Studebaker Of Purple And White Fleet Promoting Elks Convention Stops Here On Trans-Nation Tour

W. D. Deats of the Deats Storage Garage yesterday greeted one of the four cars of the Elk Purple and White fleet en route from New York to Los Angeles on a nation wide good will tour being made in advance of the Elks Grand Lodge Convention in California July 8-12.

The tour is the most ambitious demonstration of the regularity and certainty to be attained in cross country motoring ever attempted. In collaboration with the American Automobile Association and the Automobile Club of Southern California a detailed schedule has been worked out which will bring the four cars together on the same day in Los Angeles. The wide divergence of their routes, the distance the cars must cover, and the varying conditions they will encounter on their way west mark the tour as an outstanding project which has aroused wide interest.

The four pilots, each driving a smart new Studebaker President Eight roadster finished in purple and white colors of the order, separated on leaving New York, each starting westward on one of the four major continental motor routes. Car Number Four and its pilot, William Cunningham, who arrived here today, are on a course which was laid south through the Atlantic Coast states, west to New Orleans, then through the south-west into San Diego and up to Los Angeles.

Of the other three cars, one is heading almost straight west, much of the time following the route of the Hudson to Albany, to Chicago, and on into Seattle

Current Kills Worker At Wink

Lamar, employee of the Texas-New Mexico Ice Company was believed to have been instantly electrocuted Wednesday when working on a jammed ice crane in the ice plant. It is thought that his head came in contact with wires of high voltage when he climbed on the crane in an attempt to repair it. There were no witnesses. Artificial respiration was unsuccessful.

Jokester Causes Paducah Slaying

PADUCAH, Tex., June 20 (AP)—A jokester who took the stake money in a bet from the pocket of Roy Shannon, 28, yesterday, precipitated an argument in which Troy Taylor, 30, was shot to death. Shannon was at liberty today under \$2,500 bond. Shannon agreed to act as stakeholder for a bet on a baseball game here yesterday. After the game was over the winning bettor attempted to collect, but Shannon had lost the money. When one of the bettors began to feel through Taylor's pockets he became offended, witnesses said. Shortly afterward Shannon asked the city marshal to escort him to his home. The marshal complied, leaving Shannon in the front yard of his home.

Taylor, witnesses said, was waiting at the Shannon home for Shannon, and when Shannon arrived a fight started. A gun was discharged, several bullets striking Taylor who died in a hospital. Both Taylor and Shannon had been arrested recently and charged with possessing intoxicating liquor for the purpose of sale. Taylor was convicted on a similar charge several years ago, but was pardoned by Governor Miriam A. Ferguson before he had served any of his sentence.

OMAHA, June 20. (AP)—Talking pictures of wedding ceremonies were advocated today by District Judge Herbert Rhodes as an antidote for domestic strife.

Two Omaha couples announced motion pictures would be taken of their weddings. The Rev. Frank G. Smith of the First Congregational church said, "Talkies as reminders of the marriage vows in later life might help. I make my vows pretty strong, so if they saw and heard themselves taking them again it would be a good reminder of the seriousness of the covenant."

Army's Pigeon Hero Dies In N. J.

WASHINGTON, June 20. (AP)—Official information has been received by the war department from Fork Monmouth, New Jersey, telling of the death of "President Wilson," one of the army's carrier-pigeon heroes.

The report was carefully filed in the archives with the bird's record in France, which shows that the pigeon was bred in France of unknown pedigree and was considered of great vitality and speed. He saw his first service with the tank corps in 1918 and was later used in the Meuse-Argonne offensive. During intensive action November 5, 1918, he was liberated at Grand Pre with an important message. Twenty-five minutes later he arrived at his destination twenty-five miles distant with one leg shattered, his breast pierced by a bullet, but the message intact on a ligament of the torn leg. The bird will be stuffed and mounted for display at Fort Monmouth.

Officials Seek Rum Runners

WINDSOR, Ont., June 20. (AP)—United States customs officials today sought a gang of rum runners from east side Detroit whom they accuse of attacking a customs patrol boat off the waterfront of Detroit yesterday. Several shots struck the prow of the patrol boat, but none of its crew was hit. Assistant Secretary Lowman at Windsor said the firing on the patrol indicated the desperate class of men with whom the customs service has to deal. He said the treasury cannot send unarmed men against such criminals and does not intend to disarm U. S. agents.

BOSTON WOOL. BOSTON, June 20 (AP)—Sales of moderate quantities have been made of new lines of graded western wools. Bulk of sales reported were in 49 50 and 50's strictly combing wools. Quotations are about steady on both of these grades. The prices reported on 48 50 grades were in range of 78 to 80c, secured basis and 50's grade brought 88 to 90c, secured basis.

Prisoner Killed In Leavenworth

LEAVENWORTH, Kas., June 20 (AP)—Carl Panzran, 36, a prisoner in the federal penitentiary here, today ran amuck and killed E. E. Warnke, 47, foreman of the laundry, with a flat iron. Following the slaying, Panzran pursued other fellow prisoners about the laundry, brandishing his weapon, but was over-powered by Phil Holtgrave, a guard.

Panzran, received in the prison February 1, 1929, from Washington, D. C., was reported yesterday by a guard for an infraction of institution rules. Fellow prisoners said he made threats to obtain revenge then.

CROPS GOOD ALONG T & P

It was one of the wettest May records, in practically the entire territory served by the Texas & Pacific, according to the monthly report of the Texas & Pacific Railroad Company. In South Louisiana, while the excessive moisture curtailed shipments of vegetables and Irish potatoes, this loss was more than offset by rapid growth of sugar cane and corn, both of which crops are large and doing nicely. Rice also progressing satisfactorily. Cotton and corn crops in Central and North Louisiana doing well. Some grassy fields and sub-irrigated fields of boll weevil but as a rule conditions fairly satisfactory.

Fields Too Wet. In East Texas fields still too wet, although recent sunny days have greatly improved conditions, with corn good and cotton doing fairly well. There is a fair stand, color good and fields being rapidly gotten out of the grass. Two weeks of fair weather should see East Texas cotton crop doing nicely. North Central Texas still suffering from excessive rainfall; crops in many sections badly in the grass, plant growing slowly. Practically the same condition extends, with a few exceptions, as far west as Callahan County, wet grassy fields retarding cultivation and growth, with weevils reported in some sec-

From Abilene west to Midland, while crop is a little late, conditions generally are very good with exception of Nolan County, which reports soil to wet, fields grassy—a remarkable condition for that section in May. Range conditions are excellent, cattle doing well, prospects good as a whole. Near Pecos, the Texas & Pacific agricultural department has placed in operation an experiment farm, where some 215 acres have been planted to cantaloupes, honeyball and honeydew melons, with a view to demonstrating the possibilities of that section in producing the famous Pecos Valley cantaloupe. Plants are up and growing nicely, with every prospect of an excellent yield. Dairy developments continue steadily in many sections of the Texas & Pacific territory. In South Louisiana, Texas & Pacific agricultural department representatives co-operated in the distribution of another carload of Jersey heifers to farmers along Bayou Lafourche.—Dallas News.
