E. ROOSEVELT DENIES PLANE SELLING DEAL

CLAIMS CONTRACT HE HAS WILL DISPUTE DEPOSITION

WASHINGTON, Oct. 7 (AP)—A fierce dispute broke out today over a deposition, attributed to Anthony H. G. Fokker, airplane manufacturer, that Elliott Roosevelt, 25-year-old son of the President, contracted in 1934 to sell 50 military planes to Russia for a \$500,000 commission.

Soon after aides of the Senate munitions committee had made public the sworn statement, which said the sale was never made because the price asked of the Russians was too high, young Roosevelt denied he ever agreed to sell military planes to any government.

He contracted with Fokker, he said, to represent the aviation man in the sale of commercial transport planes to private foreign corporations. There was a specific stipulation, he said, that he was not to sell any government.

Young Roosevelt, who is at Oklahoma City, told the Port Worth (Texas) Star-Telegram in a telephone interview that such a figure as \$500,000 for a commission was never mentioned.

Whereas the deposition attributed to Fokker said the President's son had been paid \$5,000 in cash under the unfulfilled contract, Roosevelt said he never received a dollar personally, although \$5,000 went to a salesman associated with him.

He said he himself terminated the contract without trying to sell a plane.

"I have a copy of the contract," he told the Port Worth paper. "All this is down in black and white and I shall be glad at any time to present it to the munitions committee along with a complete refutation of all the statements allegedly made by Mr. Fokker."

Fokker, the document said, had wanted Roosevelt to make the trip "to attempt to sell airplanes to various foreign governments, counting on the willingness of high foreign officials to receive Mr. Roosevelt as the son of the American President."

"The deposition was made public unexpectedly here last night. Munitions committee aides said it was taken Sept. 12, 1935, and was made public now on instructions from Chairman Nye (R., N. D.) because of published charges that information was being withheld from the public. There was no immediate comment from the White House."

Tonight's Revival Subject Will Be 'Work of Christ'

"I believe in the Holy Spirit and preach Him fearlessly," said the speaker. "Our town needs this emphasis. Our churches need a divine baptism. Our Christian citizens need this power from on high. The unsaved, unconcerned, indifferent, lost in sin in Pampa need the presence of the spirit to 'convict' them of sin, of judgment, of righteousness. I appeal to those that love the Lord and believe in prayer to give themselves during these trying, God-less, devil-worshipping, sin-enthroning days, to the God imposed task of praying down Pentecostal power and Pentecostal fire. Such a visitation alone will change the spiritual life of our town and win the lost for Christ."

Tonight is teachers and officers night in the revival. Everyone else is urgently invited to come, but a special invitation is issued to the Sunday school staff of the church. Tomorrow night is All-First-Baptist-Church-Members-Night. The service is open to all with special emphasis placed on the attendance of the members of this particular church.

The meeting continues till Sunday night. Services are to go on as scheduled at 10 a. m. and 7:30 p. m. Prayer meetings will go on at 9:30 a. m. and at 7 p. m.

STUDENTS INTERESTED ONLY IN OPPOSITE SEX

GREENCASTLE, Ind., Oct. 7 (AP)—Do college students spend most of their time outside the class-room talking about the political campaign, the Spanish situation or some other such subject?

"Positively, no," says Professor Paul Fay of the DePauw university psychology department. "They spend most of their 'talking time' in discussions of individuals of the opposite sex."

Do the students care about what's going on in the "outside world?" "Apparently very little," says the professor. "At least, a recent survey fails to show that they spend much time on 'outside subjects' here."

DePauw is a co-educational institution in a small Indiana community, but the professor claims the findings probably would be typical of those in other colleges.

SON-IN-LAW OF MUSSOLINI TO BE SUCCESSOR

COUNT CIANO WILL BE HEAD OF FASCIST CABINET

(Copyright, 1936, By The Associated Press)

ROME, Oct. 7.—Premier Mussolini is grooming his son-in-law, Count Galeazzo Ciano, as his successor, political circles asserted today, and soon may make him head of the fascist cabinet.

Il Duce would remain as dictator under his title of "Capo del Governo" (head of the government). It was reported, and Ciano would retain his present post of foreign minister.

The elevation of Ciano, informants declared, will be discussed at a meeting of the fascist grand council in November.

They pointed out the change would have only a slight practical effect at present but would furnish the premier with a successor upon his death.

Count Ciano, who married the premier's daughter, has had wide experience in Italian governmental positions. Although he is only 33 years old, he has held important posts, including the ministership of propaganda, before he became foreign minister.

Since his return from the Italo-Ethiopian war where he won a silver medal for leading the "desperado" air bombing squadron, he has appeared widely before the public and made many speeches.

LABOR 90 PER CENT FOR FOR GREEN CLAIMS

REPORT MICHIGAN MAY LIKELY VOTE FOR PRESIDENT

WASHINGTON, Oct. 7 (AP)—President Roosevelt today lacked a mass of state business and gave thought to the final details of a campaign dash into the west starting next week-end.

The President brought back with him from Hyde Park, N. Y., where he spent an extended week-end, a statement by William Green that both organized and unorganized labor was "90 per cent for him."

Another caller, Frank Murphy, democratic candidate for governor of Michigan, told him that he had a good chance to win that state's 19 electoral votes.

Presidential aides had hoped to announce the western campaign itinerary last night, but deferred it to work out Detroit details. Murphy said the trip, starting from Washington Friday afternoon, would include major night speeches at Chicago Oct. 14 and Detroit Oct. 15, probably with appearances at Grand Rapids and Flint, Mich., en route to Detroit.

Green told newspaper men his personal contacts and study of reports from the field showed labor was 90 per cent for Roosevelt "throughout the country; that is, both organized and unorganized labor."

At around 8,000,000, he said the pro-Roosevelt sentiment was reflected in labor meetings, in resolutions thus far adopted by 26 state federations, and in endorsements of certain national and international unions.

"That is very significant," he contended, "such unanimous action has never before taken place in presidential history."

RED EDITORIAL WRITER NABBED IN CONSPIRACY

Involved In Alleged Plot to Overthrow Government

MOSCOW, Oct. 7 (AP)—Karl Radek, commentator for the government newspaper Izvestia, was arrested today on charges of being implicated in the counter-revolutionary plot against the Soviet for which 16 Russians were shot last August.

Radek, one of the best known Russian editorial writers, was one of five men under investigation in an alleged plot to overthrow the government and kill Dictator Joseph Stalin.

His name was announced by Prosecutor Andrey Vishinsky at the trial of the 16 confessed plotters Aug. 21.

Later, Radek disappeared and his whereabouts were unknown until his arrest was announced today.

The other four whose records were declared under scrutiny include M. P. Tomsky, former chief of trade unions and present head of the state publishing house; Nicolai Bulharin, editor of Izvestia; Alexei Rykoff, former commissar of posts and telegraphs; and Gregory Pyatakov, assistant commissar for heavy industry.

Prosecutor Vishinsky declared he ordered Radek jailed for political and legal guilt in the plot which allegedly was planned by Leon Trotsky, former communist party leader now in exile in Norway.

Radek, an old member of the Bolshevik regime, worked with Trotsky during early revolutionary days, and was exiled with him, later returning to grace. His articles, particularly those on foreign affairs, have been accepted for many years as authoritative because of his close connections with the Soviet government.

He was accused by several defendants of knowledge of many plots against Stalin and others. Thirteen others also have been arrested since the latest investigation and, with Radek, will be brought to trial at a date not yet set.

A game Friday also was postponed. The bolt struck late yesterday just after Coach Robinson called for "a couple more plays." One team was lined up on the defensive while the other was huddled around Robinson...

Without warning the flash came, flattening the entire first grid. Hands flew into the air and all fell to the ground, stunned.

"Our legs went out," said Jack Chafferson, 17, the team's other co-captain. "Coach Robinson was standing beside me. He yelled when the lightning struck. As soon as we could, we started carrying the boys to cars nearby."

"I thought I was 'clipped,'" said John Haupt, varsity right halfback. "I didn't know what hit me. Everything went black." "When I came to, I looked around and saw Don Correll lying on the ground. He was very still and his face was blue. All the other boys on the team were lying on the ground. Some of them were moaning."

Included in the injured was Assistant Coach Wilbur Billings. All officers were held.
