GULF NO. 4 MAKING 1600 BARRELS CITY TO PAVE NINE AND ONE-HALF BLOCKS

IKE LEWIS AND J. P. BRADFORD ELECTED ALDERMEN FROM THIRD WARD; PRISONERS ARE EXPENSE

The city council voted to pave nine and one-half blocks of streets at a meeting Wednesday night. The council also voted to accept a bid of 95 cents, flat rate, on warrants to be issued to the amount of \$5,000. Approximately \$40,000 will be used to carry out the present paving program, and the remaining sum will be used to care for the present indebtedness of the city, and for operating expenses until the 1926 taxes are collected in January of 1927.

Two Men Caught Trying To Enter Wade Store Here

An attempted robbery of Wade Store was prevented last Thursday night when Sheriff Graves and one of his deputies made their appearance. Wade Duncan, proprietor of the store, had been out at the rear of the building with a flash light and a rifle shooting rats. He came back into the store and left the flash light and gun setting near the back door. He walked to the front of the building and when he returned they were gone.

Duncan says that he thought that a hold-up was probable and notified the sheriff. The men never came around just then, however, but later some men in an adjoining store heard a noise at the back door of the Wade store and notified the sheriff.

When the sheriff and one of his deputies arrived they found two men cutting the screen out of the rear door. The men ran but were followed and caught. They are being held in the jail here. The flashlight was found in the possession of one of the men. The rifle was found hidden in a lot back of the store.

Drilling at 1000 Feet In the Wilcox Addition

Building and improvements are progressing rapidly in the Wilcox Addition, according to "Billy" Lawrence, sales manager. The well on the addition is down about a thousand feet, and we expect no delays in going on down," says Lawrence.

The company has occupied offices in the Smith Building, but still maintains the office on the addition. Prizes are being offered to the persons who guess the closest as to the progress of the well.

Paving will begin within the next four or five weeks, according to A. H. Doucette, city engineer. It will take about a month for the city to advertise for bids and complete the necessary legal operations.

The streets to be paved are: Cuyler form Brown Avenue to Browning Avenue, which are the streets passing in front of the high school building and an east and west street two and one-half blocks south of the Sante Fe tracks, and one-half block both east and west on the east and west streets between the high school building and the tracks.

The warrants will be issued by the H. C. Burt and Co. The meeting of the council Wednesday night was in session from 8 o'clock until 1:45 o'clock. The paving situation was thoroughly threshed out by the members of the council before any definite action was taken.

Ike Lewis and J. P. Bradford were sworn in as aldermen from the third ward at the meeting Monday night. They replace the vacancies made by Ben. R. White and Earl Rice who recently moved out of that ward.

The election returns of the special election held Sept. 29 were read before the council. The ballots were cast as follows: Ike Lewis 27, J. P. Bradford 19, Charles Sparlock 9, Tom Lane 5.

Several bonds were presented to the council by plumbers. All of them were approved. The amount of each bond was \$5,000.

At a meeting of the council last week the Santa Fe Railway Co. presented a petition to close Gillispie Avenue where it intersects the railroad tracks. A committee composed of Neil McCullough, Dave Pope and J. E. Murfee were appointed at that time to investigate and report to the council. The committee presented maps at the meeting showing the streets and the railroad tracks. The maps were prepared by the railway company in order to show how they intend to extend their brick platform if the street crossing is closed.

The general attitude of the council seemed to be in favor of closing the crossing if it was necessary in order that the railway company might carry out their proposed plan of expansion here. No definite action was taken on the matter.

The problem of caring for the city prisoners was brought before the council. At present the city only gets one dollar from the minimum fine of \$12.50 which is generally assessed. The city attorney receives five dollars, the mayor two dollars and sixty cents, the arresting officer four dollars, and the city one dollar. The prisoners were shown to be considerable loss to the city on account of feeding them.

A committee composed of Murfee, McCullough and Lewis were appointed to investigate the probability of putting the officers on a strictly salary basis, and probably leave more money for the city by doing so.

A. H. Doucette, city engineer, who has been investigating the paving situation in Pampa reported to the council. He says that the people in Amarillo are going ahead and paying for the cost of paving, and all that the city does is to excavate and grade the streets preliminary to the paving. "For instance," he said, "all that the property owners

J. M. Smith is suffering a sprained hip as the result of a fall last Wednesday afternoon. He is resting very well now and expects to be up before long, according to his son, Joe Smith.

He was walking around the corner at Cuyler and Foster streets when he slipped and fell. G. C. Malone was notified and he was taken to the home of his son in an ambulance. Several persons have fell at this particular corner when the mud was on the sidewalk, but none had the misfortune to be hurt as was Mr. Smith.

New \$20,000 Laundry Now Operating Here

Marion Howard opened his new \$20,000 laundry here last week. It is located at the corner of Ballard and Francis streets and operated as the Pampa Laundry.

The laundry building and equipment is new and modern in every respect. One truck is now being operated to call for and deliver the laundry. Another truck will be added in the future if business requires, according to Howard. Fifteen people are employed at the laundry.

Mrs. Howard and two children will move from Oklahoma City to Pampa to make their home. Mr. Howard says that he expects to build a house here next spring.

New 52-Room Hotel to Be Finished In 2 Weeks

E. L. Allen of Dallas is in Pampa supervising the construction of his fifty-two room hotel. The new building is located in the Wilcox addition on the south side of the city.

Allen will operate a cafe in connection with the hotel when it is completed, which he says will be within the next two weeks. The building is being contracted by C. W. Pence of Dallas for from \$25 to \$27,000, according to Allen.

HIGH LINE FROM AMARILLO TO PAMPA TO BE COMPLETE WITHIN NEXT 3 WEEKS, SAYS MANAGER

The high line from Amarillo to Pampa will be completed within the next three weeks, according to Theo Tipps, manager of the Southwestern Public Service Co. here. "Nothing but extreme weather conditions will hinder the early completion of the line," says Tipps.

G. P. Parkin, foreman of the workmen, has started a crew to work from Pampa west to meet another crew that is working eastward. Parkin is making a survey of the leading racks west of here and wires will be run to furnish electrical current.

Roy Walker, power man for the company, is making a survey of the Pampa oil field and estimating the available power there is to be furnished. If it is sufficient the

company will run a line to the field and furnish the current.

Equipment for the sub-station here is in transit and will be installed as soon as it arrives, according to Tipps. Meters are being set daily and a rapid extension of the lines is being made. Estimates are that about 100 houses are yet to be served with electrical current. More than 550 business houses and residences are now enjoying electrical convenience.

The present plant at Pampa is capable of producing 435 horsepower. The high line will produce several thousand horse power. Mr. Tipps says that the present equipment will care for the town temporarily, but that the service will be greatly improved when the high line connects with the town.

OIL WELL THREE MILES SOUTH MAKING 450 BARRELS PER DAY; BAD ROADS DELAY OPERATIONS

Gulf No. 4 is reported to be making 1600 barrels a day now. The well came in a week ago Saturday with a natural flow of 20 barrels an hour. It was shot a few days ago however and is holding its own at 1600 barrels. This well is in Section 88, Block 3, Gray County.

The Young and Osborne Holmes No. 1 well was shot with 500 quarts of nitroglycerine Monday evening and is now making around 450 barrels a day. This well is in the southeast corner of the northeast quarter of section 106. It is less than three miles from the city limits to the south of Pampa.

The Mount Valley Oil Company's well three miles east of White Deer has gas, according to reports from A. M. Wilbanks Jr., one of the stockholders in the company. The first gas was encountered at a depth of 2,350 feet. The elevation at which the gas was struck is a good indication of the well making a good producer, according to oil officials. The well is arousing much interest among the oil men.

Leases in the vicinity of the Roxana Bryan well No. 1 continue to soar and the general feeling around White Deer is high. The well has been deepened and has taken a substantial jump in production, leading the Carson County field. The granite wash was encountered at from 3,145 to 3,175 feet by this well, with an initial flow of seventy barrels an hour. The well was shut down because of inadequate storage, to five barrels an hour. Now with storage available and the hole deepened two feet, the well is making sixty-five barrels an hour.

The Roxana has started No. 2 Bryan in the southeast corner of the northeast quarter of section 92, and another location has been made in southwest corner of the northeast quarter of section 107, according to reports from White Deer.

The Marland Oil Co. has a south offset in the northeast corner of the southeast quarter of section 92. The Texas Co. has a location in the southwest corner of the northwest quarter of section 91. The Empire also has a location in the northwest corner of the southwest quarter of the same section. The McMann Oil Co. has two locations in section 107. With activities that promise to equal the other fields in a short time, the residents of White Deer and vicinity are looking forward to an equal share in the Panhandle boom.

The road leading to the oil field to the south of Pampa is in almost impassable condition, according to scouts who have been making daily trips to and from the field. Several have reported being stalled on the road for hours at a time. The

Firemen Must Hold Drill According To State Headquarters

Alex Schneider, fire chief, recently wrote to the state insurance commission and explained the conditions of Pampa as he saw them. He received the following letter in reply:

State Insurance Commission
Fire Insurance Division
Austin, Texas, Sept. 28
Mr. Alex Schneider, Fire Chief,
Pampa, Texas.

Dear Sir:—
We are in receipt of your favor of the 21st, and note what you have to say with regard to the conditions in your city in connection with the accessibility of your fire apparatus.

The conditions which exist are certainly not what they should be, and it is going to be absolutely necessary that they be remedied immediately, and we might call to your attention the fact that a regular schedule of drills must be maintained in the fire department at least twice each month throughout the entire year.

In order that this matter, and any other matters in connection with the Key Rate of Pampa may be fully brought out, we are going to list your city for the attention of our engineering department, at which time a full investigation will be made of all the fire protection facilities. Since we understand your town has had quite a large growth of course, it is going to be imperative that the fire protection keep pace with this growth. Consequently, the city officials will have to make a great many improvements if they desire to maintain their present Key Rate.

Assuring you of our hearty co-operation at all times, and that we will give this matter of inspection our earliest possible attention, we beg to remain,

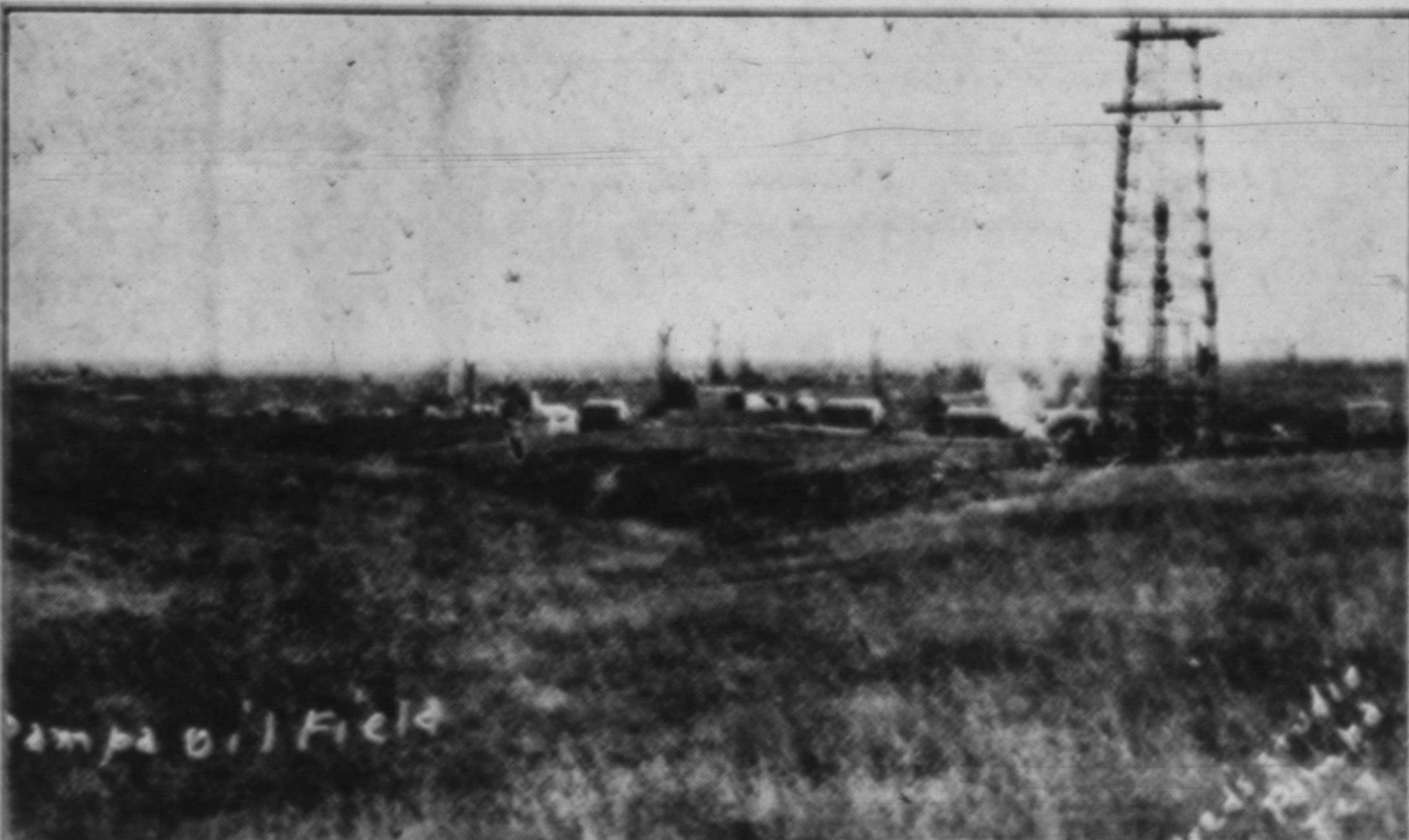
Deepest Mud at Cuyler And Atchinson Streets

In a block sign a petition to pave street in front of their property. The city then agrees to grade the street and prepare it for paving if the property owners will pay for the cost of the paving. They agree to pay in cash within thirty days after the pavement is accepted.

The plan that seemed to be met with most favor was to have the city pay one-fourth the cost of paving and have the property owners pay the remaining three-fourths.

L. Wright, representing the Portland Cement Co., spoke to the council on the qualities of concrete paving. The city engineer made his estimates based on brick paving, which the council discussed at a meeting some time ago.

The streets that had previously been planned to pave first are: Cuyler St., from the north side of the property line on Francis St. to the south side of the property line on Brown St.; Francis Street from the west side of Cuyler to the east side of Frost; Kingsmill from the west side of Cuyler to the east side of Frost and from the east side of Cuyler to the east side of Ballard; Foster Street from the west side of Cuyler to the west side of Gray and from the east side of Cuyler to the east side of Ballard; Atchison Street from the west side of Cuyler to the west side of Russel and from the east side of Cuyler to the east side of Ballard.

Ike Lewis of the third ward south of the tracks proposed that some paving be extended in the paving program on the south side. His proposal seemed to meet with the approval of the council. The older councilmen explained to the new members that the proposed streets were laid out first in order to have a basis upon which the city engineer could base his estimates.

C. R. Woolsey of the H. C. Burt and Co., which deals in investments and securities, met with the council and discussed the matter of issuing warrants for the present debt of the city, and for other warrants so that the city might carry out their program of expansion without waiting for the revenue of 1926 which is not in until January of 1927.

Most interesting of all was the fact that our capital city is one of the few municipalities of the nation to have a flag all its own, regularly adopted by the City Council, the one adopted having been selected from about 135 designs submitted by people from all over the United States, a California man winning the prize of \$50.00 which had been offered for the most suitable design.

AT 21—The Writer of "The End of a Perfect Day" Gave Up Music for Marriage.

AT TWENTY-ONE I had been married three years and was experiencing a break in my music studies, which began when I was four.

"At that tender age I often slipped away to the piano in the front room of our house. I used to pick out the tunes I had heard, and what I couldn't remember I improvised. When I was nine I could play Liszt's Rhapsody correctly enough for it to be recognizable. But if I heard a piece once I knew it by heart. Later I had a music teacher for several years.

"But when, at twenty-five, I married again, my music received a stimulus. Dr. Frank Lewis Bond, my second husband, took a deep and sympathetic interest in my career and, under his encouragement and enthusiasm, I wrote the words and music of some little songs that were continually running through my mind.

"I took a few of these to a Chicago publisher who looked them over and said 'no,' but he added that he wanted some children's songs and asked me if I could do them.

"I could, and I would. By noon the next day I had composed the words and music for a little song which I called, 'Is My Dolly Dead?' The publisher accepted it, and in another ten days it was being sung by Teresa Vaughn in the comic opera called '1402.—Carrie Jacobs Bond.'

TODAY—Carrie Jacobs Bond, even if she does not write anything else, will go down in musical history as the writer of "The End of a Perfect Day," a song which has sold five million copies, and is still selling. The only song which can compare with it in popularity, in its own field, is "Silver Threads Among the Gold." But there was many a bitter struggle before Mrs. Bond achieved her present fame. Her second husband died when she was thirty and left her to support herself and her boy. In the years that followed she did everything to make a living, even to renting out rooms to boarders. At last her songs began to be noticed, and then she established a publishing house with the help of her son, which issued all her songs. This business-like move doubled Mrs. Bond's profits, when her songs really became popular.

EVERYDAY GOOD THINGS

NUTS are rich in protein and fats;
when well-masticated they are a
wholesome food. As they are like-
cheese, a concentrated food, they
should be eaten with food that add-
bulk to the diet.

Nut Bread.

Sift together two and one-half cup-
fuls of flour, a teaspoonful of salt and
three teaspoonfuls of baking powder.
Add one cupful of milk, one-half cup-
ful of sugar, and one well-beaten egg.
Mix well and add three-fourths of a
cupful of walnut meats, broken into
bits. Bake in a moderate oven 45
minutes.

Prune Bread.

Sift together one-fourth of a cup-
ful of cornstarch, one and three-
fourths cupfuls of flour, one teaspoon-
ful of sugar, one-half teaspoonful of
salt, and stir in two tablespoonfuls of
oil of melted butter. Add one-half cup-
ful of stoned, cooked and drained
prunes and enough milk to hold the
mixture together—a scant half-cupful.
Pour into a well-greased dripping pan,
dust with one teaspoonful of cinnam-
on and chopped nuts and bake 25
minutes in a hot oven.

Combination Sandwiches

Finely chop cold chicken to make a
cupful, add one cupful of finely
chopped broiled mushrooms. Mix
thoroughly, add two tablespoonfuls
each of finely chopped pimentos,
onion and cooked green pepper, mix
with the first mixture, add mayon-
nais to moisten and use as a filling
for buttered slices of white bread,
ve with crusts removed, and cut
narrow strips.

Pampa Oil Field Praised in Article In Omaha Paper

The following brief, but graphic description of Pampa appeared in a recent issue of the Omaha World-Herald, and was written by Henry C. Richmond, formerly of the World-Herald staff, now of Pampa:

Pampa, Tex., Sept. 16.—To the Editor of The World Herald: With never a wish to detract from the best state in the union, I take it from the occasional inquiries of Nebraska friends that this now famed oil region of the Texas Panhandle is a source of interest to many who might welcome a line of first-hand information.

Wherever Madame Fortune is entertaining, people will flock. All roads lead to Texas now. Run your finger down a United States map to the north line of Texas and you come to the Panhandle (handle of the pan) bounded on the north and east by Oklahoma and the west by New Mexico. Within this square, geologists, experts and wise men of science from all points of the compass assert lies the most promising oil field in the world.

Now move south to the third tier of counties, to this treeless town on the Santa Fe, three hundred miles from Wichita, seven hundred miles from Omaha and 60 miles from Amarillo—Amarillo, the cow town of yesterday, city of 50 thousand today. Pampa, near the center of this area, which extends

northwesterly 130 miles, with a thousand producing wells bringing forth 1122 thousand barrels every day including Sunday, was for a score of years a mere village and trading point until crude oil burst forth to craze its inhabitants, tickle the farmers with rich royalties, dot the landscape with towering derricks and glut the highways with fancy automobiles. And this transformation has all come since the last presidential election, although possibly not on that account.

Come with me in fancy for a short drive from Pampa across the pretty plateau and over the hideous typography where the oil activities chiefly abound. We count a thousand spanking mules drawing every conceivable detail of equipment for the oil fields; giant trucks, with staggering cargoes, caravans of teams with lumber, machinery, casings, building materials, riggings and modern machinery; huge ditch digging machines, making the way for pipe lines; surveyors—hundreds of 'em—tourists, adventurers, speculators, brokers, "lease hounds," real estate dealers, investors, steek salesmen from Florida, dandified Californians, hard boiled oil boomers from Oklahoma by the hundred and forward looking purposeful men and women from everywhere, including Nebraska. The Norval family of Seward has very large interests in the great Borger field some 20 miles from here. William T. Lawrence, he of Anheuser-Busch and Ak-Sar-Ben fame, is a popular real estate operator here; Wilson Atkins, Fred L. Cross, George Volz, now prominent in Dallas business

circles, and other former Omahans are linking their destinies with the oil boom.

In every town in the Panhandle it is said more people sleep in cots than in beds. Building is behind. Two months ago this town had two lumber yards; there are 15 here today. Three railroads are in course of construction through these fields, and as many projected. Natural gas, in unlimited quantities, is being piped hundreds of miles, and a line is being financed to Kansas City. Million dollar pipe lines, refineries and similar projects are common. Pardon a sojourner of a few weeks for thinking it's a big show when, on every side, the best informed assert with assurance, "Why, we have only started."

Presbyterian Executive He'd

Dr. G. W. Fender, executive secretary of the Texas Synod of the Presbyterian church, was here last week in the interest of the church. He says that he met with great encouragement from every source.

He asked the Rev. W. M. Baker to supply the church here until a permanent minister is secured. A lot has been purchased by the church here, and a building fund has been started. Rev. Baker will begin regular services here Oct. 19.

Roy McMillen And G. C. Stark Buy The Strader Elevator

G. C. Stark and Roy McMillen have purchased the U. S. Strader Grain Company's elevator here and will operate it in the future as the Stark and McMillen Grain Co.

Stark has been in the feed and grain business in Tonkawa, Okla., for several years. His family will make their home in Pampa. His two children, Curtis and Ester will enroll in the Pampa school.

McMillen has been with the Stader Grain Co. in Amarillo for some time previous to purchasing business here. He and his family will live here and his oldest daughter, Blanche, will enter school here. He has another daughter, Jeanet, three years old.

F. D. Borthick, who has been manager of the elevator here for some time will continue as such for the Stark and McMillen Co.

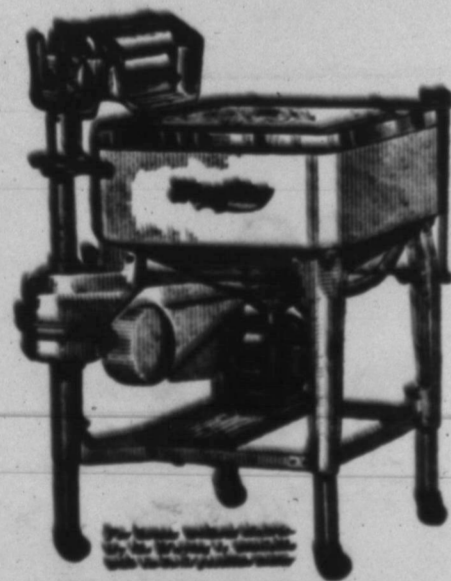

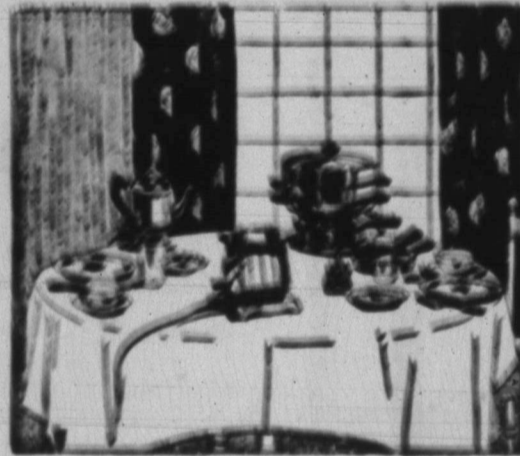
