COULD TOPPLE LIBERALS

### Showdown Due On Canadian Sex Scandal

OTTAWA (UPI)—John Diefenbaker, an old warhorse facing one of his biggest parliamentary battles, was to lead his forces today in a crisis debate over how much, if any, sex and security was exchanged between a blonde German divorcee and the men in his cabinet.

The former prime minister, marshaling Conservatives for a showdown with his successor and long-time antagonist Lester B. Pearson, was certain to demand anew that Liberal Justice Minister Lucien Cardin "name names" of indiscreet ex-cabinet ministers or resign.

The one former minister who was named in the scandal so far has denounced Cardin as a "cheap, despicable little man." And if the allegations of a scandal in the former Diefenbaker regime are not supported, Pearson's government could be toppled forcing a new election - the sixth in nine years.

Pearson was put on the spot by Cardin's allegations Thursday that ministers in Diefenbaker's cabinet - ministers plural - he said - had romantic liaisons with shapely Gerda Munsinger in the late 1950s and early 1960s.

Mrs. Munsinger had been engaged in espionage work in Europe. She is the former wife of a New York City policeman who once pitched for the Ottawa Athletics.

Cardin admitted he had not read the Royal Canadian Mounted Police file on the case and did not know if Gerda had been a spy in Canada. But she was denied entry into the United States on security grounds.

This said Cardin was a "bona fide security case" and "worse" in some respects than Britain's Profumo affair. In 1963, John Profumo, defense minister in the government of British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan resigned after admitting sexual liaisons with

### Governors Believe Viet Nam Will Top Fall Elections

WASHINGTON (UPI)—A good share of the nation's governors, though solidly endorsing President Johnson's war policies, believe that Viet Nam probably will be the top issue in the November elections.

They also generally agree that the Democrats will retain control of the new 90th Congress, although probably not by their present lopsided margins of 222-110 in the House and 68-32 in the Senate.

These findings emerged from a UPI survey taken shortly before Saturday's White House meetings between the President and his top aides and the state governors. UPI reached 36 of the 50 governors.

The survey took on added meaning when in the course of the day-long conference at the White House the 38 state governors present voted unanimously to "wholeheartedly support and endorse" Johnson's course in Viet Nam.

After the vote, Republican Gov. John A. Volpe of Massachusetts was asked whether the resolution ended Viet Nam as a political issue in the November Congressional election campaigns.

"Well, it ends it as far as the governors who approved it are concerned," Volpe said.

### AMA JOURNAL REPORTS

#### Contact Lenses Can Cause Serious Eye Complications

CHICAGO (UPI)—A survey showed Monday that among 50,000 contact-lens wearers 14 eyes had to be removed and 157 eyes were permanently damaged.

The survey, conducted by the American Association of Ophthalmology, was reported in the Journal of the American Medical Association.

There were also 7,407 "reversible ocular changes" among the 49,964 persons examined, that is, eye changes from which the patients recovered without permanent damage.

The report said eye complications associated with contact lenses were more frequent among older persons and those with previous eye injuries or disease. Complications also were made more severe by prolonged wearing or sleeping with the lenses on the cornea.

"The wearing of contact lenses is an abnormal condition which can result in serious medical complications," the report said.

"The survey and previously published clinical and laboratory studies suggest that the majority of patients wearing contact lenses have some degree of alteration of the

### Unique Alarm Really Works

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—A prowler proved Sunday that bar owner Rudy Milatovich's unique burglar alarm — a partially dialed telephone — works.

When Milatovich arrived home at 3 a.m. after walking a block from his tavern, his telephone was ringing, alerting him that something was amiss.

Milatovich, before leaving the bar each night, dials the first six digits of his home telephone number. Then he dials the seventh digit part of the way and puts a plug in the dial so the call is not completed.

A wire then is strung from the plug to the tavern's cash register. When the cash register is disturbed, the wire loosens the plug and the call is completed.

### Leaky Booster Fuel System Causes Delay

CAPE KENNEDY (UPI)—Space officials today postponed the Gemini 8 hookup and spacelike spectacular from Tuesday to Wednesday at the earliest because of leaks in the rendezvous target's Atlas booster and the capsule's breathing system.

The double trouble shattered a smooth string of preparations for the ambitious three-day spaceflight of astronauts Neil Armstrong and David Scott.

The March 15 launching of the Gemini 8 mission was postponed for a least 24 hours today, the Federal Space Agency said.

The agency said leaks were discovered in the Atlas late Sunday night during fueling checks and other leaks were found in a Gemini spacecraft system that supplies oxygen to the Astronauts' space suits.

The oxygen leak was traced to a device that separates moisture from re-circulated cabin air, engineers reported.

The Miami weather bureau reported that weather conditions for Wednesday launchings of the Atlas-Agena rendezvous rocket and the Gemini 8 spacecraft were satisfactory with partly cloudy skies expected at the launch site.

### Warm, Clear Weather Due To Continue

Clouds hung over the eastern third of Texas today but it was clear everywhere else and prospects were for a warm-up.

Early morning temperatures ranged between the low 40s in the Panhandle and the upper 30s in the lower Rio Grande Valley.

The Pampa area continued to warm with clear skies today. Temperatures are expected to edge up to the lower 70-degree range today with only a slight drop Tuesday to the upper 60s. Tonight's low is expected to be the 40-degree mark. High cloudiness is predicted to continue through Tuesday with winds from the southwest at 15 to 20 m.p.h.

The U.S. Weather Bureau said clouds would build up over the southern half of the state on Tuesday but no rain was expected.

Sunday was mild and a bright sun chased away rain-bearing clouds over South Texas. Presidio recorded a high of 81 degrees, compared with a high of 63 at Lufkin.

### De Gaulle's Move Poses Serious Threat to NATO

WASHINGTON (UPI)—U.S. officials regard French President Charles de Gaulle's move to withdraw from NATO as the gravest internal threat to the Atlantic Alliance since its inception in 1949.

The United States and 13 other Allied governments are working on a draft of a joint declaration endorsing the NATO defense alliance as a reply to De Gaulle. If approved, the statement would be issued within the next few days.

In essence, the declaration would pledge the 14 Allies to continue their support of NATO, including integrated military operations. This was aimed directly at De Gaulle's threat to withdraw his tactical air force units from NATO bases in West Germany and to oust all foreign forces from French bases unless they are placed under French command.

### Panhandle Man Killed When Car Hits Tree

Clarence William Sadler, 50, Panhandle, was killed when his car hit a tree just off US 60 about 6 miles east of Panhandle about 7:25 p.m. Sunday.

The car burst into flames and highway patrolmen were still trying to determine today if Sadler had been thrown from the vehicle or was pulled out by a passerby.

Officers said he had not been burned.

He was pronounced dead on arrival at Highland General Hospital.

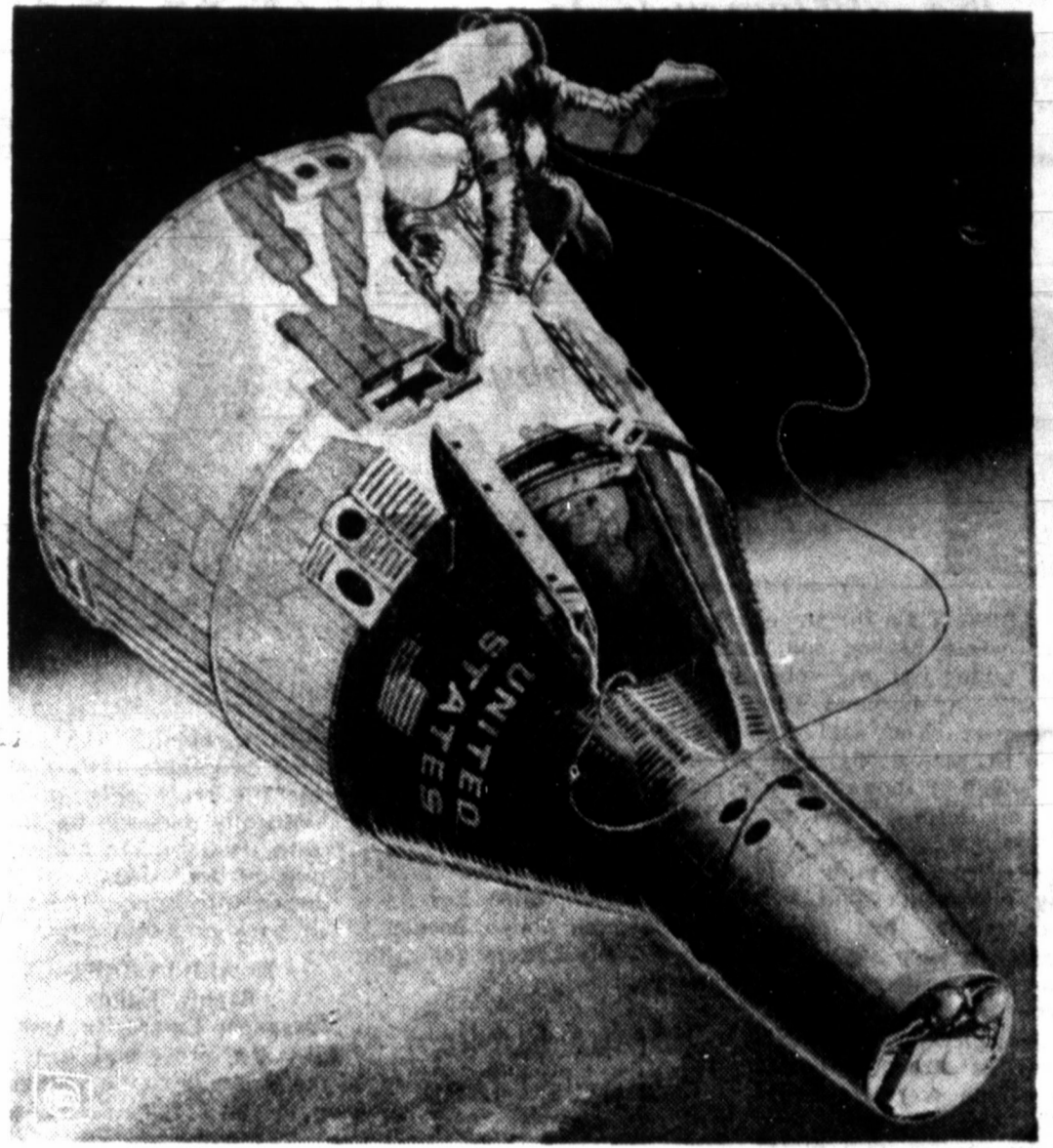
Overall, according to industry sources, there will be much more of the European flavor to styling of the 1967 models than has ever been seen before on American cars, except for Chrysler's Corporation's unhappy experience of 1961 and '62. Chrysler went sharply European in 1961 and also started the trend toward longer hoods and shorter rear decks. Ironically, this very trend, which proved disastrous to Chrysler, is one impelling all the companies now in their 1967 model.

### LBJ Expected To Follow Advice Of Joint Staff Chiefs

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Joint Chiefs of Staff are urging an expanded air war against Communist North Viet Nam, with oil storage depots and refineries in the Hanoi-Haiphong area a top priority target.

It is expected that President Johnson will, in time approve the broader air campaign — heavier blows against a widening target list — if Hanoi makes no more toward the peace table.

Part of the campaign has, in fact, been in progress since the United States resumed bombing Jan. 31 after the 37-day Christmas pause. Raids over North Viet Nam are running at three times the pre-pause level. But targets still are the same: supply lines feeding men and equipment into South Viet Nam.

### 3,000 'Rattlers' Caught in Annual Sweetwater Hunt

SWEETWATER, Tex. (UPI)—The contestants, some with gray hair, some only teenagers, and even a few women, line up carrying burlap bags, Army footlockers, and even plastic wastebaskets with lids. All the containers are filled with writhing snakes.

It's the weigh-in at the 8th annual Sweetwater Rattlesnake Round-up.

To qualify for a prize, a contestant's snakes must be alive when brought in for the weigh-in and measuring.

The three days of the hunt of rocky hills of the bleak West Texas landscape netted 3,200 rattlesnakes weighing almost 400 pounds—a low total caused, round-up officials said, by a long and severe winter.

"A lot of snakes just haven't come out far enough to be found—they're still back in their lairs," a Jaycee spokesman said.

A team led by Bob O'Donald, of Claytonville, Tex., picked up the main trophy and \$50 by capturing 334 pounds of rattlesnakes.

Despite the comparative low total of snakes, it was the best roundup in history for a spectator standpoint with more than 12,000 visitors to this town of 14,000 persons.

Joe Jackson of Dallas caught the longest snake of the roundup—a 68-inch serpent for which Jackson was awarded a \$20 prize.

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### Castro Accuses Reds of Blackmail

MIAMI (UPI)—Premier Fidel Castro bitterly denounced Red China's leaders today for using force to "blackmail" Cuba and warned the United States he has "magnificent weapons to fight any kind of war, conventional or non-conventional."

"We can never be defeated," he shouted in a Havana University speech monitored here. But he gave no specific clues as to the type of arms his Soviet-supplied island now controls.

In a bellicose anti-Chinese harangue, Castro threatened to curtail diplomatic relations with Red China and, at one point, referred to Chinese Communist boss Mao Tse-Tung as "feeble-minded."

The Chinese, Castro said in a four-hour and 10 minutes speech, had "committed a grave historical error which will prove very costly to those responsible" for reneging on a sugar-for-rice deal with Cuba.

He said the trade backdown was "for purely political reasons" and Gave Mao and other Chinese Communist leaders a tongue-lashing for these tactics.

Like the proverbial woman of the twig, the way a woman's hair is cut usually determines the way it will go.

Few women can gracefully carry off the weeping willow or the sheep dog coils still much in vogue among certain youth groups. Instead, a flattering haircut and set should be the goal of girls in their early 20s to their 30s.

A New York hairstylist has turned the former main ballroom of a hotel into a beauty salon to practice what she preaches. Simply called Ila, this special hairstylist says the woman who works for femininity (once we were born with this) stands out in the crowd.

Ila says one step to achieving this is a well cut hairstyle. She prefers the outer layers of hair left long enough for brushing smoothly, without teasing. This gives any hairstyle a soft, natural look which compliments any woman. Properly shap'd, any hairdo can be brushed back, down or to one side for the most flattering style.

Ila discusses three hairdos for this spring that keep pace with the fashion trends. She calls them the Siren, L'Allure, and The Flirt. The Siren takes its cue from the movie queens of the 1930s. The feeling is one of hair flowing in unbroken curves to the shoulder. There is no part to break the feeling. Ila sets The Siren with large, large rollers all the way back and down the sides. Large pin curls at the very bottom complete the setting. When dry, The Siren is brushed into place.

The hair stylist describes L'Allure as "essentially feminine for young and mature women." It is a graceful back-sweep from arched bangs with sort of a free swirl of a seashell. The hair is brushed back with a postiche added if the hair is cut short. With long hair, push up your own hair in back and fold over.
