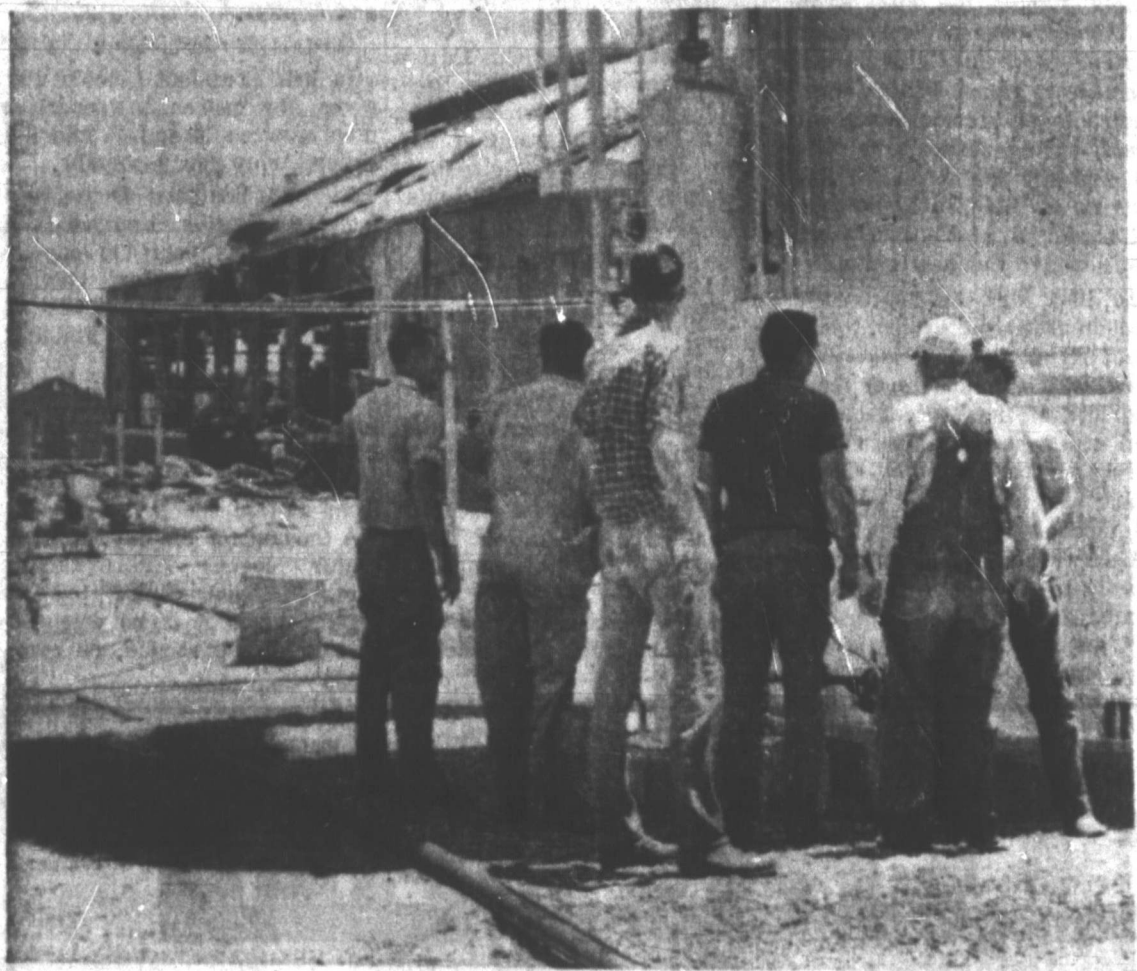

### Three Others Are 'Critical'

## Man Dies As Result Of Injuries In Blast Here

One man has died of his injuries and three more are still listed in critical condition at an Amarillo hospital from a blast that rocked the Cities Service natural gas compressor station near here shortly after 1 p.m. yesterday.

Marion Miles Stewart, 64, of 803 S. Barnes, died this morning at 1:30 in Northwest Texas Hospital at Amarillo.

Still listed in very critical condition at the hospital late this morning were C. L. Reeves, 59, an oiler, of 1200 McCullough; Leo Casey, 43, a repairman, of 1200 Charles; and Travis Patterson, 49, a repairman, of 1304 Garland.

Listed in fair condition at Highland General Hospital was E. E. Campbell, 60, an engineer, of 2225 N. Christy. L. C. (Shorty) Wassell, 51, who lives northeast of the city, was admitted to the hospital for exhaustion. His condition was not serious.

Sam Goodan, 61, southwest of the city, was listed in fair condition at Worley Hospital. His burns were not extensive, hospital spokesman said.

All of them were reportedly in the building at the time of the explosion, except Wassell. Others were less seriously injured.

The blast happened shortly after 1 p.m. but was quickly brought under control.

Company officials said the blast was apparently caused by a malfunction in a natural gas exhaust. They said the exhaust valve on an engine in the plant—which had recently been overhauled—apparently backfired and started the fire.

Company representatives said damage was confined by quick-action emergency measures, including activation of cut-off valves to shut off natural gas being pumped into the compressor plant.

The blast from the explosion knocked out windows and blew off a portion of the roof.

Three units of the Pampa Fire Department arrived at the

scene and had the blaze under control about 15 minutes after they arrived.

The explosion was heard in many sections of the city.

## Clifford Sees New Threat Of Invasion

SAIGON (UPI)—U.S. Secretary of Defense Clark M. Clifford today predicted another Communist Tet-type attack into Saigon in the next six weeks.

The Viet Cong picked off their latest victim in a wave of Saigon killings, a national policeman.

Clifford told reporters in Da Nang the impending "widespread attacks" would be "spectacular" aimed at influencing the Communist bargaining position at Paris. "Our intention," he said, "is not to let that spectacular happen."

"We know that they (the Communists) are increasing their forces around Saigon. We will be watching it carefully," Clifford said. U.S. forces killed 195 Communists within 60 miles of the capital late Monday and early Tuesday.

# Bloodless Coup Topples Aref Government In Iraq

## Continued 'Struggle' With Israel Seen

BEIRUT (UPI)—A bloodless predawn coup toppled the Iraq government of President Abdel Rahman Aref today, the Iraqi Baghdad radio said.

The broadcast from Baghdad said the new masters of the Arab nation, calling themselves "The Revolution Command Council," sent Aref and his family to an unspecified foreign country, following the coup that was "bloodless — with no bullets."

Banished with Aref went Premier Maj. Gen. Tahir Yahya, his chief aides and military officers.

The new regime, according to Baghdad radio, said it will continue the Arab struggle against Israel and will base its relations with nations according to the nations' attitude toward the Jewish state. The broadcasts also said he knew masters of Iraq will encourage private investment and private enterprise.

### History of Violence

Baghdad radio said the council ousted Aref "due to corruption and nonconsent of the Kurds' battle for autonomy in Arab Iraq. The council also acted," the broadcast said, because of the Aref regime's "prevention of the Iraqi army from facing the Israelis during the June war and covering up for imperialist and Zionist espionage rings."

First reports from Baghdad indicated the air force, the presidential guard and the 10th armored brigade played a major role in the coup. It listed one leader as Brig. Aziz Amin.

There was no report of fighting. Successful Israeli air strikes, crushing Iraq's air power, aided the Jewish state's victory in the June 1967, Arab-Israeli war and helped generate opposition to the Aref regime.

### Claim Corruption

The fall of Aref marked the fourth change of government in the Arab nation in 10 years. All were violent changes.

In 1958, rebels led by Abdul Kerim Kassem seized power in a bloody revolution in which young King Faisal, cousin of Jordanian King Hussein, was shot to death. In 1963, President Kassem was shot to death in a revolt that brought to power his former ally Abdul Salem Aref. In April 1966, Aref was killed in a helicopter crash and his brother, Abdel Rahman Aref, moved up from military chief of staff to the presidency in a regime that died today, according to Baghdad radio.

The revolutionary council announced on the radio that it would govern the nation until elections are held. It gave no date for the voting.

### Top News In Brief

**SANFORD, Maine (UPI)**—A man who had held his wife hostage at gunpoint for several hours agreed to be interviewed on television late Tuesday night. As he walked to the cameras, he tripped, his pistol discharged, and his wife was mortally wounded.

**PITTSBURGH (UPI)** — Can the steel industry afford a 6 percent pay hike for the men in the mills? The industry says no. The United Steelworkers Union (USW) says yes. Unless one side changes its mind—or President Johnson intervenes as he did three years ago—the industry may be hit in two weeks with its first strike since 1959-60.

**LONDON (UPI)**—James Earl Ray, giving up his fight against extradition to America to stand trial for the slaying of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., could be in a Memphis, Tenn., jail by this weekend, his lawyer said today.

**DENVER (UPI)**—Colorado health officials said Tuesday about one out of every four dead squirrels found in Denver over the past several days has been infected with the bubonic plague.

**PRAGUE (UPI)**—Czech Communist leaders are convinced they have won their battle with Moscow to get Soviet troops out of this country, a high party source said today.

**SAIGON (UPI)**—A force of several thousand U.S. Marines today attacked what was believed to be the last North Vietnamese stronghold along the Demilitarized Zone (DMZ).

## Fortas Listens To Court Attack

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Justice Abe Fortas sat impassively at a Senate witness table today, sipping water and periodically popping mints into his mouth, as Sen. Sam J. Ervin denounced "astounding" decisions of the Supreme Court.

Fortas, President Johnson's nominee for Chief Justice of the United States, appeared for the second day before the judiciary committee, which must pass on his qualifications before his appointment comes up for Senate approval.

Chairman James O. Eastland, D-Miss., and Sen. Philip A. Hart, D-Mich., were the only other committee members in the crowded chamber as Ervin criticized Fortas for siding with the majority in a decision which struck down the Virginia poll tax.

Ervin argued that the Supreme Court decision in the poll tax case was "like losing an atomic bomb to get rid of a mouse." He termed it another example of "judicial activism at work."

Fortas sat gazing at Ervin as the North Carolina Democrat discussed Supreme Court rulings, and occasionally leaned over to whisper to Sen. Albert Gore, D-Tenn., who sat beside him.

Ervin also criticized a May, 1967, Supreme Court decision which declared unconstitutional California's repeal of the open housing law.

"Until recently it was thought laws relating to real estate belonged exclusively to states where the real estate was situated," Ervin said. He said the law gave homeowners white and nonwhite—freedom to sell to whomever they pleased.

"Isn't it astounding for the Supreme Court to say this discriminates against any one group?" Ervin asked rhetorically.

Eastland arrived 15 minutes late to gavel the hearing to order.

Sen. Strom Thurmond, R-S.C., was the fourth member of the 16-member committee present at the outset but he left before the session got into full swing.

Sen. Philip A. Hart, a panel member, said after hearing Fortas that he found it "uncomfortable when the relationship between a Supreme Court justice and the president is other than social."

## Another Airliner Hijacked

MIAMI (UPI)—A Cuban waving a hand grenade hijacked a Miami-bound jetliner with 64 persons aboard today, forced it to refuel in New Orleans, then routed it to Havana.

The plane, National Airlines Flight No. 1064, set down in the Cuban capital at 9:36 a.m. EDT, officials reported.

There was no indication anyone had been harmed. The big DC8 was bound from Los Angeles to Miami via Houston and New Orleans when the hijacking, the third in less than a week, occurred.

First word of the hijacking was received by the Houston flight control center shortly after the plane left the Texas city.

"I have a Cuban in the cockpit with a hand grenade and a gun and 'I'm being hijacked,' pilot Capt. Sidney L. Oliver reported.

## Carver School Is Suggested As 'Special Services Center' Here

Six Pampa school officials, including Dr. James F. Malone, the new school superintendent, toured Carver, Baker and Lamar Elementary Schools Tuesday and will meet at 1:30 p.m. Thursday to discuss their findings.

In the meeting Tuesday, several suggestions were proposed for the use of Carver Elementary School, which by school board decision, will be closed as a school in the 1968-69 term.

Also by board decision, the students are to be transferred to other elementary schools by September.

J. C. Randall, principal of Carver Elementary School, and Carl Jones, Baker Elementary School principal, conducted the tour for Dr. Malone, Homer Craig, school business manager; James Trusty, assistant business manager and McHenry Lane, former curriculum coordinator. Lane who assisted six months as temporary superintendent, retired June 30, but has continued to help orient Dr. Malone in his superintendent duties.

Dr. Malone, with the other school officials agreeing, suggested Carver School could be used as a special services center, and said "the school has several possibilities. We are lucky to have a building available which can meet so many needs."

The suggestions proposed Tuesday included using the school as a speech therapy center, textbook depository, nursing and health services center, warehouse for school furniture and custodial supplies, conference room, demonstration area for new equipment, old records and federal commodities storage, census office and instructional and library services center.

"The gym could also be used for intramural games and sports between Pampa schools.

The building itself is in good condition and may not require spending a great deal of money to be established as a special services center," Dr. Malone said.

Although the men touring the schools Tuesday will discuss their tour Thursday, the final outcome for Carver and its students will be decided by school trustees, based partially on Dr. Malone's report of the tour, he said.

Fifteen Gray County youths competed in the show which began at 8 a.m. and lasted until almost 9 p.m.

## Pampa Attorney Arthur M. Teed Dies Wednesday

Arthur M. Teed, Pampa attorney for 40 years, died Wednesday in Methodist Hospital in Houston, following surgery in January.

Born in Spearville, Kans., Dec. 1, 1904, he attended high school in Amarillo, and graduated from Washburn College, Topeka, Kans., with an L.L.B. degree in 1928.

He was a member of First Methodist Church in Pampa, Pampa Noon Lions Club, member of Lovett Memorial Library Board, Pampa Fire Arts Association Board, Community Concert Association board, and was chairman of the board of trustees of M. K. Brown Foundation.

He was also a member of the Gray County Bar Association, State Bar of Texas and member of the law firm of Smith, Teed, Wade and Waters.

Attorney for Pampa Independent School District several years, he was a member of board of trustees and board of stewards of First Methodist Church. He was married to Dorothy Stark June 22, 1929.

### Wall Street Chatter

NEW YORK (UPI)—Abraham & Co. says it believes the investing public will continue to put money into the stock market and "put off a little longer the day of reckoning for the present speculative excesses." It suggests that investors can remain fully invested for the time being but should try to concentrate in equities which offer sound long term value.

Wachs & Co. notes that it now asks a question whether the blue chip issues can keep carrying the market on the upside or whether electronics and computer groups must return to favor to keep up the momentum. It said it appears the consumer is not "overly concerned" with the imposition of the 10 per cent income tax surcharge.

The Nuveen Investment Commentary says the Wednesday closings of the stock market are giving a "staccato quality" to stock dealings, adding that such action may prevent an occurrence of the "extended silly season" building up before the advent of the truncated trading weeks. It says investors who fix their sights too closely on the short term "are aiming a target at a rabbit, when by adopting a longer view, they might bag an elephant."

## Television In Review

HOLLYWOOD (UPI)—The bond between Africans and Negroes of this nation were highlighted Tuesday night in a transatlantic CBS-TV conversation, part of the network's "Of Black America" series.

Participants in the hour discussion were Thomas Mboya, minister of economic planning and development for Kenya, speaking from Nairobi; Dr. Alex Kwapong, vice chancellor of the University of Ghana, talking from Accra; Floyd McKissick of the Congress of Racial Equality in New York, and Rep. John Conyers Jr., D-Mich., in Washington. The moderator was Mike Wallace.

One of the questions posed by the broadcast, "Black World" was whether there was a sense of kinship between Negro Americans and Africans. And the general reaction was a strong yes.

Mboya felt this was inevitable because of the color bond, because Negro Americans came from Africa and because of similar problems faced in recent years by blacks of both lands. Conyers described these problems—and developments—as the "self-determination" theme in both places.

The participants agreed that Africans felt closer to Negro Americans these days because of the civil rights struggle in the United States—and that blacks in this land had added respect for Africans because of their anti-colonial experience.

Mboya said the basic idea was to free colored peoples all over the world. He added that the black man's future was, indeed, in all places, and that it was not right to believe it was only in Africa.

Conyers and McKissick, however, stressed the importance of Africa to American blacks because it gives them the sense of past, of history, of tradition, of identification—to help bridge the gap brought about by a lack of teaching about Negro background in this country and elsewhere.

All four conversationalists felt that most blacks in their lands were unhappy about American involvement in Vietnam. On the

subject of young activists, Kwapong noted it is said that if you send a student to Paris, he becomes a Communist, and if you send him to Russia, he becomes a capitalist.

Concerning interracial marriage, Mboya said it was not frowned upon in his land, but was considered strange because of the basic nature of the tribal structure. Of Christianity, the participants indicated it was being scrutinized carefully—not so much as a religion but as a means of introducing the traditional European outlook on life being rejected by blacks.

Next Tuesday, "Of Black America" will present a rerun of the series' first broadcast, which offers a history of attitudes—black and white—and their effect on the Negro American, and is narrated by Bill Cosby, the actor-comedian. Cosby, by the way, is reported considering, for the 1969-70 season, a half-hour series in which he would play a San Francisco detective with a wife and two children.

### Baby Gorilla Is Receiving 'Loving Care'

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (UPI)—Scientific know-how as well as tender loving care focused on a baby gorilla in an incubator at the Kansas City Zoo today.

The four-pound infant, born Monday night to "Jungle Jeannie," was taken from her mother in the hope she could become one of the few captivity-born gorillas to survive.

Zoo Superintendent Donald R. Dietlein said gorilla births in captivity are rare and survival is even rarer. Five born here previously have died, partly because they were left with their mothers, Dietlein theorized. Maternal care prevented more scientific ministrations.

Mrs. Janet Davis, a bacteriologist at the zoo, will look after the infant, handling her "as a little baby rather than a gorilla."

## 17 Firms Bidding For Maracaibo Contract

CARACAS (UPI)—The name of the game, is service contracts. The players are powerful international oil companies and Venezuela's nationalistic government. The stakes are the country's multi-million dollar oil industry.

Seventeen different firms, including giants such as Esso, Shell and Gulf, from seven nations laid their cards on the table early this month when they presented offers for 617,000 acres in oil-rich Lake Maracaibo. Over a decade after dictator Marcos Perez Jimenez granted the last oil concession there, Venezuela again is offering its mineral riches to the highest bidder.

But times have changed. Awaits Sentence  
Today, a jailed Perez Jimenez awaits sentence on charges of embezzling millions of dollars during his ten-year reign, and a hard-bargaining nationalistic administration, holding all the cards, is guiding the country's oil future.

For oil companies that have pushed Venezuela from a 332 barrel-per-day production in 1917 to the world's output, this means renewed demands for a larger share of the profits.

The government now collects nearly one dollar in taxes and royalty payments for every barrel of crude exported. As the world's top net exporter, supplying 5 per cent of world shipments, Venezuela earned nearly \$1.3 billion last year, 90 per cent of its foreign exchange income.

What has U.S. oilmen edge is not so much the squeeze on profits as the predominate role specified for the state oil company (CVP) under the new service contract system.

The advent of service contracts signals the end of the relatively lenient concessions system used in Caracas over the last 50 years. While service contracts at present affect only the Lake Maracaibo area offered, and any new areas the CVP puts up for bids, in 15 years all oil exploited in Venezuela will come under the new set-up.

In 1983, the last major concession areas will expire. Renewal of rights to keep on drilling areas which produce over three-quarters of the present output, and which have a three million barrel-per-day potential in 15 years will have to be negotiated through a service contract.

Last week's bidding on the relatively small area in Lake Maracaibo is a trial balloon that will give oilmen an idea of how rosy or how black Venezuela's

oil future will be for them. (Companies presenting bids were: Creole Petroleum Corp. (Esso), Shell, Pan American Venezuelan Oil Co., Mobil Oil Co., Sinclair Oil Co., Mene Grande Oil Co. (Gulf), Occidental Oil Co., Agip (Italian State Company Affiliate) with Phillips Petroleum Corp., Texas Petroleum Co., Sun Oil Co. in partnership with Atlantic Richfield and Cities Service Oil Co. and a European group of Elf-Erap (France), Gelsenberg (Germany), Hispanoil (Spain) and Petrofina (Belgium).

### OKAYS PLAYBOY

It will affect such publications as the American magazine Playboy which postal authorities had ruled obscene and banned from postal delivery.

A noise "that sounded like a sonic boom and a swishing and blowing." She looked outside, saw flames and reported the explosion to police. Her home is located about a mile from the plant.

Foster Whaley, county agriculture agent, said he was at the rodeo grounds in Recreation Park when the explosion occurred.

He immediately looked over toward the area of the plant. "The concussion from the blast seemed to rock everything. Then we saw flames shooting way up in the air."

Firemen F. E. Gee of the Pampa Fire Department's south sub-station said he was talking to his wife when the alarm came in. He heard the explosion and thought it was a sonic boom. About a minute later the alarm came in.

"I could see smoke and fire all the way from the fire station which is about 2 1/2 miles from the plant," he said.

Sheriff's officials, Pampa policemen and ambulances all converged on the scene. Seven ambulances were dispatched and sheriff's officials and police sealed off the area and kept traffic lanes open for emergency vehicles.

The building was heavily damaged but not totally demolished. Most of the damage occurred on the north side, where most of the side of the building was ripped away by the force of the explosion and a large area of the roof was blasted away. On the other side a lesser portion of the roof was blown out but only windows were knocked out. The earth was also cratered on the north side nearest the explosion and a big gas main was ruptured.

No estimate of damages was available from company officials. According to several persons, the explosion is the third at the plant since it was founded in the late 1940s. An estimated 25-30 persons are employed at the compressor station.

**30 Burglaries Are Admitted By Youths**

Three juveniles apprehended by city police here yesterday for investigation of burglary have admitted to committing 30 burglaries. Police Chief Jim Conner said today.

The trio are being held in police custody pending action by juvenile authorities.

Two of the youths were caught yesterday after a three-hour, block-by-block chase by units of the police department. The chase started at 6:17 a.m. when a woman telephoned police to report that she thought there was an attempted burglary at Floyd's Kwik-Stop drive-in grocery store.

The youths were seen fleeing down an alley and police gave chase on foot but later lost the youths. A dragnet later flushed one of the youths out and the other was arrested about 15 minutes later.

A third youth was implicated by the pair and arrested later yesterday.

The trio, two of whom are 14 and the other 15, told police that another youth had participated in one of the burglaries. He has not yet been questioned, police say.

The youths admitted to committing several break-ins immediately prior to their arrest—Monday night or early Tuesday morning. The break-ins occurred at the Pampa Optimist Club, a service station in the 200 block of W. Brown, the First Presbyterian Church, and the First Baptist Church. None of the burglary attempts was successful, except the burglary of the Optimist Club where assorted candy and cigarettes were taken. Damage to the building was estimated at \$100.

Clifford said many of the North Vietnamese troops in the northern provinces of South Vietnam had pulled back into the north to resupply and refit before the offensive. U.S. B52 bombers went after them for the third successive day today in raids above the Demilitarized Zone dividing the two countries.

## Group Suggests Big Change In Postal Service

WASHINGTON (UPI)—A Presidential commission has recommended that the Post Office Department be scrapped as presently constituted. It suggested that a new federal corporation be formed to improve mail service and eliminate the huge annual postal deficit.

The President's Commission on Postal Organization worked more than a year on a comprehensive study to the ailing postal service which currently operates at a deficit of well over \$1 billion a year. Much of the report was highly critical of current postal operations.

In a statement, Johnson called the report sobering and urged that involved government officials and members of Congress study it closely.

Postmaster General W. Marvin Watson said he was "very pleased" that the commission had completed its report and would "immediately appoint a top level task force, headed by myself, to thoroughly study all aspects of the report."

"It is this kind of thought provoking effort which is vitally needed by our nation if we are to continue to grow and prosper," Watson said.

The basic recommendation by the commission amounted to an overhaul of the current mail system by creating a postal

corporation, federally owned and chartered by Congress.

It would operate the postal service on a self-supporting basis under a nine-man board of directors with the authority to set postal rates, subject to congressional veto.

The commission was headed by the retired board chairman of American Telephone & Telegraph Co., Frederick R. Kappel. Watson's predecessor as postmaster general, Lawrence F. O'Brien, favored the corporation idea.

The commission recommended that "all appointments to and promotions within the postal system be made on a non-political basis." The corporation would replace a cabinet department as the post office is now set up.

Present postal employees with their accrued civil service benefits would be transferred to a new career service within the postal corporation.

On the question of rates, the commission said one of the most serious shortcomings of the present setup was the post office's inability to set prices for its services.

The plan submitted to the President would permit the corporation to set postal rates based on actual cost of service, value to those served and changing market demands.

Because the department is operating at such a huge deficit, the new system undoubtedly would result in higher postal rates.

"Since we see no reason why the general mail user should be subsidized by the taxpayer, we recommend that the postal service should become completely self-supporting as quickly as possible," the commission

said. Rate increases alone would not be relied upon to close the cost-revenue gap, according to the commission. Improved productivity and operating efficiency would, under the new plan, contribute substantially to deficit elimination.

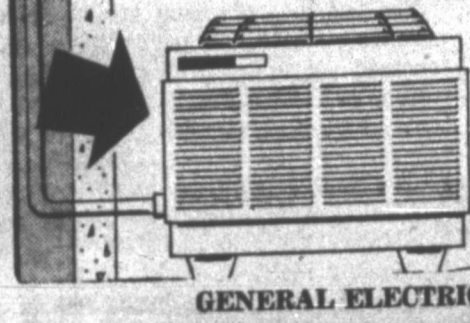

# Rio Grande Valley Cotton Needs A Few Hot, Dry Days

By KENNETH R. CLARK  
EDINBURG, Tex. (UPI) — Even the optimistic were hanging the fate of the 1968 cotton crop on "it" this week in the Lower Rio Grande Valley. "If the rain stops..."

If the rain does not stop, a lot of cotton presumably will be mulched back into the sodden soil—a process which agricultural agent A. H. (Dutch) Karcher said Monday already has begun in Hidalgo County.

"We've got some fields that promise an equivalent of last year's production," he said, "and we've got some that already have been abandoned, because of insects and the weather. We're way behind, and it may be too late to harvest cotton blooming now, because the rainy season starts after Aug. 15."

Growers might wonder what else the area has had.

**Rains Keep Coming**

Since Hurricane Beulah's rampage last year, the rains

have fallen steadily, washing away insecticide as fast as crop dusters can apply it, booming the growth of weeds, and lending cotton fields the aspect of rice paddies in much of the four-county area.

Last year, the Valley produced a bumper crop for some 316,000 bales of cotton.

This year, only one agricultural agent contacted Monday said he thought his area had a chance of matching it.

Don Cowan, of Cameron County, said bolls finally are opening there, and that it "looks like a real fine crop."

He said the harvest could top 100,000 bales, "if we get real good weather from now on."

Willacy County agent Lynn Wilson was not so optimistic.

"We're going to be down a bit this year," he said. "We'll probably harvest 40,000 to 50,000 bales, but a few more rains at the wrong time could really hurt us."

But the darkest warning of all came from Mike Schuster, of the USDA Experimental Station at Weslaco, which has been directing the Valley's intensive spray program this year.

"We're beginning to detect bollworm and tobacco budworm resistance to poison," he said. "The picture looks rather bleak if severe resistance develops, because we're using the best we have right now. We've nothing else to turn to."

Neither does the cotton grow-

### FOREIGN NEWS COMMENTARY — Mideast Still Uneasy

By JOHN LAWTON

BEIRUT, Lebanon (UPI) — The Middle East is still crislocked despite a flurry of diplomatic efforts in both western and Communist worlds to secure lasting peace.

Arabs and Israelis remained as far apart as ever on a settlement after two weeks of talks in Moscow, London, Stockholm and The Hague that involved Israel, Egypt, Jordan, the Soviet Union, Britain and U.N. Mideast peace envoy Gunnar Jarring.

A glint of peace hopes was dashed last week when Egypt recanted on tacit recognition of Israel by Egyptian Foreign Minister Mahmoud Rifaat.

Official Egyptian spokesmen in Cairo brushed aside Rifaat's reported remarks in Stockholm by reiterating three Arab decisions at the Khartoum summit: No peace, no negotiations, no recognition of Israel as long as Israeli forces occupy Arab territory.

Egyptian President Gamal Abdel Nasser, in a meeting last week with Kremlin chiefs in Moscow amid growing indications the Soviet Union was tiring of the Arab-Israeli

deadlock, also threw cold water on any faint peace hopes.

Although no concrete peace developments emerged from Jarring's recent exchanges with Israel, Egypt and Jordan, all hopes for a final and lasting settlement still center on his mission.

Reported piecemeal moves toward peace by Egypt were rejected by Israel, which wants any settlement hammered out in direct talks with the Arabs.

# McLain Hurls 18th Victory For Detroit

Denny McLain tried—and failed—to get his 18th victory on Oct. 1st last season. The failure cost the Detroit Tigers the pennant.

But this season McLain picked up his 18th victory Tuesday night—July 16th—and kept the Tigers well in command of the American League race as they bid for their first pennant since 1945.

McLain ended a three-game Tiger losing streak when he pitched an eight-hitter to give Detroit a 4-0 victory over the Oakland A's. The triumph enabled McLain to become the first 18-game winner in the majors this season, boosting his record to 18-2.

It also maintained the Tigers' 1/2 game lead over the second place Baltimore Orioles, who chalked up their seventh straight victory by downing the Chicago White Sox 4-2.

**Crucial Game**

Last year McLain had 17 victories when he dislocated his hip on Sept. 17th in a home accident. He didn't pitch again until the final game of the season on Oct. 1st when the Tigers needed a victory over California to tie Boston and force a pennant playoff.

The Tigers staked McLain to a 3-1 lead in the second inning of that game but the Angels routed him in the third inning and went on to pin the loss on John Hiller to ruin the Tiger pennant hopes.

Elsewhere in the American League; the Yankees swept a doubleheader from the Washington Senators by 4-0 and 4-3 margins, Minnesota routed Boston 12-3 and Cleveland topped

## AMA Says Ruling Will Hamper Treatment Facilities For Drunks

AUSTIN (UPI) — A U. S. Supreme Court decision will slow efforts of communities to build treatment facilities for handling drunks separately from criminal court cases, the American Medical Association said today.

In its newspaper, the AMA said the court decision permitting alcoholics to be jailed on public drunkenness charges "by no means barred treatment rather than imprisonment," however.

In the decision, the court ruled 5-4 that imprisonment of boozing Leroy Powell of Austin on public drunkenness charges was not a cruel and unusual punishment prohibited by the Constitution.

Powell, 65, has been arrested more than 100 times in the past 20 years for drunkenness, and has served out fines for more than \$1,200 in jail during the 20 years because he did not have the money to pay them.

Disappointed in Ruling  
Members of the medical profession who had hoped the high court would decide otherwise were disappointed with the ruling.

AMA News said. "Police and judicial authorities were also disappointed. Drunk cases clog the morning dockets and take up police time and cell space better reserved for criminals."

In his court opinion, Justice Thurgood Marshall said "facilities for the attempted treatment of indigent alcoholics are woefully lacking throughout the country," the AMA said.

Marshall said before the court condemns the present practice of jailing alcoholics for public drunkenness. "perhaps we ought to be able to point to some clear promise of a better world for these unfortunate people."

No Promise Likely  
"Unfortunately, no such promise has yet been forthcoming." The AMA said congress has been demonstrating "an increased awareness and concern" with alcoholism, "recently approving a new law for the District of Columbia, providing protective custody, detoxification centers and commitment."

"An ironic result in the short

run will be to lessen pressures on communities for treatment facilities for alcoholics," the AMA said.

## Outdoor Activities Can Be Dangerous

NEW YORK (UPI)—Summertime and the living is easy in the backyard. Summertime and the living also can be dangerous outdoors.

Outdoor living is "in" and as eating, swimming, playing, even dancing and singing have moved out, so has electricity. And with outside power go more hazards than with use of electricity indoors.

Big Danger  
The biggest danger in the backyard turn-on is the possibility of electrical shock due to accidental grounding. With most earth all about, a faulty

tool or appliance can send a surge of lethal current through a person by way of the ground. All electrical equipment should be in good repair and properly grounded.

Another common outdoor danger is the use of extension cords and "octopus" connections that overload circuits. These are just two of the hazards cited in the current Family Safety, a publication of the National Safety Council.

Family Safety lists these other suggestions for a safe summer outdoors.

Don't use a hedge trimmer or other tools near water, or in the

rain. Never stand in water when using an electrical tool. Stay on dry ground. If an electrical appliance falls into water, unplug the power cord before retrieving.

Be sure that extension cords are in good condition. Replace them when damaged.

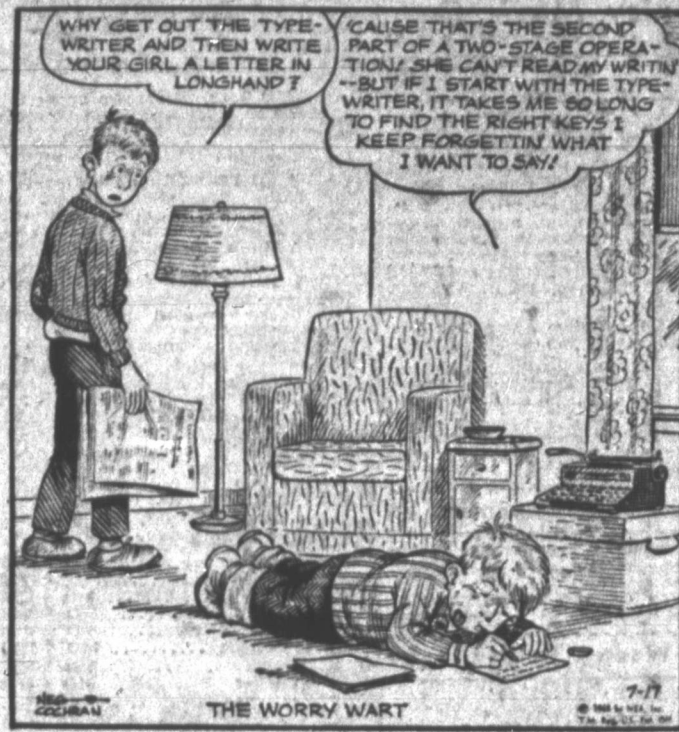
Don't overload extension cords with high wattage appliances.

Makeshift wiring outdoors can be dangerous. Better to have a qualified electrician install permanent, waterproof outdoor outlets.

Don't splice  
Be careful not to cut the cord when using an electric mower. Don't splice cut cords—replace them. Power mower cords should be bright color to make them visible against grass.

Don't use radios and television in wet areas, especially at pool-side where bare feet and wet ground or concrete add up to hazards.

Use of electric amplifiers at water's edge also can be dangerous.
