Police said they had a witness to the slavings but declined to identify him, other than that he was a soldier staying with one of the slain couples.

Firemen arrived at the boarding house owned by Albert Mearse, 72, to find every room afire. They found Mearse's body in a hallway outside his bedroom. The body of his wife, 75, was in bed. Both had their throats slashed.

Pvt Michael Artz, 23, stationed at Ft. Bliss, was found half out a door to his apartment. He had been shot in the chest. Mrs. Artz, 20, was shot in the head and her body was on the floor. Covers on the Artz' bed were

All the bodies were removed from the house before fire destroyed them.

Firemen found Morales in a driveway rext to the burning house, unconscious from smoke inhalation. Three firemen revived him then subdued him when he became belligerent, police said.

Police said they had established no motive for the slayings.

> Mao has given the Red Guards his personal blessing and made them the vanguard of his "revolution." United with the Chinese army under Lin, the Red Guard would be the most powerful deterrent to Mao's political foes.

However, according to Japanese correspondents in Peking, the Red Guards apparently have run into opposition from rival groups in some parts of China. There were reports of violence between Peking youths and rural anti-Mao groups.

The official Peking People's Daily, in an apparent reference to this opposition, warned in an editorial today that Mao and Lin were determined to "crush the people's enemies at all

While it urged the "cultural revolution" be carried out with non-violence whenever possible, the editorial made it clear "in case our enemies dare to use weapons to sabotage this cultural revolution, we can certainly silence them. The country's military might is ours, real in our hands."
