Dockworkers To Sign Agreement

SAIGON (UPI) — Striking dockworkers at the port of Saigon today reached an agreement with American military authorities to end a five-day-old walkout that had threatened the nation's fragile economy.

Republicans Take Stand Against General Tax Hike

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Republican answer to President Johnson's State of the Union address will include, among other things, a firm stand against a general tax increase at this time.

The GOP version — their so-called "state of the union" message — will be presented five days after Johnson addresses the nation shortly after the 90th Congress convenes Jan. 10.

Johnson has been working in Texas on his address, and was reported still undecided whether to call for an across-the-board tax increase to meet Vietnam war costs.

But the Republicans are not taking any chances in case Johnson decides that a tax hike is necessary.

GOP House leader Gerald R. Ford, Mich., adopted the position against an increase because of fears that a tax hike at this time could lead to recession.

Ford will deliver the domestic part of the Republican answer. Senate GOP leader Everett Dirksen, Ill., will concentrate on foreign affairs.

The bulk of the Republican proposals on issues has not yet been formulated, however. But it was learned that some economic sections have been developed.

Participants in preliminary discussions said the Republican draft will contain proposals on Social Security, revenue sharing, crime and other subjects.

The Social Security proposal, it was learned, will be tied to the cost of living. It will recommend as the GOP alternative to federal grant-in-aid programs a plan to have a percentage of federal tax revenue returned to states and cities.

Red China's Nuclear Bomb Threat Grows

HONG KONG (UPI) — Key military sources here today predicted Red China would be able to hit most of Asia—and Russia—with a missile-borne hydrogen bomb by the end of 1967.

They also said Red China should be able to post a nuclear missile threat to the United States west ahead of the 1970-75 period predicted in the past by U.S. Defense Department officials.

Acceleration of nuclear testing and the surmounting of technology and assistance drawbacks were viewed by the sources as conclusions to be drawn from Red China's fifth explosion of an atomic device.

Wednesday's blast was the atomic test in eight weeks and the third this year.

Red China's drive for perfection of an H-bomb and political pressures at home and abroad were considered the key reasons for a step-up in the weapons testing program, the sources explained.

They believe refinement—the search for a bigger bang in a smaller package—has top priority in the Chinese nuclear program.

to sign a formal agreement at the Vietnamese Labor Ministry Saturday morning.

About 5,000 Vietnamese longshoremen struck Monday to protest the U.S. Army's dismissal of temporary stevedores at the \$50 million military port recently constructed around the bend of the Saigon River from the main Saigon port.

Settlement came after a general strike called in Saigon today in support of the workers failed to come off. Some electrical workers and bus drivers walked off their jobs but the Vietnamese army stepped in to prevent any serious disruption of public services.

According to the agreement reached at a bargaining session today, cargo at the new port will be handled exclusively by U.S. Army stevedores. The Army insisted on this point for security reasons and to keep the flow of vital war supplies free from the threat of strikes.

At the same time, the Army agreed to the immediate employment at the main port of 288 of the dismissed workers and promised to make jobs available as soon as possible for the remainder of the 600 who had been working at the military port.

"Everything is over. They're going back to work," said William Moyers of Petersburg, W. Va., director of civilian personnel for the U.S. Army.

The walkout tied up thousands of tons of valuable civilian cargo at the Saigon port, although military stevedores kept vital war supplies flowing almost normally.

Conflict Flares In Middle East

JERUSALEM, Jordan (UPI) — Long-smoldering discord between Arab League nations threatened to flare into open Middle East conflict today in the wake of the alleged murder of a Jordanian border guard by Syrian troops.

The Jordanian government charged Thursday that Syrian soldiers had crossed into Jordan and fatally machine-gunned Jordanian security guard Sgt. Faisal Murad on his front doorstep.

An official Jordanian announcement said Murad, assigned to order duty, "was at the time with his family and children at his house."

It was reported later Thursday that a series of small explosions were set off Tuesday in the Jordanian capital city of Amman. One blast was in front of the Soviet Embassy.

Travelers in Amman at the time reported one explosion shattered windows at the Goethe cultural center. Other blasts went off near the offices of Premier Wasfi Tell and his information minister, they said.

(At the same time, Amman Radio reported that Egyptian authorities in Cairo had discovered explosives under the desk of the director of the "Voice of the Arabs" radio, used by the Palestine Liberation Organization (PLO) to broadcast to Palestinian refugees in Jordan.)

The Amman incidents were believed to have been the work of the militant PLO which is demanding overthrow of Jordan's King Hussein and use of force against neighboring Israel.

The Cairo-based PLO, which called itself a "revolutionary movement" organization, has joined left-leaning Syria in bitter attacks on Hussein's moderate approach to the Israel problem.

Tight Poverty Cut Complaints Bug Chief Executive

AUSTIN, Tex. (UPI) — President Johnson is moving to stave off charges that he is cutting back too hard on his war on poverty because of mounting financial demands of the war in Vietnam.

He also appeared anxious to counter speculation that he was on the outs with the poverty program's director, Sargent Shriver.

Johnson met at his ranch with Shriver Thursday for what the Texas White House described as a review of the poverty program's activities in the last year and legislative plans for it in 1967.

Major emphasis was devoted to the Head Start program, which provides pre-school training to prepare disadvantaged youngsters for their classroom education. There have been complaints that while the Head Start program is a huge success there is no "follow-through" for the children once they enter the first grades in the schools in their areas.

Johnson and Shriver "talked about ways of carrying the benefits of the Head Start program on through the child's early years in school," the Texas White House said.

The White House said that Johnson and Shriver would "continue...in Washington later" their discussion of "the anti-poverty legislation that will be submitted to the new congress" next year.

There have been indications that Congress will be taking a close, hard look at the poverty program in 1967—some members with a view toward pumping new life and funds into it but others from a standpoint of cutting back even more than Congress did this year.

Moon Rocket Due Another Test Today

BAY ST. LOUIS, Miss. (UPI) — The Mississippi test facility says if all goes well it hopes to try today for the third time this month to test the hard-luck Saturn S2 rocket.

A spokesman at the facility said engineers hoped to start the countdown early today and fire the rocket before noon.

The S2, second stage of the mighty Saturn 5 moon rocket, performed perfectly for over six minutes during a static test firing Dec. 1.

However, last week, during a scheduled full-duration burn, the rocket was cut off after less than a second because a sensor failed to signal that one of the rocket's five engines had ignited.

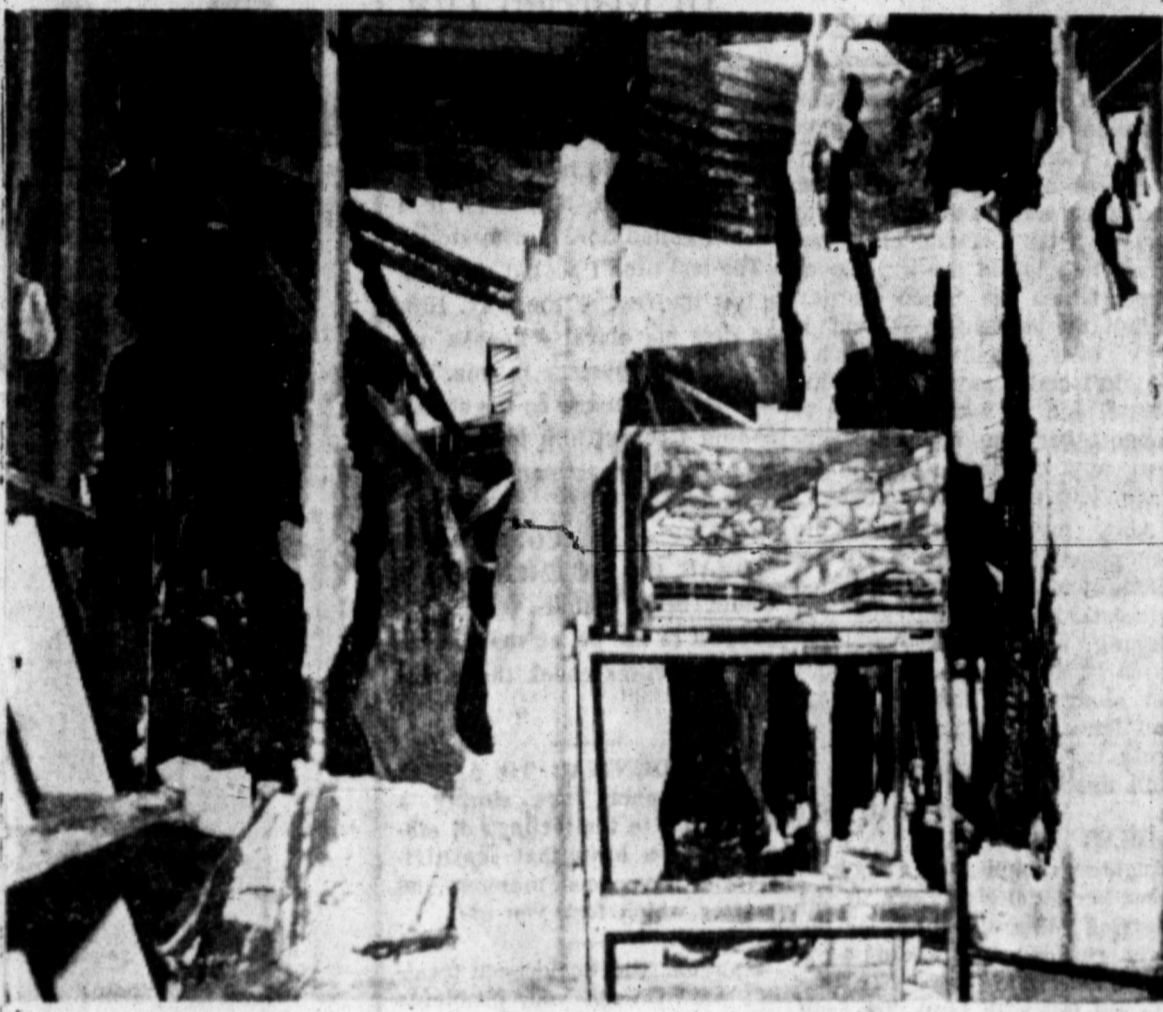
An inspection showed the engine, and the other four, ignited perfectly. The trouble was caused by a short circuit in the tiny engine ignition probe, which is about the size of a man's little finger nail.

The troubles and accidents involving the second stage have been holding up the entire Saturn 5 program. The first flight of Saturn 5, which eventually will launch American astronauts toward the moon, had been set for January. It has now been moved back to late next year.

APPEAL IS FILED

New Trial For Vessels Denied

A supplemental motion seeking a new trial for convicted rapist Tom R. Vessels was overruled by Judge Lewis M. Goodrich in 31st District Court here at noon today.

Defense counsel Warren Burnett of Odessa immediately filed notice of appeal to the Court of Criminal Appeals in Austin.

Vessels was convicted and sentenced to death last Oct. 29 by a district court jury after a week-long trial. The case had involved the criminal assault of a Pampa housewife in her home last April 28.

A sudden turn of events shortly before the judge's ruling was handed down threw the courtroom scene into one of excitement.

Defense counsel Burnett had been on the stand testifying about evidence his staff was investigating but had not completely developed. This was evidence, Burnett stated, favorable to his client and evidence that tended to prove Vessels' innocence.

The only other witness this forenoon was Ron Cross of The News who testified about the extent of trial news coverage.

As Burnett concluded his testimony, District Judge Lewis M. Goodrich called Burnett and District Attorney Bill Waters into his chamber for a conference.

As the recess started, Vessels arose at the trial table and spoke to Sheriff Rufe Jordan. Jordan and Vessels walked out of the courtroom into the third floor corridor where Vessels collapsed and began writhing on the floor. He was placed in the elevator and hurried to the county jail hospital ward.

Dr. Joe Gates, county physician, was called and began an examination of Vessels shortly before 12 o'clock noon.

When Burnett was testifying he told the court that because of the lack of time and the holidays he had been unable to get witnesses to Pampa who would be beneficial to Vessels' case.

He also stated there was evidence that had not been fully developed in connection with a telephone call to the rape victim's home on the morning of the same day the crime was committed. He stated he had evidence of other persons in the neighborhood who had at various times been victims of suspicious incidents and that he had witnesses who said they had seen a person running down the

Area Emloyes At Borger Phillips Co. Threaten Strike

Talks were to resume in Borger at 2 p.m. today in efforts to avoid a strike which has been called for midnight Saturday at the Phillips Petroleum Co. in Borger.

Members of Local 351 of AFL-CIO International Union of Operating Engineers voted last night in Borger to strike unless a settlement is reached before the deadline on demands made on the company last month.

The Borger local is made up of more than 2,000 union members from Borger, Pampa, Phillips, Dumas and Cactus. It was estimated approximately 400 of the workers live in Pampa.

The vote was included in a nationwide participation with other locals across the nation and involved some 65,000 oil workers.

Negotiations going on in Borger are being conducted between company and union officials before a representative of the U.S. Mediation and Conciliation Service from Oklahoma City.

Union representatives said the strike was called over dissatisfaction with the current contract. The union is seeking an 18 cents an hour wage raise and double time for all overtime. Also sought is another 18-cent hourly increase on Jan. 1, 1968, and a better retirement plan among other demands.

The union's contracts expire nationwide at midnight tomorrow and affect approximately 65,000 oil company workers across the country.

Pentagon Dismayed Over Bomb Criticism

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Pentagon leaders are dismayed by mounting criticism of civilian casualties in Vietnam air strikes. They regard present bombing techniques as the most accurate ever used and full of precautions to avoid such deaths.

Defense officials also expressed surprise in talks with UPI that the criticism came in the face of calls by their powerful congressional backers to damn world opinion and expand the bombing—a view not shared by all congressmen.

Officials said that in no previous conflict in which bombs were used has the selection of targets and the tactics used been as restrictive as they have been in the raids against North Vietnam.

In addition, they said, the development of secret electronic aids used in the strikes has made the bombing in Vietnam much more accurate than it was in other wars.

Officials conceded that despite precautions, civilian casualties do occur. But they said that raids are not scheduled when such casualties can be foreseen.

There was no immediate comment from within the Pentagon on congressional calls for expanding bombing issued by members including Chairman L. Mendel Rivers, D-S.C., of the House Armed Services Committee.

Troops Chase Reds While Truce Nears

SAIGON (UPI) — American planes flew their final raids of the year today and dropped bombs sardonically labeled "Happy New Year, Uncle Ho." In the South, U.S. Cavalrymen aided by air strikes chased a Communist force through the last hours before the new holiday truce.

The air cavalrymen reported killing or capturing almost 100 Communists in scattered contact with a guerrilla force of unknown size in South Vietnam's Central Highlands.

The Americans called in giant B52s to pound suspected Communist positions and supply dumps near the Laotian border.

The Strategic bombers also hit Communist troop concentrations in the Demilitarized Zone (DMZ).

In Saigon, meanwhile, agreement was reached to end a five-day strike by Vietnamese longshoremen that threatened to cripple South Vietnam's "fragile economy."

The new strikes against the North were launched from bases in South Vietnam and Thailand and from Navy carriers in the Gulf of Tonkin. Flight crews painted several of the 600-pound bombs with cryptic year-end messages to North Vietnamese President Ho Chi Minh.

The 48-hour New Year's truce—second cease-fire in a week—were scheduled to begin at 5 p.m. CST today and end at the same hour Sunday night. South Vietnamese Premier Nguyen Cao Ky warned in advance that if the Communists again violated the truce agreement—as they did at Christmastime—this cease-fire could be the last.

Ky said repeated cease-fire violations by the Communists already have caused reconsideration of an allied offer of a 96-hour truce during the Asian new year (TET) in February. There were 122 cease-fire violations by the Communists reported during the 48-hour Christmas truce.

"It is too late to change the Western New Year cease-fire because it is so near at hand," Ky said. "But if the Viet Cong continue their violations the government will have to revise its proposal for the TIT cease-fire that we ourselves suggested."

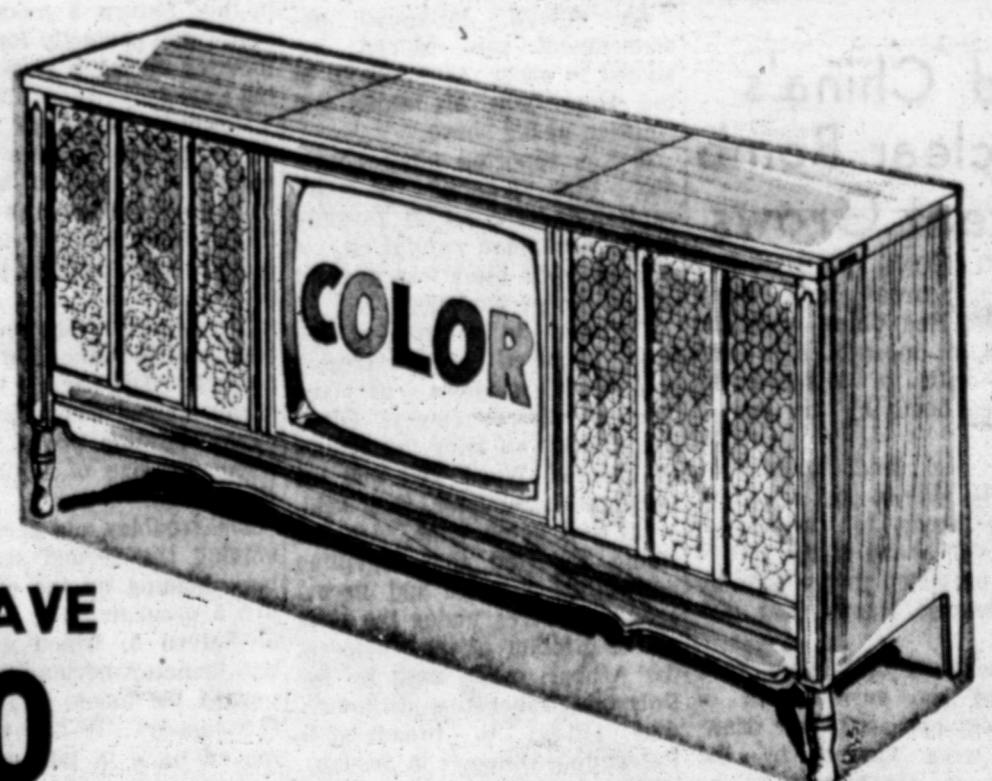

NEW YORK (UPI) — Singer Barbra Streisand, the Cinderella girl from Brooklyn who starred in "Funny Girl," gave birth Thursday to a 7-pound, 12-ounce son.

She and her husband Elliott Gould, an actor, named the child Jason Emanuel. Mother and son were reported doing fine.

Miss Streisand portrayed Fanny Brice in the Broadway and London productions of "Funny Girl." When she discovered she was pregnant she cancelled a 20-city, \$1 million American concert tour. Because of this, the expected baby was called the "million dollar baby."

Miss Streisand is scheduled to begin rehearsals next spring for the movie version of "Funny Girl."

In the Mekong Delta south of Saigon, South Vietnamese forces withdrew from the U Minh forest after killing 89 Viet Cong in a three-day battle. Spokesmen said Communists, holed up in the area for years, fled before they could be cornered and forced to fight.

During the Christmas ceasefire American intelligence sources found substantial evidence of a Communist build-up in both troops and supplies. Military commanders predicted the same thing would occur throughout the New Year's truce.

The only Latin American nation to have combat troops with the Allies in both World War's was Brazil, notes World Book Encyclopedia.

(Continued From Page 1) Ranger Bill Baten, Sheriff Rufe Jordan, Tex DeWeese of The Pampa-Daily News, Don Boyett of the Amarillo Globe News and Lou Troja, a member of the jury which found Vessels guilty and sentenced him to death in the electric chair.

Much of the testimony at yesterday's hearing had to do with finger and palm prints and hairs found on a bedspread taken from the bed of the rape victim's home.

Prior to the calling of witnesses yesterday, defense counsel Burnett and District Attorney engaged in argument over the court's jurisdiction in the case in its present status as related to the first hearing on a motion for new trial which was heard Dec. 22.

Burnett asked the court to remove the original order overruling the first motion for a new trial. Waters said he would not object if the defense would withdraw its notice of appeal to the order. Burnett refused and said he would not waive any of the defendant's rights. Waters contended the court did not have power to do away with the order unless the notice of appeal also was withdrawn.

Judge Goodrich refused the defense motion and ordered the hearing to proceed. Burnett said all of the defense witnesses were not in court because of a lack of time for them to be served with subpoenas.

Burnett then filed a supplemental motion for a new trial and said he would introduce evidence to show certain finger and palm prints were in the possession of local police and known to the prosecutor and that no efforts were made to compare them with Vessels' prints.

"But they may be the prints," Burnett said, "of a third person who may well be the guilty person."

Sgt. Wallace was called to the stand and told of taking the prints at the scene. He said he did not attempt to compare them with Vessels' fingerprints because the palm print was only a partial and smudgy one and the finger print was small and appeared to be that of a woman. Wallace testified the prints were not sent to a crime laboratory for examination because he didn't think they were of value.

Burnett then asked that court be recessed until an expert could be brought in to inspect and evaluate the prints. The defense attorney said he had been on the phone yesterday noon trying to get an expert to contrast the prints with his client or any-

one else who might have been in the room where they were found.

Judge Goodrich said he would overrule the motion to recess court "for the time-being."

Attorney Comer was called to the stand briefly and said he had been appointed by the court during the first week in November to defend Vessels, but two or three days later asked to be relieved of the appointment and the request was granted.

Chemist Taft of the Texas DPS was questioned at length about hairs found on the bedspread in the rape victim's home.

He testified specimens of hair from the defendant and from the victim were "not similar" to hairs on the bedspread. District Attorney Waters asked the witness if it could not be possible that the hairs found on the bedspread may have been those of the victim's husband. Taft said it was possible.

Burnett then asked: "Isn't it also reasonable to assume that the hair found on the bed might have been those of the person who raped the woman." Taft replied in the affirmative.

Burnett then stated that in view of the testimony about the hairs he moved that court be recessed until hair specimens from the victim's husband could be evaluated by Taft and defense experts so the report would be available to the defendant.

Judge Goodrich overruled the motion to delay the proceedings a few days.

Police Sergeant Wallace was recalled and testified he saw the hairs on the bedspread, folded it up and put it in a paper bag and took it to the police station.

Sheriff Jordan took the stand and said he gave the package containing the bedspread to Donald Overstreet of the Department of Public Safety who flew to Austin with it and turned it over to the DPS crime laboratory.

Juror Troja was called and asked by Burnett if jurors had not commented on the fact that Vessels did not take the stand during his trial.

Troja said there was no comment on that point during deliberations on guilt or innocence of the accused. He said that while jurors were discussing the degree of the penalty that should be given, he did hear one man comment but there was no general discussion about it.

DeWeese and Boyett were asked about circulation of their newspapers which had carried news stories of the crime, the subsequent arrest and trial of the defendant and stories about the case up to date.

An official of the Veterans Administration Hospital in Waco, the defendant's mother and an Amarillo psychiatrist who had examined Vessels last June and July were not in court yesterday although they were on the subpoena list.

Shortly before 5 p.m. Burnett told the court no more witnesses were present relevant to the motion and supplemental motion for a new trial.

County Exceeds 1966 Bond Goal

During November, United States Savings Bond sales in Gray County amounted to \$16,687, according to George B. Cree Jr., chairman of the county Savings Bonds Committee.

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Reawakening of New Concept In Religion

Religion in America

One of the more significant religious developments of 1966 has been a reawakening of interest in evangelism.

A world congress on evangelism was held in Berlin during October. And evangelism was a main theme of the general assembly of the National Council of Churches, which met last week in Miami Beach, Fla.

Evangelism is, by definition, a distinctively Christian enterprise. The term is derived from a Greek word which means "bringing good news." In Christian usage, evangelism is proclaiming the good news that in Jesus Christ, "God has visited and redeemed his people."

Although nearly all Christians would agree that evangelism is the primary business of the church, there is a vigorous difference of opinion, particularly among Protestants, on how it is to be carried on.

Communication Vs. Action
Conservative Protestants think of evangelism primarily in terms of verbal communication. Evangelism, in their view, is carried on through preaching—especially the kind of preaching which puts a strong emphasis on conversion—or through "personal witness." The latter term is applied to efforts by individual Christians, laymen as well as clergy, to spread the Gospel in private conversations with friends, neighbors or chance acquaintances.

Liberal Protestants are persuaded, in the words of Harvard theologian Harvey Cox, that "people today are more interested in what the church does than in what it says." So they think of evangelism primarily in terms of deeds which demonstrate Christian love and concern for human welfare.

Until fairly recently, neither side was inclined to see any merit in the other's point of view. Liberals looked down their noses at the "old evangelism" symbolized by Billy Graham's crusades and questioned whether lasting con-

versions can be achieved in an atmosphere of emotional excitement. Conservatives scowled at the "new evangelism" of social action symbolized by the Selma march, and asked wherein it differs from secular humanitarianism.

Attitudes Soften
Lately, however, conciliatory voices have been raised from both camps. Billy Graham, in his first appearance at a National Council of Churches assembly, went out of his way to say that there is more than one way of communicating the Christian Gospel.

"We communicate the Gospel by authoritative proclamation of the word of God," said the famous preacher. "But we also communicate it by loving our neighbor and by a compassionate social concern."

Dr. Arthur S. Flemming, who will be a chief spokesman for liberal Protestantism in his new role as president of the National Council of Churches, responded with a prompt amen.

"It is absurd to talk as though we were faced with an either-or choice in this matter," said Dr. Flemming. "To be effective, evangelism must include both preaching and social action."

Share Faith
Later, in a message addressed to all local churches of its 34 member denominations, the assembly also put in a good word for the man-to-man communication with conservatives call "personal witnessing."

"Christians are too seldom helpfully involved in the spiritual needs of other people," said the message. "Many of us hesitate to share our faith."

Rebuking this reticence, the message said that to be silent about Christ is a kind of selfishness.

"We know Jesus Christ is the answer to our own deepest spiritual longings," it said. "Sharing him is like offering food to hungry people."

Clergyman Says Vietnam War Has Justification

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The U.S. military effort in Vietnam, sharply criticized by some American clergymen, has received an unqualified endorsement from the leader of one of the nation's four major faith groups.

Archbishop Iakovos, Greek Orthodox primate, returned from a four-week visit to Asia convinced that "our intervention in Vietnam has a strong moral justification."

"In my opinion, the United States is the only major power which still upholds and believes in the moral obligations which emanated from the international agreements on Vietnam reached in Geneva in 1954," said the primate.

"This is a civil war fought between Communist and democracy. That is the real issue of the fighting in Vietnam."

The Roman Catholic bishops of the United States at their meeting here last month said that they could "conscientiously support" the U.S. position in Vietnam "in the present circumstances."

But they quickly added that it is the duty of every one to search for other alternatives. "We are bound always to make sure that our government does, in fact, pursue every possibility that offers even the slightest hope of a peaceful settlement."

The general assembly of the National Council of Churches, which includes most of the major Protestant denominations, was sharply critical of the administration's handling of the Vietnam problem in a statement adopted at Miami Beach last week.

Asserting that "this war must be brought to an end soon," the General Assembly called for serious consideration of a unilateral halt in bombing and other "risk" actions to bring about peace negotiations.

Several major Jewish groups also have voiced grave moral reservations about the course this country is following in Vietnam.

Is Rumor Of God's Death Dead?

Whatever became of the "death of God" movement? A year ago, it was getting reams of publicity. Time did a cover story on it. The New Yorker ran a three-part series. Television networks put together documentaries. Publishers rushed into print with scores of books.

At theological seminars, Rudolph Bultmann and Paul Tillich suddenly became passe. To be in, a seminarian had to quote Thomas Altizer and William Hamilton.

There were, to be sure, a number of old-fashioned types who clung to the notion that God would survive his undertakers.

But among the really relevant, it was fervently believed that "Christian atheism" was the wave of the future.

If so, it must now be reported that the wave of the future, like so many waves of the past, has apparently washed over the shore and retreated into the sea whence it came, without greatly altering the topography.

To Believe Or

There are today, as there always have been, a great many people who don't believe in God. And there are a great many others who do believe in God. If the proclamation of God's death has resulted in any increase in the former group, or any decrease in the latter, it has not been perceptible to close observers of the religious scene, nor has it been reflected in statistical measurements of church membership, attendance and contributions.

Christian atheism did provide a lively topic of conversation for a while. But it never seemed to catch on as a way of life. It evidently was too Christian for atheists and too atheist for Christians.

Lately, death-of-God theology has been fading out even as a subject for debate. It has been weeks since any of the avant-garde religious journals has published an article, or even a letter to the editor, to fan its waning fires.

It did get a brief mention in a recent Commonweal magazine interview with Reinhold Niebuhr. The interviewer asked the famous Protestant theologian what he thought of Christian atheism.

Dr. Niebuhr's analysis was succinct. It was, he said, a "stupid" idea.

Since Americans seem to be addicted to fads in theology, as in other areas of life, it is reasonably certain that 1967 will bring a new sensation.

What it will be is anyone's guess. But one possibility is that up-to-the-minute thinkers who spent last year asserting God's death may spend next year denying Jesus' death.

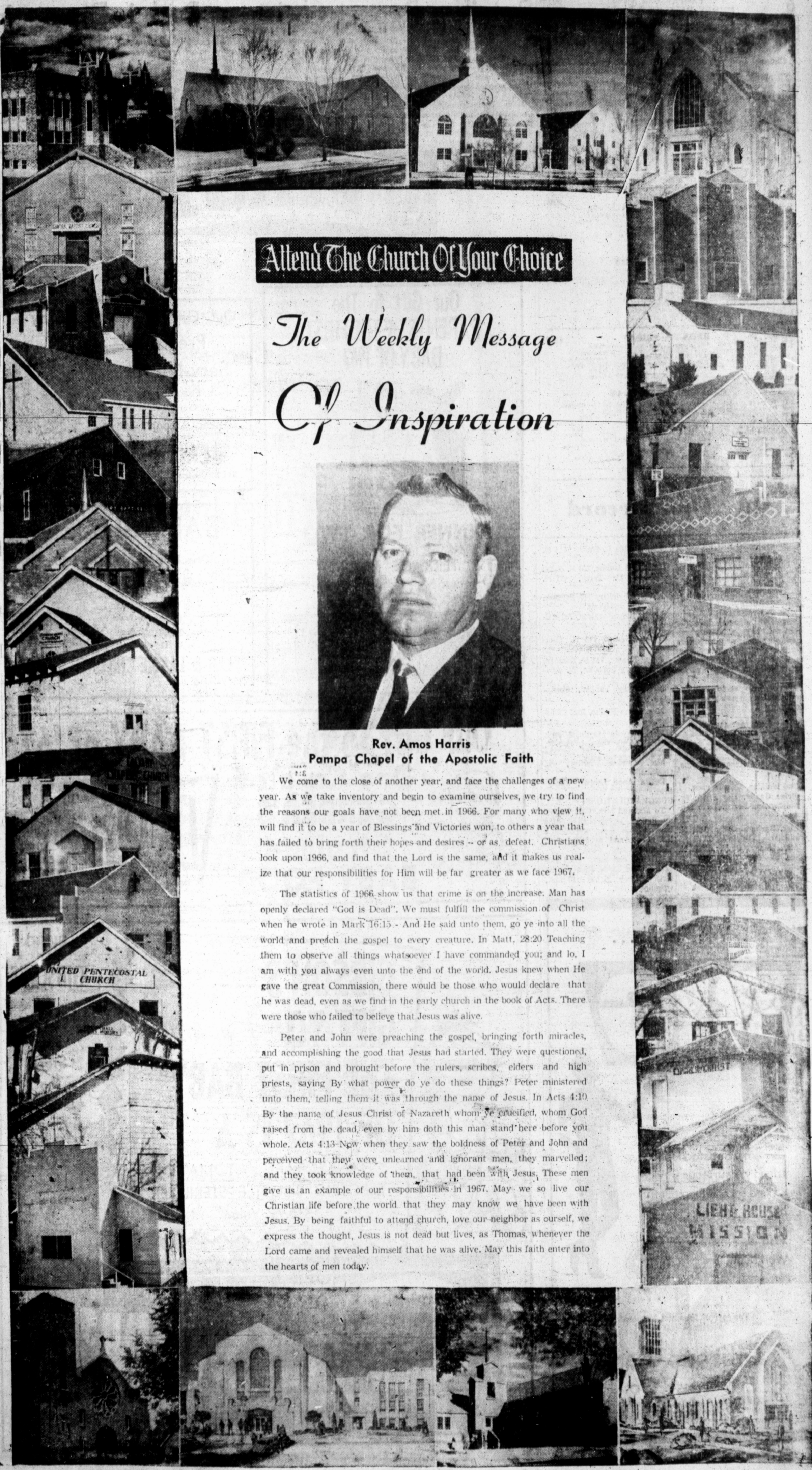

Taking Vietnam's Mekong Delta Will Require Tough Battle

The U Minh forest stretches for nearly 100 miles along the western coast of the Camau Peninsula, a tangle of mangrove trees and brackish swamp near the tip of South Vietnam's Mekong Delta.

Life is hard in the U Minh forest, both because of natural conditions and the American bombs that rain upon it.

Little Dran Van Li can testify to that.

Dran Van, Li is a pretty little Vietnamese girl of 18 from the Village of Khanh Lam in An Xuyen province, near the heart of the U Minh forest. She has lived in Khanh Lam since the age of two with her Communist parents and served on a propaganda team whose job it was to carry the story of Communism to the old people and children.

One day she and her husband defected to the government, presenting as their credentials a "friendly" pamphlet dropped from an airplane.

Tomorrow her husband may be one of the "friendlies" guiding American troops along the secret VC trails of the U Minh forest.

It is almost impossible to starve in the delta. It is a canal society with few all-weather roads. And the canals are controlled by the VC.

Along the canals it is possible to see a barge-load of American softdrinks moving in one direction as another, loaded with government-owned cement, moves in the other.

It is a matter of self-delusion that the government contracts for the cement barges. For the contractor pays some 2,000 South Vietnam will be fought.

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Alabama Superior To Nebraska

TUSCALOOSA, Ala. (UPI)—The Alabama team which meets Nebraska Jan. 2 in the Sugar Bowl is considered by many vastly superior to the squad which made a shambles of the Cornhuskers in the Orange Bowl last New Year's night.

The offense is paced by record-breaking quarterback and two of the country's top pass receivers while the defense led the nation and shutout opponents in the final 14 quarters of the season.

Alabama's offensive line, with the exception of Paul Crane returns nearly intact from the forward wall which paced the Crimson tide to that 39-28 win over Nebraska.

Maintains Winning Streak
The tide is the nation's only major unbeaten, untied team and has the longest winning streak at 16 games going into the Sugar Bowl.

Quarterback Ken (Snake) Stabler, who bounced back after a midseason slump broke a school and Southeastern Conference record with 74 of 114 completions for 64.9 per cent and nine touchdowns.

Stabler also is the team's top runner. The lanky southpaw picked up 387 yards for a 4.3 average. He was backed up by Wayne Trimble who threw seven touchdown passes. Stabler is a junior.

Roy Perkins—who caught nine passes for 159 yards against Nebraska in the Orange Bowl—tied a school record for pass receptions in a single season with 33.

Homan Top Receiver
Dennis Homan is another speedy pass receiver who gave secondaries fits with his quick pattern maneuvers. Homan caught 23 passes for 377 yards and five touchdowns, two less than Perkins.

Another top offensive threat is tailback Leslie Kelley, who came out of Coach Paul (Bear) Bryant's doghouse to lead Alabama to a third perfect season in six years.

The 214-pound Kelley—suspended in midseason for breaking training rules—finished strong and wound up with 309 yards in 94 carries including four touchdowns.

Bryant's pride and joy all season has been his lightweight defensive line featuring two brilliant sophomore linebackers—Bob Childs and Mike Hall.

Alabama is favored by nine points to beat Nebraska.

Matson To Attend Lubbock Meet

LUBBOCK (UPI)—World record holders Randy Matson and Ralph Boston confirmed Thursday that they will participate in the Lubbock indoor track meet Jan. 14.

Matson, a student at Texas A&M, holds the world mark in the shot put and Boston holds the broad jump record.

VALUABLE PLAYER

NEW YORK (UPI)—George Sauer Jr., split end of the New York Jets, has been named the team's Most Valuable Player, it was announced Thursday by the Long Island Athletic Club.

Sauer, who finished second in the American Football League in pass receiving with 64 for 1,061 yards, will be honored at the club's MVP awards dinner Feb. 9.

Other SWC teams did not fare as well. Fifth-ranked New Mexico had little trouble with Texas A&M and beat the Aggies 85-54 in the Lobo Invitational tournament in Albuquerque.

SEC Faces Prestige Hike By Winning Bowl Game

The Southeastern Conference's football prestige—at a high level all season—is expected to be enhanced Saturday when Tennessee plays Syracuse in the Gator Bowl and Georgia opposes Southern Methodist in the Cotton Bowl.

The odds-makers have made Tennessee a 5 1-2-point favorite and Georgia a 6 1-2-point choice as the annual holiday whirl of bowl games continues with three attractive pairings. The third game is the annual East-West Shrine game which will be won by thousands of crippled children in Shrine Hospitals.

Arm-chair quarterbacks, loosening up their elbows for Saturday night's festivities, will be able to see all three games on television. For some, it may be their last chance to see anything until Jan. 2 when the bowl series continues with the Sugar, Rose and Orange. On Jan. 1 blackout day, TV has nothing to offer except the American and National Football League title game.

The Gator Bowl game in Jacksonville, Fla., will be televised by ABC beginning at noon, EST; the Cotton Bowl game can be seen on CBS beginning at 2:15 p.m. EST and the Shrine Game will be televised by NBC beginning at 4:30 p.m. EST.

Tennessee is favored over Syracuse on the strength of a powerful passing game led by Dewey Warren. Warren completed 136 passes for 1,716 yards and 18 touchdowns in leading Tennessee to a 73 record this year.

Syracuse will attempt to overcome Tennessee's passing game with a rushing attack sparked by All-America halfback Floyd Little and 230-pound fullback Larry Csonka. Little gained 811 yards rushing and scored 15 touchdowns this year while Csonka was the No. 9 rusher in the nation with 1,012

SUPERBOWL — Green Bay 40, Kansas city 10 — The Chiefs will do good to score in this one. The Packers can do as they darn well please.

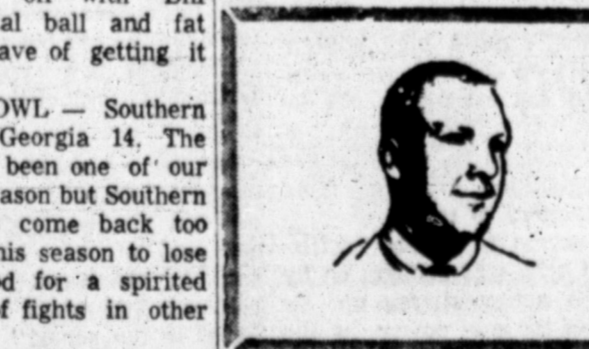

NEW YORK (UPI)—Stanley Heller & Co. says one of the longest and most dynamic periods of economic expansion in this country's history is now entering a transition phase. The company says a moderate business readjustment rather seems to be the consensus of economic forecasts.

Hospitals, Nursing Homes Under New Wage Hour Law

Beginning Feb. 1 of 1967, the amended Fair Labor Standards Act will apply for the first time to hospitals and nursing homes, either public or private, except hospitals operated by the Federal government.

"Employees of such institutions, unless specifically exempt, will be entitled to a minimum wage of at least \$1 an hour," said Regional Director Wm. J. Rogers of the Labor Department's Wage and Hour and Public Contracts Divisions in Dallas. "The minimum wage will advance by annual steps of 15 cents each year to a \$1.60 an hour starting Feb. 1, 1971."

Hospital employees may be entitled to overtime pay of one and one-half times the employee's regular rate of pay after 44 hours, effective Feb. 1, 1967, 42 hours beginning Feb. 1, 1968, and 40 hours on and after Feb. 1, 1969.

But, Rogers said, the Act has a special provision for hospital employees who have an agreement for a fixed work period of

14 consecutive days which allows the payment of overtime over 8 hours in a workday and in excess of 20 hours in the 14-day period.

He noted also that employees of nursing homes are to be paid overtime of at least one and one-half times their regular rate of pay for all hours worked over 48 in a work week.

A new pamphlet sets forth in some detail these requirements as well as the equal pay, child labor, and record-keeping provisions of the Act.

National Window

United Press International President Johnson is the injured party in the public ruckus between the Kennedys and the publishers who bought the rights to William Manchester's "The Death of a President." The Kennedys did not do

It is no exaggeration to assert that Jacqueline Kennedy had become a fairy tale figure for the American people, a beautiful princess who tripped lightly among them. That mystical image was shattered in the heat of the Manchester controversy.

Strong-willed, imperious women are not to be discounted. They also can be lovely. But the image of Jacqueline Kennedy in the minds of the American people was not of a strong-willed, imperious woman. The late President's widow probably could not care less, so long as the massed power of the Kennedy millions could be maneuvered to compel the publishers to change Manchester's book to her pattern.

But Johnson probably could not care more nor more deplore the character assassination which was practiced upon him. Deliberately or not, either the Kennedys, or their closest associates spoke of the President in spite and anger when they were approached by Manchester for book material.

As the controversy progressed across the front pages, the cruel references to Johnson and his behavior at the time of John F. Kennedy's assassination began to appear in dribbles and droplets.

These accusations of brutal, power-grabbing, boorish conduct on the part of the President struck with the deadly subtle impact of a poison pen. Johnson's dilemma is that the charges against him are intangible, more implied than stated. He can no more answer or refute the accusations than he would be able to throttle a ghost or shoot a bad dream.

On the record so far as it now has been established, the Kennedys have all but shot Johnson in the back and from ambush at that. Against the whispers, innuendos, hints and calumnies, the President has no defense whatsoever.

His troubles are multiplied by the fact that the Kennedys have compelled revision of the Manchester text. Whatever finally is published and however sharp a published version may be with Johnson, the suspicion will persist that his conduct was worse than the authorized text represents it to have been. That is because many persons will assume that the roughest accusations against Johnson have been deleted.

The carefully edited Wall Street Journal suggests that all of this could so damage Johnson politically as to hurt his 1968 chances for re-election. So, too, could there be a backlash against the Kennedys by persons deeming them guilty of unfairly attacking the President.
