## 200,000 BUSHEL WHEAT HARVESTED

## RESIDENCE PROPERTY BRINGS ENORMOUS PRICE

### O'LEARY AND ADDINGTON PAY \$26,000 FOR HOBART TRACT OF TWELVE ACRES

What is believed to be the highest price paid for real estate in the suburbs of Pampa was received by T. B. Hobart for his twelve acre tract lying in the west part of the city, which tract sold this week for a consideration of \$26,000 cash.

The land was purchased by Haley Addington and John O'Leary through the firm of Taylor and Anderson, exclusive agent for them. Mr. Addington and Mr. O'Leary already have extensive holdings in city property having put on the market the O'Leary addition, the Hollywood addition and other properties to be divided.

The twelve acre tract bought by Mr. Hobart will be divided into lots and be placed on the market shortly, according to the owners.

## CHILDRESS INDEX ADVOCATES BETTER HIGHWAYS TO PAMPA

Gray county reports more gushing oil wells. The latest claims that Gray and Wheeler counties have the best wells in the entire Panhandle field. The oil is of better quality and can be marketed through pipe lines as it does not contain so much paraffin as oil from farther to the northwest. As the crow flies it is only about forty miles from the northwest corner of Childress to the producing wells of Gray county. Transportation facilities are not the best from this city to the fields, which has caused those in the oil game to go to Amarillo and come back east to the fields. It is now up to Childress, Wellington and Shamrock to bring about a change of affairs and win the oil field business and travel. It can be done if the leading citizens of the three cities will work in harmony.

### North Pike Essential

The essential road is from Childress to Wellington. This is a state highway and should be surfaced as soon as possible. The road is in splendid condition and follows a short route. There are good bridges over all the creeks and rivers and concrete drains wherever needed. The road is of standard width and has been put in proper condition as regards drainage.

Between Childress and Wellington are many beds of good gravel. At no point would it probably be necessary to haul gravel more than six or eight miles. The road should be graveled eight to ten inches deep so as to withstand the heavy loads of motor trucks. An asphalt binder should be used.

### Branch at Wellington

At Wellington the highway should

branch or at a point near Wellington. The road between Shamrock and Wellington should be graveled and made first-class. A new road should be graded from Wellington direct to Pampa. This would reduce the mileage perhaps fifteen or twenty miles and bring all motor travel and truck business from as far as the Hutchinson county fields direct to Pampa, thence to Wellington and Childress. It may be necessary for Collingsworth county to build a bridge across the Salt Fork of Red River but it is very probable that the road should not leave the Shamrock-Wellington road until the trestle is crossed on the present bridge.

### Means Much to All

The building of such a system of hard surfaced highways would assure Wellington, Shamrock, Pampa and Childress of at least ninety per cent of the traffic, both passenger and truck. It would mean a saving of at least eighty miles between Wichita Falls, Dallas and Fort Worth to the oil fields. It will mean the erection of modern hotels in all the towns mentioned above.

The project can be put over and the Index would like to see a meeting held at Wellington at an early date and have representatives from all the towns attend. It might not be out of place to invite representatives from Borger and Channing to attend.

The thing of greatest value is to do something. The road cannot be built unless a united effort is put forth. The opportunity awaits these towns to receive great benefit from the oil fields, which are gradually being extended southeastward.—Childress Index.

### LOOK TO YOUR LAURELS, AMARILLO!

Well, well, well. Now comes McLean, our sister city on the southeast corner of Gray County, with claims on the Wilcox fields. Of course it doesn't mean anything to us, but somehow the News got the idea that the Wilcox field belonged to Amarillo.

But one at a time: According to a news story appearing in the Amarillo News of Thursday, July 1, of the present year, we note that "McLean is the nearest railroad point to the Wilcox and Wheeler county fields".

Now the mere fact that the Achinson, Topeka and Santa Fe Railroad operates a railway through Pampa, which town is located exactly six and one half miles from the center of the Wilcox holdings in Gray county and which town is practically surrounded by oil wells in what has been called by some (of course illiterates) the "Pampa Oil Field", is not going to prompt us to dispute any story appearing in that most estimable newspaper.

Incidentally, the McLean Chamber of Commerce carried an advertisement covering almost half of the adjacent page and carrying exactly the same statements that appeared in the news story.

We don't want to intrude into anyone's business, but would like to see fair play up in our section of the State. It seems to us that Amarillo should have some consideration in the matter as the newspapers of that city staked a claim to the field first. Of course there may be some technicalities that we don't understand concerning such things, but we just want to call the situation to the attention of the people.

### POST OFFICE NOW HAS 626 LOCK BOXES

The Pampa Post Office now has 626 lock boxes, more than the majority of second class post offices, according to Postmaster William Crawford, who states that he is expecting the classification to be raised at any time.

The recent increase in the number of clerks has added materially in the dispatch with which incoming and outgoing mail is handled at the local office.

### C. R. ANTHONY STORE TO OPEN SOON

L. T. Hill, vice president of the C. R. Anthony Dry Goods Company, and A. E. Hamilton, also connected with that company, were visitors in Pampa this week securing a location for the new C. R. Anthony Dry Goods store that will be opened in Pampa shortly.

Mr. Hill was very enthusiastic over business prospects for Pampa and states that a store will be opened here just as quickly as a suitable location can be secured.

The company is now operating thirty stores in Texas and Oklahoma.

The brick work on the Johnson building has been temporarily halted on account of not having enough face brick to finish. Mr. Johnson is continuing work on the building, however, and states that it will be rushed to completion.

G. C. Malone was awarded the contract for furnishing the floor coverings and furnishings throughout for the new Hotel Pampa, which will be located in the new R. E. Johnson building on West Foster avenue.

The Davis Construction Co. was awarded the contract for the erection of four business buildings for F. R. Warrick of Kansas City on the old A. E. Davis property on West Foster avenue. Work will begin at once and building will be rushed to completion. The buildings are to be of brick and tile and will cost approximately \$12,000.

## LOCAL BANKER BOOSTS PAMPA AS "OIL CITY OF THE PLAINS"

B. E. Finley, president of the First National Bank and booster for Pampa and Gray county, recently compiled some interesting information concerning Pampa and the Pampa Oil Field. This information was printed on a blotter and mailed to a number of people throughout this section of the State.

The blotter reads as follows: Pampa, "The Oil City of the Plains" Located in the heart of the Gray county oil field.

First oil land leased in Gray county in 1915. Wilcox Oil & Gas company began drilling first well in the Pampa Field in June 1924, on what is known as the Combs, Worley & Reynolds Ranch strictly a wild cat venture.

First well brought in in the Pampa Field August, 1924, a fifty barrel producer, now producing one hundred barrels daily, brought in by Wilcox Oil & Gas company.

Eighty-five thousand barrel tank erected by Wilcox Oil and Gas com-

pany in the Pampa Field in 1925. Second well in Pampa Field, a 200 barrel producer, brought in by Wilcox Oil & Gas company.

Stclair constructed pipeline from Pampa Field to Pampa in 1926. Third well in Pampa Field, 750 barrel producer, brought in in 1926 by Wilcox Oil and Gas company. Fourth well brought in in June 1925, 4,000 barrel producer, by Wilcox Oil & Gas company.

Merton No. 1 well in Pampa Field brought in in June, 1925, by Clark and Company. Daily production in the Pampa Field 6,000 barrels.

Wilcox Oil & Gas company now constructing a \$1,000,000 casing head gasoline plant in Pampa Field. No dry holes in the Pampa Field to date.

Oil from the Pampa Field is highest gravity oil in entire Panhandle. Fifty new rigs under construction in Pampa Field—July 1, 1926.

Harvesting of Pampa's greatest wheat crop is under full sway, with more than 100,000 bushels of wheat brought in the first three days of this week. The end of the week will probably see over 200,000 bushels shipped out or stored in local elevators.

The wheat is testing from 58 pounds per bushel to as high as 65 pounds, the average around 61 and 62 pounds per bushel. It is impossible as yet to get accurate figures on the per acre yield but farmers estimate the wheat at from twenty to forty-five bushels per acre.

C. W. Bowers of the Kepling Community is among the largest wheat growers of this section this year, having about 800 acres in wheat. He has just started harvesting and is expecting the entire field to yield on an average of forty bushels or more.

Many others in this section report yields as high as forty-five and fifty bushels on smaller fields.

Harvest hands began arriving last week and are now coming in in large numbers. They are finding employment as soon as they get here. Grain men and others report a shortage in hands, but hope that the incoming stream that is daily arriving will handle the situation.

The extra switch engine that is now stationed at Pampa greatly facilitates shipping, and it is thought the wheat can be handled easily if there is not a car shortage.

### G. C. MALONE OPENS SECOND STORE ACROSS TRACKS

G. C. Malone announces the opening of a second hand furniture store in Pampa. Mr. Malone states that the two stores are necessary to take care of this furniture business here.

S. J. Spears will be in charge of the new store. He recently returned from Kansas City where he has been for several days purchasing furniture for the two stores.

Mr. Malone will be assisted in the old store by his brother Parker Malone and Charlie Dunkle.

Why can't a town have two, three or even twenty slogans if it wants? Just at this time some of the old timers are questioning the recently begun practice of calling Pampa "the Oil City of the Plains", holding that Pampa is "The Wheat City of the Plains". Pampa is "The Wheat City of the Plains". Approximately one thirteenth of the wheat produced in the entire State of Texas is grown around Pampa and shipped from this point. Pampa might well be called "The Wheat City of Texas". But Pampa deserves the other slogan as well. At the present rate of production the Pampa field is bringing in an annual revenue of over \$4,000,000 with good prospects of increasing this output to \$40,000,000 annually within the near future. That's just two of the good things Pampa has to offer—there are numerous others.

**PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION**  
HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 9

A resolution proposing an amendment to Article 7, of the Constitution of the State of Texas by changing Section 3, eliminating the provision authorizing the Legislature to create special districts and making an appropriation therefor.

Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 3, Article 7, of the Constitution be so changed as to read as follows: (creating new Section.)

"Section 3. One-fourth of the revenue derived from the State Occupation taxes and poll taxes of one dollar on every inhabitant of the State, between the ages of twenty-one and sixty years, shall be set apart annually for the benefit of the public free schools; and in addition thereto, there shall be levied and collected an annual ad valorem State tax of such an amount not to exceed thirty-five cents on the one hundred (\$100.00) dollars valuation, as with the available school funds arising from all other sources, will be sufficient to maintain and support the public schools of this State for a period of not less than six months in each year, and it shall be the duty of the State Board of Education to set aside a sufficient amount out of the said tax to provide free text books for the use of children attending the public free schools for this State; provided, however, that should the limit of taxation herein named be sufficient the

deficit may be met by appropriation from the general funds of the State and the Legislature may also provide for the formation of school districts by general laws; and all such school districts may embrace parts of two or more counties, and the Legislature shall be authorized to pass laws for the assessment and collection of taxes in all said districts and for the management and control of the public school or schools of such districts, whether such districts are composed of territory wholly within a county or in parts of two or more counties, and the Legislature may authorize an additional ad valorem tax to be levied and collected within all school districts heretofore formed or hereafter formed, for the further maintenance of public free schools, and for the erection and equipment of school buildings therein; provided that a majority of the qualified property tax paying voters of the district voting at an election to be held for that purpose shall vote such tax not to exceed in any one year one (\$1.00) dollar on the hundred dollar valuation of the property subject to taxation in such district, but the limitation upon the amount of school tax herein authorized shall not apply to incorporated cities or towns constituting separate and independent school districts created by general or special law.

Section 2. The forgoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1926, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words, "For the amendment to the constitution of the State of Texas eliminating the provision which authorizes the Legislature to create special school districts," and all those opposed shall write or have printed on their ballots the words, "Against the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas eliminating the provision which authorizes the Legislature to create special school districts."

Section 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution and existing laws of the State.

Section 4. That the sum of two thousand (\$2,000.00) dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

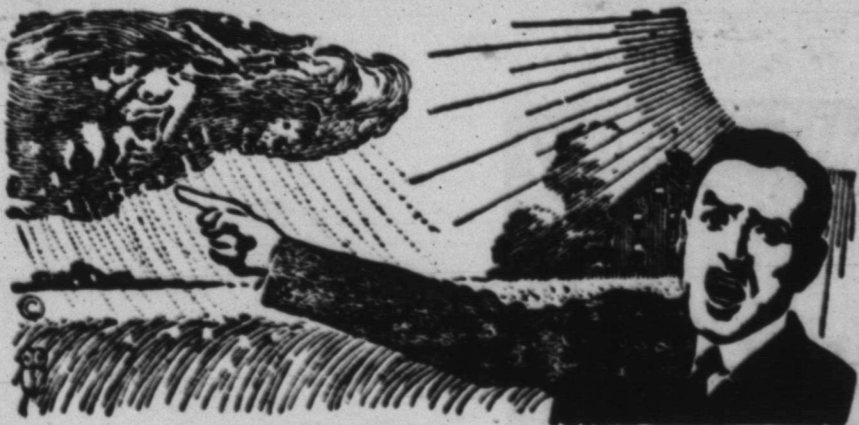

**PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE  
CONSTITUTION**

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 7  
Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by amending Section 33 and Section 49 of the Constitution of Texas so as to permit officers of the National Guard Reserve, and the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, and enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States to hold public office in Texas.

Section 1. That Section 33 of Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

The accounting officers of this State shall neither draw nor pay a warrant upon the Treasury in favor of any person, for salary or compensation as agent, officer or appointee, who holds at the same time any office or position of honor, trust or profit, under this State or the United States; except as prescribed in this Constitution. Provided, that his restriction as to the drawing and paying of warrants upon the Treasury shall not apply to officers of the National Guard of Texas, the National Guard Reserve, the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, nor to enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States."

Section 2. That Section 40 of Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"No person hold or exercise at the same time, more than one civil office of emolument, except that of Justice of Peace, County Commissioner, Notary Public and Postmaster, officer of the National Guard, the National Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States, unless otherwise specially provided herein. Provided, that nothing in this Constitution shall be construed to prohibit an officer, or enlisted man of the National Guard, or an officer in the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, or an enlisted man in the Organized Reserves of the United States from holding in conjunction with such office any other office or position of honor, trust, or profit under this State or the United States.

Section 3. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday in November A. D. 1926, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"For the Constitutional amendment permitting officers and enlisted men of the National Guard, and the National Guard Reserve, and officers of the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, and enlisted men of the Organized Reserves of the United States, to hold other offices or positions of honor, trust or profit under this State or the United States."

Each voted shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Section 4. The Governor shall issue the necessary Proclamation for said election, and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The expense of publication and election for such amendment shall be paid out of proper appropriation made by law. Approved March 16, 1925.

**PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE  
CONSTITUTION**

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 9  
A Joint Resolution relating to the amending of Article 16, Section 58, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, abolishing the Board of Prison Commissioners; providing for the supervision and management of the Prison System, under such laws as may be provided for by the Legislature.

Section 1. That Article 16, Section 58 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 58. The Legislature shall have full power and authority to provide by law for the management and control of the Prison System of Texas; and to this end shall have power and authority to place the Prison System under the supervision, management and control of such trained and experienced officer, or officers, as the Legislature may from time to time provide for by law.

Section 2. The above Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a general election to be held November 3, 1926, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballot the words "For the amendment of Article 16, Section 58, of the Constitution, abolishing the Board of Prison Commissioners said amendment shall write or have printed on their ballot the words "Against the amendment of Article 16 Section 58, of the Constitution, abolishing the Board of Prison Com

Section 3. The sum of \$5,000.00, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of the funds in the Treasury of the State, and not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

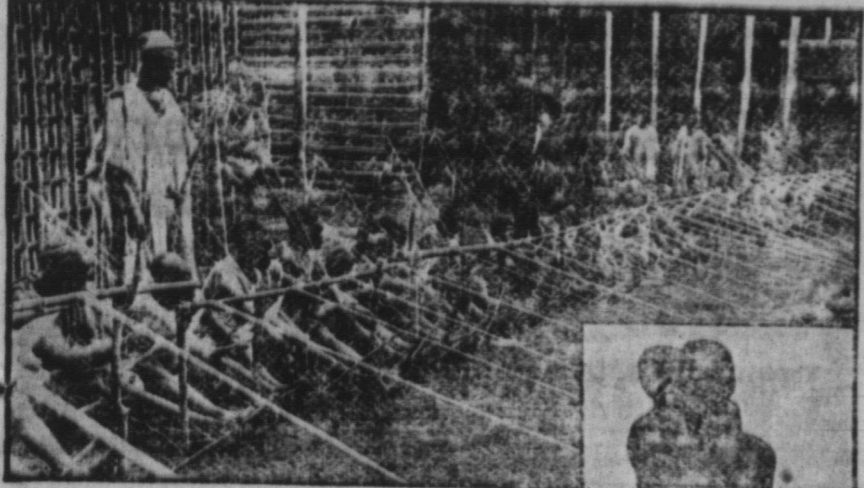

# The Wool Industry in South Africa

(Lett. from E. S. Bartlett, Bloemfontein, O. F. S., Africa)

The Union of South Africa is rightly classed among the great wool producing countries of the world. Climatic conditions there are admirably adapted to the breeding and raising of the Merino type of sheep with a strong, staple wool.

A large part of this country is suitable only for the raising of sheep, and the government is making progressive and intelligent efforts to improve both the sheep and the manner of preparing the wool for market.

Jacks being a strong menace in South Africa, long-time government loans are extended to sheep owners for the erection of jack-proof fencing. Government sheep experts are maintained permanently in allotted districts so that their services and advice may be assured at a nominal fee.

The mutton sheep of South Africa is the fat-tailed, black headed Cape—a non-wooled sheep. As no cross-breeding for mutton lambs is done, the wools are purely Merino in character.

Progress in this South African industry is particularly noticeable in the harvesting. Despite the fact that Kaffir labor can be secured at the equivalent of \$3.50 American, per month, there is a trend towards the modern shearing machine as against the age-old hand blades, which, even in America, have not been discarded by many otherwise entirely progressive wool raisers.

A study of this fact, however, readily reveals the reason for it. While there is a first cost for the machine, the unskilled black adapts himself to its use much more readily than to the hand blades, and soon does a remarkably smooth job of shearing with the machine.

Once adapted to the use of the machine, its economic value is demon-

strated in the materially greater number of sheep shorn daily; the better market value of the wool, the fewer maimed sheep, and not least important, the additional 55 to 125 more wool obtained with the machine over and above the amount of wool secured with the hand blades. As a consequence, the machine resolves itself into a small investment with certain and big returns.

Steadily, the science of wool-marketing in South Africa is fast approaching the scientific efficiency of the Australian marketing plan, which is, without doubt, the most practical and efficient in existence today.

Considering that the four provinces, Natal, Transvaal, Orange Free State, and Cape Province, which comprise the Union of South Africa, have 20,000 square miles less of territory than Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Montana and Wyoming combined, it is surprising to note that they contain two and one-half times as many sheep as our five states named.

This alone makes that country a strong contender for future leadership in the wool industry. It is interesting to note however, that the great bulk of foreign progressiveness is due to American initiative, American implements, and machinery and American ingenuity. The South African wool industry holds true to this in that American methods and American machinery are destined to take a large and important place in the economic progress of the far distant Union of South Africa.

out for the past seven years by the experiment station at Lubbock. Recognizing the merits of this tree and its adaptability to the western part of the State, the Station has during the past five years propagated and distributed some ten thousand trees of this variety in widely scattered areas. Only favorable reports have been made on the performance of this elm from the various places it has been tried throughout the State.

The people are fast becoming informed as to the desirability of this elm and there is a big demand for it. The supply within the State up to this time has largely been propagated by the experiment station for trial and distribution. The Chinese elm is propagated readily from fresh seed and in the absence of a supply of seed fair success has occasionally been secured from root and hardwood cuttings. Many nurserymen in the State are becoming interested in the possibilities and in the sale of this tree to plant in Texas. A few of the nurserymen do not have a limited supply of trees of this variety available and many others are also now planning to propagate it in considerable numbers.

A recent letter to the experiment station from the University of Nanking indicates that large shipments of seed of the Chinese elm will soon be received in the United States. The letter states:

"We have orders for about three hundred pounds of Chinese elm seed for this spring's delivery and are now

collecting the seed at three different places. At least we hope that conditions are sufficiently peaceful where we sent the men so that there will be no difficulty in making the collection and that we will be able to forward the seed to our various people in the United States of America."

"From what you say I imagine that there will be considerable demand for this for sometime to come and if it continues to do as well as it has done will undoubtedly result in large plantings throughout the semi-arid west."

Many of these seed will be planted in the State and it is hoped that an adequate supply of this tree will soon be available. From experience with some four or five importations of seed direct from the University of Nanking, Nanking, China in the past few years according to Mr. Karjer, it has been found that difficulty is occasionally encountered in getting setting good germination. This seems to be mainly due to the fact that the seed ripen in China in May and by the time they reach this country the hot, dry months are not so favorable for planting tree seeds. In spite of this fact, however, the station has had better success in planting the seed with proper care immediately upon arrival than when the seed were held over for planting until the following spring. These elms do not retain their viability well and when held over until the following April or May, which is the best

time for planting, best seeds of this kind, the germination is usually very low. The shipments of this seed will arrive from China in June or early July and the best success may be expected by planting immediately upon arrival and giving the seedbeds from one-half to full shade during germination and the young seedling stage.

Fresh seed give a high germination and produce seedlings in abundance so that once a dependable supply of seed is developed from trees in this country it will be easily propagated. Trees on the Lubbock station have borne a heavy crop of seed the past two years, but they have mostly been destroyed by late frosts before completely matured. Enough good seed were saved this year to furnish several thousand plants. A more dependable source of seed will likely be farther north in the plains area where

the tree are held back from putting on a seed crop in the spring so as to escape the later frosts.

The Chinese elm is a drought resistant tree having an extensive surface root system. It has numerous small leaves, makes a dense shade and is remarkably fast growing and easily transplanted. It is apparently especially valuable for the western part of the State where there are practically no suitable shade trees native and where a dependable tree of these habits is so badly needed for both city and farm planting. Its growth there up to this time indicates that Chinese elm is a distinct and valuable addition to the meagre list of trees thriving in this region and from trial plantings in other sections it also promises to be of considerable importance as a desirable shade tree in other parts of Texas.

"Shall the provisions of Chapter 9 Article 1086 to Article 1105 both inclusive, of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas 1925, relating to Street Improvements, be adopted or rejected by the City of Pampa, as provided by Article 1104 of the R C S of Texas 1925, and the constitution and laws of the State of Texas."

The said election shall be held at the Fire Station in the City of Pampa and the following named persons are hereby appointed managers of said election, to-wit: Presiding Judge, T. H. Lane; Judge P. C. Ledrick and T. W. Johnson and John B. Ayres as Clerks.

The said election shall be held under the provisions under the constitution and the laws of the State of Texas, relating to such elections and only qualified voters who are property taxpayers of said City shall be allowed to vote.

All voters who favor the proposition to adopt the provisions contained in Chapter 9 of the R C S of Texas, 1925, shall have written or printed upon their ballots the words: "For the adoption of the provisions of Chapter 9, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925."

And those who oppose, shall have written or printed upon their ballots the words: "For the rejection of the provisions of Chapter 9, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925."

Said election shall be held in compliance with the law with reference to regulating City Elections, in said City.

**PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION**

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 19  
Proposing an amendment to the Constitution providing for taxation of school lands owned by counties.

1. Cotton material.
  2. Wash material.
  3. Made by machine with little or no hand work on it.
  4. Made in style suitable for the individual wearing it, also which can be laundered easily.
  5. Use some tailored finish, either bound button holes or set-in pockets.
  6. Trimming suitable for material used in the dress.
- The following score card will be used in the judging:
1. Suitability of article to purpose—15.
  2. Beauty and quality of design—15.
  3. Harmony and color of materials—15.
  4. Symmetry, accuracy in cutting—20.
  5. Perfection of stitches—10.
  6. Neatness of finish—10.
  7. Laundering possibilities—5.
  8. Appearance of dress on woman—10.

**Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas.**

Section 1. That Article 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas shall be amended by adding after Section 6 thereof 6a, which shall read as follows:

Section 6a. All agriculture or grazing school land mentioned in Section 6 of this Article owned by any county shall be subject to taxation except or State purposes to the same extent as lands privately owned.

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, thereon "For the Constitutional amendment providing for taxation of all agriculture or grazing school land owned by any county, to the same extent as land Constitutional amendment providing for taxation of all agriculture or grazing school land owned by any county to the same extent as and privately owned."

Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the necessary said election and have the necessary as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The expense of publication and election for such amendment shall be paid out of proper appropriation made by law.

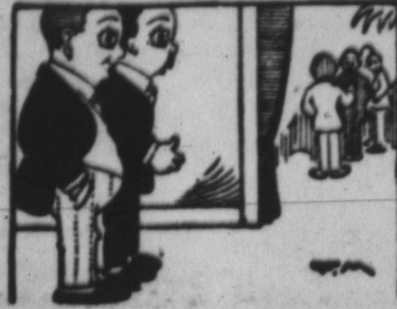
