## What's Doing In West Texas

By West Texas Chamber of Commerce

**Haskell**—Many new buildings are under construction here including a new hotel, a two story telephone office building, a \$12,500 brick residence and many other buildings are nearing completion.

**Childress**—This city will soon have an up to date fire proof modern hotel if present plans do not fail to go through. Present crop outlook for the year is reported to be the best in many years.

**Wellington**—The recent poultry show held here proves the fact that poultry business is worth while as there were hundreds of fine show birds in competition for prizes as well as many entries for the prizes for eggs were in competition.

**San Saba**—A large Lobo wolf was trapped here in this county recently and ranchmen are very much relieved as many years livestock have been destroyed by this animal.

**Del Rio**—Much complaint has been received lately from ranchmen who have had many of their goats sheared with hand clippers by thieves who make the rounds by night through the pastures, catching the goats and clipping the mohair.

**Mineral Wells**—Much interest is now being shown here and the old time bustle of business is rapidly returning since the location of the Baker Hotel which will be under construction soon at a cost of \$500,000.

**Dalhart**—This part of the Plains is now assured of one of the best small grain crops in many years. The late rains and heavy snows have brought out the wheat and oat fields to their fullest capacity for production and the year 1926 bids fair to be the banner year of the Canadian river region.

**Crowell**—Every one here is looking forward to one of the most interesting District Convention meetings that has been held by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, May 11th. Mr. Ferguson, president of the local chamber of commerce is leaving nothing undone to make each and every one visiting Crowell have a profitable day.

**Chillicothe**—The business men here appreciating the good work for all West Texas by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce and realizing the value of the Poultry, Hog and Seed Selection campaign to the farmers of West Texas, came in strong in their renewals for 1926 memberships, doubling their usual membership.

**Ballinger**—The Chamber of Commerce of this city entertained the Commissioners Court with a luncheon recently and much interest was shown in the building and up keep of the highways. The Ballinger Luncheon Club meets once every month and all directors are requested to be present that all matters of interest be discussed.

**Roswell, N. M.**—According to Claude Simpson, Secretary of the Chamber of Commerce there will be a large delegation from Roswell to the Annual West Texas Chamber of Commerce Convention to be held in Amarillo June 21-23-25. New Mexico is but a continuation of Texas people and soil under another name.

**Munday**—The 36,000 egg hatchery here has been running at full capacity since the opening season and to date manager Walter Beaver states that he is unable to take care of the custom trade and have been unable to supply the demand for baby chicks on this account.

**Stamford**—According to the last reports on hog shipments to different towns in West Texas there has been shipped and received to date more than 20 car loads of young immature sows for the replenishing of hogs for West Texas.

**Ballinger**—Work of wrecking the old Methodist church has started here in preparation for making room for the new imposing \$40,000 Methodist Episcopal structure to be erected here.

**Colton**—The college officials of the West Texas State Teachers' College estimate that about \$850,000 will be needed in new buildings if the institution is to properly function.

**Amarillo**—To date 43 bands have signed papers agreeing to participate in the 5th annual band contest to be held during the 5th annual convention of the West Texas Chamber of

**Rotan**—The new \$100,000 high school building was dedicated here Sunday, May 2. It is said to be the most imposing school building ever erected in a town of Rotan's size.

**Crosbyton**—The Crosby County Fair will be held in this city September 15 to 18. Word comes to Crosbyton from Justiceburg that a 500 barrel daily capacity oil well has been brought in there.

**Lubbock**—Application of the Santa Fe Railway System to extend its lines eastward in Floyd county will be considered at a hearing called by the Interstate Commerce Commission to be held in this city on May 20.

**Cisco**—The Bankhead highway westward in Eastland county from the end of the brick pavement will be retopped with asphalt immediately, after which the road will be hard-surfaced in Callahan county.

**Breckenridge**—West Texas' greatest White Way, according to Curtis Harcock, manager of the local chamber of commerce, is to be immediately erected here. The plan calls for from 200 to 250 standards, and work is to begin at once. Specific plans for financing the White Way may at times be obtained from the head office of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

**Stamford**—Officials of the Texas Transcontinental Trail recently met here and let a contract for \$0,000 booklets describing the newly named highway between Texas and New Mexico.

**Vernon**—The Vernon Chamber of Commerce is making plans for a trade trip into Oklahoma, the party to leave this city on May 25.

**Ranger**—Dallas interests announce the construction of a new 100-foot business house here on West Main street, to be occupied by two new business institutions.

## ROCK ISLAND IS GRANTED PERMIT FOR LIBERAL ROAD

The Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific railway was authorized by the Interstate Commerce Commission to construct a line 145 miles long, stretching from Amarillo to Liberal, Kansas.

The line is designed to develop new territory and to serve as second class track for the handling of the roads through transcontinental traffic. It will run in a general north-westerly direction from Amarillo to Liberal.

The route is through Potter, Carson, Hutchinson and Hansford counties Texas, Texas County, Oklahoma, and a short distance in Seward County, Kansas. Construction will start immediately.

## CITY COUNCIL MEETS MONDAY NIGHT; BIDS RECEIVED FOR PUMP

The date for purchasing the equipment has been postponed for several days for further investigation and consideration, according to Mayor Reid who states that the equipment will be of the most modern in every respect when installed.

Work is going forward on the third water well for the city which it is hoped will afford a sufficient supply of water for the city for some time to come.

## PAMPA WILL HAVE HIGH LINE FROM AMARILLO SOON

Pampa is to have within the near future a high-tension line, according to announcement made Thursday afternoon by C. S. Makeig, general manager of the Southwestern Public Service Company.

The right of way is now being secured and materials are being put on the ground for the immediate construction of the highline. The line will cost about \$120,000 and will be completed within the next 90 days.

This power line has been under consideration for Pampa for some time, but due to the increased demand for power and lights the project has been rushed to the present stage. The plant here is not large enough to take care of the demand.

## LYNCH DAVIDSON TO SPEAK MAY 19 AT AMARILLO

Lynch Davidson, candidate for Governor, will speak in Amarillo Wednesday, May 19th at 8 o'clock at the Municipal auditorium, according to J. H. Gouley, an Amarillo supporter of Mr. Davidson.

Mr. Davidson is the first candidate for governor to speak in this section in the present campaign and was the first candidate to announce his candidacy for this position. He was one of the principal candidates in the gubernatorial race two years ago.







### French Doors impart

#### Touch of Elegance

Between the dining-room and hall or living room we so often see French doors nowadays, and very good they are, too.

If one, happily, has this mode of shutting off the dining room, the curtains may be of tan or yellow net. If it is not possible to buy the shade wanted, home dyeing is an easy matter. Stretch this net tight across the glass, using brass rods at top and bottom of the glass.

This same net should be used against the windows, with the straight hangings of the blue or blue and tan material at the side of the windows.

If there are sidelights in this dining room, use yellow shades, and if candles are used on the table these may also be shaded with this color. There is a soft, sunshiny glow about yellow, as used on lamps, that is most satisfying.

There are delightful little parchment shades which might be used in this color scheme. Having the shade a deep yellow with blue flowers would be charming.


