## Thieu Announces New Draft

### US Battle Deaths In Vietnam Top 20,000

SAIGON (UPI) — American battle deaths in the Vietnam War passed the 20,000 mark last week, U.S. officials said today. The South Vietnamese government announced it will draft 135,000 more of its own youth to help fight the war.

President Nguyen Van Thieu said the new soldiers will include 18- and 19-year-olds previously exempt from the draft and discharged veterans. They will be in the army by the end of the year, he said.

Heavy ground fighting raged today in two areas of South Vietnam, U.S. spokesmen said, and in North Vietnam American planes struck their heaviest blows in a month by bombing a MIG base and supply convoys.

One battle today was 16 miles west of Saigon where allied troops counted 142 Communists killed in fighting that erupted Wednesday. In a series of clashes south of Da Nang troops of the U.S. American Division killed another 111 Communists.

U.S. officials said 336 Americans died in fighting last week. It was the lowest figure reported in several weeks but it pushed to 20,096 the total killed since 1961.

During the same period, spokesmen said, Communist losses totaled 314,460 killed.

The spokesman said U.S. pilots flew 119 missions over the north Wednesday, the most since Feb. 19 when American pilots went on 126 missions.

One of the targets was the Phuc Yen airfield 18 miles west of Hanoi, a base for MIG fighters.

Other strikes were aimed at Communist supply convoys streaming toward South Vietnam and U.S. Navy pilots reported a spectacular fuel fire that sent smoke billowing 5,000 feet into the air.

The officials said at least 110 trucks were destroyed in the convoy moving through the panhandle region.

Near the Mu Gia pass leading into the Ho Chi Minh trail the pilots said their bombs set off a series of fires and large explosions from ammunition in the convoy.

"Right after our bombs hit we had an instantaneous forest fire going," Cdr. Fred H. Whittemore, 38, of Carson City, Nev., said.

One of the trucks, apparently a tanker, exploded with a fireball 200 feet wide and sent a

huge cloud of smoke 5,000 feet high, the pilots said.

Air Force Maj. Charles W. McClaren, 37, of Spender, Ind., said he was "absolutely astounded at the number of vehicles and the way they were sitting out in the open."

The U.S. command announced five major U.S. military operations that so far have accounted for 799 Communists killed. They said some of the campaigns began early in January.

## Presidential Candidates Hit The Campaign Trail; Rocky Now Out

Presidential candidates fanned out north and south on the campaign trail today as New York Gov. Nelson Rockefeller prepared to step into the contest.

Sen. Eugene J. McCarthy, D-Minn., and former Vice President Richard M. Nixon stumped Wisconsin as the days dwindled down in the April 2 primary, and Sen. Robert F. Kennedy, D-N.Y., set out on a quick three-state tour in the south.

NEW YORK (UPI) — Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller announced today that he has decided not to seek the Republican party's nomination for president.

McCarthy hopes to upset President Johnson in the Wisconsin contest and prove his strong showing against the President in New Hampshire was as much due to his attractiveness as a candidate as to his antiwar platform. It will be their first head-on clash, for Johnson was a write-in in New Hampshire.

Nixon, untested in Wisconsin, hopes to show he is attractive enough to Republicans to bring out the vote even in the absence of an exciting contest.

Kennedy's swing will take him to Georgia, Tennessee and the University of Alabama at Tuscaloosa, where as U.S. Attorney General he forced integration despite then-Gov. George Wallace's "stand in the schoolhouse door" in 1963.

In a 1966 visit, Kennedy was accorded a standing ovation after addressing a campus crowd of 3,500.

It appeared one reason Kennedy was revisiting the campus was to demonstrate that McCarthy has no lock in the kind of younger generation support credited with greatly boosting McCarthy's New Hampshire campaign.

In Wisconsin Wednesday, McCarthy predicted he would "make a good run" against Johnson there, and later renewed his antiwar theme with a declaration "we are involved in a war that militarily is indefensible."

**Spring Weather Due To Arrive Following Storm**

Winter seemed to be on the way out again today after a one-day return visit yesterday on the first day of Spring.

The noonday weather forecast indicated a gradual warming trend after a cold night tonight.

Yesterday's snowfall resulted in .09-inch moisture for Pampa. The mercury got up to only 34 degrees for a high yesterday afternoon and last night's low was 24.

The forecasters said it was expected to get into the mid-40s this afternoon, then back into the low 20s tonight. The warming trend is expected to set in Friday mid-forenoon and the afternoon's high tomorrow should reach into the low 60s. Saturday's outlook is for fair and warmer.

Up to eight inches of snow covered the ground in the Texas South Plains today and mid-winter temperatures gripped the state. But a winter-like storm that struck the state the first day of spring had pushed on east and south into other states and the Gulf of Mexico.

Forecasters predicted more low temperatures tonight and a warmup Friday. A few snow flurries were reported in Fort Worth early today and there was light rain along the southeast Texas coast and in far East Texas.

Reports of eight inches of snow at Panhandle points were official. There were unofficial reports of up to 10 inches in Hockley County and of drifts up to several feet deep. Schools were closed for today in Leveland and Ropesville.

Local floods ebbed in Dallas and Fort Worth and the Trinity in Dallas was forecast to reach 37 feet, seven feet above flood stage. Levees, however, will contain the Trinity.

## Reds Pound Laotian City

VIENTIANE, Laos (UPI) — The Defense Ministry said today the important province capital of Attapeu was under heavy Communist mortar and rocket attack. A spokesman said North Vietnamese and Pathet Lao forces had occupied two nearby villages controlling the main highway to the city.

The moves were described as part of the continuing Communist campaign to seize communications centers in southern Laos and open new infiltration routes into South Vietnam.

Col. Thongpan Knocky, an official Defense Ministry spokesman, said the bombardment on Attapeu with Soviet-made 140-millimeter rockets marked only the second time in the offensive that the Communists had used the big missiles.

He said the barrage began included 82-millimeter mortars and was mainly aimed at the military barracks and airport.

He said the barrage began Wednesday night and was still under way late today but he had no reports of casualties or damage.

## Taxwriters Ask Income Tax Change

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Key congressional taxwriters are calling privately today for a change in income tax rates as a fresh approach to higher taxes, instead of the administration's 10 per cent surtax formula.

In the Senate Finance Committee and House Ways and Means Committee, lawmakers say the surtax formula has not been understood by the public and stands little chance of gaining acceptance.

As one alternative, the lawmakers, who asked not to be identified, said that a basic change in income tax rates may stand a better chance of winning approval than the surtax, which has gone nowhere since it was introduced last August.

In a related development, there were reports in the Ways and Means committee that the administration would have to reduce spending by more than the \$4 billion reportedly suggested by President Johnson to spring loose higher taxes.

One member of Ways and Means, Rep. Charles A. Vanik, D-Ohio, announced, "I cannot support a tax increase to expand or escalate the war in South Vietnam."

Johnson proposed the 10 per cent surtax last August but the Ways and Means committee has taken no action. Under the President's plan, taxpayers would pay an extra 10 per cent charge on top of whatever income tax they owed. A \$1,000 tax bill would total \$1,100, for example.

Although key members of the House committee would not commit themselves, they said a basic change in tax rates could produce as much revenue if taxes are needed. One suggestion has been that part of the 20 per cent tax reduction Congress approved in 1964 be restored.

One member of the panel was reported to have suggested this to Johnson two weeks ago, coupled with a proposal for a big government spending reduction. The suggestion was that Johnson reduce spending by about \$7 billion in return for a major tax hike of up to \$14 billion. There was no indication as to Johnson's reply.

Since then, Johnson has suggested a program of "national austerity." Although details were lacking, the programs included the 10 per cent surtax to produce \$12 billion in revenue and some congressional spending reductions in cooperation with the White House.

## 15 Killed

The communique put Israeli losses as 15 killed and 70 wounded. It said six army vehicles and one plane were damaged but that "all targets of this morning's operation have been attained." It said some Israeli forces already had returned to Israeli-occupied Jordan on the west bank of the Jordan River.

Premier Levi Eshkol earlier put Arab losses as at least 100 dead.

King Hussein of Jordan called for all Arab nations to take a unified stand against Israel. He was immediately backed by Egypt's President Gamal Abdel Nasser who urged Arabs to form "one army to unleash the battle of destiny and honor."

Hussein's request for an urgent summit meeting to decide pan-Arab policy against Israel was backed by most Arab leaders.

Nasser was among those cabling immediate support. Jordan also asked for an immediate meeting of the Security Council and it was believed it would convene later today.

The Israeli army and air force struck across the cease-fire line into Jordan today at least six points along a 100 mile line in reprisal against raids by Arab saboteurs based on Jordanian soil. Jordan said the troops withdrew after savage, daylong fighting.

Israeli paratroops dropped at the big refugee camp at Al Karamah, 2 1/2 miles east of the Jordan River and only 18 miles from Jordan's capital of Amman. Bitter hand-to-hand fighting raged there and at other Arab towns and villages.

The strikes by Israeli tanks, infantry and armored cars were supported by the Israeli air force which sent French-made Mystere jets screaming in to silence Jordanian gun positions in the worst outbreak of fighting since the June war.

# Cary Grant's Wife Cites LSD Use

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — Witnesses in the divorce suit between actor Cary Grant and his estranged wife, Dyan Cannon contended Wednesday that Grant is a veteran user of LSD and once spanked his pretty wife because she wore a miniskirt to a discotheque.

Miss Cannon told the court that her husband's use of the mind-expanding drug made him "outlandish, irrational and hostile," but denied he spanked her for wearing a miniskirt. Instead, she testified, Grant slugged her on that occasion.

Grant's psychiatrist, Dr. John Marmon of the UCLA Medical Center, conceded the 64-year-old actor did use LSD regularly, but said he found no organic defects in Grant's brain as a result. He

also testified Grant told him he spanked Miss Cannon "because she was going or planned to go to some discotheque wearing a miniskirt and with heavy makeup."

"Mr. Grant was an emotional individual, as seen in many actors," the psychiatrist said, "but there were no organic defects to his brain and no irrational effects to prevent him from being a loving father or to make him endanger his daughter."

Their contrasting opinions came on the opening day of the divorce suit in which Miss Cannon, 30, mother of Grant's only child, Jennifer, is asking for a divorce and a monthly income of \$5,470.

She also asked the court to

forbid Grant to visit Jennifer unless a third person is present. Miss Cannon described incidents in their married life together which she called "outlandish, irrational and hostile" and which "I attribute to his use of LSD."

The former actress said that Grant was subject to wild fits of temper and that the debonair actor beat her with his fists twice and laughed when she was cringed in fear.

On another occasion, Miss Cannon said, Grant disrupted her plans for a dinner party by bolting the gates of their Beverly Hills estate, locking her in a room, and settling down in another part of the house to read poetry.

Miss Cannon said Grant urged

her to visit a psychiatrist and then accused the doctor of trying to seduce her.

She said that while watching an Academy Awards show on television with friends, Grant began yelling and jumping up and down on a bed.

"He yelled that everyone on the awards show had their faces lifted, and he was spilling wine on the bed. This lasted a couple of hours, as long as the awards were on," Miss Cannon related.

Miss Cannon said Grant told her he has used LSD for ten years, and repeatedly urged her to try it. She said she did twice before their marriage.

Marmon said Grant told him he took LSD "because he felt it deepened his sense of compas-

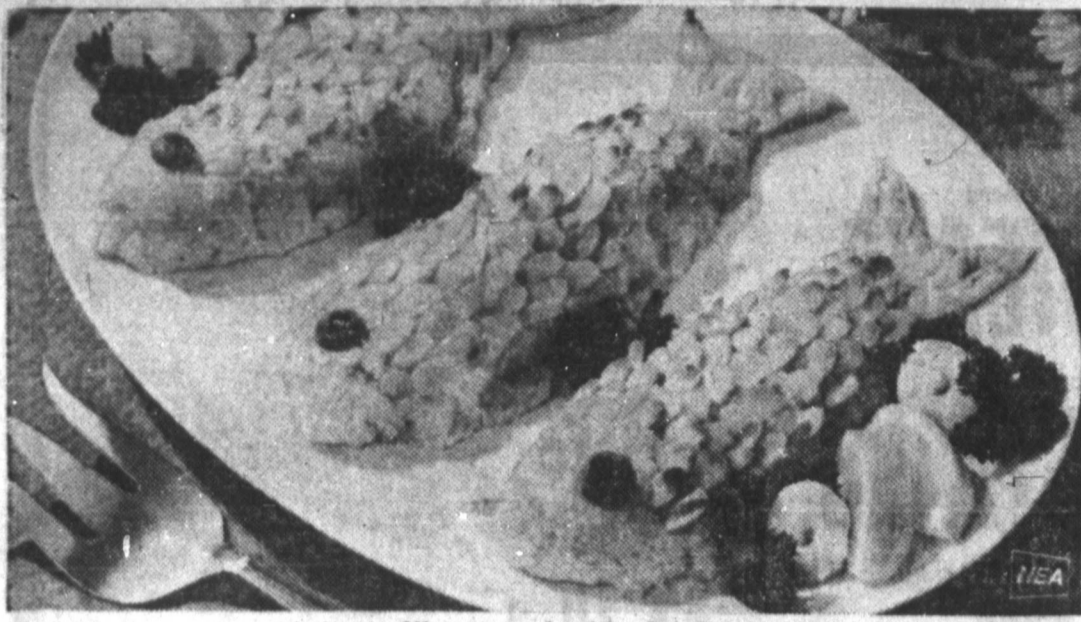

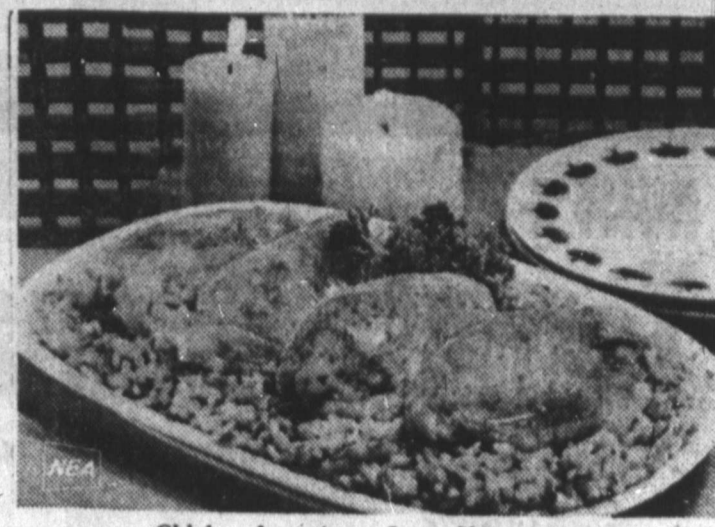

Using fresh mushrooms, approximately one-half pound, saute in 2 tablespoons butter and lemon juice. Using canned mushrooms, drain and reserve liquid. Saute in same manner as fresh. Combine cooked celery and mushrooms in 1 quart casserole. Melt 2 tablespoons butter in saucpan. Stir in flour. Pour mushroom stock into 1 cup measure; finish filling with milk and blend with the butter-flour mixture, remaining salt and ground black pepper. Cook until medium thickness, stirring constantly. Pour over celery and mushrooms. Cover with buttered soft bread crumbs. Bake in preheated moderate oven (375) degrees until brown, about 20 minutes. Six servings.

Make a paste of 2 tablespoons of the butter, parsley, chives and marjoram. Cut a slit in the thickest side of each breast half to form a pocket. Place one tablespoon of the mixture in each breast pocket; secure with small skewers or wooden picks. Sprinkle chicken breasts on both sides with salt. Place remaining 4 tablespoons butter in shallow foil-lined baking pan. Put in 425-degree oven, until butter melts. Remove from oven. Place chicken breasts skin side down in melted butter; turn over and sprinkle with paprika if desired. Bake in 425-degree oven 30 minutes. While chicken is baking, cook rice. Remove skewers from chicken. To serve, spoon rice on platter; top with chicken breasts. Two servings.

### Food Buying Guide

The following guide to the nation's food buys for the weekend was prepared by the departments of Agriculture and Interior for United Press International.

**WASHINGTON (UPI)**—USDA's Consumer and Marketing Service reports that weekend shoppers should find excellent displays of meat and poultry and ample stocks of some fresh vegetables and fruit in food stores and supermarkets.

Broiler-fryer chickens and turkeys should again lead the field as being the most abundant meats. Pork and some pork products are also abundant, and these include bacon, ham, butts, and fresh roasts and chops. Supplies of beef roasts and steaks should be ample and so should stocks of ground beef and stew meat. North Pacific halibut steaks, ocean perch fillets, and canned tuna are fish buys to watch for, according to the U.S. Department of the Interior.

Cabbage, celery, lettuce, and potatoes are the most abundantly available vegetables. Fruits in the abundant class are bananas and oranges. In some areas, apples and grapefruit may be abundant also.

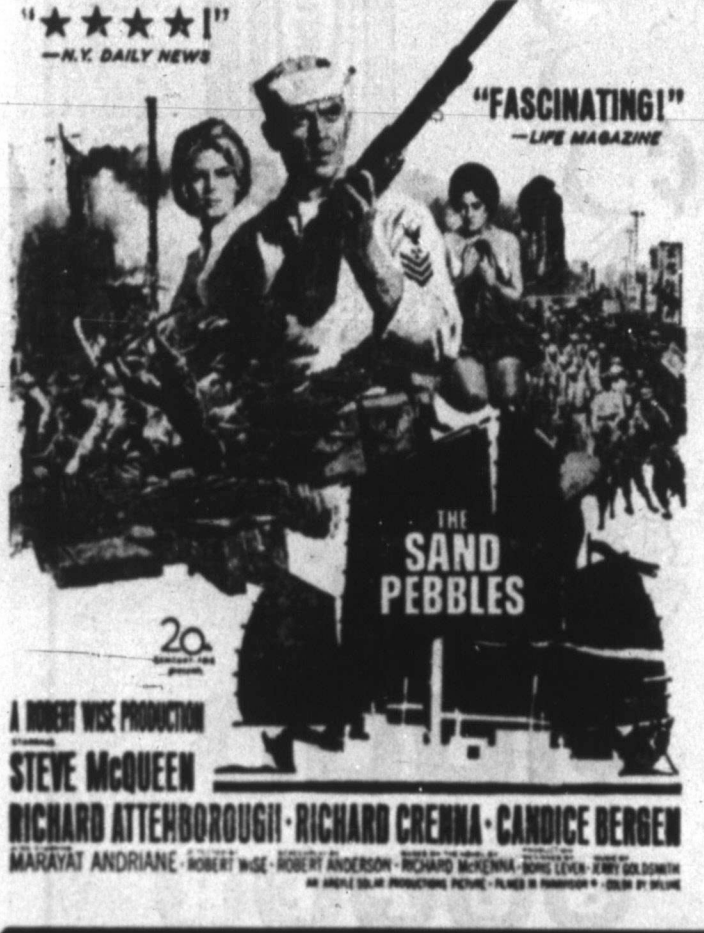

### Pentagon Says Major Task In Vietnam Is Pacification

WASHINGTON (UPI) — As scheduled to be reached at mid-year. Pentagon officials see it, the major task facing allied troops in Vietnam is to build security in nearly two-thirds of the country, where pacification programs were disrupted by the Communist TET offensive. Officials note that this must be done while maintaining sufficient forces in the extreme northern part of South Vietnam to guard against a long-threatened major offensive somewhere in that area. These military requirements illustrate the manpower bind which led Gen. William C. Westmoreland to request more troops, above the 525,000 level

According to Pentagon figures, the pacification program was "seriously affected" in 13 South Vietnamese provinces during the TET offensive; in 16 provinces it was "moderately affected;" in 15 provinces it was only "slightly affected."

But Washington officials have been able to supply little information on what "seriously" or "moderately" affected really mean. The Communist TET campaign, which began at the end of January, and continued into the first part of February, was mainly a series of attacks against South Vietnam's cities.

In many cases, the Viet Cong bypassed the hamlets to get at the cities. In the process, however, some 18 of 51 South Vietnamese army battalions assigned to provide security for pacification programs in the hamlets were moved to protect the cities.

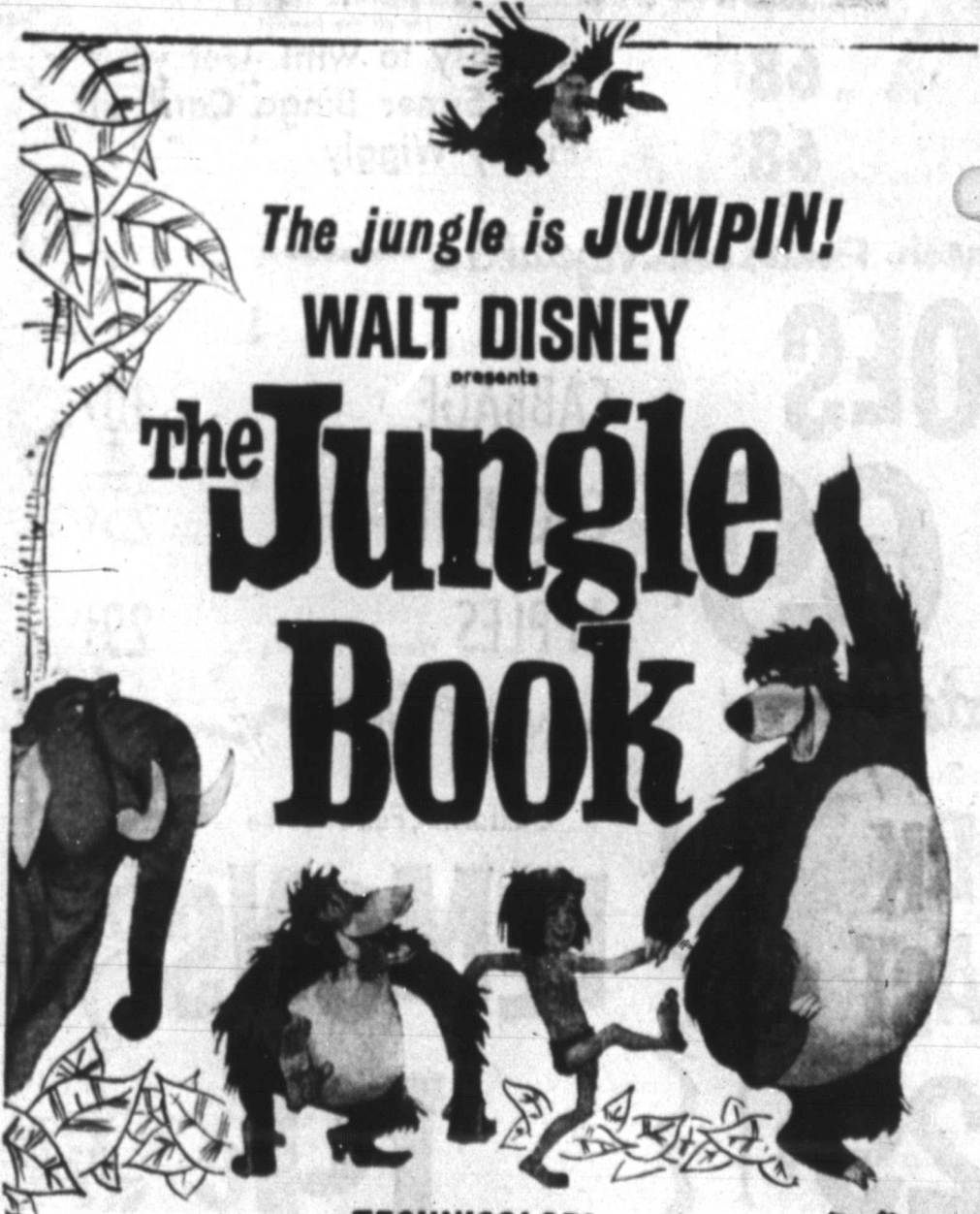
South Vietnamese pacification teams, which do the work of trying to raise hamlet living standards and tying them closer to the central government, also fled to the cities. As of March 1 only something over 300 of 555 such teams were at their posts. In one of the "seriously" hit areas, around Phan Thiet, in Binh Thuan Province, the Viet Cong reportedly have moved in to fill the vacuum, taking over hamlet governments and collecting taxes. How widely this has happened is not known.

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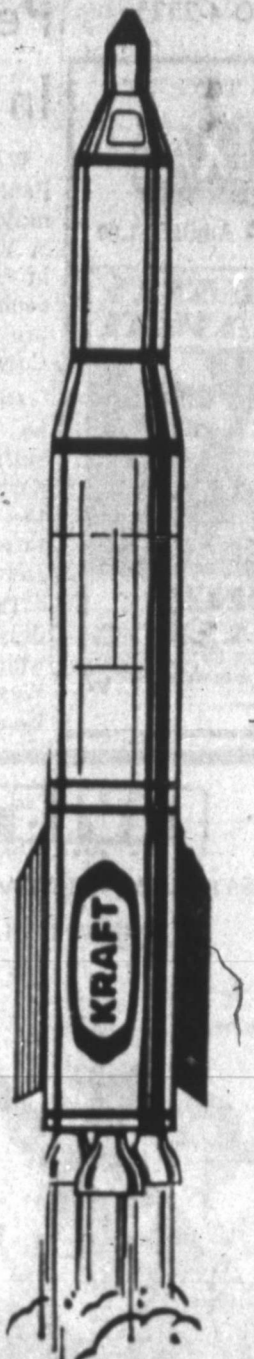

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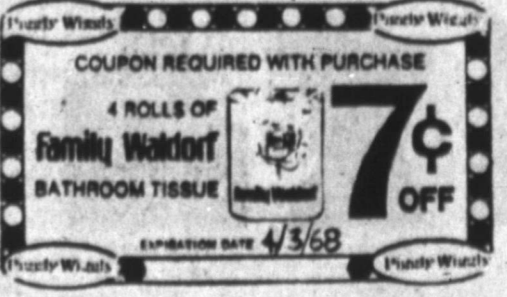

## Kennedy Not Supported By All Former New Frontiersmen

WASHINGTON (UPI) — It might almost be 1960, the way Sen. Robert F. Kennedy is gathering the clan and the Irish Mafia behind his presidential campaign.  
 But 1960 it isn't, and Kennedy thus far has not been successful in wooing the first-line new frontiersmen that joined John F. Kennedy's cabinet.  
 Four Kennedy cabinet appointees are still serving in the Johnson administration, and none shows any sign of defecting. They are secretaries W. Willard Wirtz, Labor; Dean Rusk, State; Stewart Udall, Interior, and Orville Freeman, Agriculture.  
 Another close associate of President Kennedy, Larry F. O'Brien, became postmaster general under President Johnson and is undertaking a key role in Johnson's all but announced re-election campaign.  
 The White House made clear that Johnson would not stand in the way of any new frontiersman who out of loyalty feels he must join Bobby Kennedy's camp.  
 "I think each man has to decide for himself," Press Secretary George Christian said. "There is no policy. It's a matter of individual decision if such a conflict should develop."  
 Robert S. McNamara, another

top figure of the Kennedy administration, is out of government. But after serving on for almost five years as defense secretary in Johnson's cabinet, it appeared unlikely divided loyalties would let him choose sides.  
 There is also the matter of McNamara is closely associated. Kennedy is making the Johnson administration's war policy a major political issue.  
 Bobby Kennedy has had little trouble lining up the allegiance of the campaign crew, many of them later White House aides, that his brother used to call the Irish Mafia. And most of the Kennedy family clan, including Mrs. John F. Kennedy, is preparing to participate actively in Bobby's show.  
 One clan member, R. Sargent Shriver, is reported in line to be Johnson's ambassador to France, but late indications are he prefers to stay home and work for his brother-in-law.  
 The names lined up so far for the new Kennedy effort read like a roster of the 1960 campaign staff.  
 Pierre Salinger, President Kennedy's cigar-smoking, piano-playing press secretary, will concentrate on fund-raising in California, the key primary as the Kennedys see it.  
 Brother-in-law Stephen E. Smith is acting as campaign manager, and Theodore C. Sorensen, Kenneth O'Donnell and Sen. Edward M. Kennedy are taking over as top strategists.

# Highlights and Sidelights From the State Capitol

**AUSTIN**—All those candidates for governor got a hefty bit of pressure off them when both the state Democratic and Republican executive committees decided to put the question of liquor-by-the-drink on the May 4 ballot.

With increasing concern over liquor-law enforcement and the Texas Liquor Control Board, coupled with Gov. John Connally's push for liquor-by-the-drink, gubernatorial candidates have been pressured hard for their stand on the issue.

Now, with the question being put to the voters in a referendum, all the candidates have to say is that they will abide by the wishes of the voters.

Also on the ballot as referendums will be the question of pari-mutuel horse-race betting and the creation of a Texas Dairy Commission with the power to regulate and fix the price of milk and other dairy products.

Although none of the voters' answers to the three questions will be binding, the issues do assure a high turnout of the more than 4,000,000 registered voters. It will take an act of the Legislature to put any of them in effect. Ballots will merely say: "This proposition is only an expression of public opinion and has no force or effect as law."

Legislature directed the first primary vote on local option pari-mutuel gambling. Petitions signed by 119,000 voters called for voter opinion on creating a Texas Dairy Commission with power to regulate milk prices.

Both party leaders decided the liquor-by-the-drink issue is hot enough to warrant a check on that, too. This referendum will be the first opportunity Texas voters have had to express their opinions statewide since the repeal of prohibition in the 1930s.

Campaigns already are shaping up on the high-voltage drinking and gambling issues. Op-

ponents of a dairy commission also are organized for battle. Anti-Crime Council of Texas has formed to combat organized crime and defeat the racing proposition. Committees for Tourism and Regulated Sale of Mixed Drinks stands ready to get back into action. Dry spokesmen report they have organized to fight liquor-by-the-drink. Texas Racing Association is ready with a campaign for a wagering proposal.

Meanwhile, House committee studying liquor laws has asked for an attorney general's opinion on constitutionality of a mixed drink local option bill.

**PARKS IMPROVED**—While finishing touches were applied to the \$1,000,000 renovation of the Davis Mountains State Scenic Park near Fort Davis, new federal grants were approved for four other state parks.

Federal funds of \$104,150 matched by the state for its 538-

of like amount will finance a 498-acre park 14 miles southwest of Cleburne.

Federal funds of \$28,500, also matched by legislative appropriation, is earmarked for Mission San Francisco del Los Tejas Historic Park northwest of Crockett, a 118-acre historic park in the Piney Woods.

Lake Brownwood State Recreation Park near Brownwood will get \$117,150 federal money matched by the state for its 538-acre park.

Another federal grant of \$99,900, matched by state funds, will create the 588-acre Bentsen-Rio Grande Valley State Scenic Park near Mission.

Dedication tentatively is set for March 28 of the Davis Mountains Park. Also slated for dedication by Governor Connally that same day at the Park is scenic Texas Mountain Trail, one of ten unveiled by Connally

last January to lure tourists off the beaten path into Texas areas of outstanding beauty and historic interest.

**SCREWORM CASES CUT**—Texas' screwworm eradication program cut reported cases of infestation from 49,484 in 1962 to 1,219 in 1967. So reports Auditor C. H. Cavness in his audit of the Animal Health Commission.

Commission's share of the program has been turned over to the federal government except for security supervision of the Rio Grande Valley screwworm fly production plant and the required inspection force.

**COURTS SPEAK**—State won its \$1,000 civil penalty suit against a Bellville contractor under a water permit law. The road builder was first permanently enjoined from using public waters without permit from the Texas Water Rights Commission.

State Supreme Court denied rehearing of decision that Hillsboro cannot enforce a peddler and vendors ordinance against an insurance company.

Court of Criminal Appeals upheld a six-year probated sentence for a Houston lawyer who encouraged his client to lie on the witness stand.

Same court ordered a new

trial for the man who received the death penalty for the shooting death of a potato chip salesman in Chambers County.

**APPOINTMENTS**—John Stokes of Lufkin is the new executive director and special counsel for the Republican Party of Texas. He succeeds Al Allison of Dallas who resigned to accept a private business offer.

Gubernatorial candidate John Hill named Rep. Bob Armstrong of Austin as executive director of his statewide campaign.

Governor Connally appointed A. E. Fawcett Jr. of Houston and R. F. (Bob) Byers of Dallas to the Texas Water Well Drillers Board.

House Speaker Ben Barnes has appointed Rep. Delwin Jones of Lubbock as chairman of the House Interim Committee to study egg importation and grading.

William J. Harding will direct activities of the new Association of Texas Fire and Casualty Insurance Companies.

John Peace of San Antonio, a member of the Board of Regents of the University of Texas System, has been appointed by Chairman Frank C. Erwin Jr. as a member of the Board for lease of University Lands.

**MORATORIUM ASKED**—The Texas Animal Health Com-

mission has joined the Texas Farm Bureau and the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association in asking the U. S. Department of Agriculture to delay a proposed new regulation prohibiting interstate shipment of cattle from counties not certified for brucellosis control.

Under the proposed regulation, cattle in uncertified counties could be sold for consumption only in Texas, unless the cattleman has his herd qualified himself, which involves personal expense.

Ninety-five Texas counties are not certified, and one AHC official estimates that three years will be required for compliance. As the regulation now reads, between May 1 and January 1, it will go into effect sometime 1969.

The USDA regulation is being sought by those states which are completely certified and do not want infected cattle being shipped in from states not so certified.

**SHORT SNORTS**—City of Abilene has received permission from the Texas Water Rights Commission to divert water from the Brazos River's Clear Fork as long as flow in the Fork is not reduced to less than 200 cubic feet per second.

## Old Indian Legend Concerns Panhandle Crop Prediction

**About 6:50 a.m. March 22**, John W. Crim will start a small fire on his farm 12 miles north and one mile west of Muleshoe, Tex., perhaps throw a handful of sand into the air, and tie a string onto a pole extending high over his head.

Simultaneously, the hundreds of farmers and ranchers throughout West Texas will be hoping all three signs give evidence the wind is from the northeast.

If it is, according to an old Indian legend, the Panhandle and South Plains of Texas will have a bumper crop in 1968.

**It's the Direction**

According to the legend, the direction of the wind at sunrise each March 22 portends the type of dryland crops produced the year—bad, poor, average,

good or bumper. The best direction is northeast; the worst is southwest.

Crim has gone out each year since 1924 and says it's proved accurate about 80 to 90 per cent of the time.

Chester Hufstедler, with the soil conservation service in Childress, Tex., thinks this year will be a top-quality year for farmers and ranchers regardless of any Indian hocus-pocus. He points to the more than 5 inches of moisture that already has soaked into the rangelands in his area in 1968 and contrasts it with a year ago, when the region went eight consecutive months without any measurable precipitation whatsoever.

**In Best Shape**

"Our farmers think they're in the best shape as they've been in years, as far as starting a new crop," Hufstедler said.

W. H. Pippett, a farmer-rancher in the Tell community 12 miles southwest of Childress said the situation looks better than at any time in the past 10 years.

"Oh, we got 3 or 4 inches of snow yesterday, and everything's stuck right when we've got a lot of heavy feeding with cattle to do. But we're not complaining. We'll take that moisture anytime. It seems like until now, we have sure been suffering through a dry cycle," he added.

There's more than one side to every coin and more often than not there are times when the coin might stand on its edge.

That just could be the case on the present going on in Pampa about the new athletic director, Swede Lee. And one thing which should be mentioned first is that my opinion stated twice earlier this week was based on a concern for one of the finest coaches and one of the finest men in the Panhandle or anywhere else for that matter coach Terry Culley.

That deep concern shared by many of the people here in Pampa should not have anything to do with the situation involving the change going on in the school system under Lee's direction. Lee was brought here to establish an all-around program, but that's not all of it. Lee wants to see a good program from elementary school through the senior high school. Most of the informed people know that I did not start the war between the fans of one sport and the fans of an overall program. (But I did fan the fire).

Dr. Harbord Cox of Pampa has lived here all his life and lettered in four sports at PHS, football, basketball, track and baseball. Dr. Cox lettered three times in football, twice in baseball, three times in track and once in basketball. The reason he lettered only once in basketball was that the coach in basketball put the choice up to him to either play basketball or football. Dr. Cox chose football. He still does not regret this choice 20 years after he made the decision. That was the beginning of "the war."

Of course, today the boys think that they have a better chance to get a scholarship if they concentrate on one sport. I did that myself in high school. But then that doesn't have so much to do with the situation here now. Like Dr. Cox, Ray Thompson talked with me yesterday and brought several things up that I had not considered, and they were not just petty tangents. There were good facts and good suggestions. Thompson headed the Sports Committee which spent a lot of time looking into the various athletic programs in the schools in this area to find out what made them tick. AMARILLO (Sp) — Texas Pro Fuel Circuit, branch of National Hot Rod Association Division Director Dale Ham, will initiate its competition here Sunday, March 24 at Amarillo Dragway's 1968 season opener. The March event will be the

first of 15 on the TPFCC docket leading to more than \$51,000 in prize money for the participants.

Other similar events will follow at Odessa Raceway Park (April 7) and Austin Raceway Park (Apr. 21) before drivers begin the second round of competition April 28 at Amarillo Dragway.

## Bo Finds True Love in 'Mate

COCOA BEACH, Fla. (UPI) — It was probably inevitable that baseball's leading playboy would finally find a playmate.

Bo Belinsky, part-time pitcher and full-time playboy, Wednesday claimed he'd finally found "true love."

Each of the participating tracks will host five TPFCC meets during the season, including one meet which will serve as both a Texas Fuel event and a NHRA World Championship Series Meet.

Response to the new circuit has been phenomenal. A total of 38 cars from the five state areas have expressed their intention to race in at least one of the TPFCC events.

Of the total, 17 cars have signed contracts to compete in all 15 events on the circuit and six others will race at 12 or more of the meets.

Such enthusiasm has prompted predictions of upwards of 25 fuel cars for the Amarillo opener although Amarillo Dragway president Earnest Walker is conservatively expecting about 22 of the slingshot dragsters on race day.

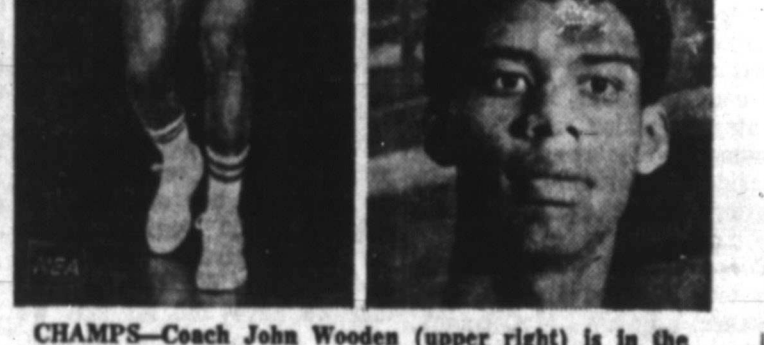
A minimum of \$1,000 has been guaranteed to the winner of each event on the circuit with an additional \$500 awarded to the runner-up and lesser amounts to each of the eight qualifiers on the basis of success in the eliminations.

To make the circuit even more appealing to the participants, each of the three tracks involved will contribute an additional \$300 following the conclusion of each series of three races.

That money will be distributed among the top four cars in the circuit point standings after each series of events.

Cars will earn points toward the bonus money on the basis of success at the various TPFCC events. The winner of each race will be awarded five points, the loser four and each qualifier a subsequent amount.

As a further stimulus to racers in the Southwest, Walker has indicated that if as many as 24 cars enter the top fuel competi-

## Boxers Go Tonight In Utah Gloves

SALT LAKE CITY (UPI) — Five more heavier Texas boxers will swing into action in the National Golden Gloves Tournament, tonight, seeking to join the three who advanced with victories Wednesday night.

Heavy-fisted featherweight Lorenzo Trujillo of Corpus Christi led the Texas trio into the third round with a pair of victories, one an upset of former champion Mel Miller of Las Vegas. The other was over Gregory George of Detroit.

Houston's Gus Macias lost six pounds overnight and still had the strength to dispose of Albert Hughes of Detroit and Percy Joyner of Salt Lake City in the lightweight class.

Rudy Barrientos of Fort Worth easily outclassed James Tackett of Huntington, W. Va., in his only bout.

Two Texans lost — light-welter Jessie Avalos of Corpus Christi who bowed in a booted split decision to Gilbert King of Cleveland, and bantamweight Bubba Busceme of Beaumont, whose fight with Robert Lee of Knoxville, Tenn., was halted in the first round because of a cut over his eye as the result of a butt.

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Foreign News Commentary

The Swedes like to point out the difference between neutralism and neutrality.

Neutrality in their case means that since 1809 they have managed to avoid wars and have profited therefrom.

It also means that Sweden grants asylum to anyone it believes is being persecuted for political or religious beliefs.

However, neither the government nor the people are neutralists.

The government and all political parties in Sweden are critical of U.S. involvement in Vietnam and have not hesitated to let their opinion be known.

U.S. Issues Warning Last year, the government permitted the so-called "International Tribunal on War Crimes" to convene in Stockholm despite a warning from the United States it would "not improve Swedish-American relations."

The tribunal, organized by British philosopher Bertrand Russell, found the United States guilty of acts of aggression contrary to law and of bombing civilian targets.

Sweden, much to the distress of the United States, has also granted asylum to "humanitarian" grounds to 28 American servicemen either opposed to the Vietnam War or seeking to avoid service there.

But it also must be said that there are in Sweden now some 60,000 refugees representing all Communist nations, according to unofficial sources.

Must Balance The Swedish argument is that if they are to admit Communist defectors they also must admit Americans to confirm with their neutral policy.

Early this month, as a sign of its displeasure, the United States recalled Ambassador William W. Heath to Washington for consultation.

Adding further complications have been attacks on the U.S. Embassy, burnings of the American flag and physical violence against a U.S. diplomatic representative.

The issue also is dividing Swedes. Conservative party members have demanded the resignation of Education Minister Olaf Palme, who marched in an anti-American parade.

Swedish neutrality is deeply ingrained. After World War II, the Swedes bowed to a Soviet demand for the return of Baltic refugees who had served in the German army.
