FRIEND'S VIEW OF MORMONISM GIVEN IN STUDY

Auxiliary Starts a Study Series on Religions

A summer study course on various religions of the world was started yesterday by the Presbyterian Women's Auxiliary, with a discussion on Mormonism led by Mrs. L. C. Neely, who lived in a Mormon community in Utah for 15 years.

She made the topic especially interesting, as she was able to present a vivid picture of Mormon worship from a viewpoint gained from her friends of that religion.

Mrs. T. D. Hobart was in charge of the spiritual life lesson that opened the meeting, and gave the opening prayer. Topics from the Yearbook of Prayer were presented, telling of mission work in the southern mountain regions and in northern China.

Insect Pests in Garden Now Need Rough Treatment

The bug and insect garden pests need a lethal treatment which will do away with them once and for all. This is not difficult to accomplish with modern methods and materials, and if the gardener will get on the job when the pests first appear, damage from them will be slight.

Discoveries in recent years have brought forth better materials to work with, although they are based on age-old practices which use dried flowers of pyrethrum, and a substance called rotenone. The latter is derived from an Asiatic plant called derris, which is used by natives to kill fish.

These two substances have brought about considerable change in spraying and dusting methods. Both are contact poisons, meaning they kill what they touch. And both have the advantage of being harmless to humans and animals while being deadly to insects of all kinds.

Prior to the development of these materials, a gardener was obliged to use a contact poison to kill aphids and other insects that drink plant juices; and a stomach poison for the leaf eaters. Nicotine was the most reliable contact poison and arsenic was used for the leaf eaters. A number of preparations are now offered under trade names which furnish all around protection, by combining both pyrethrum and rotenone in one spray.

Although it is impossible to get each of these substances separately, they are usually prepared in a mixture which needs only a dilution of water.

Rotenone, government experts say, is 30 times as powerful as arsenate of lead as a stomach poison, and 15

times as powerful as nicotine as a contact poison. It is harmless to warm blooded animals, but keep it away from gold fish. Both pyrethrum and rotenone are inclined to be unstable, which means that they lose their power under certain conditions. In purchasing trade preparations of these materials inquire about this and be assured that your product will not lose its effectiveness before you get a chance to use it.

First division Texas league clubs uniformly trounced the four lower-placed outfits last night in the

scramble for leadership, currently held by the clouting Dallas Steers. Houston made it an even tighter race by dropping San Antonio twice by identical scores, 6-4, in a double-header. A Houston homer in the ninth gave them the first game. In the second San Antonio got nine hits to Houston's ten but the Buifs came through when it meant something. The double victory put the Houston team a half game behind the second-place Beaumont Shippers, and a single percentage point behind Tulsa, clinging to third place.

Dallas batsmen silenced their usual cannonade and let the pitchers take the spotlight as Fort Worth bowed to the league-leaders, 2 to 0. Beaumont's Shippers showed they still could count under pressure and set down Galveston, 4-3, in a 14-inning set. Credit for the win went to George Gill, who allowed but eight hits and two earned runs.





The book has a foreword by Amos G. Carter, a short history of Texas, written by Peter Molyneux, author of "Romantic Story of Texas," and a short review of the Texas Cattle Industry and Texas Cattle Brands, by Frank Reeves, livestock editor of the Fort Worth Star-Telegram. It is illustrated with pen and ink drawings of actual ranch scenes, done in West Texas.

Of special interest to ranchers and cattlemen of this section of the country are the brands of Gray county, among which the editors have listed the "Hat," the "Double T Anchor," and several others. This publication will undoubtedly attain a wide circulation over the United States, and Gray county feels proud to have these brands included in the volume.

The publication of the book came about as a result of public interest in brands, fostered by the great revival of Texas history engendered by the Texas Centennial. When a Fort Worth department store, early in the spring of this year, put about 500 brands on its wrapping paper, a flood of requests poured in for information about brands, some of them from residents of the New England states. To satisfy this de-

mand, as well as to fill a long felt want among Texas ranchers and cattlemen, the Fair Publishing company, Fort Worth, has assembled in this book an authentic list of a large number of representative Texas brands.

The banker partially incapacitated, was carried by ambulance and lifted from a private railway coach yesterday into the seclusion of his country home.

The medical advisers, family members and business associates minimized the affliction, declaring he was not seriously ill and that he probably would make his annual vacation trip to his estate near London and his grouse-hunting sojourn in Scotland.

The banker is in his sixty-ninth year.

Hollywood Show Nets \$30,000

HOLLYWOOD, Calif., July 2 (AP)—A million dollar cast that wasn't paid a cent rang down the curtain early today on Hollywood's most colossal show.

Hollywood, used to spectacles, hadn't seen anything like it since the movies were born.

It had 1,700 stars. It lasted six hours, and it swelled the Actors' Fund of America by \$30,000 or more.

Eleven thousand persons, paying from \$1 to \$100 a seat, packed an auditorium that is Hollywood's closest imitation of Madison Square Garden and watched top-notchers of the stage and screen do song, dance and drama.

Hindenburg Ends Fourth Flight to New Jersey Port

LAKEHURST, N. J., July 2 (AP)—The German dirigible Hindenburg grounded at 2:20 a. m. Central Standard time, today, completing its fourth commercial flight from Germany in record-breaking time.

The big ship made the run from her home port, Frankfurt-On-Main to Lakehurst in 52 hours and 51 minutes, cutting eight hours, 34 minutes from her previous record, Lieutenant George Watson of the naval air station announced.

The Hindenburg's lines were made secure at 2:35 o'clock after she made what was said to be the first flying mooring ever made by a German airship. A ground crew was ready, but was not called upon as the ship flew directly to the mast.

Twenty-two persons, the smallest passenger list to be carried since commercial service between Germany and the United States was started in May were aboard for the record-breaking flight.

ROBINS AND BLUE BIRDS FEED ON INSECT PESTS

RALEIGH, N. C. (AP)—Experiments conducted by the federal bureau of biological survey indicate the robin and bluebird are the farmers' friends—not enemies.

Survey workers examined the contents of stomachs of robins. They found 42 per cent of the robin's food in animal matter; 16 per cent beetles; 5 per cent grasshoppers; 9 per cent caterpillars and 11 per cent various insects.

Contents of 244 stomachs of bluebirds consisted of 58.51 per cent animal matter and 41.49 per cent vegetable matter. S. Z. Pollock, junior biologist, says this proves the bird is of economic as well as aesthetic value.
