highway safety violations:  
—Turning in the middle of busy streets.  
—Crashing through safety barriers.  
—Crossing highway white line safety markers.  
—Parking illegally.  
—Speeding.  
—Failing to signal even a single turn.

### FIVE US PLANES LOST

## 280 Reds Slain In Savage Three Hour Viet Battle

SAIGON (UPI) — U. S. Marines today battled Communist forces on two widely separated fronts, killing an estimated 280 in 24 hours.  
In Saigon, U. S. military spokesmen reported the loss of five American planes, including a valuable Skyknight "Spook" jet designed to jam enemy radar networks. Three of the planes were shot down over the Communist north.  
Heavy ground fighting was reported raging between U. S. Marines and Communists near the North Vietnamese border, about 425 miles northwest of Saigon.  
Communist troops overran the government outpost of An Hoa, about 12 miles north of Quang Ngai during the weekend.  
U. S. Marines helicoptered into the area caught up with the attackers and reported "heavy contact."  
By late afternoon, the mission, named Operation Texas, had accounted for 46 Viet Cong killed in ground fighting and an estimated 150 more by Marine air attacks.  
Helicopters ferrying Marines into the battle area reported heavy ground fire.  
The An Hoa area sits on the line of retreat taken by a North Vietnamese regiment that was bloodied by U. S. Marines in Operation Utah two weeks ago.  
U. S. Marines also were reported locked in heavy combat with Viet Cong forces about 15 miles northwest of Hue, near the North Vietnamese border. They reported 34 Communists killed by body count and an estimated 51 more dead in artillery and air strikes during the first 24 hours of fighting.

## UFOs Watched By 40 Persons in Michigan

ANN ARBOR, Mich. (UPI) — At least 40 persons saw an unidentified flying object land in a swamp near here Sunday night, police said today. Twelve witnesses were policemen.  
Two sheriff's deputies said they saw eerie blinking lights — apparently on a flying object — rise above the trees, then dip again. Another policeman said he and other officers saw a formation of four or five flying objects. One passed right over his car, he said.  
A farmer and his son said they approached within 500 yards of the object. It took off with a sound like a ricocheting bullet, they said.  
Six police cars chased the formation but the UFOs vanished.  
Washtenaw County sheriff's deputy Stanley McFadden said at least 60 persons saw the objects in the air or on the ground.  
McFadden and deputy David Fitzpatrick left their car and slogged through the swamp about 12 miles northwest of here after watching the object rise to tree top level, then sink down and apparently land.  
A crowd of 40 to 50 people watched it on the ground, McFadden said. He said he, Fitzpatrick and most of the other witnesses could see lights only because of the darkness.  
But Frank Mannor, 47, and his son, Ronald, 19, told police they ran through the swamp to within 500 yards of the object. They drew a picture of it and described it as the shape of a football, made of wadded material, with blinking lights and antennas.  
Mannor said the object took off when his son said to him, "look at that horrible thing there, dad!"  
"I went out there and I saw these lights on the ground," McFadden said. "It appeared it would go up about tree top level and then go down again."

### Spring Makes Warm Debut

The Pampa area heralded the first day of Spring today with warm temperatures expected to cool slightly for Tuesday. Today's high temperature mark is expected to reach the middle 80-degree range with winds variable from the northwest and southwest at 12 to 18 m.p.h. Tonight's low will be in the middle 40's with a high Tuesday in the lower 70's.  
According to legend, the first day of spring arrives when the goddess Persephone, who was carried off by the god of the underworld while picking flowers, ends her annual six months in the nether land and returns to spend the next six months with the heavenly gods.  
Persephone returned to the Pampa area today with green showing brilliantly in much of the wheat and pasture land.  
A snowstorm lashed the Pacific Northwest today—the first full day of spring.  
Wet snow pushed by winds reaching 40 miles an hour pelted Olympia, Wash., which reported five inches of snow. Wenatchee, Wash., had three inches of snow and nearby Ephrata reported an inch.  
The storm spread rain along the Oregon and northern California coasts, where rain has fallen almost daily since mid-February.  
Spring arrived officially at 8:53 p.m., EST Sunday.

### 1,300 Die in Wake Of Smallpox Epidemic

DACCA, East Pakistan (UPI) — A smallpox epidemic sweeping two districts of East Pakistan has killed 1,300 persons in the last three weeks, reports reaching here today said.  
About 1,000 persons were reported to have died in Jessore District 160 miles east of here and 300 in adjacent Khulna.

### African Quake Takes 100 Lives

KAMPALA, Uganda (UPI) — Police helicopters today rushed doctors and supplies into remote western Uganda, where one of the most violent earthquakes in recent African history killed more than 100 persons.  
The first tremor struck early Sunday morning and severe aftershocks continued almost without interruption for four hours.  
The quake registered 7.7 on the Richter scale on European seismographs and 10 on a scale of 12 at a seismographic station in the Soviet Union.  
Estimates placed the dead at more than 100 with scores injured.  
The quake was believed to have originated near Lake Albert on the border between Uganda and the Congo, a seismically active area.





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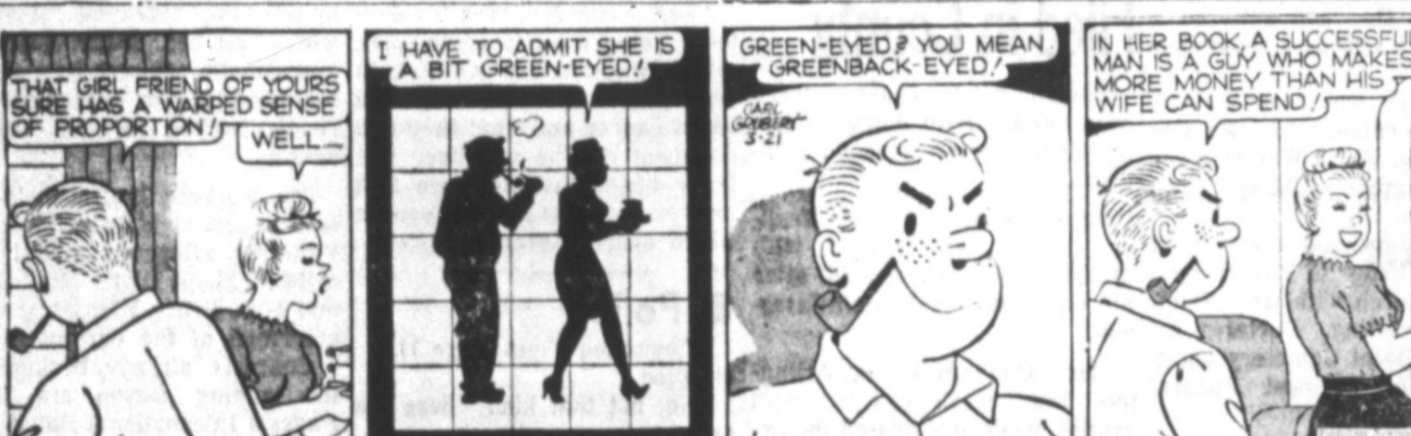

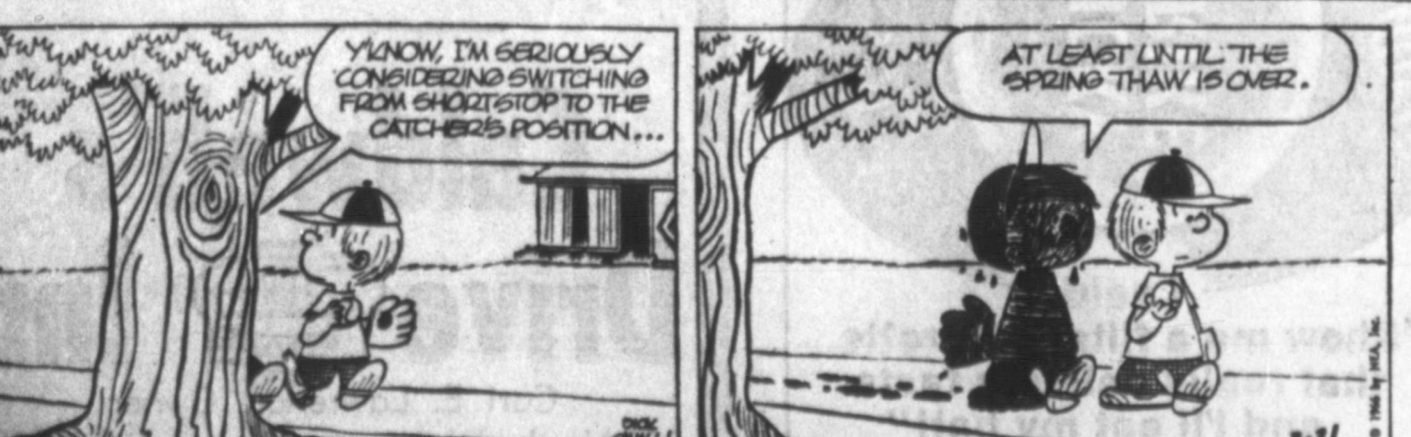

# Spirit of the 76ers Reigned in Philadelphia

PHILADELPHIA (UPI) — The Philadelphia 76ers, whose name suggests the spirit that characterized the team all season, today reigned as champions of the National Basketball Association's Eastern Division after a nine-year dominance by the Boston Celtics.

The 76ers, who battled the Celtics and the Cincinnati Royals for the coveted position in one of the NBA's greatest division races, captured the title outright Sunday by whipping the Baltimore Bullets 108-104 in their final game of the season. The Celtics also won,

defeating Cincinnati 121-104, but finished one game back of Philadelphia.

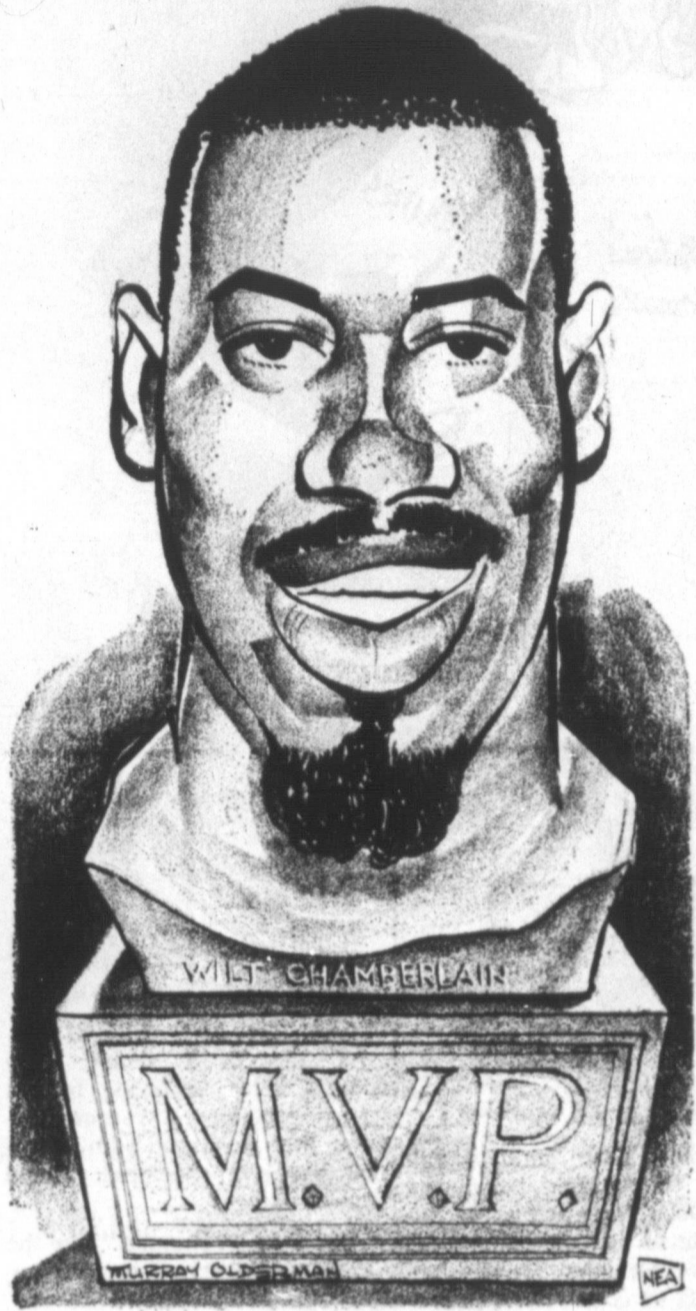
"We won this championship because we are a team," a happy Coach Dolph Schayes said after Sunday's contest. "Ward, Greer, Gambee, Wilt, they were all great. We couldn't have won this title without everyone of them giving us everything they had."

This was the crux of the 76ers all season. It was always a case of team effort, a quality that the Celtics employed expertly in winning their nine division titles.

The greatest contributor to the 76ers' season-long cause had to be big Wilt Chamberlain. The 7-foot-1 center, who today was voted the NBA's Most Valuable Player, enjoyed his finest season. He led the league in scoring and rebounding, but more than that, he totalled an amazing amount of assists for a center to become an outstanding team player.

Schayes expressed confidence that his team would win the league championship which begins Wednesday with Cincinnati meeting the Celtics.

## Russell Stranglehold Broken by Chamberlin

NEW YORK (UPI) — Wilt Chamberlain broke a Bill Russell stranglehold today when he was named Most Valuable Player in the National Basketball Association for the 1965-66 season.

Chamberlain, received 48 first-place votes and a total of 181 points in balloting for MVP honors by fellow NBA players.

It marked the second time that the perennial league scoring champion has won the annual Podoloff Trophy that was formerly known as the President's Cup. Big Wilt of the Philadelphia 76ers previously earned the honor in 1960.

MANILA (UPI) — Junior lightweight champion Gabriel (Flash) Elorde won a unanimous 10-round decision over former lightweight champ Ismael Laguna in a non-title fight.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. (UPI) — The Texas Western Miners defeated the Kentucky Wildcats 72-65 to win the NCAA basketball championship. Duke took third place by beating Utah 79-77.

NEW YORK (UPI) — Top-seeded Brigham Young crushed New York University 97-84 to take the National Invitation Tournament title, and Villanova beat Army 76-65 for third place.

"We can beat either one," the Philadelphia coach predicted.

Other NBA action saw the Western Division champion Los Angeles Lakers eliminate the San Francisco Warriors from playoff consideration by closing their regular season with a 124-112 victory at home Sunday.

The Warriors had whipped the Lakers, 125-119, Saturday in San Francisco.

The bitterly contested game Sunday was tied six times in the fourth quarter before Leroy Ellis and Elgin Baylor directed a surge in the closing four minutes.

Laker Jerry West set a new NBA free-throw record in the game, putting in 11 to give him 340 for the season, beating Chamberlain's old mark of 835.

West was also high point man, chalking up 35 while Ellis had 28 and Baylor made 25.

The Warriors, who entered

the game needing a victory to stay alive in their duel with St. Louis for third place, are now out of the competition. Baltimore will now meet St. Louis in the playoffs and the winner will take on Los Angeles. Whoever emerges from that scramble will meet the Eastern Division champion for the title.

St. Louis stayed in the fighting ranks Sunday by toppling a determined Detroit scoring drive, downing the Pistons, 121-117 in the Automobile City.

The Hawks had a 38-30 lead in the first quarter and led 56 at the half. But the Pistons came back in the second half and tied it up 91-91 at the end of the third quarter.

At one point in the fourth quarter, Detroit had a five-point lead. But player-coach Richie Guerin, who was high point man in the game with 35, led his team to a last-minute rally to give it to the Hawks.

## Astrodome Has Nice Effect on LA Dodgers

Finally, we've figured out what was wrong with Moneybags, Inc., otherwise known as the world champion Los Angeles Dodgers.

It wasn't the absence of Sandy Koufax and Don Drysdale, after all.

It was playing outdoors that was bothering them. You know how things like fresh air, the sky overhead, sunlight and grass can throw off your game.

After losing their first six spring games outdoors, the Dodgers moved into the antiseptic atmosphere of the world's

most glorified hothouse — the Houston Astrodome — and swept a pair of games from the Astros this weekend.

After winning 8-3 Saturday night, the Dodgers came back to post a 4-1 victory over the Astros on Sunday to leave the champs with a 2-6 spring mark.

They were the first two games played with the new synthetic grass in the infield. The nylon grass appeared to be somewhat fast, especially on hard, sharp grounders but otherwise passed its first test.

Score Early

The Dodgers wrapped up Sunday's game in the first inning when Tommy Davis doubled in a pair of runs off Robin Roberts. Joe Moeller, Don Sutton and Ron Perranoski stopped the Astros on seven hits in the contest.

## Miners Are Toast of Cage World

COLLEGE PARK, Md. (UPI) — Bobby Joe Hill, the slick ball-handling wizard who quarterbacked the Texas Western basketball team, admits he had "never heard of" the school before 14,253 Saturday night, Miner Coach Don Haskins.

But after Hill paced unheralded Texas Western to a stunning 72-65 triumph over top-ranked Kentucky in the NCAA finals before 14,253 Saturday night, the once-obscure Miners suddenly became the toast of college basketball.

Elsewhere on the spring circuit, the Chicago White Sox knocked the Baltimore Orioles out of the top spot in the Grapefruit League standings with a 5-2 triumph.

Gary Peters, Johnny Buzhardt and Ed Fisher spaced out six hits for the White Sox and rookie Tommy Agee homered as the Sox boosted their record to 9-2. Baltimore is now 7-2.

The Baltimore loss gave the New York Mets a chance to take over first place in the spring season. But the thought was too much for the Mets who had their four-game win string stopped by the New York Yankees, 5-4. The Mets and Yankees now are 6-6 in the series that started in 1962. The Mets are 6-2 this spring.

Come From Behind

The Yanks scored three runs in the first inning off Met starter Dick Selma and then came back from a 4-3 deficit with two more in the fifth to wrap it up as Gil Downs and Jackie Cullen pitched shutout ball for the Yanks the last five innings. Met pitcher Darrell Sutherland suffered a broken nose when hit by a thrown ball in pre-game practice.

The winless Washington Senators suffered their ninth straight loss of the spring, a 13-4 setback at the hands of the Kansas City Athletics. Rookie Ernie Fazio collected three hits including a two-run homer for the A's. KC is now 7-2 this spring.

The Detroit Tigers also upped their mark to 7-4 by crushing the St. Louis Cardinals 9-4 on seven-run seventh-inning that featured four hits, four walks and an error.

Joe Sparda, Johnny Hill and Dave Wickersham combined to pitch a three-hitter to the Tigers.

The Cincinnati Reds went 4 innings before finally stopping the Boston Red Sox 6-4. Deron Johnson's grand slam homer following three straight Sox errors, Tony Conigliaro's homer for the Sox in the 10th of the 13th.

Pirates Win Seventh

The Pittsburgh Pirates created their record to 7-3 on their fourth straight win by stopping the Philadelphia Phillies 5-4. Singles by Matty Alou and Dave Roberts scored the two key runs in the seventh to Pittsburgh.

After starting off with seven straight losses, the Minnesota Twins chalked up their third straight win by whipping Atlanta, 8-1. Three Twins pitchers, Dave Boswell, Dwight Siebler and Pete Cimino scattered nine hits to chalk up the win.

## Houston Will Make Move Up NL Ladder

COCOA, Fla. (UPI) — The Houston Astros are not going to field the best team in the National League this coming season, but it may be the youngest.

Grady Hatton, their new manager, is going with as many kids as possible "because they are our hope for the future." And Hatton thinks that future "is bright."

He isn't concerned over where the Astros will finish this season although he hopes they will better their ninth place finish of last year.

Hatton is considering starting a team that will have 24-year-old Jim Wynn in center field as the oldest player.

This "kid" team would have Rusty Staub, 22, in right field; Greg Sims, 19, in left; Chuck Harrison, a few days younger than Wynn, at first base; Jonny Morgan, 22, at second; Sonny Jackson, 21, at short; Nate Colbert, 19, at third and John Bateman, 23, behind the plate.

Of those kids only Wynn,

Staub, Morgan, Jackson and Bateman are sure of their jobs.

The veteran Jim Gentile probably will open at first base despite his disappointing .246 batting average last year; Bob Aspromonte will be at third and Lee Maye in left field. Gentile, who hit only seven homers for the Astros in 81 games after he was obtained from Kansas City, is 31; Aspromonte, who also had an off-season with a .263 average and only five home runs, is 35 and Maye is 31.

Maye also was a disappointment last season, hitting only .251 with three home runs in 108 games after he was acquired from Milwaukee, where he was hitting .302.

Morgan had a fine rookie year, batting .271 with 14 home runs and 40 RBIs.

Wynn and Staub were the big guns in the Houston attack last season. Wynn hit .275 with 22 HRs and 73 RBIs. Staub batted .256 with 14 HRs and 63 RBIs.

Bond Will Stay

Walter Bond, who also can play first base, will be kept for outfield and pinch hitting duty. Other outfield prospects include Norman Miller, who hit .280 at Amarillo, and Gene Rattiff, who was a first year man last season.

Ron Brand, who is 25, will backstop catcher Bateman. Although Bateman hit only .197 to Brand's .235 last year, he is the better receiver.

There will be youth on the pitching staff, too, and Hatton considers his hurling the strongest part of his ball club.

The ace of the staff could be Larry Dierker, a 19-year-old hard throwing right-hander, who won seven games and lost eight last year. He is considered one of the top pitching prospects in the major leagues.

Bob Bruce (9-18), Dick Farrell (11-11), Robin Roberts (10-9), Dave Giusti (8-7) and Claude Raymond (7-4) figure to be the other starters.

Danny Coombs, 0-2 last year, may make the club as a starter but Hatton says he probably will need another year of seasoning in the minors.

Stan Musial once hit five home runs in a doubleheader during his playing days with the St. Louis Cardinals.

## Hebert Finally Ends Long Golf Drought

ORLANDO, Fla. (UPI) — It had been a long, dry stretch since Lionel Hebert last won a golf tournament but the \$21,000 he handed him at the windup of the Florida Citrus Open made the waiting worth while.

Hebert, who hadn't been in the winner's circle since the 1962 Memphis Open, came out on top in the richest tournament of the current winter tour by shooting a four-day, 5-under-par 279.

Now the leading official money winner for 1966, Hebert finished two strokes ahead of Jack Nicklaus, last year's top money winner; Charles Coody who won the 1964 Dallas Open; and ex-Marine Dick Lytle.

Nicklaus, who shot a 70 Sunday, Coody (68) and Lytle (71) all wound up with \$8,833.33 as their share of the runnerup prize.

Hebert, who shot his second straight 2-under-par 69 Sunday, started the final round in a four-way tie for second, two strokes behind Gardner Dickinson.

Dickinson soared to a 4-over-par 75 in the last round for a 283 that left him four strokes behind Hebert. The three who were tied with Hebert at the end of the third round were Lytle, Gay Brewer who had a 73 Sunday and Joe Campbell who had a 74.

Hebert leaned heavily on his long irons Sunday. He said he broke his favorite driver several weeks ago while trying to repair it and had been having trouble breaking in a new one.

Although he failed to win a tournament between the 1962 Memphis Open and the new Citrus Open, Hebert still played well enough to average about \$25,000 a year over the past three years.

Nicklaus was the only member of the "big three" to have much success in the Citrus Open. Arnold Palmer finished nine strokes back and earned only \$500 and Gary Player failed to make the cut at the end of the second round.

Tied for fifth place in the Citrus Open at 282 and earning \$4,150 each were Randy Glover, who had a 67 Sunday, Billy Maxwell with a 69, Mason Rudolph with a 71 and Bob Shave with a 68.

Levines Reports Net Earning

Levine's, Inc., with a store in Pampa, today reported record net earnings of \$1,225,484, or \$1.73 per share, for the fiscal year ended last Jan. 31. This represents a gain of 17.2 percent over the \$1,045,347, or \$1.47 per share reported a year ago.

The increase in earnings was significantly higher than the rise in sales, said Chairman William Levine. The company reported sales for the fiscal year of \$43,779,127 or 8.7 percent over the \$40,267,061 last year.

The rise in earnings of the past several years recently brought about the second increase in the cash dividend rate within a two year period. The board recently established a new annual cash dividend of 60 cents per share, up from the previous 52 cents which had been in effect for a little over a year.
