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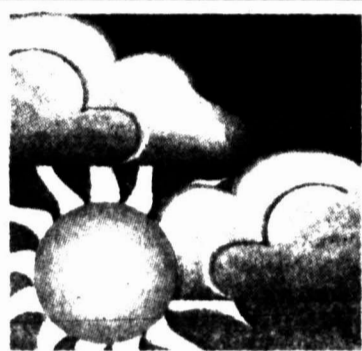

Johnny Todd Preston, 27, was in Gray County jail today in lieu of \$20,000 bond in connection with the burglary of a Pampa well service company.

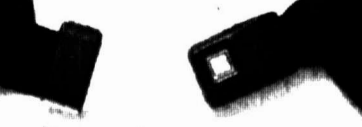
McGavock has already pleaded guilty. The charges against Robert Dee Preston are pending, according to the district attorney's office.

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## Theater seeks PEDC funding for new cinema

There could be a new movie theater in town by Thanksgiving but it might require a lot of PEDC money to get going.

That suggestion was made by Larry Delaney who is district manager for Hi-Plains Cinema, the company that owns Cinema 4 in the Coronado Center. He was speaking to the board of the Pampa Economic Development Corporation at its monthly meeting Monday afternoon.

The new theater would be in the old downtown Capri theater on North Cuyler and include a 12,000-square-foot addition in what is now a vacant lot. It would have eight screens and stadium seating, according to Delaney.

He said the move is necessary because the Pampa theater needs

## Warrants issued for court no shows 14 arraigned in District Court

Warrants have been issued for a man and a woman who failed to appear for arraignments on unrelated charges in 223rd District Court.

Edmundo Perez, 25, of Woodward, Okla., charged with driving under the influence of alcohol, subsequent offense, and Michelle Annette Cole, 33, of Amarillo, charges with possession of controlled substances, were being sought today after failing to appear in court in Pampa for arraignment before Judge Lee Waters.

Perez was indicted July 6 by a 223rd District Court grand jury. Cole, initially indicted Nov. 11, 1998, was reindicted on July 6.

Fourteen others were arraigned Tuesday on charges ranging from drug charges to stolen cars. All were indicted by the July term grand jury.

Johnny Dale Aufloger, 33, is free on \$5,000 bond after pleading not guilty Tuesday to charges of possession of a controlled substance.

## Teen guilty on drug charge, gets 180 days

A Pampa teenager pleaded guilty to possession of a controlled substance in 223rd District Court.

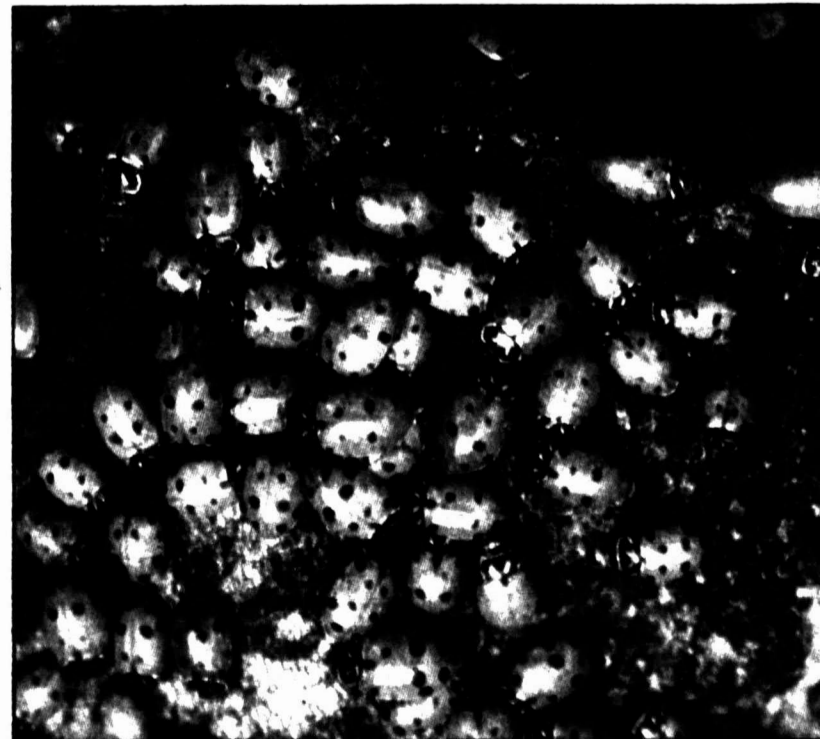
Jesus Rodriguez, 19, Tuesday pleaded guilty to possession of a controlled substance, cocaine, a state jail felony, in connection with his arrest last summer in a vacant house.

Judge Lee Waters sentenced Rodriguez to 180 days in the Gray County jail, with credit for the 167 days he has already served, and a \$2,000 fine.

Pampa police were called to a vacant house at 405 N. Davis about 10 p.m. July 24, 1998. Officers said they found Rodriguez and Pete Vargas Perez, 20, in the rent house owned by Rodriguez's mother. In earlier hearings, officers testified they also found a white powder and syringe in the bathroom of the house. Both Rodriguez and Perez were arrested and charged with possession of a controlled substance.

Tests by both Pampa police and the Texas Department of Safety laboratory indicated the white powder found is cocaine.

Dist. Attorney John Mann said the case against Perez is pending.

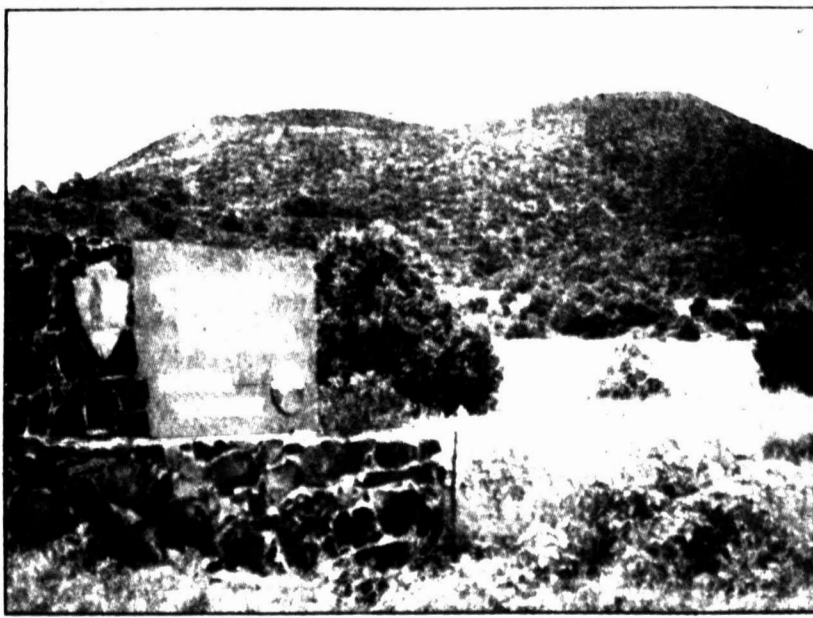
CAPULIN, N.M. — "I was impressed," said Pampa Police Chief Charlie Morris. "I didn't know they did that."

The "they" to which Morris was referring are a multitude of small orange and black beetle known as ladybugs. What he was impressed with was their annual swarming here on the rim of an extinct volcano.

Each summer the small insects cluster on vegetation here, usually on the mountain mahogany, skunk bush or piñon pine.

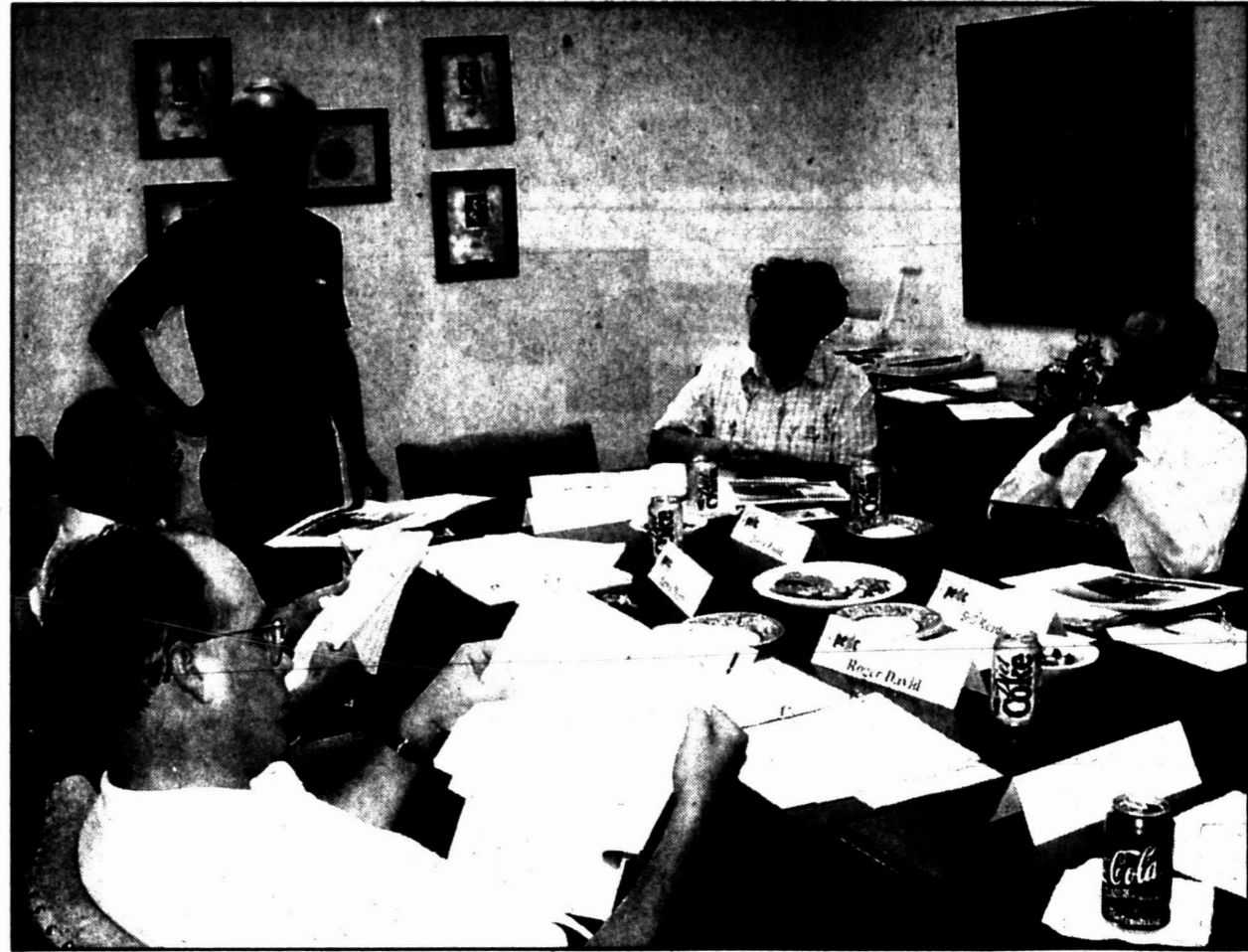
## Bush assembles powerhouse fund-raising team

WASHINGTON (AP) — The team helping Texas Gov. George W. Bush smash all campaign fund-raising records includes governors, members of Congress and corporate executives.

Many of Bush's "Pioneers" — volunteers who have raised \$100,000 — have been supporters of the governor's two statewide campaigns in Texas.

Others were supporters of his father, former President George Bush, or his brother, Florida Gov. Jeb Bush.

The money is pouring in. Bush already has raised \$37 million in the first six months of his campaign — more money than the 1996 GOP nominee, Bob Dole, took in for his entire campaign.

more screens and the company has not been able to expand at the Coronado Center.

Board member Jerry Foote asked, "You're saying you are trying to get more room out there and they won't lease it?"

"That's right," Delaney answered.

He said the company has also asked mall management if they can move into a vacant store at the end (the old Alco building) but he said that request was also refused.

"There was no discussion. It was just, no," he said. "You get no cooperation from them, the roof leaks, air-conditioner problems. I think the whole area out there is a joke."

He said the company's other theaters including Borger and Hereford are all downtown theaters.

Delaney said a new theater here would feature mostly new equipment and rocking-chair seats as they used in Borger.

He said renovations in Borger cost approximately \$400,000 including buying adjacent buildings and leveling them. He projected the proposed theater in Pampa would cost \$600,000 to \$630,000.

He proposes to redo the building in a style similar to the Hollywood Theater in Amarillo.

"So it would be bright yellow?" asked Roger David.

"Yellows and greens and oranges. It's spectacular it would stick out like a sore thumb," Delaney said.

"Almost my exact thoughts," David answered.

"We look at what the new theaters in Amarillo have done to Pampa and Borger and other towns — they have sucked the business out of these towns, even our business because they have so much more, they are new they have stadium seating," Delaney said.

He believes a new theater in Pampa can draw people here from area towns.

"We are going to close the Cinema 4. Our lease runs out in September, regardless. That theater in that mall is never going to survive. You've got a bad track record with ownership in the past, bad management and ownership of the mall. There are so many things negative about that theater that you'll never overcome them," Delaney said.

He said if a new theater can't be funded, the company might expand in the Coronado Center if they can get additional space at a reasonable price.

He cited the recent "Star Wars" movie as a reason theaters need more screens. He said when his company was offered the movie it was for a minimum of six weeks at the same auditorium.

"There's more and more going to that and if you don't have the auditoriums you don't get it," he said.

"What do you want us to do?" David asked.

"We want you to buy the Capri building and the lot next to it and fund the renovations on it and lease it back to us for a period of seven years at \$2,200 a month," Delaney said.

"That is basically the same program we have set up in prospective figures with Borger," Delaney said. "We want you to fund \$630,000. We pay \$183,000 (the cost of buying the theater, three lots north of it and construction of 12,000 square foot shell) back on rental figures. You guys are paying the difference of \$447,000."

Delaney said the company is paying more than \$2,220 in rent now for the four screens.

New Board President Richard Stowers questioned whether the PEDC could be involved since it is a retail business but Executive Director Bill Ready said they can because the area around the Capri qualifies as a blighted area, due to the number of vacant buildings in that area.

No action was taken as the presentation was preliminary but the board said it will review the request and take action at some future meeting.

# JFK, Jr.'s plane, body found

AQUINNAH, Mass. (AP) — The wreckage of John F. Kennedy Jr.'s plane was located off the coast of Martha's Vineyard with Kennedy's body still aboard, and the Navy readied a recovery mission, government officials and family sources said today.

"They've got the fuselage and John Kennedy's in it," a government source with firsthand knowledge of the investigation told The Associated Press. The White House confirmed that Kennedy's plane and a body had been found.

A source close to the scene said federal officials did not want to provide an identity of a badly mangled body aboard until a coroner could examine the body. He said there were no immediate reports of the bodies of Kennedy's wife and sister-in-law, who also were on board the plane when it crashed Friday night.

Jim Hall, chairman of the

National Transportation Safety Board, and Coast Guard Rear Adm. Richard Larrabee, who was overseeing the search, canceled a round of morning TV appearances and went to the USS Grasp, the ship where the wreckage was to be deposited after being raised from the ocean floor.

The heightened activity took place after ships from the Navy, Coast Guard and National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration spent Tuesday night scouring a site 7 1/2 miles southwest of the Martha's Vineyard coast, a spot that investigators had speculated was the likely splash point for the plane.

It crashed while carrying Kennedy, 38, his wife, Carolyn Bessette Kennedy, 33, and her sister Lauren Bessette, 34.

The fuselage was first spotted at 11:30 p.m. Tuesday, according to a statement issued by the safety board, and subsequent investigation confirmed that it was Kennedy's airplane.

White House spokesman Joe

Lockhart said the discovery was made with remote cameras. The Grasp was being repositioned so divers could go down and assist with the recovery, a senior administration official said.

"The highest priority remains locating and recovering the remains of all three," Lockhart said.

The Bessette family had no comment on the discovery of Kennedy's body, said Grant Stinchfield, a family friend.

The Kennedy family was notified of the discovery in the early morning hours, a family source said. They have discussed a range of options for handling the remains, including the possibility of a burial at sea.

No dates or details have been completed, said a family source.

"Several options are being discussed. No decisions have been made," the family source said. Stinchfield said the Bessettes were working with the Kennedys on plans for a service. Nothing has been finalized, he said.

Several experienced pilots who flew into the Vineyard on Friday night said the hazy skies and darkness were challenging even for them. Kennedy obtained his pilot's license in April 1998.

At a briefing Tuesday, Robert Pearce, who is heading the investigation for the NTSB, gave a more detailed explanation of the approach.

All seemed fine about 34 miles from the airport, with the plane descending from 5,600 feet to about 2,300 feet at a slightly faster-than-normal rate of 700 feet per minute.

About 20 miles from the airport, the plane started turning to the right and climbing back to 2,600 feet. After leveling off, it flew for a short time before beginning another turn to the right and starting "a rapid rate of descent" that may have exceeded 5,000 feet per minute, or about 10 times faster than normal.

The descent was 3,000 feet per minute faster than what would be a stressful approach for even the most experienced flier, experts said.

Pearce would not speculate on the damage caused by such a crash, but said: "I'm sure you can draw a conclusion by the debris we've been bringing in, which is fragmented."

On the fourth full day of the search, the FAA acknowledged it was asked in a phone call from an intern at the Martha's Vineyard airport to help locate the plane Friday night.

The caller, 21-year-old Adam Budd, expressed no great urgency as he telephoned an FAA station in Bridgeport, Conn., at 10:05 p.m. Friday, FAA officials said.

He said he called at the request of an unidentified couple who had come to the airport to meet Lauren Bessette. Kennedy and his wife had planned to drop her off on their way to Hyannis Port, Mass., for his cousin's wedding.

Budd asked if the agency could track the airplane, but the person at the FAA station questioned him about who he was and finally said: "We don't give this information out to people over the phone."

Budd gave up, saying, "It's not a big deal."

The plane had gone down about 9:40 p.m. Nothing was done until a much more urgent call was made to the Coast Guard at 2:15 a.m. by a Kennedy family friend.

An FAA spokesman said the person who took Budd's call acted appropriately. But an unidentified FAA source said in today's Boston Globe that the agency was considering disciplinary action against the employee for not coming forward about the call when it became clear the plane was missing.

# Kennedy tragedy touches media

NEW YORK (AP) — For news personalities like Diane Sawyer and Christiane Amanpour, John F. Kennedy Jr. wasn't just someone they covered. He was someone they knew.

As publisher of the political magazine George, Kennedy traveled in the same high-powered New York media circles. He favored the same vacation retreat — Martha's Vineyard — as luminaries like Mike Wallace and Walter Cronkite. And the same parties. When NBC's Tom Brokaw was honored at a reception last winter for his book, "The Greatest Generation," Kennedy was there.

CBS's Dan Rather, who appeared shaken when the news of Kennedy's plane crash came out over the weekend, talked about running into Kennedy in restaurants.

Two of Kennedy's relatives work for network news divisions: NBC's Maria Shriver and Fox News Channel's Doug Kennedy. Neither has covered the plane crash, and neither has been asked to.

ABC's Sawyer took Monday and Tuesday off as host of "Good Morning America" because she was grief-stricken over the crash. She is friendly with a former ABC employee, Anthony Radziwill, and his wife, Carol, who were relatives of Kennedy's and particularly close to the couple.

Sawyer was expected back today. "She felt she couldn't be on the air," ABC News spokeswoman Eileen Murphy said. "You can't force anybody to do something they're not emotionally equipped to do."

CNN correspondent Amanpour talked extensively, in interviews on "Larry King Live" and CBS's "60 Minutes," about her relationship with Kennedy, a friendship that dated back to their college days in Rhode Island.

Ms. Amanpour said that she and her husband, State Department spokesman James Rubin, had spent the previous weekend visiting Kennedy and his wife, Carolyn, at their Martha's Vineyard home. They met 20 years ago when Ms. Amanpour attended the University of Rhode Island and Kennedy was at nearby Brown, and were briefly housemates.

Though the war correspondent had never spoken publicly about the relationship, she said she wanted to now.

"We, his friends, owe him to tell what we know about him from an accurate and honest perspective," Ms. Amanpour said on "60 Minutes."

She told King that she was constantly impressed by how Kennedy lived a normal, full life "despite the fish bowl."

Ms. Shriver, a contributing anchor on "Dateline NBC," was maid of honor at the wedding of Kennedy's sister, Caroline. On Tuesday, she paid a condolence visit to Caroline Kennedy at her Long Island summer home. Ms. Shriver had not been scheduled to be on "Dateline NBC" this week.

Fox News Channel's Kennedy, a cousin of JFK Jr., has been at the network since its launch three years ago. He specializes in slice-of-life features. Fox hasn't been in touch with him since the accident, spokesman Brian Lewis said.

"We want to respect his privacy at this time of mourning," Lewis said. "He's a family member, not a Fox news reporter at this time."

## Caroline takes ride as plane discovered

BRIDGEHAMPTON, N.Y. (AP) — After the family was told today that the body of John F. Kennedy Jr. had been found, Caroline Kennedy emerged from her summer home for a short bicycle ride with her husband.

Ms. Kennedy, dressed in biking gear and wearing a helmet, pedaled silently out of her driveway around 8 a.m. with her husband, Edwin Schlossberg, trailing behind.

She did not speak. The couple returned about 25 minutes later.

The wreckage of her brother's airplane was located late Tuesday off the coast of

Martha's Vineyard, the National Transportation Safety Board and Coast Guard said today.

The Kennedy family was notified early this morning that John Kennedy's body also was found, a family source said.

Shortly after Ms. Kennedy's bike ride today, her cousin William Kennedy Smith arrived and stayed for about 20 minutes.

Ms. Kennedy and her husband also went for a bicycle ride Tuesday near their modest summer home on the eastern end of Long Island, in an area of winding roads and multimillion-dollar estates.

Later Tuesday, she was visited by Smith and another cousin, Maria Shriver. Sen. Edward Kennedy visited on Monday.

## LADYBUGS

Capulin Volcano National Monument between Clayton and Raton are Convergent Lady beetles, *hippodamia convergens*.

The convergent lady beetle gets its name because of the converging white dashes on its black thorax, according to park biologists. They usually have 13 black dots on an orange elytra or shell, but a spotless variety of *hippodamia* is known to exist. They are known as the champion aphid-eaters and one of the most abundant ladybugs that exist.

It is a species that moves in a passive, or wind-carried, migration each year, rangers said. Beginning around the end of May, the ladybugs migrate back to this extinct volcano and take up residence on the higher portions of the cone. According to the rangers here, they cluster much of the time on vegetation along the crater rim trail, a steep paved hiking trail about a mile long around the top of the volcano.

It's been almost a decade since Pampa's police chief first discovered their presence on the rim of the volcano's crater.

"It's been years," he said. Morris was on vacation, riding his motorcycle to Colorado for a fishing trip when he took a side trip to the Capulin Volcano National Monument here about three miles north of U.S. Highways 64 and 87.

It was July, 1990, when he made his way up the curving road leading to the trail heads of paths going around the rim of the crater and going down into the crater of the extinct volcano.

"I thought that was really a unique situation," he said. Usually during the last week in May or the first part of June is when the lady beetles arrive at Capulin Volcano, park service rangers said. The ladybugs ride on a warm air current in the 55 degree Fahrenheit zone and as the zone hits the earth, so do the ladybugs.

During the summer months at Capulin Volcano, the ladybugs cluster on the vegetation or fly from shrub to shrub looking for food. The hot still days of mid-summer are when the ladybugs are moving around the most. The ladybugs favorite food is the aphid. They build up their fat depots or storage areas to get through the approaching winter season, rangers said. The ladybugs hibernate through the winter on Capulin Volcano, possibly going to the lower elevations of the volcano.

The ladybugs that make it through the hardest parts of the winter then migrate off the volcano in February catching another warm air current blowing toward the south in most cases, rangers said.

Since the wind carries the ladybug in its migration, it has a hard time controlling its destination. There have been some accounts of lady beetles going into Mexico to reproduce. Other accounts say they go to aphid-infested valleys or fields closer to the volcano or maybe to aphid-rich wheat fields in Texas.

The adults lay their eggs and die completing the one year cycle that these lady beetles go through. The eggs hatch and the larvae engorge themselves on the aphids that are available in the area. Since the larvae usually clean the area of their favorite food, aphids, by the time they become adults, they are faced with the fact of either starving or migrating back to the mountainous areas to let the fields or valleys regenerate another supply of aphids so another generation of ladybugs can be hatched. So a new generation of ladybugs migrates back to Capulin Volcano to await the opportunity when they too can go back to these aphid-rich areas and lay their eggs.

Capulin is an extinct volcano, now a national monument, that last erupted between 56,000 and 62,000 years ago. The cone rises to more than 1,300 feet above the plains around it.

Named Capulin after the Spanish word for chokeberry, four states are visible from the top of the rim on a clear day.

Their great grandfather, James Madison Haslett II, started drilling wells near Titusville, Pithole and Oil City, Penn., in the 1870s. Titusville was the beginning of the oil industry in the U.S. when oil was struck there in 1859.

Lee and Chuck were born in Forest County, Pennsylvania. Their grandfather Clifton James Haslett Sr. was field foreman for United National Gas Co. of Pennsylvania from 1910 to 1939. Lee and Chuck's father, Warren Henry Hoover, drilled wells in Pennsylvania, New York, Kentucky, West Virginia and Oklahoma.

The oil boom in the Texas Panhandle lured Warren's oldest brother, Buzz, to Pampa in 1935.

The oldest brother, Buzz Hoover, drilled one of the biggest wells that had ever been drilled in this area near where the old Plainsmen Motel is located today, Debbie said.

"We just went from there," Debbie said. "He sent for the other brothers to come and pump his leases."

In 1948, Warren's son Chuck started Triangle Well Service with

Andy Webb and C.W. Henry using one unit that worked night and day. Chuck kept his job as production foreman for an oil producer and operated his own unit at night. Lee was still in high school and worked as a field hand on the unit evenings and weekends.

By 1950, the company had two rigs and Chuck was able to buy out his partners. In 1951, he expanded the business to six units. Lee was named field supervisor.

Chuck retired in 1980. Lee bought the company and ran it until last year with his daughter Debbie, daughter Vickie Hoover and grandson Marcus Hall (Debbie's son), who is now field supervisor.

Although officially retired, Lee still comes out to the office occasionally.

"We don't make any decisions without calling him," Debbie said. Debbie said she thinks her father always wanted a son, never thinking a daughter would be too interested in the oil field.

"It's been in my blood since the day I was old enough to stand on the counter and answer the phone," she said.

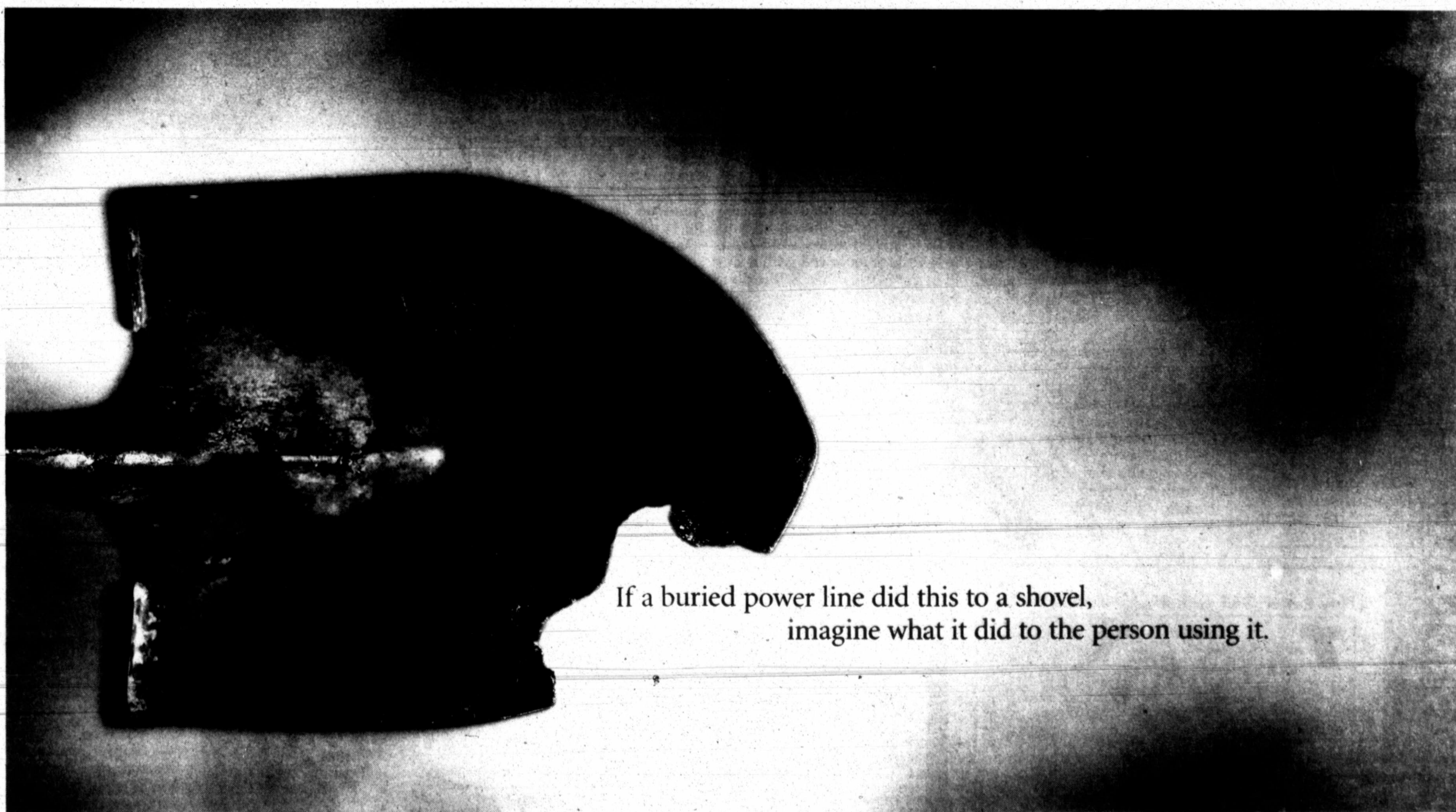
After she had been in the business about five years, she got her sister interested.

Operations today include vacuum trucks, drip trucks and transports.

Chuck Hoover died last year. A key employee, June Allen, who spent 40 years with the company, died the year before.

"She was the right hand of this business," Debbie said. "When we lost her, it was devastating."

Lee is turning the business over to the next generation. If Hunter, Christopher and Carrie have their way, it won't belong before they're actively involved in the business.

## Coronado's Schaeffer could be new cage coach at Pampa High

**PAMPA** — Lubbock Coronado assistant Jerry Schaeffer is expected to be the new Pampa High boys' basketball coach.

## AL dominates interleague play

The American League gained some ground on the National League as the third year of interleague play came to a close.

While the NL went 135-116 this season, AL teams won nine of 14 games on Tuesday. Toronto, Oakland and Texas completed three-game sweeps.

The Rangers defeated San Francisco 6-3, the Blue Jays beat Atlanta 11-6 and the Athletics edged Colorado 2-1.

In three years of interleague action, the NL leads 362-327.

Rick Helling pitched 6 2-3 innings for Texas to earn his first win in a month. Todd Zeile and Ivan Rodriguez drove in two runs each for the Rangers, who have won five of six.

Helling (7-7) got his first victory since June 16, breaking a string that included a loss and four straight no-decisions.

"We ran into a hot club," Giants starter Shawn Estes (6-6) said. "I threw some good pitches and they hit them. Against a team like this, you can't make mistakes. I'm just glad interleague is over."

Jeff Zimmerman got the final two outs, extending his club records to 21 scoreless relief appearances and 24 2-3 scoreless relief innings.

The visiting Giants, who have dropped seven of eight interleague games, were unable to get a runner past first until Barry Bonds' two-run homer in the seventh.

In other interleague games, it was Arizona 6, Seattle 0; Tampa Bay 5, Philadelphia 4 in 13 innings; the Chicago Cubs 8, Kansas City 7; San Diego 2, Anaheim 1; Cincinnati 5, Detroit 2; Boston 7, Florida 1; Baltimore 4, the New York Mets 1; the New York Yankees 7, Montreal 4; Milwaukee 5, the Chicago White Sox 4; Cleveland 7, Houston 1; and Minnesota 4, St. Louis 2.

In the only NL game, Los Angeles defeated Pittsburgh 8-4.

**Blue Jays 11, Braves 6**

In Toronto, Darrin Fletcher hit a tiebreaking grand slam in the sixth.

The Blue Jays, winners of four straight and 11 of 14, trailed 5-4 before a six-run sixth. After third baseman Chipper Jones misplayed a grounder, Carlos Delgado hit an RBI single off Tom Glavine (8-9) to tie it.

Mike Remlinger relieved and got an out before walking Tony Batista. Fletcher then hit an 0-2 pitch just over the right-field wall to give Toronto a 9-5 lead. Jose Cruz Jr. followed with a single, and Homer Bush's RBI double made it 10-5.

"They beat our brains in," Glavine said. "They've got a pretty good club, but they're not that good. We lost three games here and really probably should have won all three."

**Athletics 4, Rockies 3**

Kenny Rogers allowed three hits in 7 2-3 innings, winning his 17th straight decision at Oakland Coliseum.

Ben Grieve homered for the second straight game, and Matt Stairs and Eric Chavez also homered for the A's, who have won five of six since the All-Star break.

Rogers (5-3) gave up an unearned run on an RBI single by Dante Bichette with two outs in the eighth.

**Diamondbacks 6, Mariners 0**

Randy Johnson struck out 10 and allowed eight hits in his 25th career shutout, returning to Seattle to lead Arizona over the Mariners at Safeco Field.

Johnson (10-7), who won for the first time in seven starts since June 14, lowered his NL-leading ERA to 2.65. He was 70-32 at the Kingdom from 1989-98 and helped build momentum for a new ballpark when he led Seattle to the AL championship series in 1995.

Johnson increased his career strikeouts total to 2,558, moving past Jerry Koosman for 18th place on the career list. It was his 14th double-digit strikeout game this season, and 116th of his career.

Arizona went ahead with a four-run sixth off Damaso Marte (0-1).

Scott Rolen went 0-for-3 with three walks after homering twice in each of the first two games of the series.

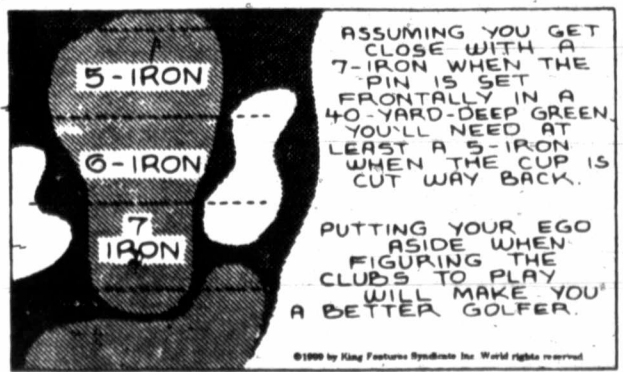
**Cubs 8, Royals 7**

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## Palmer wins at state meet

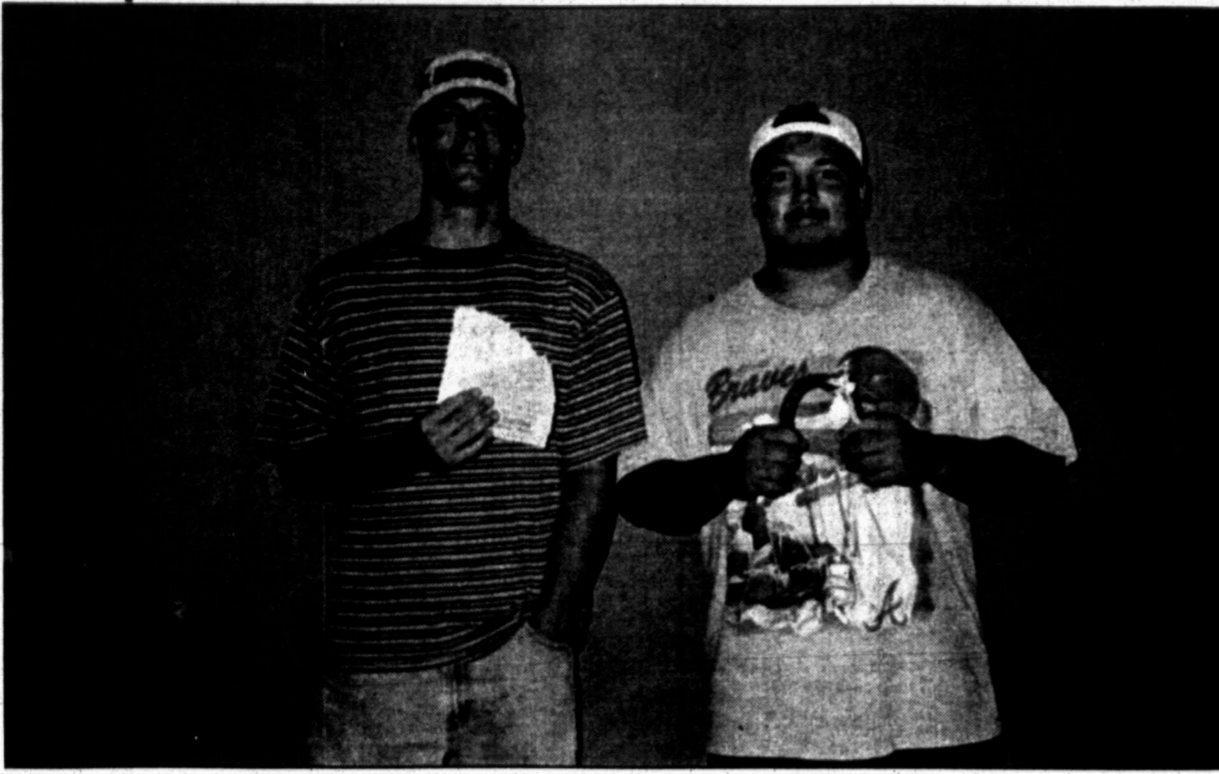
DALLAS — Pampa school teacher Wendell Palmer won two of three events at the Texas State Masters meet last weekend at Jesuit High School.

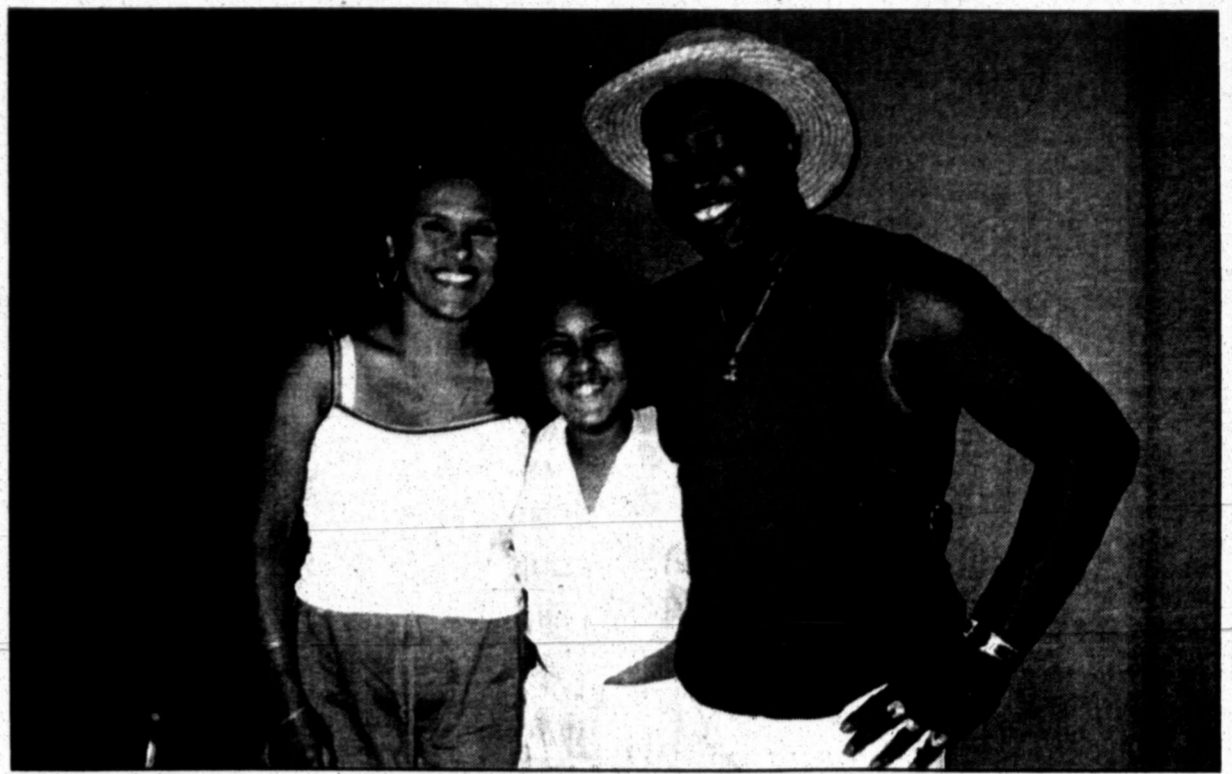
