"Our purpose is to renew the friendships and keep alive the memories of our service overseas in the most gigantic war in the world's history," says Major Gen. Beaumont B. Buck, retired, national chairman for the first A. E. F. reunion. Dallas expects to entertain 120,000 ex-soldiers and sailors at the Texas centennial exposition for the reunion September 10-13.

General Buck, who now lives at San Antonio, commanded the third division of the American army in the Meuse-Argonne battles. His aides for the reunion include General William R. Smith of the 36th division, General J. P. O'Neil of the 90th; Patrick J. Hurley, former secretary of war; O. A. Davis of New Mexico, Bruce Baird of Louisiana, Governor Landon of Kansas and Colonel Frank Knox of Chicago.

Others General Buck says may attend include former Secretary of the Navy Josephus Daniels, now ambassador to Mexico; Lieut. Gen. R. L. Bullard, who commanded the second army, A. E. F.; Ray Murphy, national commander of the American Legion; James Van Zandt, commander of the Veterans of Foreign Wars; Major Gen. Frank Parker, commander of the first division during the war and now commander of the third army at the eighth corps area; Col. Theodore Roosevelt of the first division.

"You will tell of marching in the rain and mud in blackest darkness," General Buck said in his official announcement to "members of the army, navy and marine corps, and all others who were auxiliary to the military service of the United States in the World War overseas."

"You will again work your way over or through barbed wire entanglements; you will again participate in a trench raid or stand guard on the edge of no-man's land."

"Your buddy will be there, the man who stood firmly by your side in the stress of battle; the man who shared his last bit of memento or tobacco with you."

Special meetings of regiments and divisions, banquets and balls to be given by various organizations are on the program for the reunion.

SOVIETS ASK TROTSKY EXPULSION AND START OWN PURGE

AIDES IN PLOT OUSTED FROM HIGH OFFICES

DRAMA AND WRITERS' UNIONS UNDER SUSPICION

MOSCOW, Aug. 29. (AP)—The Soviet government, demanding the expulsion of Leon Trotsky from Norway, started tonight to clean its own house of counter-revolutionaries.

Director Tabakoff of the Magnit factory in Chelyabinsk was arrested and thrown out of the party. His former assistant, E. Dretzer, was one of those executed as an anti-communist plotter.

Manager Amogbelli of the state dramatic theater resigned. He, with the playwright Afiongenoff and the former editor, Gromsky, of the government newspaper in Moscow, Ivestia, were recently accused of having known the schemes of R. Pickel, another of those executed, without reporting them.

Pickel was once the manager of the Kamerny theater, one of the best known in Moscow.

The Writers union also is under government suspicion because it did not throw Pickel out until after the trial began.

Arrests have been made of some of the staff of the Pedagogical institute at Leningrad and some employees of the department of education. The teachers college was said to have been a hotbed of Trotskyist activities.

It was denied, officially however, that Alexander Ozersky, commercial attaché at London, had been recalled. Rumors here had said Ozersky was to be replaced but this was denied as well as reports linking him in anti-government activities with Gregory Sokolnikoff, former ambassador to London, and General V. Putna, military attaché there.

Russia's petition to Norway to banish Trotsky, one-time commander of war in the Soviet, which he had engaged in terroristic activities against the U. S. S. R.

The Soviet message did not ask for Trotsky's return to Russia but made it plain that refusal to banish him would prejudice good relations between Moscow and Oslo.

Marines Recruit From Pampa Goes To Training Spot

Private Durham left with Privates Wood and Nairn of Stephenville and Sweetwater, Texas, for San Diego, California, where the Marine corps maintains a training center for recruits. The period of training is for at least one month after which they will be transferred to sea duty, foreign duty or they may remain at one of the many shore stations.

While undergoing training, Durham will receive thorough instruction in rifle and pistol practice, drill and inspections and the responsibilities of a Marine. He will have an immediate opportunity of enrolling in extensive educational courses maintained by the Marine corps.

MARKET BRIEFS

NEW YORK, Aug. 29. (AP)—The railroads, showing down only briefly for profit taking grades, rallied to another impressive advance in today's brief stock market session.

Buying forces, boosted by earnings statements and signs of sharply expanding passenger and freight traffic, climbed ahead earlier in the final hour, and rode them for gains of fractions to 2 or more points.

The alcohol and a number of specialties showed strength.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks was up 2 1/2 points at 69. That for the rail advanced 3 1/2 while the industrials were unchanged and the utilities advanced 1/4. Transfers totaled \$16,850 shares against \$11,850 last Saturday.

Drawing renewed attention to the transportation group was the survey of the Association of American Railroads disclosing that July net operating income of 113 class 1 lines was about 129 per cent above the same month last year.

Heading an air squadron of nearly one hundred entrants in the famous Ruth Chatterton air derby, Miss Chatterton will swoop down on Dallas next Monday to complete the first half of the Cleveland-Los Angeles air efficiency race. In honor of the acting aviatrix, the Texas Centennial exposition has declared Monday Ruth Chatterton Air Derby day and is making plans to honor the star with a banquet at Falsfast Tavern on the Centennial grounds at 6:30 that evening.

Under the sponsorship of the Junior chamber of commerce of Dallas special awards have been prepared for flyers finishing in first places in the Cleveland to Dallas hop. These awards will be presented to the winners in elaborate ceremonies held on the Village Green at Morris England in the Centennial building during the course of the banquet. Hundreds of windows—including one in the Associated Press bureau—were shattered as the detonations shook several important government buildings.

Another rebel plane flew first over the city at a tremendous height, then poised and dived.

It flattened out of its power dive when but a few hundred feet up and loosed its cargo of projectiles. Stoolers on Madrid's streets fled in confusion for underground shelter as the bombs exploded in the garden of the war ministry.

MANY HURT AS REBEL AIRMEN BOMB MADRID

MADRID, Aug. 29. (P)—Many lay wounded in Madrid tonight after a rebel airplane had bombed the city proper for the first time.

The number of casualties tonight still was unestimated by government officials who said physical damage to the city had been only slight.

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CITY PROPER HIT FOR FIRST TIME BY THE PLANES

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Gaping holes were ripped in the ground and windows in the bank of Spain, the postoffice and other buildings were shattered.

Government planes immediately soared up to challenge the attacking plane, which sped to safety.

The government planes, as if expecting another air raid, circled the city in wide arcs tonight, on the lookout for aerial enemies.

Several excited citizens mistook the government planes for rebel and potted away at them with rifles until told of their mistake.

As comparative calm returned to the debris-strewn streets, the first Soviet ambassador to Spain presented his credentials at the presidential palace.

Speeches were made stressing desires for closer relations between the "Liberal" government of the two nations.

Government officials announced additional victories throughout the day.

In the Province of Cordoba, they said, 300 peasants armed with only six rifles and a few shotguns had driven off a force of 400 rebels.

Rebel forces near Montilla, it was announced, broke and scattered when government planes roared overhead. The rebels, the government said, were carrying off their dead in truckloads after this encounter.

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DEMOS LIKELY TO RENEW THE OIL COMPACT

STATE PARTY RALLY SEEKS FUND FOR WAR-CHEST

AUSTIN, Aug. 29. (AP)—Democratic leaders today laid plans to give the national party campaign a rousing send-off at the state convention in Fort Worth Sept. 8.

While others worked on the convention program, expected to extend over two days, Roy Miller of Corpus Christi, director of organization and finance, called a meeting of the Roosevelt-Garner Texas campaign committee for the same date.

Miller said the committee would consider means of raising Texas' quota of \$250,000 of the national democratic war-chest.

Governor Alfred and Myron Blacklock, chairman of the Texas executive committee, indicated favor for William C. Repass of Houston as temporary convention chairman and keynoter.

The governor also said the convention probably would approve renewal of the interstate oil compact, which expires next year, and might take a pronouncement on revising election laws.

"There is no good reason why the compact should not be approved," he commented. "We have done pretty well under it."

He voiced dissatisfaction with election statutes and disclosed a study had been undertaken at the University of Texas, on his request, to obtain data on which recommendations for changes might be based.

Meanwhile, Jeffersonian Democrats, meeting at new headquarters in Austin, organized to fight the New Deal and the re-election of President Roosevelt. J. Everett Haley, chairman, said the group had no official connection with the Republicans, but had endorsed Governor Landon, Republican presidential nominee.

MARTYRS NOW FACE DANGERS FOR RELIGION

Moderns Outnumber Ancients, Says Churchman

MILWAUKEE, Wis., Aug. 29. (AP)—A belief that modern Christian martyrs probably outnumbered the ancient ones although their deaths were not as heroic was expressed today by Clifford P. Morehouse, editor of the Living Church, an episcopal weekly.

"In many parts of the world today," he said in an interview, "it is as dangerous to live and worship as a Christian as it was in the days of the Catacombs."

He added, "the signs point to darker days ahead."

"Russia alone probably has had as many martyrs as the entire Roman empire from Nero in 64 A. D. to the year 313 when Constantine made Christianity the religion of the empire," he said.

"Adding to this the martyrs among the Assyrians, Armenians, Greeks, Chinese, Mexicans and Spaniards, it seems a fair assumption," he continued, "that the number who gave their lives for Christianity from the time of the World War to the present far exceeds the number in the age persecution."

Morehouse estimated there were at least 187,000 martyrs in modern times and about 129,000 among the ancients.

"In each of the modern major persecutions," Morehouse said, "various pretexts were given for executions or for the subjection of Christians to conditions that resulted in the death of vast numbers of them and only rarely was the fact of their Christianity given as the pretext for their death."

Morehouse enumerated as follows: as many as 50,000 Armenians died in June and July, 1915, when the Turks persecuted them; at least 1,000 Assyrians suffered the same fate; about 25,000 Greeks died in the sack of Smyrna, 100,000 or more in Soviet Russia; 10,000 or more Chinese in the communist revolts and invasions; 1,000 or more Mexicans in recent years. KNIFE ATTACK IS CONFESSED BY NEGRO BOY

AGED WHITE WOMAN'S CONDITION NOW IS SERIOUS

FORT WORTH, Aug. 29. (AP)—A 14-year old negro arrested in Temple confessed today, officers said, that he attacked and stabbed Mrs. Desky Foster, 60, near ten-mile bridge here Thursday afternoon.

City Detective C. D. Bush and Deputy Sheriff E. C. Watson of this city arrested the youth at the home of an uncle in Temple about 3 p. m. today and started back to Fort Worth with him immediately.

The officers said the negro told them he tried to kill Mrs. Foster "but the knife was too dull," and then tried to gouge her eyes out.

They said he related in detail how he bound her and attacked her five times in a ravine near her tent home in the vicinity of ten-mile bridge. He said he had been fishing in Trinity river near the spot.

Mrs. Foster is in the city-county hospital in a serious condition from shock and the stab wounds. She was slashed on the neck, shoulder and face and her eyes were badly bruised.

Another suspect, arrested yesterday by Sheriff A. B. Carter, is being held in an unannounced jail.

The youth was arrested on information here by City detectives Joe DePee and Bush. They said they learned a negro woman and her sons had been fishing in the vicinity of the Foster tent home and that one of the boys had been absent from the fishing party for a time Thursday afternoon.

They learned, further, that this boy and a brother had gone to Bell county, their former home, to pick cotton.

Upon the strength of this information Bush and Deputy Sheriff Watson drove to Temple and solicited the aid of Bell county officers.

AUSTIN, Aug. 30 (AP)—Seasoned Rangers grinned but said little when they heard the spurs on the statue of a Texas Ranger at the Centennial exposition were buckled on the inside of the foot.

Col. H. H. Carmichael, director of the department of public safety, said he understood that Capt. Bill McMurray of the force had explained—perhaps to relieve officials' confusion—that Rangers frequently wore their spurs with buckles on the inside the better to reveal the decorations on the outside.

The possibility was discussed that someone in Austin also erred when it was discovered the cannon on the Capitol grounds had been painted green.

There are two little mortars, used in the Civil War, at the entrance to the statehouse, and some distance away, two big howitzers captured from the Germans in the World War.

"I am not an authority on the subject of military painting etiquette," Col. Carmichael said, "but I believe I never saw any green cannons before. It may be they adopted a camouflaging scheme to harmonize with the surroundings."

Drunk Driving in Death Is Charged

GILMER, Aug. 29 (AP)—The traffic death Thursday of T. L. Thompson, 65, at Big Sandy brought charges of driving while intoxicated today against Thomas D. Hilbert, New Orleans disabled war veteran.

County Attorney M. G. Meil said he would take the case before the grand jury Sept. 14, and if Hilbert was indicted would pursue the prosecution further in Thompson's death.

Justice L. G. Baird set bond at \$1,500.

Meil alleged Hilbert's car jumped a curb and crushed Thompson against a church wall, inflicting fatal injuries.
