Birthday Of Franklin

On Jan. 17, just 221 years ago, was born Benjamin Franklin, the son of a tallow candler. Benjamin was the tenth son and the fifteenth of seventeen children.

After he became large enough to him in making candles and then was apprenticed to his brother, James, who owned the New England Courant. Here he learned the principles of printing with which he was to rise from an obscure beginning until he became noted as the first great printer of the United States and among the great printers of the

Achieveing great fame, Franklin has to his credit the establishing of the first library in America, which was founded in Philadelphia in 1731 and which has been said to be the model of the American library sys-

in 1732, Franklin won wide recognition for the publication of "Poor \ Richard's Almanae". In Franklin's lifetime the almanac was the most popular form of literature in America. A few people read newspapers, but every farm who could read at all had an almanac hanging by the fireplace.

Besides the monthly calendar, the almanac contained anecdotes, scraps of useful information, and odds and ends of literature. Franklin pretended that it was written by a Richard Saunders and published it annually for twenty-five years.

Among the many proverbs that were to be found in Poor Richard's sayings one of the best known perhaps is the following:

"Early to bed and early to rise Makes a man healthy, wealthy and

in 1737, Franklin became postmaster of Philadelphia and in the same year organized a police force and a fire department.

"There usually were two to four buffalo sentinels on the lookout. follows: When they began to get uneasy, we would go down to the ground again ciation, New Orleans, April 26 to 29. with great caution if possible, and crawl on all fours in a bee line for America, Cincinnati, May 9 to 11. the herd, and when the sentinals began to get uneasy again, we knew that our time was up. We were usually then at a distance of from two to three hundred yards. Lying along the ground, we would get our old "pizen" slingers to our shoulders and plump the most suspicious sentinel in the long hair at the bulge of the ribs. At the crack of the gan we jumped to our feet and ran after the buffalo as hard and as fast as possible to save every inch of that hard earned ground. When the buffalo were running they could not see that their persucr was in motion. They usually ran from fifty to one-hundred and fifty yards at the first shot, and a good runger that got on his feet right could gain about half of that distance on them when they began to slow up. Then we would drop down and lam it to the first broad wide we saw, trying to kill a leader. Then we would have to jump and run again. This time the buffalo would not run quite so far nor so fast; and, after a few times, we could hold our own with them. Then after a little maneuvering, we had our herd at what is called a "stand", and we could sit in one place and shoot as many as we wanted for a day's skinning.


