Violence Again Hits US Cities

A dozen police officers called for help. Answering squad cars had some windows smashed and one policeman was slightly injured when a bottle hit his leg. Three persons were arrested.

It was a bit different at Denver, Colo., Sunday when, "the queen of soul," singer Aretha Franklin, walked on stage at the open air Red Rocks Theater, said she had not been paid and therefore would not sing.

Smash Equipment
About 100 to 200 of 3,000 persons in the audience began shouting and throwing bottles, cans and rocks. They rolled 50-gallon trash barrels down the aisles. Some of the youths ran onto the stage and smashed a piano, musical instruments and electrical equipment.

Top News In Brief

MANILA (UPI)—An army of workers dug in the rubble of an earthquake-shattered apartment house today but the head of the rescue operation said hope was gone for the 200 persons still buried in the debris.

WELLINGTON (UPI)—A fire broke out today on the British liner Gothic 800 miles east of New Zealand, killing seven persons, ship company officials said.

MADRID (UPI)—Generalissimo Francisco Franco today declared a "state of alert" in the Basque province of Guipuzcoa where a local secret police chief was assassinated Friday.

PARIS (UPI)—North Vietnam said today if the United States wants to end the Vietnam War peacefully it must "discuss the issues" with the National Liberation Front (NLF), the Viet Cong's political arm.

MIAMI BEACH (UPI)—A man from Las Vegas who had been sending "goofy" letters to Nevada Gov. Paul Laxalt showed up at the governor's hotel with a rifle and a pistol wrapped in brown paper. Laxalt's press secretary said early today.

He said he understood the man had been taken into custody. Miami and Miami Beach Police said they knew nothing of the matter. The FBI said, "We have been instructed to tell the press that we have no information to release on the case."

Israelis and Jordanians exchanged mortar and bazooka shells across the Jordan River today in the second flareup in two days. Sunday Israeli jets bombed Jordanian-based Arab guerrilla bases.

PANMUNJOM, Korea (UPI)—Communist North Korean infiltrators attacked a patrol of American infantrymen on the edge of the Demilitarized Zone separating North and South Korea today. Each side suffered one man killed.

SAN JOSE, Costa Rica (UPI)—Mt. Arenal poured out a steady cloud of ash today threatening the nation's main cattle-raising country. The volcano's eruptions last week killed 78 persons.

GRAPEVINE, Tex. (UPI)—Four persons drowned when their boat overturned Sunday while several persons stood helplessly on the banks of Lake Grapevine. Nine children had been let out of the boat before the victims returned to the lake minutes later.

Three Are Killed Airliner, Private Plane Collide

MILWAUKEE, Wis. (UPI)—The flight had been smooth except for that thud.

The North Central Airlines Convair 440 settled down, bounced twice on the runway and rolled to a stop. The nine passengers got out and took a look at what had caused the thud.

They saw that the right side of the fuselage, just beneath the cockpit, had been slashed open. The wheel of a small plane protruded from the tear. Their plane had collided in midair with a smaller aircraft and there was the other plane—imbedded in theirs.

Work crews at General Mitchell airport used torches to free the smaller craft from the larger. The bodies of three Chicago area teen-agers were found in the small plane. Ricky L. Stenberg, 19, Elk Grove, Ill., the pilot; Virginia Johnson, 18, Mount Prospect, Ill., and her 13-year-old brother, Richard.

Copilot Injured
The only one injured aboard the Convair was copilot John Mazur, 30, Wheaton, Ill., who was at the controls of the two-engine jetprop airliner when it and the Cessna 150 collided.

Percy, Hatfield Thought Leaders For 'Veep'

MIAMI BEACH (UPI)—Sen. Charles Percy of Illinois and Sen. Mark Hatfield of Oregon were reported today to be leading prospects for the Republican vice presidential nomination if Richard M. Nixon said he did not want New York Gov. Nelson Rockefeller, his principal rival, for a running mate. California Gov. Ronald Reagan, another presidential contender who is considered by many of Nixon's supporters to be the most attractive No. 2 man, says flatly he would not accept a vice presidential spot on any ticket.

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Many Delegates Still Unsure About Favorite

MIAMI BEACH (UPI)—The 1968 Republican National Convention opened today with Richard M. Nixon holding a commanding lead over his two chief rivals for the GOP presidential nomination.

Ray C. Bliss, chairman of the Republican National Committee, called the convention to order at 9 a.m. (CST) in the 16,926-seat Miami Beach Convention Hall.

Many of the delegates on hand for today's opening session were still unsure how they would vote when the presidential balloting begins Wednesday night.

While Nixon is the front runner for the presidential nomination, it appears he will need help from favorite sons to win on the first ballot.

Key Excerpts From GOP's '68 Platform

MIAMI BEACH (UPI)—Key excerpts from the 1968 Republican platform:

Vietnam
The administration's Vietnam policy has failed—militarily, politically, diplomatically, and with relation to our own people. The administration's piecemeal commitment of men and material has wasted our massive military superiority and frittered away our options. It is time to realize that not every international conflict is susceptible of solution by American ground forces. We pledge a program for peace in Vietnam—neither peace at any price nor a camouflaged surrender of legitimate United States or allied interests—but a positive program that will offer a fair and equitable settlement to all, based on the principle of self-determination, our national interests and the cause of long-range world peace. We will pursue a course that will enable and induce the South Vietnamese to assume increasing responsibility. We will see to it that our gallant American servicemen are fully supported with the highest quality equipment, and will avoid actions that unnecessarily jeopardize their lives.

Favorite Sons Crucial
Any favorite son break toward Nixon would gravely damage the chances of Governors Nelson A. Rockefeller of New York and Ronald Reagan of California. Nixon's chief rivals for the presidential nomination.

Senate Republican leader Everett M. Dirksen said Nixon appeared to have a first ballot nomination "just about buttoned up." And a Rockefeller partisan, Gov. John Chafee of Rhode Island, said Nixon was "perilously close" to a first ballot victory.

Rhodes was virtually in a position to be the kingmaker because—as Rockefeller put it Sunday—his judgment was highly regarded by the professionals in the Republican party.

Before the balloting Wednesday, there will be much oratory to point with pride at the GOP record and to view with alarm the troubles of the Johnson administration.

Private Meetings Important
In short, the major developments at the convention before Wednesday night will occur outside the convention hall. They will come in delegate caucuses and in hotel rooms, where wavering and uncommitted delegates and favorite son delegations will be courted or subjected to pressure to line up with the major contenders.

Television In Review

NEW YORK (UPI)—"What's going on in Miami Beach?" asked Walter Cronkite.

Then the veteran anchor man answered his own question by giving the CBS audience an introduction to the Republican National Convention Sunday night with an hour-long series of interviews and opinions setting the stage for this week's selection of a presidential candidate.

He made it look easy, neatly sifting facts and comment into the introductions that preceded appearances by the three leading candidates — Richard Nixon and Governor Nelson Rockefeller of New York and Ronald Reagan of California. But it isn't easy and in an interview Cronkite talked about the four years of study and preparation that provide the solid background for his convention performance.

High Budget
All three networks weighed in Sunday with programs from the Miami Beach Convention Hall kicking off a month of political decision which will cost them an estimated \$25 million, including an expensive shift of electronic gadgetry from Miami to Chicago where the Democratic National Convention makes its presidential choice the week of Aug. 26.

Cronkite for CBS and Chet Huntley and David Brinkley, working in tandem for NBC for the 12th year since they were first teamed in the 1956 conventions, paved the way in Sunday's shows for the saturation coverage to which their networks are committed. ABC's Howard K. Smith made the point that his network will concentrate on a 90-minute summary every night rather than follow the proceedings from gavel to gavel.

ABC's motives are largely dictated by economy but it will be interesting to see how it fares in the ratings. Some CBS and NBC functionaries privately think their networks are overdoing a good thing and that fans of pre-empted shows may spin

the dial in frustration or boredom.

Organize Details
Cronkite is not unique in the intense preparation he considers necessary for holding a convention together with thousands of facts at his fingertips to keep the interest continuous and pertinent. Brinkley and Smith also assemble facts personally and perhaps it's not a coincidence that all three learned the harsher disciplines of journalism as reporters in the same news agency.

Cronkite waved to a mass of loose-leaf notebooks. "I start on them as soon as a convention ends," he said. "It's a continuous process. I clip, file and make the notes myself."

Cronkite's unflappable stems from complete command of his craft. Seated on the anchor desk he gets phone calls and messages from many reporters and cameramen and has access at the same time to the wires of the various news services.

This tidal wave of information would drown ordinary broadcasters without the journalistic experience of a Cronkite, a Brinkley or a Smith. "I simply put it all together as I learned to do on newspapers and in UPI when I was a rewrite man," Walter said.

Wall Street Chatter

NEW YORK (UPI)—Wright Investors' Service offers the opinion there will be a continuing moderate decline in the Dow Jones industrial average over the few two or three months. Still, the analyst says, while it advises no one to "get out of the market," it suggests accumulation of investment reserves of 20 per cent or more in cash through elimination of speculative issues and profit taking in fully priced equities.

Tessel, Patrick Ostraus says that although a short term rally from current levels is a distinct possibility, such a recovery may be highly selective. It says any advance from here on could likely give way to a resumption of the intermediate correction which could drop the D-J to the 830-840 level before strong year-end rally could follow.

(Continued From Page 1) leaning to him. Rockefeller's total was 273 and Reagan's 180. There were 189 pledged to favorite sons and 35 other uncommitted delegates.

If Nixon can reach the end of the first ballot above 600 votes, delegates who supported other candidates will scramble for the privilege of putting him over the 667 votes needed for victory.

In a CBS radio interview Sunday at Montauk, Nixon said he had "a very good chance" to win on the first ballot but was not predicting it. He said he could not win on the first ballot if all of the favorite son candidates held out.

Gov. Dewey Bartlett of Oklahoma, already an announced Nixon man, revealed to one's surprise Sunday that he was abandoning his status as a favorite son and releasing his delegate. He saw the delegation breaking up with 14 votes for Nixon, seven for Reagan and one for Rockefeller.

The platform-writing committee headed by Dirksen produced a 12,000-word document broad enough to support Nixon, Rockefeller or Reagan.

Its strongest language was found in those parts containing an indictment of the Johnson administration.

Strong War Criticism The platform charged the administration with breaking faith with the American people about the extent of U.S. involvement in the Vietnam war and with making piecemeal commitments which wasted U.S. military superiority.

It also called for "de-Americanization" of the war and pledged the GOP to seek a peace "that will offer a fair and equitable settlement to all based on the principle of self-determination, our national interests and the cause of long-range world peace."

(Continued From Page 1) police station, wounding one officer and four civilians. Another terror blast killed two civilians and wounded four on a train 145 miles northeast of Saigon.

In other action, Communist ground fire shot down a second UH1 helicopter Sunday near the coastal city of Tam Ky, 350 miles north of Saigon. The United States has had 803 choppers shot down in the war. Sunday the Communists also downed a two-engine spotter plane in the Central Highlands.

No Americans were killed in any of the aircraft downings. U.S. jet fighter-bombers Sunday flew 100 missions against the supply lines of North Vietnam's southern panhandle, hitting 49 supply boats, eight trucks, 11 warehouses, 8 bridges and 16 fortress bunkers, plus roads, bridges and ferries. U.S. spokesmen said no planes were lost.

In South Vietnam, B-52 Stratofortresses flew 11 missions late Sunday and today. They struck Communist buildup areas in the troubled northern provinces and the Central Highlands. They also pounded the "forest of darkness" in the Mekong Delta before some 850 U.S. and South Vietnamese troops for the first time invaded that decade-old guerrilla sanctuary famed for its huge biting ants, bamboo vipers and cobras.

In the U Minh forest, its local name, 140 miles south of Saigon, the allies killed 28 guerrillas in the opening hours of the drive. It began Sunday. Its target: 2,500 guerrillas reported in the everglades Swamp-like terrain and Viet Cong base camps.

Liberal Demos To Challenge Texas Convention Delegates

By DAVID ANDERSON AUSTIN, Tex. (UPI)—Liberal Texas Democrats will challenge Gov. John Connally's delegation to the national Democratic Convention on grounds of racial discrimination, a spokesman said.

A group called "Texas Democrats for an Open Convention" hopes to take nearly half of the state's 14 votes away from Connally on grounds there are not enough Negroes and Mexican-Americans in the Texas delegation.

The 122 delegates include five Negroes and five Mexican-Americans.

Alen Red, executive secretary of Texas Citizens for McCarthy, said there should be 20 to 25 Mexican-Americans and 15 to 20 Negroes to properly reflect the make-up of the Democratic Party in Texas.

Basis is Rule The legal basis for the liberal's challenge is a rule adopted by the 1964 National Democratic Convention at the behest of the predominantly Negro Mississippi Freedom Democratic Party.

That rule says every state delegation, beginning in 1968, must fairly represent the Democrats of that state.

Maury Maverick Jr. of San Antonio, TDCC's lawyer, is preparing a brief alleging that the pro-Connally delegation is unrepresentative — racially and otherwise.

49 Mishaps During July Are Reported

Forty-nine accidents and 11 injuries were reported in Pampa during July, according to a report released today by Police Chief Jim Conner.

The figure compares with 54 accidents and 19 injuries for the same period of time last year.

Total figures for the year now stand at 424 accidents and 89 injuries, as compared to 325 accidents, 116 injuries and two fatalities at the same time last year.

Most accidents happened between 12 noon and 1 p.m. and between 4 and 5 p.m. The traffic report reveals. More accidents occurred on Monday than any other day.

Most accidents were logged by drivers under the age of 20 with a total of 18, followed by the 20-24 age group. Primary contributing factors to accidents were failure to yield right-of-way and speeding.

Total property damage for the month was estimated at \$13,418, according to the report. The traffic report is an official report compiled by Mrs. Carrole Scott, Pampa police traffic clerk, for the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Detroit Pitcher Captures No. 22

Denny McLain admitted for the first time today that he may win 30 games this season while Al Kaline claimed that the Detroit Tiger star is a cinch to win the American League's Most Valuable Player Award, and the major leagues' Cy Young Award.

McLain, seeking to become the first 30-game winner in the majors since 1934 and the first in the AL since 1931, raised his record to 22-3 Sunday with a 2-1 victory over the Minnesota Twins. The win enabled the Tigers to maintain their six-game hold on first place.

"It's possible that I'll win 30 games," said McLain. "But it's not probable. After, all, I've been lucky to win 22 because the team has rallied to win for me many times. I figure I've got 13 or 14 more starts this year."

"We all think that Denny is a cinch for the Cy Young Award," said Kaline, speaking for the Tiger players. "And that he has a good chance for the VP Award, especially if we win the pennant."

Ends Shutout String
McLain, who is 15-0 on the road and 7-3 at home this season, carried a shutout into the eighth inning when the Twins scored an unearned run on a walk, a fielder's choice, an error by first baseman Al Kaline and Ted Uhlender's single. The run snapped McLain's string of 26 consecutive shutout innings.

The Tigers took a 1-0 lead against Jim Kaat in the fourth on Mickey Stanley's triple and Bill Freehan's single and tallied what proved to be the winning run in the eighth on a triple by Dick McAuliffe and Kaline's sacrifice fly.

The Baltimore Orioles beat the New York Yankees 5-3, the Cleveland Indians topped the Oakland Athletics 7-4 after a 5-0 loss, the Boston Red Sox drubbed the California Angels 5-1 and 12-6 and the Chicago White Sox defeated the Washington Senators 7-2 in other American League games.

In the National League, the Chicago Cubs nipped the St. Louis Cardinals 6-5, the Cincinnati Reds downed the Atlanta Braves 6-4, the San Francisco Giants blanked the Pittsburgh Pirates 2-0, the Philadelphia Phillies shaded the Houston Astros 3-2 and the New York Mets beat the Los Angeles Dodgers 8-4 before a 2-0 defeat.

Mark Belanger started a two-run seventh-inning rally with a single, scoring the tie-breaking run for the Orioles on a fielder's choice, as Tom Phoebus raised his record to 12-10.

VATICAN CITY (UPI)—Pope Paul's controversial encyclical on birth control is expected to result in pressure from church liberals for the election of a non-Italian as the next pope.

The liberals are, of course, generally disappointed with the Pope's decision to stand firm in opposition to artificial means of birth control.

Some of them already have expressed the opinion that this stand may remain unchanged so long as the Pope comes from Italy, since Italian clerics tend to conservatism on such questions.

Aside from birth control, some of them feel the liberal cause in general would be better with a non-Italian Pope.

At this juncture it is nearly pointless to speculate where a non-Italian Pope might come from. Pope Paul, now nearly 71, could live several more years and the composition of the College of Cardinals could be drastically changed before he dies.

But if the election were being held today it seems doubtful any of the leaders of the liberal movement in Holland, Belgium, Germany and France could succeed in getting the necessary two-thirds vote because they would be opposed by most
