N. Viets Claim 'Defeat' Of US As Paris Talks Begin

US Claims Win In Saigon Battle

SAIGON (UPI)—U.S. and South Vietnamese troops have smashed the Communist spring offensive against Saigon by killing or capturing more than 5,000 communist troops, military spokesmen said today.

American generals said the battle for the capital was over with allied troops mopping up guerrillas trying to flee.

Lt. Gen. Bruce Palmer, deputy commander of U.S. Army forces in Vietnam, said, "The Communists have shot their wad... about the only real fighting we are doing is chasing the remnant of this group."

"It's all over within Saigon now," agreed Maj. Gen. Julian Ewell, commander of the 9th Infantry Division.

GIs produced a captured Communist document saying the Viet Cong struck the capital in hopes of bolstering the North Vietnam bargaining position in peace talks that opened with the

United States in Paris today. Lt. Gen. Fred C. Weyant, commander of Saigon area forces, said the Communist thrust "has been crushed."

"Although isolated small attacks, terrorism and harassment by fire including rockets are still possible, large numbers of enemy have been attempting to withdraw from the battlefield for the past 48 hours," Weyant said.

Situation Under Control
Lt. Gen. Bruce Palmer, deputy commanding U.S. Army general in Vietnam, said the Saigon area is secure. "We have the situation well in hand."

U.S. spokesmen said about 12,000 Communists drove against Saigon May 5. They said 80 to 90 per cent were North Vietnamese.

The 24 Communist battalions were met at the gates by 24

Rainfall Is In Its Eighth Straight Day In Pampa

half to over three inches have fallen in various areas even in the immediate Pampa area.

The rainfall started one week ago today and it has rained locally every day or night since then. Rain Sunday and this morning totaled about 2-tenths inch.

The area has been under a cloud cover practically all of that time although the sun did pop through and there was a patch of blue sky visible directly overhead at one time late this forenoon.

The week-long steady rains have added to the verdure of city lawns and, incidentally, cut down on city water department revenue due to the lack of necessity for watering grass to get it off to springtime growth.

The Amarillo weather bureau said it did not have available information on the last prolonged rainy spell, but one official at the bureau said he believed it was in June or July of 1965 when we had a six or seven-day protracted rainy spell.

"It just doesn't happen here very often," he said.

The noonday forecast from the weather bureau indicated another 30 per cent possibility of more rain tonight and about a 10 per cent possibility for tomorrow.

Fog that covered Pampa most of last night lifted about 9 a.m. today when rain began falling. (See RAINFALL, Page 3)

Lack Of Response From Reds Is Cited

PARIS (UPI)—The preliminary talks on the Vietnam War opened today with a North Vietnamese claim it had "defeated" the United States and Washington's charge that U.S. limitation of bombing the North had not been matched by similar restraint from Hanoi.

"We ask what restraints you will make for your part to contribute to peace," U.S. Ambassador W. Averell Harriman told the Hanoi delegation.

Harriman put this question in an opening statement on behalf of the United States at the first three-hour session of preliminary talks in Paris. It was the first time the United States and Hanoi had met across the conference table in an effort to end the war.

Difficult Talks
Xuan Thuy, the chief North Vietnamese negotiator, made it clear from the outset the talks would be difficult. He said the United States had lost the war and that it must end the bombing of the North and all other acts of war before formal peace talks can begin.

Harriman said the United States had come to Paris "in a spirit of sincerity, good faith and hope." But he firmly listed the aggressive actions with which the United States charges Hanoi, in particular Communist failure to match President Johnson's bombing limitation.

"Since March 31 we have sought a sign that our restraint has been matched by the Democratic Republic of North Vietnam," he said.

"We cannot conceal our concern that your government has chosen to move substantial and increasing numbers of troops and supplies from the north to the south," Harriman said. "Moreover, your forces have continued to fire on our forces from across the Demilitarized zone. We ask what restraints you will take for your part to contribute to peace."

Harriman said the United States proposed restoration of the Demilitarized Zone "to its proper and original state." He said this could be an "important test of good faith on each side."

"We believe it is a reasonable test and we are prepared to carry it out," he said.

Harriman opened his remarks on this proposal by saying "let us begin by pulling apart the contending forces as a step towards broader measures of de-escalation."

In a tough statement at the three-hour opening session attended by 11 Americans and 11 North Vietnamese, Thuy charged Washington with being guilty of "monstrous crimes against human rights."

His statement was made public by Nguyen Thanh Le, chief spokesman for the Hanoi delegation.

The talks began shortly after 10:30 a.m. (5:30 a.m. EDT) as both sides were claiming victories in the war in Vietnam and ended at 1:45 p.m. (8:45 a.m. EDT).

First Comment
Harriman's first comment was only that the talks proceeded in a "very correct" atmosphere and that they would meet again at 10:30 a.m. Wednesday after each side has studied the other's opening statement.

Thuy's opening statement lasted two full hours, including translation.

Le said Thuy clearly outlined the aims of the preliminary talks—to determine with the United States side an end of U.S. bombing and all other acts of war against North Vietnam and then to "discuss other points of interest."

All Work Together In Hospitals

Scan today's headlines and the impression is that we live in a self-serving society. We are, it might appear, a people dedicated to fulfilling our personal whims at the expense of any who stand in our way.

It only appears that way, in truth, we are a nation of people who care about others. And nowhere is this concern for others more evident than in the nation's more than 7,000 hospitals.

Within these hospital walls is an army of dedicated men, women and teenagers working in concert toward a common goal: the provision of the highest quality patient care. The patient seldom sees the majority of the hospital people, but they are there in force. Hospitals now employ more than two million persons, and hospital-based occupations are among the fastest growing in the nation.

The people who fill these occupations come from every walk of life and from varying educational backgrounds. High school graduates, through on-the-job training, fill such jobs as nursing aide, electrocardiograph technician, food service supervisor, dietary aide, laboratory technician, or surgical technician. Professional nurses complete at least three years of education and training beyond high school in preparation for their work.

College graduates pursue careers in hospital engineering, purchasing, public relations or personnel. Persons with postgraduate training work as occupational therapists, physical therapists, medical social workers, hospital administrators, health science librarians, or speech pathologists.

Legislators Warn Constituents To Stay Home During 'March'

WASHINGTON (SPL)—Members of Congress are bluntly advising constituents to stay away from Washington during the impending "poor people's march."

The legislators are warning of the possibility of a number of dangers—outbreaks of riots and violence, incendiary fires, which have continued to plague the capital since last month's costly disturbances following the slaying of Dr. Martin Luther King, and the spread of disease.

The extraordinary development that members of Congress are telling their home folks not to come to Washington was revealed by Senator Karl Mundt, S. D., a ranking Republican on the Powerful Appropriations and Foreign Relations Committees. He also disclosed that he is urging colleagues to do the same "because I fear we are headed for very serious trouble."

"I have deemed it necessary, for the first time in my 30 years in Congress, Mundt said,

"to tell the people of my state that if they have business in Washington, they should cancel it if possible. Also, if they must come, they should leave their wives and families at home, because until this so-called march is completed, visitors cannot feel safe in our capital city."

President Johnson should make a personal appeal to the march leaders to drop their plans, Mundt declared, in the interest of both their professed cause and the security of the people of Washington. This view was echoed by Senator Gordon Allott, R-Colo., who contended the march will do more harm than good.

"People have a right to petition," he said, "but they also have a right to do it in an orderly manner. When ten thousand, twenty thousand, thirty thousand or one hundred thousand people mass in one place to petition, it can hardly be called a petition. That is a demand. It is a demand that we bow our neck to the power represented by those people."

"I do not propose to do that. For one thing, we must have all law and order. The people who are coming here, no matter how well intentioned, are doing themselves a great disservice. I can listen to four or five people in my office, but I cannot listen to a crowd of ten or more thousand. And the same goes for other members of Congress."

Senator Strom Thurmond, R-S. C., cited testimony before the Senate Permanent Investigating Subcommittee that marchers will be armed.

This admission came from Attorney General Ramsey Clark, who was questioned on the matter as follows:

"Do you think that some of the people coming here will have guns?"

Clark: "There will be people coming in with guns. There will be people already here who have guns. We have too many guns in this nation. That's one of the great difficulties. We urgently need to move effectively after them."

Television 'Miraculous' Houston Heart Transplants

HOLLYWOOD (UPI) — The television ratings indicate that CBS-TV's Andy Griffith Show was the nation's most popular regular series in the past season.

Second was the weekly series of the same network's in-structible Lucille Ball. This remarkable lady not only manages to retain her peak television popularity, but is also currently appearing with Henry Fonda in a family movie comedy that seems to be a smash hit, "Your, Mine and Ours," about a widower with 10 children who marries a widow with eight.

As it happens, the format of Miss Ball's video series in the coming season calls for her to portray a widow with two children. The youngsters will be played by her real-life offspring, Lucie and Desi.

'Miraculous' Houston Heart Transplants

HOUSTON (UPI) — An ambulance, its siren wailing in the night, raced down a boulevard bordered with moss draped pink oak trees between the dignified campus of Rice University and the playground of Hermann Park.

Its destination was the 134-acre Texas Medical Center complex and the siren echoed through the night until it arrived at one of the 10 hospitals. It most likely stopped at Ben Taub General because one of the best equipped emergency rooms in the world is located there.

It gets plenty of use in this metropolis known as "the murder capital of the nation." Almost anyone in Houston who is wounded or injured and is hanging by only a shred of life would rather be brought to Ben Taub than any place else.

They are brought in so regularly and are treated so quickly and skillfully by the resident physicians and nurses they tend to become a number rather than a name.

Most recover. That's why the hospital has a reputation. Some do not. That's where Houston gets its reputation.

Until 8:15 p.m. May 2, those who died were treated like any other accident or homicide victim. But then Dr. Denton Cooley and the administration of nearby St. Luke's and Texas Children's Hospital changed all this.

Now these victims become possible donors for heart transplants which Dr. Cooley and his staff have been doing at a record pace since they decided to embark on the program that Thursday evening. It will take a multitude of circumstances, even after the

family offers the heart, for one to be used in a transplant.

But this series of circumstances was achieved almost miraculously three times in five days after Dr. Cooley and Newell E. France, the hospital administrator, decided on the program.

Everett Claire Thomas, 47, of Phoenix, Ariz., received the heart of a 15-year-old gunshot victim five hours and 21 minutes after the decision was made.

James Bordon Cobb, 48, of Alexandria, La., received the heart of a 15-year-old motorcycle accident victim less than three days later.

Within another two days, the third transplant brought life back to John Stuckwish, 62, of Alpine, Tex., after he died on the operating table.

Cobb died two days after receiving the new heart. Dr. Cooley said death was attributed to failure of the lungs, kidney or liver—not the new heart.

The other two patients were progressing well and were expected to recover, Dr. Cooley said. No other doctor has two transplant patients living although three other doctors have made two transplants.

In all, there have been 13 heart transplants in the world—three in Houston, two each in South Africa, New York, Stanford, Calif., and Paris; and one each in London and India. Five of the recipients survive, and two of those are in Houston.

Even Dr. Christiaan Barnard of South Africa, the dean of the heart transplant surgeons, has not had such success. His first transplant recipient died and he has yet to make a third although he has been talking about it.

Dr. Cooley isn't even sure of the reason for his initial success, but he has some ideas. He believes the sino-aortic node, which acts as the ignition switch for the heart, should be transferred from the donor to the recipient.

The node of the recipient or an artificial device known as a pacemaker has been used in most other operations. Dr. Cooley said Dr. Barnard may use the donor's node, but he does not know for sure because Dr. Barnard has not made known this detail.

Dr. Cooley said he believes the donor's node should be used because it is known to be healthy while the recipient's node may be damaged along with other parts of his heart.

He believes another reason for his initial success is the use of a new rejection drug which has not been used in the other transplants.

It is Anti-Lymphocyte Globulin (alg) which first was used extensively in kidney transplants in Denver. It increased the survival of the kidney recipients from 50 to 95 per cent.

ALG now is being produced by the Baylor University College of Medicine, of which Dr. Cooley is a staff member, and the Houston Heart Association.

Drugs such as Immuran and other cortisone derivatives have

"It was 3 o'clock and we hadn't had lunch, but I didn't want to say anything," the visitor said. "And we never once sat down all day."

Motley County Is Protesting Designation As 'Hunger Area'

MATADOR, Tex. (UPI)—Motley County residents are protesting implications in news reports based on released "findings" of a citizens board of inquiry in Washington had endangered county residents.

The board said it held hearings around the country and made field trips.

"No one came here to make inquiry that we know of," said Campbell.

Meador carried a page one editorial in his weekly paper titled "have you been hungry?" It said in part, "there is no hunger in Motley County except people on a diet and trying to reduce. "Babies suffering from malnutrition here, and dying? Not true," said pharmacist Bob Stanley.

Seat Belts Available For Wheelchairs
