

Christ was more concerned with the attitude of his followers toward him than he was about that of the rest of the world. It is the same today. His concern for the world was demonstrated at Calvary but his concern for his followers is evident from the coming of the holy spirit to lead and companion with us as we follow Jesus Christ today.

Jesus is concerned today with our attitude toward him and with our attitude toward his church. He asks us today the same pertinent question quoted above. He wants to know what we think of him. He does know this; both by our personal lives and by our participation in the work of his church in its world redemption program. There are three indications which tell him as well as the world of our attitude. These are; A. Our prayer life; B. Our Bible study and; C. Our Church participation.

We learn from the scriptures that Jesus was versed in the Old Testament writings; that he spent a great deal of time in prayer; even arising very early in the morning, or remaining through the night; and that he was accustomed to regular worship in the Synagogue. All of these combined to tell us of his love for the Father and his concern for his Father's work.

The devil; the world; and God can tell of our attitude toward Christ; Whether it be good or bad; by observance of these three characteristics. If we would be strong in our Christian lives we must not neglect these things. No one of them is adequate to equip us to meet the world in more tal combat and emerge in victory. Both our lives and our witness will raise or fall as we study God's word, pray, and "forsake not the assembling of ourselves together." slood a year itelial sould diffy sold
