# WOULD RAISE CASH FOR OLD

TEXAS LEGISLATURE TO CONVENE ON SEPT. 28

AUSTIN Sept. 10 (AP) - Governor Allred today called a special session of the legislature to convene Sept. 28. The governor said the primary purpose of the session would be to raise addition al revenues for payment of old age pensions.
While the governor did not com-

mit himself at this time, it is expected the subject of enabling legislation to make other benefits the federal social secruty act available to Texans also would be submitted.

"The only subject definitely in mind at this time," Allred said, 'is the financing of old age pensions. There may be others. I don't know

He expressed opinion that the leg-islation to change the old age assistance law would not be in order under his call. He declined to say whether revisions were needed. Law "So Liberal"

"I know this," he said. "Far more people are qualifying for pensions than it was estimated would. This is because the Texas law is so liber-

The original estimate was for 60. 000 pinsioners, but that number already has been exceeded, and thousands of applications have not been passed upon. The governor said he would make

recommendations on means of raising additional revenue, but would not announce them now "I don't know how much will be necessary," he said. He voiced hope that only one ses-

ion of 30 days would be necessary. Under the law, a special session may extend only 30 days, but in the past additional sessions frequently have been called immediately. "I also hope there will be a mini-

# COUPLE SAW

CENTRAL PARK CREEK IS SEARCHED BY **OFFICERS** 

Mystery today still clouded the disappearance last Saturday midnight of Hubert Arp, 17-year-old Pampa youth, whose father, W. H. Arp, of S. Cuyler-st, expressed to authorities belief that his son had met with foul play.

Developments in the case today included the story of a South Side couple that they heard a shot, loud voices and then saw someone dragging a man into the back seat of a car about 1 a. m. Sunday

The story, told to sheriff's depu-ties, gave no further clew. The couple said in their excitement they failed to get the license numbers of the automobile which had been seer near the spot where young Arp was last reported.

According to information obtained by police, the Arp boy last was seen st. A companion said he left him there talking with two girls. One of the girls, questioned later, admitted they had been talking with the youth but said he left them to join anfound of him.

One report that he had gone to Hobbs, N. M., failed to reveal any trace of him after authorities made a check there.

Police have been unable to verify a report that the missing boy was seen in a south side pool hall as late as Monday night. Sheriff Earl Talley, who joined in

search of the creek bottom in Central park last night, said he had been unable so far to find any motive that would lend support to the foul play theory.

As far as authorities have been

able to determine, young Arp had no enemies. His father stated that he knew of no quarrels in which his son had been involved.

Mr. Arp, however, based his opin-ion that his son had met with some kind of accident or foul play on the fact that he wore only his working clothes when he left home Saturday evening and that he had told his father he would be back in a short time to change clothing.

The boy has never left home for more than 12 hours at a time, the father said, except on occasions when he took two short trips of which he dvised his parent.

"He always wrote me as soon as he would get to his destination," the father said, "so that I would know ne was all right.

The two youths who had been in he boy's company Saturday night cined a renewed search for him today. They went to the races at Panhandle, according to Judge James L. Todd, in the belief that he might be working there this week.





There is no charge. Your car will be tested for safetygiven a thorough check with no cost to you. It is a splendid opportunity to cooperate with the state's campaign to make the highways safe, cut down on accidents, and above all, protect your own life.

Here in America we find public officials bending every effort to insure traffic safety. Perhaps we should also adopt a few of the practices now being used abroad.

In a European country, the cars of motorists convicted of flagrant violation of traffic laws are painted with an emblem, as a warning to other drivers. It is said that this practice, newly started, has caused an appreciable decline in dangerous driving, as motorists naturally want to avoid the embarrassment and publicity the emblem gives

A great many thousand American motorists should have their cars so branded.

The worst class of offenders consists of those who push the throttle to the floor-board as soon as they get out of sight of a traffic officer. Excessive speed—and there are times when 15 miles per hour is excessive-is responsible for more deaths than any other driving violation. Defective brakes, steering gear and poor lights add to the

Passing on hills and curves and "meandering" through traffic are also potent causes of death, injury and destruction. On a myriad tragic occasions, a driver has tried to save a needless minute—at the cost of a life.

Driving on the wrong side of the road, jumping traffic lights, passing at intersections—are practices dear to the heart of the Dark Angel. They help keep our morgues and hospitals full to capacity.

Yes, it might be a good idea to adopt the branding practice in this country. A suitable emblem would be a skull and cross-bones.



The mohair which is now makng its way into world markets will be ultimately processed into automobile and furniture upholstery and rich draperies.

This year prices have ranged rom 55 cents a pound for grown to 65 cents for kid mohair. Tom Richey of A. W. Hilliard and Son, Boston, was the heaviest taker, inofficial reports here indicate, having bought over a million pounds in the last few days. Although goats are ranged in small flocks all over Texas, which

produces 85 per cent of the annual output of mohair, the indusry is concentrated mainly in what is known as the Hill Country. The region of Southwest Texas is a section of rocky soil studded with liveoak trees and not generally considered acceptable as pasturage for any other livestock. Deer abound in the same region, and "city hunters" sometimes have difficulty distinguishing between the real thing and the angora goat. Some of the nimrods have found goat shooting to be much more expensive than deer hunting.

The goats are shorn twice yeary, in the spring after most of the danger of a late freeze has passed and in the fall early enough that a protective coat may be grown before cold weather starts
