

Lighter Side The

WASHINGTON (UPI) —The
Astrodome, Houston's all-weather
baseball stadium, appears to
be having a peculiar effect on
Texans.

I first noticed this last month
when I was visiting my native
state.

One of my relatives, a
middle-aged widow, happened
to mention that she had been in
the Astrodome earlier in the
summer. This rather surprised
me because she lives about 400
miles from Houston.

"Did you enjoy the game?" I
asked.

"What game?"
"I understood you to say you
had been to Houston to see a
baseball game."

"Don't be silly. I wouldn't go
across the street to see a
baseball game. I said I had
been to see the Astrodome."

It turned out that he had
driven to Houston, taken a tour
of the empty stadium and then
driven home again.

My first thought was that the
poor soul had lost her marbles.
But when I made a few
discreet inquiries among other
members of the family, I
learned that her behavior was
normal.

I was told that thousands of
Texans had visited the Astro-
dome when no game was being
played. Apparently they felt
that baseball would detract
from their enjoyment of the
stadium.

A man who had actually seen
a game in the Astrodome said
it also was a bit unusual. He
said many spectators spent
more time watching the electro-
nic scoreboard than what was
happening on the field.

The New Breed
After I returned to Washing-
ton, I began to mull this over.
Traveling long distances to see
baseball games is no novelty,
but driving 400 miles not to see
a game is something else
entirely.

I concluded that the Astro-
dome was creating a new breed
of fans—or rather, non-fans.

A few days later, when the
Washington Senators were play-
ing away from home, I drove
out to D.C. Stadium and spent
a few minutes sitting in the
empty stands.

There were no guided tours,
as at the Astrodome, but it was
nevertheless a pleasant expe-
rience. In some ways it was
better than watching the
Senators play.

It then occurred to me that
baseball owners probably would
pick up a lot of extra cash by
catering to non-fans.

Merely keeping the gates
open likely would not attract
much of a crowd, except in
Texas, but if they offered a
regular schedule of non-games,
it could be a big drawing card.

Texas Republicans Will Stand Greatest Chance For Victory

AUSTIN, Tex. (UPI) — Texas Republicans — pushed into a deep, dark cellar in the 1964 elections — could make more gains in November than any time since reconstruction days. But, it is expected to come on an all or nothing basis.

The Republicans, who had only state Rep. Frank Cahoon of Midland and U.S. Sen. John Tower to call their own after President Johnson's sweep in 1964, have picked their spots for November, and many observers believe they picked them well. "It will be feast or famine," one top-ranking Republican official said. "If Tower runs strong in Dallas and Houston we could have 18 to 20 representatives in the House."

GOP Feast?
That would be a feast. The GOP has never had more than eight representatives in the statehouse this century.

And, observers feel the Republicans could place at least three members in the Senate. State Rep. Hank Grover of Houston and Ike Harris and Thomas Crouch in Dallas are all given a good chance to win the voters' favor.

A victory by any one of the

candidates would strengthen the party position, since there has not been a GOP member of the Senate since the 1800s.

It is a far different picture from that painted by GOP officials early this year.

They indicated, at least statewide, that they were going to put all their eggs in one basket and push Tower to victory in his fight against Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr.

But, five of their six congressional candidates are considered 50-50 to better odds to win, and even three statewide hopefuls have decided they don't like the "token candidate" label.

Albert Fay of Houston, Republican National Committeeman who made the race for land commissioner in 1962, definitely plans to try and unseat Democrat Jerry Sadler.

Hot Campaign
Fay, who received 34 per cent of the vote in that run, has been living up support, and plans to start an intensive campaign in early September. High officials in the party said Fay has already made his brochure, and is expected to get some boosts from the Latin-American oriented "Democrats for Tower" groups in San Antonio and Cor-

pus Christi.

It also gave him a big boost down the line when the state AFL-CIO endorsed the Republican, the first time in state history a GOP hopeful has drawn the labor-stamp of approval.

Rudy Garza of Corpus Christi, the GOP candidate for comptroller, has also made it known to close associates that he plans to shake loose and stage a strong campaign against Robert S. Calvert. The "Democrats for Tower" groups in Garza's city and San Antonio are ready to unroll the banners and help both Fay and Garza in such a move.

Richardson attorney Robb Stewart, making the attorney general's race against Democratic nominee Crawford Martin, shook loose last month to announce he would stage a strong battle.

But, on the whole, the GOP eyes are on the Tower-Carr race, and the benefits they expect to derive from it.

The GOP has 42 state representatives in Congressional races who hope Tower will run strong enough to give them a "feast" instead of another 1964 "famine."

FDA Makes Plans To Put End To Mexican Arthritis Hoax

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A Dixie congressman and the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) have teamed to stop a cruel hoax on arthritis sufferers lured across the Mexican border in search of relief.

The FDA blames at least six deaths and another half dozen serious afflictions in Texas and Louisiana on a drug prescribed by a doctor in Piedras Negras, Mexico.

Rep. Otto Passman, D-La., became interested in the medication last spring when he received complaints from constituents that it was unavailable in the United States. He was asked to use his influence to get it authorized for U.S. sale.

The drug, variously known as Dimethyl Pyrazolone Sulfamide, Dipyrone, Novalgine, Pyralgin and Narone, has a definite therapeutic effect on arthritis. In some cases victims have been miraculously cured or the affliction arrested.

Side Effects
But serious side effects develop, sometimes unknown to the patient. Chief of these is the destruction of white blood cells resulting in serious damage or death.

After hearing glowing reports from constituents about the drug, Passman traced one form of it to a German firm, Farwerke Hoechst Ag, Frankfurt, West Germany. He contacted Dr. Hubert E. Huckel, director of medical research for the U.S. affiliate of the German organization, Hoechst Pharmaceutical Co., Cincinnati, Ohio.

Huckel replied that Novalgine was produced and sold by his company in Europe and various other countries throughout the world, but not in the United States. He said, however, there were two U.S. products chemically identical. He listed them as Narone, produced by the Ulmer Pharmaceutical Co., Minneapolis, and Pyralgin (Dipyrone), produced by Savage Laboratories, Houston, Tex.
