'ILLNESS' IS EXPLAINED Failure To Get Salary **Boost Seen as Cause**

An explanation for the mysterious malady that caused 29 employes in the city's sanitation, water and street departments to stay off their jobs since Monday finally came out into the open today.

Billy G. Hoover, 418 N. Sumner, assistant superintendent and truck driver in the sanitation department, said the men were "sick" because they did not get a pay raise along with the salary increase given to police department members last week.

Hoover said police department pay raises now give a patrolman a minimum starting pay of \$422 a month. The starting salary in the sanitation department, he stated, is \$318 a month with a worker being required to work 30 months before he attains top pay of \$348 a itation department workers still month.
