WASHINGTON, April 16 .-The destroyer Preble was fired upon by Chinese along the north bank of the Yangtse river today, the Navy department is informed.

PARIS, April 16 .- (AP)-Representatives of five powers concerned most in the Chinese situation have recommended to their governments that they be authorized to draft a new note on the Nanking incident from Eugene Chen, Cantonese foreign minister, which they regard as unsatisfactory.

It is understood the five powers are united in demanding that the lives and protected and reparation made known. for damage already done.

SHANGHAI, April 16 .- (AP)-Foreign authorities tonight are contemplating the results of a day in which both British and American warships were made targets for Chinese guns.

When the time comes for the Lieut. Byrd and bricks to be laid in Pampa's streets Indian Jim Brown, world's fastest brick layer, will be seen in action. The Stuckey Construction has hired Fleig, who resigned, and sought to the coming years. He concluded his Brown to lay the bricks on the streets now being gotten ready.

The record hung up by Brown, and yet unchallenged, was made in Olathe, Kans., September 12, 1926. when he placed 46,644 bricks in the record time of 7 hours, 48 minutes. Brick laying will be started about Thursday on north Cuyler street.

Brown is an Oneida Indian, born on the Oneida reservation, New York State in 1879, received his early education at the reservation school. Destroyer Preble Is Forced to Reply Today

POWERS MAY REPEAT NOTE

Reply of Foreign Minister Chen Is Disliked

(By The Associated Press.) ST. LOUIS, April 166 .-Government engineers here today said the most damaging flood of all time in the lower Mississippi valley would strike Monday when the river would reach its crest at Cairo, Ill.

CAPE GIRARDEAU, Mo., April 16.—(AP)—The Mississippi river levee 25 miles south of Charleston, Mo., broke today and the water inundated thousands of acres in the lowlands of that vicinity.

NEW ORLEANS, April 16. -(AP)—Fourteen and onehundredth inches of rain fell here last night, the weather bureau reported today.

This rainfall breaks all records for the last 56 years, the highest previous record being 9.22 inches.

Hundreds of blocks in the residential section were flooded and thousands of persons were unable to get downtown early today for business, which was largely suspended for the Easter holidays.

Many thoroughfares which are high and dry under normal rains are under from 4 inches to 3 feet of water.

Rains which began shortly before noon Friday swept down with gradually increasing fury and soon after nightfall scores of streets near the bend made by the river were flooded. Street car service was Lieutenant-Commander Richard curtailed and hundreds of automobiles were left stranded.

TEXAS BOOMS

For several months nationally known writers have been predicting boom conditions for parts of Texas, especially the Rio Grande valley.

There are many differences between oil booms and those in which agriculture and real estate play the greater parts. The Panhandle is conceded its great development, but the tendency, fortunately, is to predict substantial, permanent growth for this section.

Texas is getting more publicity at this time than any other state. Other sections of the country are jealous. For example, an official Minnesota agricultural bulletin recently issued was titled "Gamblers Preparing to Boom Texas Land." The specific reference is to the Rio Grande valley, and the Chamber of Commerce of that section is much concerned over the deal. Governor Moody has been asked to demand an apology of the Minnesota governor, and the post office department has been notified of the "libelous statements harmful to Texas" which have been sent through the mails.

The bulletin presumably is intended to quiet Minnesota farmers, some of whom are planning to move to Texas. There may be some truth in the pamphlet - in fact, all letin-to make people afraid of Texas investments - is a matter about which to lodge a



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"SPIRITUAL WIVES" WEEP FOR DEAD LEADER OF ENGLISH SECT

(By The Associated Press.) BRIDGEWATER, England, April 16.—The death of John Hugh Smyth-Piggott has left many "spiritual wives" in tears at his "Abode of Love" and for the second time has deprived the Agapemonites of a Messiah.

Russian City Ghost Of Czarist Glory

KRANSNOVODSK, Transcaspia, April 15 .- Once one of the most lively and prosperous cities in Asiatic Russia, Krasnovidsk, built on the Sea by the Russian army engineers, is only a ghost of its former animation, wealth and commercial activity.

In Czarist days the city was the center of great shipments of oil, grain, furs and other commedities from Russia to the whole of Turkesby Brother Prince, who first pro- tan. Today the town is little more than a fishing village and railroad terminal.

Krasnovidsk was the door which gave entry to the emperor's legions of troops in their conquest of Turkestan. The road from there to Samarkland is literally paved with the bones of thousands of soldiers who perished from disease, lack of water. food, or sunstroke during Russia's 30 years' conquest of Turkestan. The same road now is traversed by a residence at Prince's magnificent thousand miles of railroad which home at Spaxton. Thirteenth Annual Music Festival To Begin Tomorrow

The Panhandle Music Festival, to begin Monday has been staged annually at Amarillo under the direction of Emil H. Myers of the Amarillo College of Music for 13 years.





The Keys of the Kingdom

"I will give unto thee the keys of the kingdom of heaven." "The kingdom of heaven was Christ's church which was to be established on earth. It has a door, namely, Christ himself. It had terms and conditions of entrance, which were the keys of the door. Peter, as representative of the disciples who made the good confession, received these keys; that is he was allowed to declare to men the conditions on which one might enter the church of Christ." "And whatsoever, thou shalt loose on earth shall be loosed in heaven." This power to make authoritive decisions regarding divine truth was not confined to Peter, but was expressly extended by Christ to the other disciples; see Matt. 18:1, 18: John 20:23. "Peter exercised this authority when he went in the eat with Cornelius (Acts 11:3); as did the 'apostles and elders and brethren' when they decided what 'burden' should be laid upon Gentile believers. (Acts, 15:23." Jesus Foretells His Resurrection v 21

"And the third day be raised up." Our Lord definitely foresaw his resurrection and referred to it as the one conclusive sign. "The sign of the prophet Jonah," which he would give in confirmation of all his claims and to the confusion of all his enemies. His resurrection was a necessary part of the divine plan for his life on earth.

"Get Thee Behind Me, Satan." v 23 "Peter had just been put before all the other apostles in deserved honer; now he is ordered in merited disgrace behind. The keys of the head of the kingdom of heaven had been placed in his hands; now he is hailed as the very head of the kingdom of hell! So necessary is it for every Christian to take heed of pride, and watch lest when he thinks he stands firmest, he should fall. Peter was tempting Christ exactly as Satan had tempted him in the wildernes, urging him to be man's monarch rather than God's martyr."






