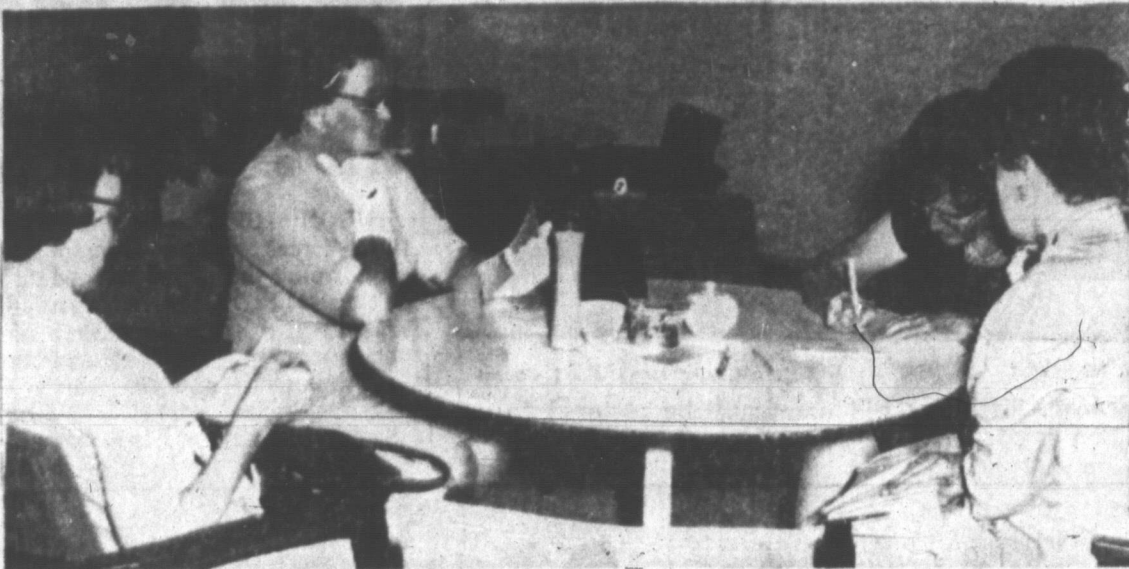

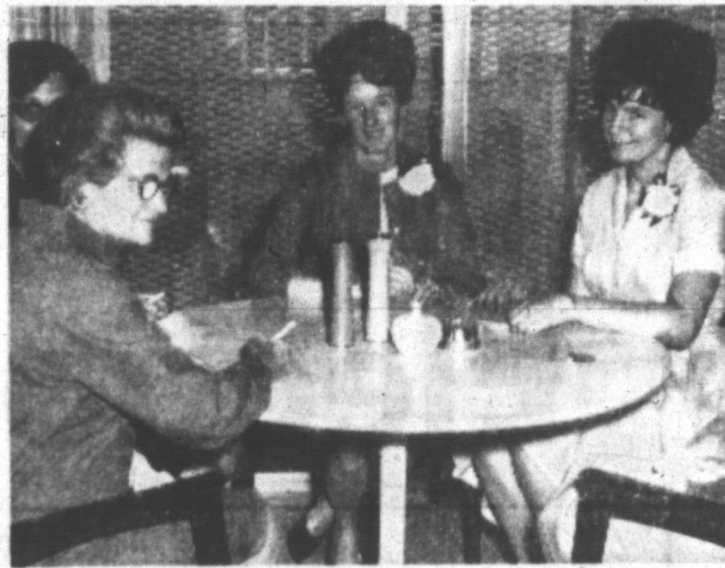

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Visit Heats Troop Removal Proposal

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The debate over Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield's "troops from Europe" proposal heated up somewhat during the weekend, perhaps because of the presence in Washington of West German Chancellor Ludwig Erhard.

Mansfield told UPI he would not call up the "sense of the Senate resolution urging substantial reduction of U.S. troop strength in Europe until early October. He said, however, that he did not believe Erhard's Washington visit imperiled the proposal.

Sen. Bourke B. Hickenlooper, Iowa, ranking Republican on the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, said he thought the proposal should be referred to that committee and possibly the armed services committee for further study before any action is taken.

Mansfield would prefer to have the Senate vote directly on his resolution, but he said: "if the Senate wants to refer it to a committee or committees, it's okay with me."

Senate GOP Leader Everett M. Dirksen, Ill., has urged fellow Republicans to shy away from the troop resolution. He agrees with President Johnson that adoption now would damage NATO's shaky position and make unnecessary trouble for Britain, already under great financial pressure.

Plans will be discussed for holding a charter and installation banquet on Oct. 1 at a meeting of the Pampa Chapter 70, Pi Delta Pi, Junior Order of the Knights of Pythias.

The meeting will begin at 7 tonight in the Knights of Pythias Lodge Hall, according to Teddy McIlvain, temporary chairman.

J. C. Hopkins, chancellor commander of Pampa Lodge No. 480, reports that a charter has been received from the Supreme Lodge.

All future junior members and Knights are urged to attend.

In their raids against the North, U.S. pilots concentrated on Communist surface-to-air (SAM) missile sites, particularly those around the city of Thanh Hoa, which officers described as "one of the toughest targets in North Viet Nam."

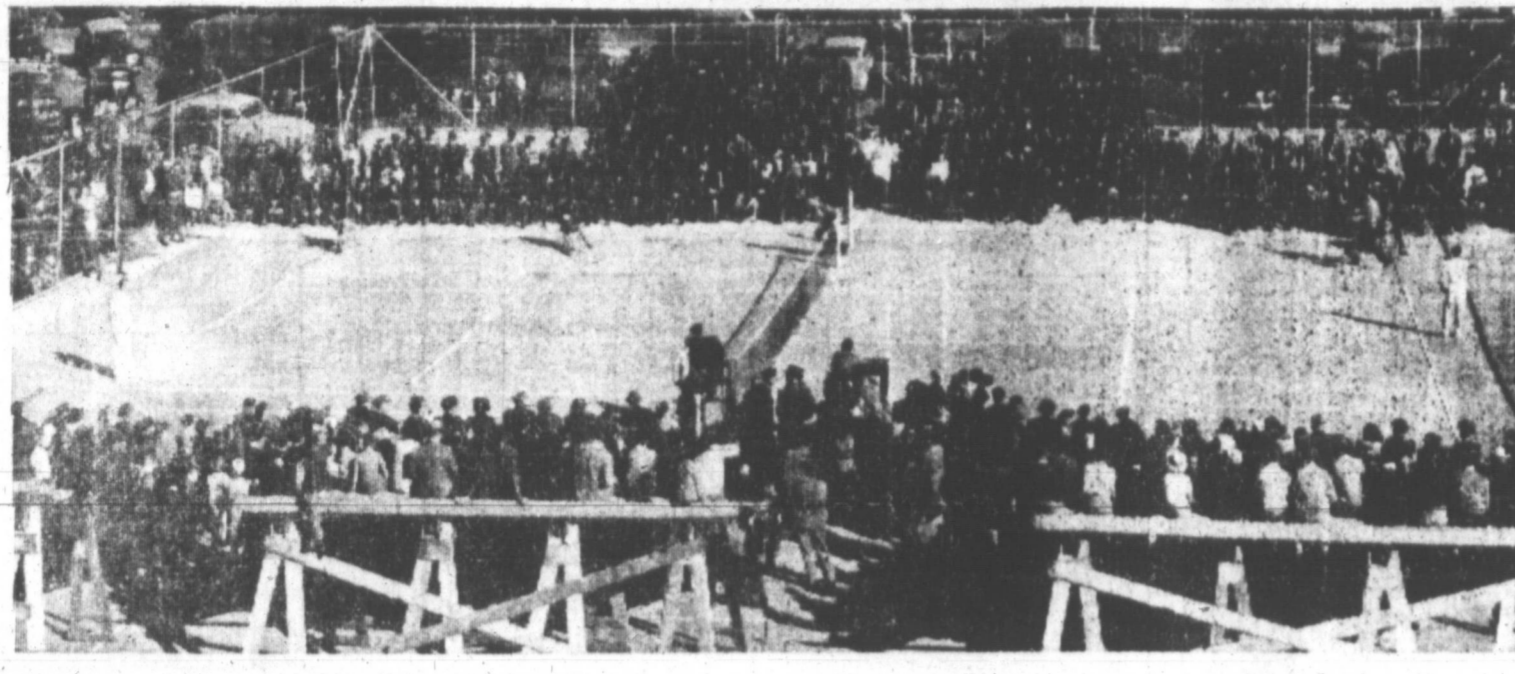

Twenty-Two Die In Texas Traffic

A three fatality accident and the deaths of two women struck by a hit-and-run car helped send the weekend violent death list upward in Texas.

A United Press International survey for the period running from 6 p.m. Friday to 12 midnight Sunday showed that 30 persons died violently in the state. Twenty-two of the victims died in traffic. Homicides and suicides took five lives, one person drowned and miscellaneous violence claimed two lives.

The worst wreck of the weekend occurred Sunday near Carizo Springs. Two cars collided head-on 12 miles west of the city, killing Mr. and Mrs. David Colbert of Crystal City and Raymundo E. Chavarria of Asherton.

Two unidentified women died after being struck by a car shortly before midnight Sunday in San Antonio. Police said the driver may deliberately have hit the women. Both victims were thought to be in their early 20s.

Bobby Wayne Underwood, 32, of Dallas fell out of a fishing boat Sunday at a lake near Terrell and drowned.

A 3-year-old girl, Rene Benavides, burned to death Sunday in Corpus Christi when a storehouse in her backyard caught fire.

An offshore oil drilling accident Friday night claimed the life of Herbert H. Zerke, 56, of Corpus Christi. A board dislodged and fell, hitting Zerke on the head.

A 12-year-old Dallas girl was shot Saturday and police were holding a 15-year-old girl who admitted the shooting. Dead was Margaret Ann Hamilton.

A cafe shooting in El Paso Sunday night took the life of Jose Contreras, 18. A suspect was arrested.

Frazier, Rexroat In Antisub Training

DESTROYER USS WALKER — Seaman Ernest L. Frazier, USN, son of Mrs. Dorma Cook of 528 N. Davis, and Signalman First Class Billy G. Rexroat, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. Emmet Rexroat of 1020 Neel Rd., are participating in the South China Sea antisubmarine warfare training exercise "Silver-skate" aboard this U. S. Seventh Fleet unit.

This five-day exercise, designed to increase Fleet defense tactics against potential enemy submarines, began Sept. 23. It involves major surface, submarine and air units of the Seventh Fleet, as well as Royal Navy ships, in offensive tactics against an "aggressor" force of three U. S. submarines, one nuclear powered.

Seventh Fleet units operate throughout the Western Pacific from the Arctic to the Antarctic, in a 30 million square mile area. One and one-half billion people, more than half the world's population, live on the Asian land mass adjacent to these waters.

Gordon 'Pooped' Before His Walk

SPACE CENTER, Houston (UPI) — Astronaut Richard F. Gordon said today he was tired out before he even started his walk in space during the flight of Gemini 11 earlier this month.

The 36-year-old astronaut told a news conference that he had to sit in his hot, bulky space-walking suit for part of an orbit after he got ready for the walk ahead of time.

Then, he said, he had trouble getting his gold sun visor into place.

"The point of this story is I was tired and had a pretty high heart rate before I started," he said.

Gordon's space walk Sept. 13 had to be cut short after he spent an exhausting 30 minutes in space and was half-blinded by his own sweat.

Gordon said he and Gemini 11 command pilot Charles (Pete) Conrad got all ready for the space walk nearly an orbit before the flight plan called for it.

"We had a big discussion as to whether to go ahead one revolution early or stay on the flight plan and we decided to stay on the flight plan," he said.

Then, Gordon said, when he made his way up to the nose of the linked-up Gemini 11 spacecraft and its Agena docking vehicle, he could not lock his feet between them as he had planned.

As a result he had to hold on with one hand while he was pulling out a 100-foot rope to attach between the vehicles.

The exercise, which took 30 seconds in practice, wound up requiring 30 minutes, and Conrad called Gordon back in the spacecraft soon after.

Gordon and Conrad told newsmen today about their three-day flight which, except for the space walk, was an unqualified success.

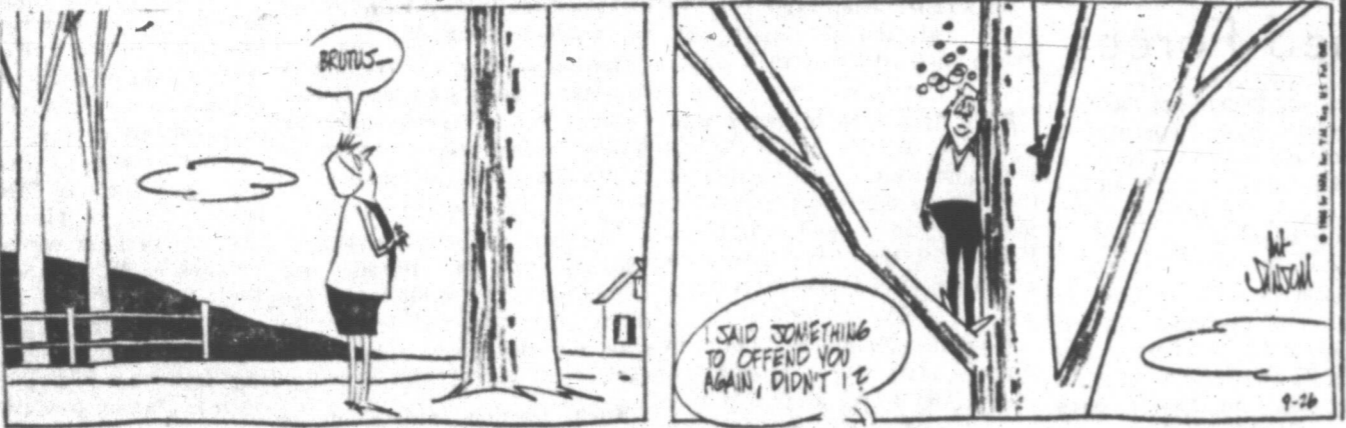

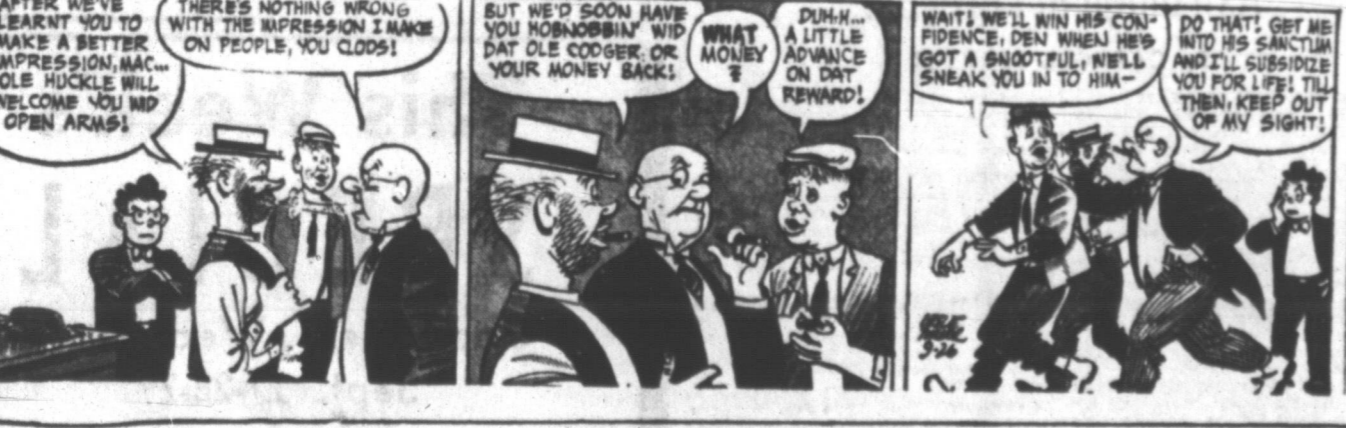

Communism U.S.A. Style

The Communist Party U.S.A. is engaged in an all-out drive to win your affections.

In this week's mail comes an invitation to send for a copy of the Communists' New Draft Program at \$1 a copy.

The program is described as "the first attempt of an organization on the left to offer to the American people a program which comprehensively answers many questions of policy facing the working class and the people's movements today."

The letter we received, signed by William Weinstone, director of New Outlook, New York City publishers, states 46,000 copies of the program already have been distributed throughout the United States.

One of the things in the letter that disturbed us (although it is to be expected) was the statement that "many major universities already have ordered

copies to be used as courses and many public libraries have purchased copies."

"Can it be that our universities and public libraries are falling for this guff and assisting in its circulation?"

Lovett Memorial Library here does not have a copy on its shelves and has not ordered one.

Mr. Weinstone's letter states very bluntly that the book "charts a course for the most effective conduct of battles for today—civil rights, jobs and security, peace and democracy—and for tomorrow's socialist transformation of society."

That last sentence should be warning enough to anybody that the Communists are doing and attempting to do right here under our very noses.

The only reason we can see for reading such a book would be for self-protection.

Monkey Business Isn't Over

Persons who assumed that the evolution issue was resolved by the famous 1925 Scopes trial in Dayton, Tenn., will be surprised to find out that "the situation hasn't changed much in 40 years!"

So declares a writer in the October issue of Together magazine of the Methodist Church.

Robert Gildea cites areas where "religious fundamentalists persist to this day in the belief that in six 24-hour days God created the universe, including man in his present state."

And in 1966, he continues, those people are "rushing to defend a 1928 Arkansas law prohibiting the teaching of evolution." Although that law never has been enforced, a lawsuit has been filed to test whether such a statute conflicts with constitutional guarantees of freedom of speech.

Mrs. Susan Epperson, 24, a biology teacher in Little Rock's Central High School, is supported by the Arkansas Education Association in the suit which is expected to reach the U.S. Supreme Court. The authorized textbook teaches the theory of evolution, but her attorney argues that she would violate state law if she uses it.

"Prominent Little Rock clergy joined in a statement that to use the Bible to support an irrational and archaic concept of static and undeveloping crea-

tionism is not only to misunderstand the meaning of the Book Genesis," Gildea writes in "The Monkey Trial Isn't Over Yet," but to do God and religion a disservice by making both enemies of scientific advancement and academic freedom."

Gildea explains that "the primary thrust of Genesis—to prove that creation did not happen by accident—still stands."

"The Fundamentalists, however, cannot be content with this view," he continues. "They persist in their defense of the inerrancy of Scripture in the face of all evidence to the contrary," even though the majority of theologians and biblical scholars show that the language of Genesis "is symbolic."

Gildea is director of Methodist information for the Indiana Area. He lists current fundamentalist upsurges against the teaching of evolution in Phoenix, Ariz., Kitchener, Ont., and Carmel, Ind. In the latter community, a suburb of Indianapolis, they have organized the Committee for Academic Freedom in School Curriculum which opposes the teaching of evolution because members are religiously offended by science courses which ignore the biblical account.

Meanwhile, in Arkansas Mrs. Epperson has won the first round, but the fight goes on.

Bludgeons the Unmarried

Americans have always tended to look askance at the single person—the balding bachelor, the career girl, in fact, anyone past 30 who has never married.

They get it from all sides. To be single is to be suspected of some sort of duty-shirking to the human race or just plain oddballism. Psychological studies claim the single person is the most insecure, the most ridden by neuroses. Actuarial tables prove he doesn't live as long as his married counter-part.

All this is bad enough. But perhaps the heaviest burden of all for the bachelor or spinster is the outright discrimination practiced against them by the government.

In the first complete study of the federal income tax system since it was "reformed" in 1964, Joseph A. Pechman, director of economic studies for the Brookings Institution, devotes considerable space to the plight of the unmarried taxpayer.

Under the "split income" provision, married couples even without children, are taxed at the rate of half their total income. The single person pays the full rate.

Pechman also argues that the \$600 personal exemption for a taxpayer, his spouse and each dependent is also unfair to single persons. It assumes that it costs twice as much for two persons to live as it does for one. In reality, it costs about three-fourths as much for one person to live as it does for two.

It is time someone spoke up for the single taxpayer, though

it is hardly likely anyone in government will pay any attention. There just aren't enough single adults around to foment a decent riot, much less influence legislation.

Whiskey is one of the oldest alcoholic beverages. It's supposed to have first been distilled around 550 A.D. by the Irish, who called their product "uisquebaugh," which meant "water of life." The Latins also had a little something earlier which they called "aqua vitae," and the French had "eau-de-vie," but the Irish get the credit. Then the English started making their own and called it whiskey. Somehow that name has stuck.

Incidentally, the distinctive taste in whiskey comes from proper blending. The skilled blender is responsible for giving a good whiskey its consistent standard of smoothness. It's the blending that repeats the same fine flavor of a particular brand.

Today's smile: An irate lady told an inebriate: "If I was in your condition, I'd shoot myself." And he told her: "If you were in my condition, you'd mish."

Proof is not an indication of quality in judging whiskey. It is only the measure of alcoholic content of the liquor. Early distillers used to make their own test by mixing one-half gunpowder and one-half whiskey. If the powder didn't ignite when they applied a match to the mixture, it was too weak. If it ignited, and the flame burned too brightly, it was too strong. But if it burned with an even blue flame, it was said to be "proved." That meant it was about 50 percent alcohol by volume. Today there are more accurate methods. Each degree of proof is one-half of one percent of alcohol. Therefore, an 86-proof whiskey contains 43 percent alcohol.

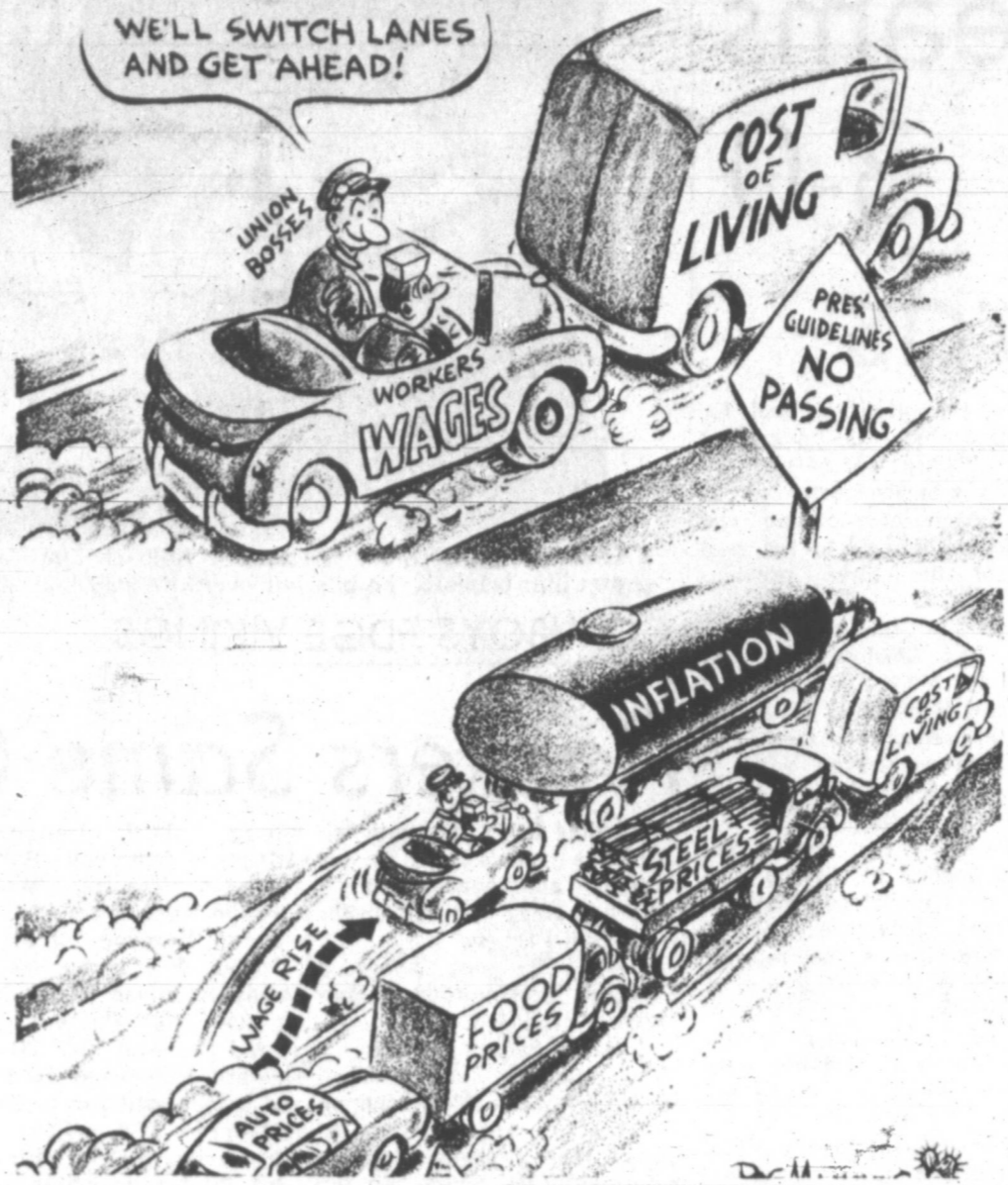

Backstage Washington

Probe of German Agents of U.S. and British Defense Firms Aims U.S. Officials; President to Seek Answers of Erhard

WASHINGTON — High on the agenda of next week's talks between President Johnson and Chancellor Erhard is a West German investigation of German representatives of U.S. and British defense contractors.

At the request of the State and Defense Departments the President will seek the reasons behind and the scope of this probe, which caught Washington authorities by surprise. Last month the Bonn Defense Ministry suddenly notified German agents of American and British arms firms to submit complete details of their financial and other relations with their employers. In several written requests the German Ministry asked for full disclosure of payments received by these company representatives for obtaining military contracts running into hundreds of millions of dollars.

High U.S. officials reportedly are concerned about this little-known probe for the following reasons: —A number of arms contracts under scrutiny were negotiated with U.S. firms under vigorous Pentagon prodding. These West German purchases were designed to offset the drain of U.S. dollars resulting from the maintaining of 300,000 American troops in Europe. —U.S. defense contractors have complained that their German representatives are being asked for secret information which could benefit competitors if disclosed. —Washington officials see possibility of an international arms sales scandal breaking during the crucial congressional election.

GETTING THE FACTS —This backstage political and foreign affairs bombshell was turned over to President Johnson after the State and Defense Departments were able to obtain only the barest details about the Bonn investigation. Bonn officials would say only that the inquiry is based on a 1961 law, drafted at the instigation of former Defense Minister Franz Strauss, to combat illegal activities by lobbyists and manipulators.

Similarly Washington ran into a blank wall in endeavoring to ascertain whether the sale of F-104 jet fighters, of which 62 have crashed in Germany, was involved in the probe.

In recent weeks American businessmen in West Germany have reported that the Bonn government is now demanding inclusion of a clause in all arms contracts permitting full access to the records and files of the U.S. firms.

British firms confronted with this requirement are urging their Foreign Office to protest it. So far, they have refused to agree to the provision. President Johnson's discussion of the matter with Chancellor Erhard will probably determine what U.S. firms do.

Foreign Markets Offer Opportunity to Farmers

WASHINGTON (NEA) — The Agriculture Department would think more daringly about increasing exports a bit less bureaucratically about crop controls, the United States would be better off and the United States balance of payments problem less serious. Studies of foreign markets indicate that in the next decade the United States farmer should be able to steadily increase his own exports on a wide front. That is, he will be able to do this if his competitive position is not destroyed by government restrictions.

World shortages of food and other agricultural products are going to get worse in the late 1960s and early 1970s.

The population in a host of countries is growing faster than their ability to increase food production.

Take Japan as an outstanding example.

Forecasts of Japan's economic growth indicate that the country is in a position to increase imports of basic Ameri-

agricultural crops over-all 3 per cent a year.

Japan is now the No. 1 foreign market for United States agricultural products. That is, United States alone took 14 per cent of all United States agricultural exports in 1965, compared with the 23 per cent taken by the entire European Community.

Japan took more cotton, wheat and rice last year than the European Community and exceeded all individual countries in dollar imports of soybeans, corn grain, sorghums, barley, hides and skins and tallow.

During the past five years there have been sharp increases in United States exports to Japan of soybeans and other oilseeds, wheat, rice, feed grains, tallow, tobacco, fruit and non-fat dry milk.

Detailed studies of Japan's future needs by Japanese economists indicate that this should be only the beginning.

Japan's total beef imports from all countries are expected to more than quadruple between 1965 and 1975.

In that same period, the studies predict:

Japan's total wheat imports will jump a third, feed grain imports almost triple, cotton imports rise 20 per cent, high-grade tobacco imports double, dairy product imports move up sharply.

If the United States is alert and our prices are competitive, the American farmer will get a large chunk of those increases. Japan is only one example of growing worldwide needs for United States food and other agricultural products.

Per capita food production between 1961 and 1966 moved down 2.8 per cent in the Far East, 3 per cent in Africa and 3.9 per cent in Latin America.

Experts estimate that if present population and agricultural trends continue there will be famines of serious proportions in India, Pakistan and Red China early in the next decade with equally serious shortages in Indonesia, Iran, Egypt and Turkey a few years later.

These reports indicate that at present world population increases, world agricultural production will have to triple within the next 34 years to barely make possible a "modest" diet for everyone.

A recent survey done in Harlem for the N.Y. TIMES, the American Broadcasting Co., and an unnamed foundation can be placed alongside the editorial on crime and public reaction in the 9-12-66 Pampa Daily News. Both show the need to halt the growth of crime. More police protection is wanted.

The editorial reported, "Discontent is increasing largely because of a feeling that persons elected to public office have failed to take the steps necessary to maintain law and order."

One of the Harlem residents added, "Welfare dependents are breeding too fast. These welfare dependents should be placed in a neighborhood by themselves instead of in projects with decent working-class men and women. They build slums wherever they go."

Therefore, leaders such as Vice President Humphrey, who says he "could lead a mighty good revolt" if he lived in a ghetto with garbage lying around and rats biting his kids, ought instead to consider his neighborhood's need for an education in the rudiments of household hygiene, pest control, child care and discipline, the value of holding a job, and the worthlessness of loitering, rioting, looting, and crime.

The Doctor Says:

Lotions or Powder Better Than Alcohol in Chafing
Q—My skin chafes very easily, especially the inner surface of my thighs. Will using rubbing alcohol in this area strengthen the skin?

A—The chafed area should be kept clean and dry. Calamine lotion, Lassar's paste or zinc stearate powder would be more effective than alcohol. Over-treatment or infection would tend to aggravate this condition, in which case it is best to have a doctor decide what treatment to use.

Q—I have periodic attacks of colitis. Would taking Maalox aggravate this condition?
A—No. This combination of magnesium and aluminum hydroxide neither increases nor decreases the rate of peristaltic movement in your intestines.

Q—What does the diet for colitis consist of? Is there any medicine for this condition?
A—For colitis a bland diet with no roughage (bran, vegetable and fruit) is essential. When all vegetable and fruit is eliminated from the diet it is necessary to take vitamin supplements. The medicines given for colitis include antifoaming agents, enzymes, mineral replacements, modifiers of the type of bacteria in the bowel, relaxants that work on the intestinal muscles, sedatives, and tranquilizers. Many drugs are available in each of these categories. Let your doctor decide which you need, if any.

A—Vitamin B-12 is now recognized as the most effective treatment for this disease. Although some doctors prefer to inject it into the hip muscles, tablets that can be taken by mouth are also available.

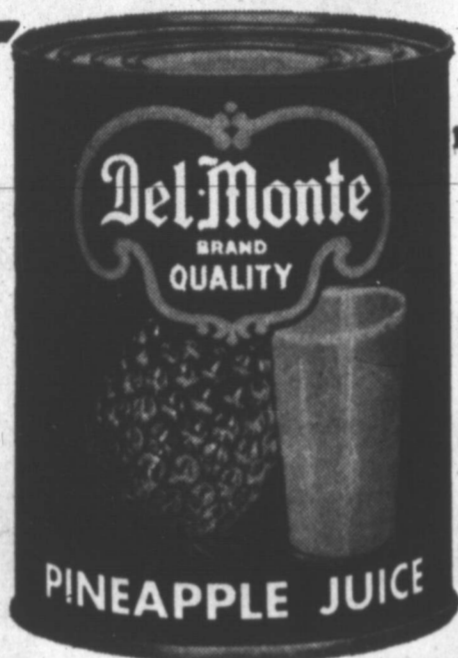

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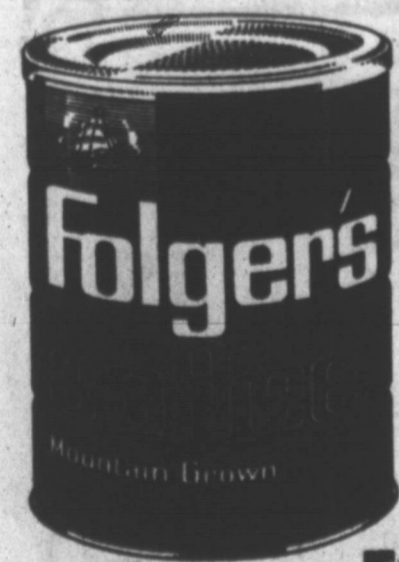
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
