As soon as the weather clears up and the roads are passable. Ainsworth plans to make another trip to the cave. He plans to have a flashlight that will work without fail next time.

The snowfall began last Friday morning as the NEWS went to press, and continued intermittently until Tuesday night. Snow and rain fell ing for work in Hutchinson coun- alternately during these days, but the major part of the snow fell Sunday night and Monday morning.

Snowfall for this county was about eight inches. Hard winds drifted the snow about for several days, but observers here state that it was an ideal snow, as the snow melted rapidly, alowing only a small part to be blown away.

Farmers and merchants alike are enthusiastic over prospects for an average wheat and row crop. Statisticans estimate the 1926 wheat crop for Texas at 25,000,000 bushels, as compared with 6,552,000 for last year. Crop estimates work to the disadvantage of the wheat grower, as the estimate is likely to be too high, causing a decline in the wheat mar-

Along this line is something else which is badly needed here and which can and should be secured in the very near future. Several miles of .sidevalks could and should be laid here right away.


